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The Collection of Government Bills a specialty. 1275-14

COUNCIL MEETING.

Various Matters Referred to the Next Legislature.

The Executive and Advisory Councils of the Hawaiian Government met this afternoon at 2 o'clock. There were present: President Dole, Ministers Hatch, King, Damon and Smith, and Councilmen Bolte, Allen, Nott, Morgan, Hosmer, Wood, Kennedy and Castle.

President Dole called the Councils to order at ten minutes past two and the usual roll-call and reading of minutes followed.

Chairman Hosmer of the Judiciary committee reported against the petition of the liquor men for remuneration, claiming that the amount asked was too great in the first place, being over \$10,000, and that the licenses showed on the face that the saloon keepers were required to close their saloons on holidays on any other days at the request of the Minister of the Interior.

President Dole stated in reference to the above matter that the Government was expending nothing outside of the money regularly appropriated, and that the petition would require the passage of a new appropriation bill. While personally he thought the petitioners had no claim in law or otherwise he was in favor of referring the matter to the Legislature.

Minister Damon also concurred in the President's idea and said he was in favor of allowing the liquor men at least an extension of license for the 23 days, during which their places had been closed.

The alcohol bill was also referred to the legislature.

The report of the Military Committee as read by Mr. Bolte recommending that the pay of the officers of Companies E and F be increased was approved. Among others Captain Pratt gets full pay hereafter. The report was adopted.

Minister Damon offered a new appropriation bill calling for \$20,000 more to pay the expenses of the Government to date. The bill passed its first reading and, under suspension of the rules, its second.

President Dole read a petition signed by 55 Hawaiians asking the privilege of organizing a separate military company, and asked the Councils to authorize him to allow the company to be formed. The Councils authorized the President to grant the request.

Minister Damon brought up the appropriation bill again and asked that it pass its third reading, the money being required by the first of the month, and it being more than probable there would be no further meetings of the present Councils. The bill passed unanimously.

The secretary of the Councils was instructed to have the laws of the Councils passed since the organization of the Republic, printed and bound, both in English and Hawaiian, tenders to be called for.

The bill allowing deputy sheriffs to administer the oath of allegiance was referred to the Legislature. At five minutes to three the Councils adjourned.

LATE COAST NEWS.

Schooner Transit Arrives this Morning—Eighteen Days from San Francisco.

The United States Minister at Alexandria, Egypt, has obtained from the Turkish Government instructions for the Governor of Erzeroum to facilitate the mission of William A. Sachtleben, of St. Louis, who was sent out by the American Bicycling Association to search for the remains of Frank G. Lenz, the Pittsburgh Wheelman, who has been missing for a year and who is supposed to have been shot dead on the road between Kowitali and Sahara, Armenia.

President Cleveland states that in the event of his not being re-nominated for the Presidency he will make an extended foreign tour soon after he leaves the White House.

A cyclone in Kansas on the 1st inst. killed seven persons and destroyed a vast amount of property. It is said to have been the most destructive storm for years.

The ports of Vera Cruz, Tampico and Guyamas are open for the free importation of goods in bond bound to the free zone bordering the United States on the south.

General Manager Frye of the Santa Fe road declines to reinstate any of the A. R. U. men who were implicated in the strike of a year ago.

An aged Hebrew dealer in old clothes was murdered at his home, near Marysville, California, by two men who have been jailed for the offense. Plunder was their object.

The New York House and Senate have voted to legalize horse racing.

Zella Nicolaus has filed papers in the Supreme Court of New York in her suit against George Gould to recover forty thousand dollars which she states was in the form of check, and which was lost in some way and found by Gould. This is the case which brought Gould into such notoriety about a year ago.

It is authoritatively announced that an English syndicate will purchase the entire electric street railway system of Portland, Oregon. It has a 128 miles of track and the price to be paid is \$3,000,000.

George Newcomb and Charlie Pierce, members of the Dalton-Doolin gang, operating in Oklahoma Territory, have been killed in a fight with the sheriffs.

