VESUVIUS ON A RAMPAGE

Woman Shoots on Account of Slander in Dreyfus Affair.

Japan to Negotiate a New Loan—Hill on Baltimore and Ohio—Russia and Li Hung Chang.

New York, September 23.—A World cable from Naples says: Vesuvius, the grim volcano that stands like an executioner, always prepared to destroy this beautiful city, after a long rest is once more belching smoke and flames and lava. Where the present series of eruptions will end no one can tell, of course, but many residents here profess to fear the destruction of Naples, though for the most part they are cheerful, and laugh and sing, as did their ancestors of Pompeii and Herculaneum just before they were eternally buried.

A panic prevails at Torre del Greco, which is on the coast, three miles south of Resina. This has a dense population of 25,000 happy-go-lucky Italians, whose greatest industry is selling relics, guiding travelers, telling lies to Americans and selling nauseous wine.

A WIFE'S REVENGE.

She Causes an Answer to Slander of Her Husband.

Paris, September 23.—Mme. Paulmiere, wife of M. Charles Ernst Paulmiere, member of the Chamber of Deputies from the Department of Calvados, has added another tragedy to the bewildering intricacies of the Dreyfus plot.

Mme. Paulmiere today entered the offices of La Lanterne and asked to see M. Millerand. M. Millerand was absent, and M. Ollivier, the editor's young secretary, who was present, stepped forward to receive the lady, who, without waiting for an explanation, whipped out a revolver and fired twice. M. Ollivier fell to the floor wounded. He was taken to hospital.

Mme. Paulmiere was taken into custody, and, when questioned, answered coolly: "I wish to kill M. Millerand."

She explained that La Lanterne had slandered herself and her husband because her husband had written a letter to General Chanoine, the Minister of War, with reference to putting a stop to the attacks upon the army provoked by the Dreyfus affair.

Japan to Negotiate a Loan.

Yokohama, September 27.—It is understood that the Japanese Government has decided to negotiate for a foreign loan of \$50,000,000.

James J. Hill Talks.

St. Paul, Sept. 17.—President J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern, returned from Chicago today and made this statement to an Associated Press representative regarding the Baltimore & Ohio story:

"Any connection which I may have with the B. & O. is simply for the purpose of getting that road on its feet and making it what it was at one time, one of the most important roads in the country. Recently it has failed to such an extent that it is an incubus. Any intention I may have with regard to the Baltimore & Ohio has no connection with the Great Northern. Neither has the Great Northern nor myself any connection with any road between St. Paul and Chicago and furthermore, neither did I expect to have any such connection. Some one who is responsible for the state-

ments to the contrary has an imagination that is altogether too vivid."

Further than this Mr. Hill has nothing to say regarding the matter.

Ex-Secretary Morton's Job.

New York, September 31.—Senator Roca, who was recently elected President of Argentina, has asked J. Sterling Morton, Secretary of the Department of Agriculture under President Cleveland, to come to Argentina and build up for the Government just such a department there. The salary offered Mr. Morton is a princely one, and he is asked to stay in Argentina a year at least.

Li's Deep Scheme.

Vancouver [B. C.], September 21.—The China Gazette says it is at length at liberty to mention the important piece of news that at St. Petersburg, closely concealed from prying eyes, is a document signed by Li Hung Chang promising to hand over the control of Chinese customs to Russia.

AMERICAN MARINE SURGEON

Arrives to Take Duty in Harbor of Honolulu.

Is Detailed by Treasury Department and Will Have Headquarters at United States Consulate General.

Dr. Carmichael, Surgeon of the Marine Hospital Service of the United States, arrived in the Australia. He has been detailed by the Secretary of the Treasury to come here for duty at the Consulate General. His duties will pertain to the examination of bill of health of vessels, matters of quarantine, etc. Functions in these respects hitherto exercised by the Consul General will be assumed now by the newly arrived official.

Consul General Haywood introduced Dr. Carmichael early to Attorney General W. O. Smith, president of the Board of Health, and the Marine Surgeon was by that gentleman furnished with all information regarding the health regulations of the port.

THE HIGHER COURTS.

Lazarus Case Appeal and City of Columbia Libel.

The Supreme Court this morning heard the claim on J. O. Carter, administrator of the Lazarus estate, for valuables worth \$250. A contention of the claimant is that the defendant was made responsible personally instead of in his administrative capacity. Lyle A. Dickey is sitting as temporary Justice with Chief Justice Judd and Justice Whiting.

Contrary to information given out by interested persons yesterday, no rebuttal is put on in the City of Columbia maritime libel. Judge Perry is therefore hearing closing argument today.

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WARSHIPS WILL HURRY

Only Three Stops Between New York and Honolulu.

