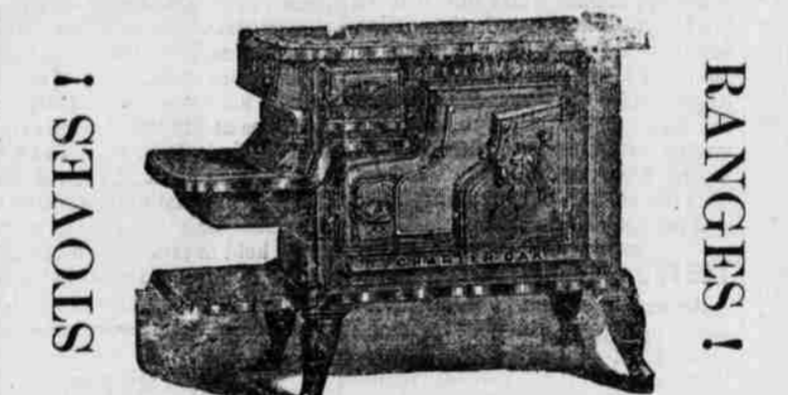

HONOLULU weather is still dreary
The wind, though little, is from the
South-east. The sky is completely
overcast, and rain threatens to come
down with a vengeance every moment.

THERE was no meeting of the
Mutual Telephone Company yester-
day, as a quorum was lacking. The
meeting has been, therefore, post-
poned until 2 o'clock to-morrow after-
noon.

NEW OFFICIAL APPOINTMENTS.
Mr. Jona. Austin has been ap-
pointed Minister of Foreign Affairs;
Mr. S. B. Dole, Fourth Associate
Justice of the Supreme Court; Mr.
G. J. Ross, Auditor-General; and
Mr. S. M. Damon, Member of the
Board of Health.

THE MADRAS CASE.
Hon. S. B. Dole this morning filed
in the Supreme Court a motion in
the case of John Chapman and
others vs. The Hawaiian Government
in effect as follows:
The plaintiffs by their attorney S.
B. Dole move the Court to vacate
and cancel the decision of the Su-
preme Court sitting in banco filed in
the above entitled cause on the 23rd
day of December, A. D. 1887.

DEPARTURE OF THE SAN PABLO.
The departure of the S. S. San
Pablo for Yokohama this noon was
rather interesting. The Band was
on the wharf playing favorite selec-
tions, while the steamer and dock
were well crowded with people. The
Marshal bringing four Chinese wo-
men ashore made a diversion from
the regular routine of steamer de-
partures, and the arrival of the Gar-
retts with Col. Geo. Macfarlane, from
a drive, gave an aristocratic tone
to the departure. As the steamer was
moving from the wharf the moneyed
gentlemen passengers amused them-
selves by tossing small coin onto
the wharf for the natives to scram-
ble for. When the steamer was too
far away for this sport, the young
rats stripped off their clothing and
went overboard for more money.

HABEAS CORPUS.
Just prior to the departure of the
S. S. San Pablo for Yokohama this
noon, the Marshal with a writ of
Habeas Corpus boarded the steamer,
and a few minutes later four Chi-
nese women with their baggage were
put ashore. The women were through
passengers from San Francisco for
Hongkong. They are here yet, the
steamer having gone without them.

A LONG DAY FOR THE BAND.
The Hawaiian Band gave a Christ-
mas concert at the residence of
Chief Justice Judd this morning;
played off the San Pablo this noon;
will be in attendance at the dinner
given at the Palace by the King
this evening, to Captain Davis of
the U. S. S. Juniata; and will
furnish music from 8 o'clock to-
night until small hours in the morn-
ing for the Arion concert and dance.

A CHRISTMAS TREE.
On Monday evening Mr. Marques
gave the children of the free school
near his residence a Christmas tree.
This school opened about six months
ago, and now has 46 pupils, mostly
Portuguese, many of whom had
never seen a Christmas tree before.
Their happiness was unbounded as
they each received a present from
the tree, kindly distributed by Mr.
and Mrs. Canavaro.

LEAP YEAR.
"Did you know that next year,
1888, will be Leap Year, Mr. Re-
porter?" said a youth to a BULLETIN
scribe this morning. Yes! "Well,"
continued the youth, "what would
you advise a fellow to do. I am
spotted, as is every marriageable
young man in the town. You see
the girls do the proposing in Leap
Year," the dear boy rattled along,
looking at his reflection in a store
window, "and there's about seven
after me. Would you advise me to
let my hair grow long and dress like
a female or migrate to Ocean
Island?" Before the scribe could
give an answer, the youth bolted in
to an office, to avoid being seen by
one of the seven.

A CRAZY SEAMAN.
The ancient Bolivian bark Ram-
jio, Captain Wall, arrived in port
yesterday, after a passage of forty-
eight days from Hakodate, Japan,
with a cargo of 5233 bags sulphur
for Sherwood & Sherwood.
Captain Wall reports that on
December 16th a Japanese sailor
named Okasabero attempted to kill
the cook with a hammer and also
assaulted one of the crew with a
chopping-knife, injuring both severely.
He was evidently insane at the
time. After committing the murder-
ous assaults the Jap jumped over-
board and was drowned. The in-
jured men are doing well.
The Ramjio is a curious-looking
craft and is one of the oldest vessels
afloat, having been built at Cobijo
120 years ago. She is owned by N.
Richard of this city and left here a
few months ago for Siberia, carrying
among her cargo a steerie and para-
phernalia for a Russian church
there.—[S. F. Call, Dec. 21.

Late Foreign News.

London, Dec. 20.—There is a tele-
gram to hand that Lord Randolph
Churchill is on his way to St. Peters-
burg to obtain an audience with the
Czar.

Pesth, Dec. 20.—Several army
officers on furlough here have been
ordered to return to their garrisons
in Croatia immediately. Numbers
of officers in the Reserve Corps have
been ordered to settle their affairs
so as to be in readiness to join their
regiments.

Paris, Dec. 20.—The bans of
matrimony were to-day published
between Maurice Bernhardt and
Princess Virginia Clotilda Jablon-
nouski, the great-granddaughter of
Lucien Bonaparte. The wedding
will be celebrated at midnight at the
Church of St. Honore.

Chicago, Dec. 20.—An "Inter-
Ocean" special from Lincoln (Neb.)
says: Governor Thayer of Nebraska
has telegraphed to the Nebraska
Senator at Washington protesting
against the confirmation of Lamar
on the ground that his past record
makes him an unfit person to inter-

New Freight Boats
FOR SALE.

We take pleasure in recommending
our boats, as their construction is the
result of years of study and labor in
building, and handling boats around
our various island landings. We claim
these boats to be superior for island use
to others (either built here or imported)
in every essential point, and we are

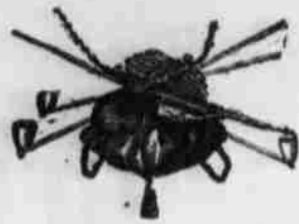