It is announced in Washington, D. C., that Great Britain has accepted the guarantee made by Salvador for the payment of the indemnity by Nicaragua in London within a fortnight, and as soon as Nicaragua confirms it and so informs the British Admiral, the Admiral is instructed to leave Corinto.

The government of Italy has offered to join that of the United States in an effort to avert by mediation the threatened conflict between Japan and the three European powers.

The denial from Washington of the report that an alliance was about to be concluded between England and the United States to support Japan has produced a favorable impression in Russia.

C. T. Hills, one of the witnesses for the prosecution in the Dumont case in San Francisco, attempted suicide on the 2d inst. Despondency was the cause. Mrs. Stanford was recently in Washington, where she called on Attorney-General Olney and urged him to push the suit as fast as possible, so as to place the estate of her late husband in a position to be available at the earliest possible date for the purposes provided in his will.

Theodore Durant has been bound over by the coroner's jury in San Francisco to stand trial for the murder of Minnie Williams.

The death of General Newton takes away one of the bitterest opponents of the Pacific Mail Company in the fight with the Panama Railway Company.

"PRINCE CUPID."

The Gist of His Application for a Writ of Habeas Corpus.

At noon of May 20th, Hon. Paul Neumann, as counsel for Jonah Kalaniana'ole, more generally known as "Prince Cupid," convicted of misprision of treason, filed in the Supreme Court a petition for a writ of habeas corpus in his behalf.

Owing to the importance of the matter and numerous inquiries which have been made as to the grounds on which the writ was issued the BULLETIN presents its readers with a synopsis of Mr. Neumann's brief in the case.

The petition of J. Kalaniana'ole respectfully shows to the Court that he is a resident of Honolulu, and is unlawfully and unjustly restrained of his liberty and imprisoned by one James A. Low in the Oahu prison by virtue of a pretended commitment or order of the late Military Commission. Accompanying the petition is a long recital of the proceedings had before the Commission in his case which would take up a page to print.

The findings of the Commission on the evidence introduced against "Cupid" show that out of fourteen charges he was acquitted on eight and found guilty on six. The sentence of the Commission reads as follows:

"And the Commission does sentence the accused Jonah Kalaniana'ole to be imprisoned at hard labor for the term of one year at such place as the commander-in-chief may direct and to pay a fine of \$1000; said imprisonment to date from the 11th day of February, 1895."

The proceedings of the Commission in the said case were duly forwarded to the President of the Republic of Hawaii and Commander-in-Chief of the Military forces of the Republic.

The proceedings, findings, and sentence in the case of Jonah Kalaniana'ole are hereby approved, but the said sentence is modified as follows: That the said Jonah Kalaniana'ole be imprisoned at hard labor for the term of one year at the Oahu jail or any other jail or prison of the Republic and to pay a fine of \$1000. Said imprisonment to date from the 11th day of February, 1895, and to be imprisoned at hard labor until said fine is paid. The Marshal or his deputy is ordered to take the said Jonah Kalaniana'ole into his custody and to cause the said sentence to be executed against him by imprisonment at hard labor for the term designated in the said sentence, and thereafter until the said fine shall be fully paid, at the Oahu jail or any other jail or prison in the Republic.

SANFORD B. DOLE, President and Commander-in-Chief. The modification made in the above sentence was explained to the reporter by one who knows as consisting solely in transferring the defendant from the military authorities to that of the marshal.

The recital of the sentence and action of the Commission constitutes section one of Mr. Neumann's petition. The remaining sections are given in full.

Sec. 2—That your petitioner is of the age of 24 years, and was born in the then kingdom of Hawaii, and has ever since his birth resided in the Hawaiian Islands.

Sec. 3—That petitioner at the times hereinafter stated was not nor has, nor has he ever been, nor is he now in the military or naval service of the Republic of Hawaii.