General Augusti Reaches Spain—More Sailors for Manila—Japanese Papers Want More Indemnity.

Washington, Sept. 22.—The battle ships Oregon and Iowa will lose no time in making the voyage to Manila. In fact, the utmost haste consistent with a safe trip will be made, and no more stops are contemplated than are absolutely necessary for coaling purposes. Between New York and Hawaii the war ships will not touch port but three times. The stops will be made at Bahia, Brazil; Punta Arenas, on the Straits of Magellan, and at the Galapagos islands.

Augusti Reaches Spain.

Madrid, Sept. 21.—General Augusti, the former Captain General of the Philippine islands, has arrived at Vitoria, capital of the Spanish province of Alava, about thirty miles south of Bilbao. The General, admitted that he contemplated surrendering before the capitulation actually took place. He also praised the army eloquently, and expressed the hope that the Supreme Court would pass judgment on his conduct.

Sailors Going to Manila.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The Navy Department has ordered 400 sailors sent to Admiral Dewey's squadron at Manila. The men will be sent from San Francisco on a merchant steamer.

ABOUT MUSTERING OUT.

What President McKinley Has to Say to the Boys.

This statement issued by President McKinley has tended to quiet the volunteers anxious to be mustered out:

"From the number of requests I receive for the mustering out of this or that regiment, I judge that the people are under the impression that the war is over. That is a mistake. Nothing but a peace protocol has been signed. We are just on the eve of sending some distinguished gentlemen to Paris to meet the Commissioners from Spain and to negotiate the peace treaty. It would be the height of unwisdom to indiscriminately discharge our army when there is a possibility that circumstances may require our Commissioners to make absolute demands.

"I have issued orders that there shall be 100,000 volunteers mustered out of service. One half of the quota of soldiers furnished to the Government by each State was allowed to go home. But no amount of political influence or persuasion can induce me to permit any more regiments to be mustered out until this war is definitely over. If this can be understood, the people and the soldiers themselves will be satisfied. The services of the soldiers retained in the army are needed by the United States for the present."

Change of Captains.

In a letter received by Captain Campbell of the Inter Island Company this morning it was stated that Captain Thompson of the R. P. Rithet would assume command of the new lumber schooner ordered by S. C. Allen and soon to arrive here; also that Captain Geo. Calhoun would take the R. P. Rithet, Captain Thompson's old boat, and that Captain Calhoun, father of the younger ship master of the same name, would take the Archer.

PRESIDENT DOLE WILL GO

Necessary for Him to Join the Commission in Washington.

Minister Damon Generously Furnishes Means for Settling the Industrial School Matter to Perfect Satisfaction.

President Dole was asked this morning if he had decided to go to Washington on the business of the Hawaiian Commission. In reply he said:

"It looks very much as if it were necessary that I should attend the meetings of the Commission in Washington.

"No, there is no need that I should leave with Mr. Frear. The object is to be there when Congress meets. It is not likely, however, that much business will be done in Congress until after the Christmas vacation."

As previously stated in the BULLETIN, Commissioner Frear will leave for Washington the 11th of this month.

All necessity for invoking the intervention of the Council of State to get over the Industrial School difficulty is ended. Minister Damon, in his private capacity as a banker, has come to the relief of Brother Cooper, Minister of Education, in most generous style to overcome the difficulty and give effect to the new policy relating to industrial and reform schools.

Mr. Damon advances the money to pay for the land on Kauai and erect the necessary buildings. He charges neither rent for the property nor interest on the money, and if the Legislature does not, within three years, take the property off his hands he will be content to keep it for himself.

Minister Cooper said this morning that his chief concern in the whole matter was upon that part of the scheme providing for an industrial refuge for girls in Honolulu. Public opinion had long ago conceded the crying demand for such an institution. The transfer of the reform school for boys to Kauai makes the premises at Palama available for an industrial school for girls.

Typhoons on Japan's Coast.

Victoria, (B. C.), September 20.—The Empress of India arrived today, bringing news that serious typhoons have done great damage on the Japanese coast. In Yokohama harbor the British ship Lindhurst and the Italian cruiser Marco Polo collided, both being damaged.

The wreck of the American ship Emily W. Whitney is reported from Shanghai, and a number of the crew are said to have been lost. She foundered in the typhoon which caused the abandonment of the German ship Trinidad.

Reports from Canton say the revolution is assuming alarming proportions. The Japanese papers urge that more damages be demanded from Hawaii.

GEN. MILLER'S COMMAND

Troops That Make Up the Next Manila Expedition.

Special Attention Called to Equipment of Ships and Amount of Supplies—Gen. Merriam Remarks.

