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To the Inspectors of Election in the several Districts of the Kingdom:—

Inquiries having been made whether persons who are exempt from the payment of personal taxes by reason of being clergymen, teachers, pupils in High Schools, firemen, &c., or by reason of being over the age of sixty years or whose taxes have been excused by the Assessor on account of infirmity or poverty, are allowed by law to vote at the Election for Representatives.

It is my opinion that all such persons are entitled to vote. The Tax Collector should issue to each such person a tax receipt with the words "Qualified to Vote" upon it, which he must sign and in place of the amount of taxes he must write "exempt" or "excused." On the presentation of this Tax Receipt to the Inspectors of Election at their sessions previous to the election, the name of the voter must be put on the list of voters and the Receipt returned to the voter.

At the general Election to be held on the 3rd February, 1886, the votes of such persons must be received, unless challenged for other reasons.

MARINE FATALITIES.

A blue book has been issued in England containing the First Report of the Royal Commission on Loss of Life at Sea. It embraces some 13,000 questions and answers, occupying 750 pages. Although the London *Globe* says the investigation "has thus far borne too much the appearance of a trial of the ship-owning interest of Great Britain on the prosecution of the Board of Trade," still a perusal of that journal's review of the document is rewarded with some suggestive hints and information that may be applicable to other than British commerce. Mr. Gray, Permanent Assistant Secretary to the Board of Trade, while admitting a diminution in the loss of life on best managed steamship lines, holds that the annual loss of life in merchant shipping amounts to one out of every fifty-seven employed. Among the reasons for this high rate of mortality elicited by the investigation, a chief one is the practice of over-insuring ships, and the fact that no civil or criminal responsibility attaches to owners who knowingly send to sea unseaworthy, overladen, or unmanned vessels. Mr. Gray, who conducted the investigation for the most part, refers to "small capitalists who, though they no more want a ship than they want a boa constrictor, are induced by highly-colored prospectuses to put their money into ship-owning speculations. Inordinate profits are promised, and to get these it is necessary for the managers of the enterprise to risk the safety of the ship by cutting down the master's wages, reducing the number of the crew, and, in general, sacrificing everything to the all-important consideration of saving money." Some high authorities are cited, on the other hand, to show that the figures and conclusions of Mr. Gray are over-drawn. "Mr. Richard Lowndes, President of the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, believes, as the result of forty years' experience in shipping matters, that there is exceedingly little wilful wrecking; but he nevertheless thinks that the present system of insurance tends to diminish the caution that would otherwise be used." The chairman of the Hartlepool Shipowners' Society, in a long experience, had not found that vessels highly insured were more likely to be lost than those insured on a lower scale. During the in-

quiry a good deal of discussion occurred on the question of the alleged deterioration of officers and men in the mercantile service. Vice-Admiral R. A. Powell is of opinion that the master of a large passenger ship is usually an extremely good navigator and a skilful officer generally, but that, on the other hand, the master of an ordinary trader is not quite equal to what he should be for his responsible position. "Still," he adds, "it is impossible to forget what they do when they come regularly into peril, their marvellous self-sacrifice, both in the case of the seamen and the masters." Captain Methven, formerly of the Peninsular and Oriental Company's service, thinks that "the ordinary practice of masters in navigation is far below what they are capable of and that their work should be more closely looked after by owners by supervision of the log-book, which is often very badly-kept."

The revelations of the British inquiry above stated do not show causes of marine fatalities peculiar to British commerce. With the growth of Hawaii's infant marine they will be found to crop up, and it would be well to prepare for them. Already it is no new thing here to see people who have no more need of a ship than of a boa constrictor, and know as little about the management of one as the other, embarking in shipowning speculation. On our coral beach, as well as on every shore in the world, there are always persons ready to jump at what seems to be a chance of fortune in the shape of a vessel condemned after running on the strand. Such ships, when they fall, as they often do, into the hands of men without the capital such property requires for its management, are patched up barely enough to make them float with the assistance of the pumps and sent on a voyage with precious lives on board. Doubtless the license allowed such hulks as these, where regulations are lax or absent altogether, frequently contributes to marine fatality. We do not think that over-insurance with fraudulent or felonious intent has given much, if any, cause to be feared in the Hawaiian register. Nevertheless, as our marine commerce grows the temptation to that species of rascality will doubtless increase, and ought to be provided against with other kinds of risk thrust upon sailors and sea passengers. At all events, one of the needs of this kingdom is a comprehensive shipping law for the protection of human life on all vessels leaving our ports, whether for foreign or domestic voyages. In a brace of articles in reference to the lost schooner *Kamoi*, the most evident local contributors to the loss of life were exposed. Since then the schooner *Domitila* has gone so long overdue as to justify placing her on the permanent roll of missing vessels. In making approaches to the electors, the would-be law-makers of the kingdom could not promise a more necessary thing than that they should, if elected, see to it that the interests of those who go down to the sea in ships would not be neglected in the coming session of the Legislature.

MEETINGS ON MAUI.