Sec. 4—That on Tuesday, the 8th day of January, 1895, this petitioner was arrested without a warrant by order of irresponsible persons, whom petitioner cannot

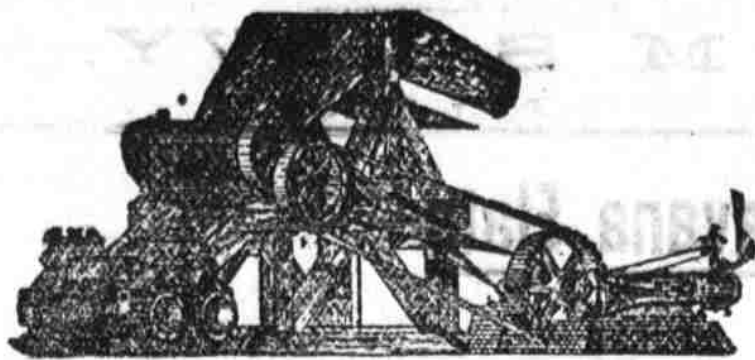

name, and from that time was closely confined in prison. That on the 11th day of February, 1895, the petitioner was forcibly carried before a Military Commission convened at Honolulu by order of Sanford B. Dole, commander-in-chief of the Hawaiian military, and arraigned before said Commission on a charge of misprision of treason.

Sec. 5—That petitioner objected to the authority and the jurisdiction of the Commission appointed to try him upon the said charge, but his objections were overruled and he was ordered to plead to said charge, which petitioner declined to do.

Sec. 6—That said Commission proceeded to try the petitioner and condemned him to imprisonment at hard labor for the period of one year and to pay a fine of \$1000, which sentence petitioner is informed and believes was approved by the said S. B. Dole on the 8th day of March, 1895.

Sec. 7—Your petitioner further avers that during all the times stated the regular courts of the Republic were in session and the Attorney-General of the Republic was actually appointed and acting *de jure*; but that no prosecution was instituted against petitioner for the pretended crime imputed to him; and petitioner is restrained of his liberty and imprisoned by virtue of said proceedings and on the order of said Commission and not otherwise.

Sec. 8—Your petitioner claims that said Military Commission had no jurisdiction or authority legally to convict and sentence him in the manner and form above stated.

Wherefore petitioner prays that a writ of habeas corpus may be granted, directed to the said James A. Low, commanding him to have the body of petitioner before your Honor at a time and place therein specified, to do, receive and submit to what shall then and there be considered by your Honor concerning him with this writ, and that petitioner may be discharged from custody and be restored to his liberty.

The writ of habeas corpus is somewhat of a curiosity to those not used to court matters. In "Cupid's" case it reads as follows:

"THE REPUBLIC OF HAWAII.

"To James A. Low, greeting:

"We command you that upon the receipt of this writ, you have and produce before our Supreme Court at a special term to be convened at Aliiolani Hale, in Honolulu, on Thursday, the 23d of May, 1895, at 10 o'clock a. m., the body of J. C. Kalaniana'ole, who is unjustly imprisoned and restrained of his liberty as it is said, to do and receive what shall then and there be considered concerning him in this behalf. And have you there this writ, with your doings thereon.

"Witness the Honorable Albert Francis Judd, Chief Justice of our Supreme Court at Honolulu, this 20th day of May, 1895."