Washington, September 19.—Commanding General, Department of California: With the approval of the Acting Secretary of War the Fifty-first Iowa, Twentieth Kansas, First Tennessee, First Washington and detachment of the Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry at San Francisco are hereby relieved from duty in the Department of California and will proceed to Manila, Philippine islands, reporting upon arrival for duty to the commanding General United States forces at that point. The Quartermaster's Department will furnish the necessary transportation, special care being taken to provide sufficient space and the subsistence and medical departments are charged with providing ample and suitable supplies furnished by the respective departments to insure comfort, well being and health of the troops en route. By command of Major-General Miles. H. C. CORBIN, Adjutant General.

Washington, September 19.—Commanding General, Department of California: All recruits and detachments now at San Francisco belonging to regiments in the Philippine islands, including the four companies of the Twenty-third United States Infantry, are directed to proceed to Manila. By command of Major-General Miles. H. C. CORBIN, Adjutant General.

Transportation.

Washington, September 20.—Depot Quartermaster: The Acting Secretary of War directs that ocean transports be furnished for transporting 5000 additional men to Manila. In order to do this the returning transports will be used for this purpose. These transports are supposed to be in the same condition as when they went to Manila on former expeditions. The Senator and China left port August 24th and 30th respectively; Indiana, September 1st; Pennsylvania, September 9th; Newport, September 13th; Zealandia, August 24th. The Zealandia went into the dry dock at Nagasaki. Part of the vessels went via Nagasaki and part via Honolulu. There will be ample room for bunks, lavatories, etc., provided. You are authorized to supply water and coal. Make inspection; report and wire when in proper condition.

MORE.

Quartermaster General.

Regarding the difficulty between the local government and the United States army General Merriam stated when he reached San Francisco: "It was the rightful property of the United States Government, and I affirmed my intention to take it. There was no friction, though, as the local authorities gracefully assented to my demands after some palaver. What will be done with these buildings I cannot say at present.

Relief from Manila.

J. N. Reid of the Australia has with him on this trip an interesting relic which he fished out of the hold of the sunken Don Juan de Austria when the Australia was in Manila bay. It is a barbed covered and encrusted cartridge box half filled with Mauser cartridges. Together with this was a Mauser bayonet. This forenoon Mr. Reid had the relic in the Port Surveyor's office where a great many people went to inspect it.

FRANK HALSTEAD MANAGER

Installed in Charge of the Big New Waialua Plantation.

Has Been Associate Manager of Old Plantation—New Pump Doing Excellent Work—Six Million Gallons Daily.

Frank Halstead is installed as manager of the new Waialua Sugar Company's big plantation. It is a fitting position for him. He was brought up on the old Waialua plantation, his father's property, which is the nucleus of the present big corporate enterprise. Since the retirement of his father, Robert Halstead, from the active care of the plantation some years ago, Frank has been associated with his elder brother Edgar in the management.

Edgar Halstead retired as manager the end of September, yesterday, and intends going to the Coast on the 11th of this month. Frank Halstead took charge of the plantation this morning.

The new pump at Waialua, lately imported from Chicago, is working splendidly. It throws up six million gallons of water daily to irrigate the fields. The pump was started a week ago last Thursday.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

McKinley Desires to Begin His Preparation.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Secretary Gage and Attorney General Griggs were the only members of the Cabinet present at today's meeting, and as a consequence the meeting was informal and brief. The President suggested the necessity of giving early attention to annual departmental reports, saying that he desired to begin the preparation of his message to Congress as soon as practicable. He talked with Secretary Gage at some length as to the lines of his report, but no information was given out concerning its probable scope or character.

New Inter-Island Steamer.

The new Inter-Island boat Mazama will sail from San Francisco on September 4. She will make the trip in about ten days. Captain Godfrey will not come down in charge as he has been steadily at work on the steamer since her arrival in San Francisco and has had no chance as yet for a vacation.

Prefers Civilian Life.

Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 20.—Colonel William Jennings Bryan, of the Third Nebraska Volunteers, will shortly resign his commission in the United States Army and resume the discussion of public questions. When asked if the rumor was true, he said: "You might say that I am not so enamored of camp life that I would at the close of the War apply for a commission in the Regular Army."

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## ASK HIM TO DIVIDE SAMOA

British View of the South Sea Island Proposition.

China's Empress in Charge—Woodford Resigns—Aguinaldo's Peace Commissioners.

London, September 24.—The Daily News this morning in a short leading article, invites Joseph Chamberlain, during his sojourn in America, to arrange for the partition of the Samoan islands, Germany to take Upolu, England Savay and America the other islands. The papers say the whole Pacific would thank him to secure this arrangement, which would prove the greatest blessing to all concerned.