Messrs. W. R. Castle, L. A. Thurston, W. A. Kinney and A. C. Smith returned from Maui by the steamer *Kinaiu* on Sunday morning. During their visit to that island they held successful meetings at Wailuku, Waihee, Kahakuloa, Honokahau, Lahaina, Kahana and Waikapu. They succeeded in administering discomfiture, as preliminary to defeat, to the Government party, but the "Advertiser," naturally, tries to make a triumph for the Finance Minister at Lahaina, where, on the contrary, he cut a figure that should invite the deep commiseration of his friends. Mr. Kapena boasted at Wailuku that a lot of young fellows from Honolulu were going to hold forth at Lahaina and he was going there to prevent them having a hearing. He used up a horse to reach the spot in time, finishing the journey on foot. With Kia Nahaolelua, a Government candidate, he entered the meeting while Mr. Thurston was delivering a ringing address. Instead of overawing the speaker, the august presence of

the Minister only stimulated him up to warmer work. Alluding to the presence of the Minister of Finance, Mr. Thurston said \$54,000 had been spent by the Government, and there was not a scrap of paper to show where the money had gone. Mr. Kapena rose and excitedly shouted, "You're a liar! You're a liar!" The chairman told the Minister to sit down, but the latter gave a dastardly cue to his partisan supporters by continuing, "I don't want to have a riot here, but this talk will lead to a riot," then fairly roaring, "O my Lahaina, will you let me be abused in this way?" His Lahaina, however, proved stolid to the incendiary appeal, showing better sense than the Minister gave them credit for. When he found the Opposition candidates would not wilt before his characteristic glare or appeals to mob sentiment, Mr. Kapena, in a fury, howled out an accusation against the Opposition visitors, of having brought four thousand dollars in gold into the district to bribe the electors. To this Mr. Thurston returned the Ministerial compliment of the lie direct. The natives were deeply impressed with the exhibition made of himself by the Minister of Finance, and before the gentlemen left it was evident that great harm had been done to the Government cause. When Mr. Thurston mentioned the misappropriation of money on the occasion mentioned above, he had not the documentary proof with him. He procured it later, however, and after speaking at Kahana, returned to a meeting at the Lahaina market, clinching the charge there with the production of the Indemnity Bill of last session, necessitated by the expenditure of the amount named without authority. At Kahana Mr. Kinney was appointed chairman of the day. Mr. Kapena followed the Oppositionists into the arena, but discovering that the tide of feeling was strongly set against the Government, he soon retired in disgust without having spoken a word. On Messrs. Richardson, Thurston and Kinney's approach to the Lahaina market, for the second meeting, they were escorted by a gay cavalcade of horsemen.

JOHN YOUNG.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—A correspondent of your journal desires some information about the Hawaiian pioneer, John Young. Young was a Scotchman. He was boatswain of the American bark *Eleanora*, which was trading in the central and Southern Pacific. The *Eleanora* was at Kealahou, on the 17th of February, 1790. On this day Young went ashore (consequently it will be 96 years the coming 17th of February, since he landed on these Islands). When he attempted to join his ship he was, much to his surprise, forbidden to leave, by Kamehameha I. The bark *Eleanora* remained two days off Kealahou Bay, firing guns for Young to return, but the King would not permit him to go on board. Young was an ignorant seaman, but nevertheless he had great influence over Kamehameha I. He rose to be a chief of consequence, and to the last possessed the confidence of the people high and low. At the time of the capture of John Young, there were other white men on the Islands—runaways from ships—mostly of bad character, but John Young, by his moral and religious knowledge, superior address, and intelligence, quickly offset the opinions the Hawaiians had formed of the foreigners. Young was so beloved by the natives that they would not permit his departure. He was carefully guarded whenever a vessel hove in sight, and never suffered to go aloft. Kamehameha and other high chiefs made him valuable presents of estates, etc. In the year 1804 Young was appointed governor of Hawaii. He lived to a ripe old age.

At a meeting of the Royal Geographical Society, held at the University of London on Nov. 30th, the Marquis of Lorne presiding, Sir Leopold McClintock expressed his high opinion of the work which had been done by Major Greeley, and the latter, responding, said he, of all Arctic men, owed much to that society, the greatest geographical society in the world.

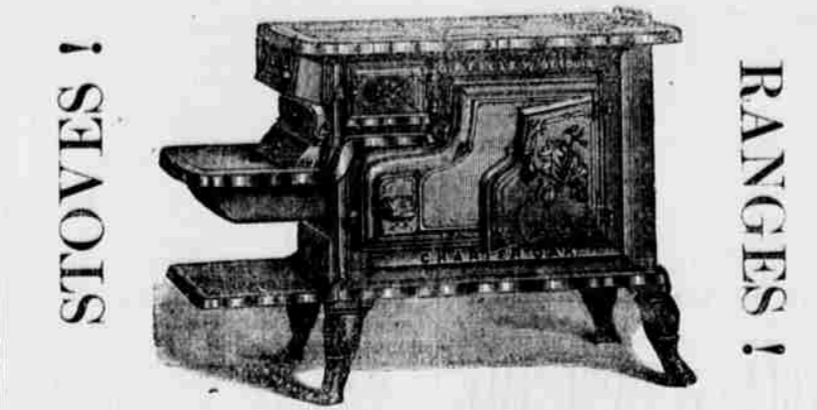
