## THE ELECTION.

### The Machine Defeated.

The results of the election yesterday have been a severe blow to the government and to the men who desire to run "machine" politics in Hawaii. Judge Robertson who was openly denounced by the American Union Party, whose name was omitted from the official announcement of candidates and who was opposed tooth and nail by the alleged professional ward-politicians in the employ of the government went in with a clear majority of 368 over the official candidate Mr. L. C. Ables. The Union party, the government and the "machine" have been taught a lesson that it will be well for them not to forget in a hurry. The election of Messrs. Fernandes and Vivas is extremely gratifying to those who believe in popular government. The Portuguese voters stood solid for their candidates and in spite of all efforts on the part of the missionary element sent them in with big majorities. The "machine" succeeded in electing Ables and Carter. Both of these gentlemen went in through their personal popularity rather than through the work of the alleged professionals. It is noteworthy that Mr. Ables pulled a bigger vote in the 1st district than Mr. T. J. King, the official candidate. Mr. Carter pulled a heavy vote in the outlying districts a fact that perhaps saved him. Messrs. Klemme and Kunuiakea are about even, the difference being only two and a fraction. A recount will be demanded and it is possible that Mr. Klemme will make a test case of the legality of the fractional vote through which Kunuiakea gained the majority claimed. Klemme was ahead in Honolulu proper, while his opponent pulled more votes in the country districts. The election as a whole was a miserable failure for the p. g. 1507 voters were registered and about 1300 went to the polls. The contest between the different factions brought every man to the fore, and the annexation party undoubtedly turned out in its full strength. But what has become of all the braves? Where are the rank and file who (on paper) appeared before Blount and the Senate? Are they dead or have they deserted? Alas! echo answers "they were never there." And yet we have before us the statement that appeared in Thrum's last annual and that was "compiled by courtesy of F. B. McStocker, Chairman of the Executive Committee, Sept. 30, 1893," and that shows, that the glorious, the only Club, at that time counted 6,597 members or as Mr. McStocker naively says 63 per cent. of the voters. For Oahu the genial Chairman of the Executive Committee enumerates his faithful followers in regard to their nationalities as follows:

the Club roll is being daily swelled and that the work of the officials of that organization is increasing from hour to hour. And yet the same papers, in one of their leisure moments, not "cutting faces" at each others tell us that the great and mighty flock that now holds the banner of annexation and the p. g. high and that registered last month on Oahu must be enumerated as follows:

Where, oh, where is the rest? Have they deserted these shores? Have they become royalists? Are they in durance vile or in jail? Or are they in hiding? Who will enlighten us! Will the Chairman of the Executive Committee, Mr. F. B. McStocker have the courtesy to explain, or is he following the example of his great Master, who never, never explains—when it doesn't suit him and is there more gold in being a silent guardian *ad vitam* than there is silver in being an honest C. J. Let us peruse the figures for Oahu and compare them:

That shows plainly that 1700 have disappeared from Oahu, "lost" as it were. And we must remember that we are comparing figures from Sept. 30, 1893, with figures referring to people of whom many only arrived two or three months ago and do not appear in Mr. F. B. McStocker's calculation of September 1893. We regret to say it, but there is a deep and disagreeable doubt in the minds of many people as far as the figures of the esteemed chairman of the etc. is concerned. There is something wrong somewhere; who will clear up the mystery?

### Constitutional Makers.

It has been rumored that some "Professor" or other in the States has been hired to frame a constitution for Hawaii. We are surprised to hear such a rumor. A look at the men who are at the disposition of the Hawaiian Nation for the purpose of writing a constitution will fully show that no outside help is needed, and that, as Mr. Atherton puts it, the hand of providence is guiding Hawaii. (He evidently has a mortgage on "providence.") What better constitution makers could any country desire than the following:

It seems that the total absence of the officers of the different men-of-war in port from the late p. g. regiment "hop," has aroused the displeasure of Mr. Dole. While we have found it only proper and very natural for those gentlemen to hold aloof from a crowd in which they would have found themselves uncomfortable and entirely out of place, it is highly praiseworthy and commendable, when gentlemen show their own self-respect in refusing to mix up with individuals intellectually as well as morally so far below their station. If Mr. Dole only had the slightest idea about the modus operandi as to how and of what material military officers are created in civilized countries, and could properly appreciate their station in official and social life, he would probably share our opinion on the subject and would not have wondered about their absence from the late entertainment at the Drill shed. Now, in order to show Mr. Dole the difference between military officers of civilized countries and those created by him, we will give him only a slight idea of the requirements of the former as the disqualifications of his own, are surely well enough known to him.

The first requirements for any young gentleman aspiring for an officer's position are a clean record of a good moral character, superior training and high intellectual attainments—with such he may present himself before a board of examiners of the different military training institutions, such as Westpoint, Annapolis etc., whereafter passing successfully a very stiff and rigid examination, he may be admitted as Cadet—as such he has to undergo a military study and practical training for four long years (in other countries even longer) when finally he will be admitted to his graduation examination; if he passes it satisfactorily a commission as 2nd. Lieutenant for the Army or a corresponding rank in the Navy will be issued to him—but then a number of years of actual service will elapse, and he may grow old and gray before he may attain the rank of a Colonel.

Therefore it is easily to be comprehended, that those gentlemen hesitate to associate, or put themselves on the same level with ignorant and unrefined individuals picked up from the different street-corners, and put into a military Uniform.