AGUINALDO'S COMMISSIONERS.  
Washington, September 23.—It is probable that if Agoncillo and Lopez, the two representatives of Aguinaldo who arrived yesterday at San Francisco, call at the White House on their way through Washington to Paris they will be admitted to see President McKinley, but only as individuals and not as representatives of any government.

EMPRESS IN CHARGE.  
London, September 24.—A dispatch to the Times from Peking says the Emperor and all the higher state officials have bowed to the Dowager Empress, and that everything is quiet.

WOODFORD RESIGNS.  
Washington, September 23.—Following the custom in the case of a Minister who has been obliged to leave his post by the breaking out of hostilities, Stewart L. Woodford has filed his resignation as Minister to Spain.

NOVELIST JOHNSTON DEAD.  
Baltimore, September 23.—Richard Malcolm Johnston, the novelist and lecturer, died in this city this morning after an illness of several months.

WANT MORE OPEN PORTS.  
New York, September 23.—A special cable to the Sun from Havana says: The American Commissioners not think the ports of Bahia Honda and Jucaro, recently granted for the free importation of food, will answer. Havana is the port required for the bringing in of supplies, owing to the condition of the people in the province. It is also held necessary that food should be imported by way of Matanzas to meet the requirements of the sufferers of that province.

COMMISSION COMPLETE.  
Washington, September 23.—The President told his visitors today that the commission to investigate the conduct of the War Department had been completed and would consist of nine members, as first announced the full membership.

Several of the members of the commission, including General Grenville M. Dodge, who will probably be chairman, arrived in the city today, preparatory to attending the preliminary meeting to be held at the White House tomorrow. General Dodge was closeted with the President for half an hour in the afternoon discussing the details of the work to be undertaken.

THREE MINNESOTA SOLDIERS DIE.  
Manila, September 23.—Privates Carrier, Dennis and Schultz of the Thirteenth Minnesota Regiment, have died in the hospital this week. The regiment has forty-five men on the sick list.

## ITEMS FROM HARBOR FRONT

The Kinau is due from Maui and Hawaii ports tonight.

The brig Consuelo sailed from San Francisco for Mahukoua a September 21.

The British steamer Condor sailed from San Francisco for Manila on the 18th inst.

The Warrimoo did not get away for Vancouver and Victoria until 1 o'clock yesterday morning.

The Keuhou will return to Hamakua at 12 m Monday and the James Makee to Kapaa at 4 p m on the same day.

The schooner John G North sailed from San Francisco for Honolulu with a cargo of general merchandise, September 18.

The bark Helen Denny sailed from Newcastle, N S W, for this port August 14. She should be here inside of a fortnight.

The China brings word of the Zealandia. Her injuries, received in a typhoon, were quite serious, and it will be some time before she is ready to continue her voyage.—S F Chronicle.

The Santiago and C D Bryant for Hilo and the Irmgard and Andrew Welch for Honolulu, have been chartered to load, and the R P Rithet and Mauna Ala were to have sailed for this port on the 24th inst.

The following vessels have been chartered in Newcastle, N S W, to load coal for this port: Bktus City of Adelaide, Echo and Kate Flinginger; bks Dominion and McNear; schrs Muriel and Defiance; sps Republic and Hawaiian Isles.

The bark C D Bryant, which arrived on Saturday night from Honolulu, brought up two soldiers who had stowed away in Honolulu. They went down in the Peru, but neglected to remain on board when that steamer left Honolulu for Manila, where there was considerable prospect of fighting. The captain of the Bryant put them ashore here soon after his arrival.—S F Chronicle.

The O S S Australia, Houllette commander, arrived in port this morning as predicted in the BULLETIN. Her passenger and freight accommodations were both taxed to the utmost. Purser McCombe kindly furnished the following report: Left San Francisco, Sept 24, 1898, at 2 p m with 52 cabin and 77 steerage passengers; also 58 bags mail. Experienced moderate to strong S E winds until Sept 26. Thence to port, moderate to strong trade winds, squally and rainy. Arrived in Honolulu, Oct 1, 1898. Time 6 days, 16 hours and 55 minutes.

The bark Alden Besse, which arrived yesterday, twenty-two days from Honolulu, had a most unusual experience off this coast. She was for over five days within 200 miles of the Golden Gate. There was no wind, and by the time the wind did come Captain Potter had almost given up hope of ever reaching San Francisco. On September 16th, at 8 p m, when about 180 miles west of the Farallones, the Alden Besse encountered a heavy electric storm. Thunder roared and lightning turned the night into day. Heavy showers of rain fell at frequent intervals, but absolutely no wind accompanied the storm. The storm continued until 10 a m of the 17th, and Captain Potter says that the occurrence was the strangest he had ever experienced.—S F Chronicle.