Objection is made to the policy of the EVENING BULLETIN in opposing immediate annexation, on the grounds, that as an independency we can never expect stability. Is it that we cannot expect a Republican form to be a stable government or is it that ours lacks the moral and physical support of a majority of the people. If this is the case upon what are the objections based? Six months ago the supporters declared in speeches and through the newspapers that the government was growing stronger every day. If it has gained strength in the same ratio during the past few months there is no apparent reason why the government should not be stable and continue so forever. True enough it has much to contend with in the matter of finances. But then the condition of the treasury was not flourishing when the change came; there was an indebtedness to pay and little or nothing with which to liquidate it, but under the management of Minister Damon and by the introduction of business methods in his conduct of the department the aspect of affairs has been materially changed, and the government is on a stronger financial basis to-day than at any time since the overthrow of the monarchy. It is unfortunate that circumstances have been such that it has been necessary to draw upon the treasury for the support of forces believed to be necessary to keep the government in power, but this must be considered among the "fortunes of war" and is what follows in every country where governments are overthrown or even attempts made to do so. The expenditure of funds on these lines means the stoppage to a very great measure of public improvements no matter how great or necessary may be the demand for them. If it were possible to proceed with the public works it would give idle men employment and there would be less hue and cry about stability, a word that has haunted the people for the past three years. But except in cases of actual necessity the matter of street improvements must remain dormant, and the cry for work continue until in the opinion of the officials the hunger of the men in the departments of public safety has been appeased. If the government could be induced to reduce the expenditures in maintaining an unnecessary force in these departments, and utilize the money in the department of public works so that the idle men who are willing to work could be given employment there would be less dissatisfaction in the ranks composed of men who, while ostensibly supporting the government, oppose it by sowing the seeds of dissatisfaction.

The special session of the Supreme Court will be a most interesting one from the fact that upon the decision in the case of "Prince Cupid" will depend all others convicted by the Military Commission. If, as Mr. Neumann expects, the trial and conviction in this case will be shown to be unconstitutional and illegal, the same would follow in the other cases.

It is strange that the name of Pat Curtis has appeared so often in the columns of our contemporaries during the last few days. If it had not been for the interview had with him on Saturday last and published in that day's BULLETIN his name might never have appeared in print. We lead, others follow. Some time ago Curtis remarked to some of his friends that the government was against him and would not give him anything to do to save his life. The reasons for its objection to him were matters for conjecture by his hearers. It is supposed now that Paddy has decided to turn the tables and give the government something to do—hence the stern chase that has been kept up during the past week.

THE OPIUM BUSINESS.

It Still Flourishes in Spite of the Revenue Cutter.

While on his daily rounds this morning a BULLETIN reporter ran across a man who is supposed to know a good deal about opium and the opium ring. After applying the usual force pump the gentleman yielded up the information that opium was plentiful in town, and also very cheap. He also said that only a few days since he was approached by a certain individual who asked him what he would take to divulge what he knew about the opium ring. The answer was, "Twenty thousand dollars and an assurance that I will be put on board the Australia two seconds before she leaves." The "Dope Hunter" replied that the sum demanded was too high and that he would "see him later." It is hardly necessary to state the BULLETIN informant has nothing to do with the yacht Spray, although he did say that the opium brought by the Norma was landed in Honolulu weeks ago, which latter fact may be news to the revenue collectors.

"CUPID CASE."

It Will Probably Be Postponed For a Week.

Also that, owing to the pressure of business General Hartwell will ask for a week's further time in which to prepare the government's side of the issue. Paul Neumann will doubtless apply for bail for his client, and in a habeas corpus case it will hardly be refused.

THE POLICE COURT.

The Hawaiian Government Gets Three Dollars More.

The session of the District Court of Honolulu this morning lasted about seventeen minutes, more or less, and His Honor was enabled to go about his usual business on time.

The celebrated case of the Republic of Hawaii vs. Thos. E. Krouse came up and went down again, being remanded until to-morrow.

Kalama pleaded guilty to being drunk and disorderly and received the usual sentence of \$2 and an extra one for costs.

Ah Chee, accused of malicious injury by, to use the wording of the Court records "maliciously cutting a certain coat of the value of \$2.50 and a pair of shoes of the value of \$3.50, the property of Ah Pee," pleaded guilty and said he would never do it again. In extenuation of his offense Mr. Chee said that on a certain occasion Ah Pee whipped him, and he cut up the shoes and coat to get even. This method of getting even with an adversary is presented to the consideration of John L. Sullivan and others, and no charge made for the advice. The prosecuting witness said he did not want defendant to be punished as he himself was much to blame, and taking this view of the case His Honor let Chee go after reprimanding him in that tone of voice for which he is becoming celebrated.

Seven other cases were continued until later dates, and His Honor was interpreting in a civil case in the Circuit Court a few minutes afterwards.
