STATEMENT.

THE undersigned, a Committee of Directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, appointed to formulate the views of the Board on the advantages offered by the Society to the public, report:—

1st—The Society issues all the approved forms of assurance, including Ordinary Life, Endowment and Tontine policies. It is immaterial to the Directors which form of policy is taken by intending assurers.

2d—The Life and Endowment forms of policy provide for annual cash dividends and a surrender value; are indisputable after three years and payable immediately after proof of death.

3d—The premiums on a Tontine policy are the same as on the Ordinary Life, but, while the latter is only payable in the event of death, the holder of the Tontine policy has the right to draw the whole of the reserve and the accumulated profits in cash at the end of a stated period; thus, during his own lifetime, after his producing years are past, he can, without any larger premium than on an ordinary policy, secure these greater advantages.

4th—Experience shows that the return paid in cash on maturing Tontine policies approximates to or exceeds the amount of premiums paid by policyholders, so that the average cost of the assurance will be only about the interest on the premiums.

AN OLD ACQUAINTANCE.

The following extracts of a letter from Mr. F. W. Scaife, late of the *Daily Hawaiian*, will be read with interest by his many friends in Honolulu. The letter is dated Melbourne, Victoria, Australia, Nov. 3rd, 1885:—
 "I left Hongkong by the S. S. Guthrie, one of the most beautifully fitted-up ships I ever saw. From Hongkong we went into North China to Foo Chow Foo, where nearly all the foreign vessels load their tea cargoes. We had a stay of about fourteen days here, and took the most of the opportunity of visiting the interior, which we found exceedingly interesting. We visited several of the chief joss houses, amongst which was that of the Shan, the oldest and richest one in China."
 Mr. Scaife then briefly recounts his trip up the Minn River, past the sites of several notable land and naval battles in the recent Franco-Chinese war. Several ironclads were building at the Pagoda Anchorage, where are a dockyard and arsenal. He proceeds:—
 "After getting between 3,000 and 4,000 tons of first season's tea on board we left Foo Chow for Palmerston, Port Darwin, as we were the mail steamer and had to call for mails. Things are getting a little lively at Port Darwin; a new ship's pier is in course of erection, and a new railway from Port Darwin to Adelaide is being contracted for."
 The steamer made brief calls at several minor ports, but stayed two days at Brisbane and about eight days in Sydney. The writer says:—
 "I consider the harbor and entrance to it, at Sydney, the finest in the world without exception, and passing the Heads, especially at night, with those enormous, powerful electric lights lighting up the narrow defile, makes a sight always to be remembered afterwards. About three days after leaving Sydney we arrived at the Queen City of Melbourne, Victoria. I like Melbourne very much, and think it one of the most beautiful and best laid out cities I have yet visited. The streets are broad, the footpaths ditto, and are kept exceedingly clean. Nearly all the streets either have the wood pavement or are receiving it, and the new cable tramway is just commencing to run out to Richmond and the suburbs. Melbourne is, no doubt, going ahead. Sydney is, in my opinion, anything in comparison to Melbourne. The streets are too narrow, crooked, and not over remarkable for cleanliness, and the public buildings do not show up to the same advantage as in Melbourne, owing to their having the appearance of having been crowded into their present sites, and not having elbow-room."
 Mr. Scaife describes the tragedy on the Flemington racecourse on the Saturday before his writing, when a collision of two horses brought the whole field of 42 horses down in a struggling mass, from which Nicholson, the leading Australian jockey, was taken out dead and many other jockeys seriously injured. He gives a graphic description, too lengthy for our space, of the terrible spectacle. Other matters of general interest referred to are the sculling race, to have come off on the 19th inst., between Beach and another Australian for the championship of the world, and subsequently a race between Beach and Teemer, the American who lately defeated Hanlan. A postscript of Nov. 4th describes the race for the Melbourne Cup the previous day: "The scene was an especially brilliant one, and put one much in mind of our Derby at Epsom. The race itself was splendidly run; all the field keeping well together for three-fourths of the distance and making a most brilliant finish, beating the record, and yesterday's cup was won in the quickest time ever made in the Colonies—two miles in two minutes and 29 1/2 seconds. An outsider, 'Sheet Anchor,' was the winner and most of the people present were pretty well bit."
 Mr. Scaife was doing well, in good spirits, and well pleased with his new location.

THE FOWL STEALING BUSINESS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—More chickens gone! "Anglo-Saxon," after discovering the loss of four (or five) "roosters" last night, is an ardent sympathizer with the gentleman who signed himself "A Victim" in the *Advertiser* of the 23rd current in the loss of his fine fat chickens. Further, the public ought to admire his courage and determination, especially in the following: "Unless the authorities come to our relief we must protect ourselves and supplement the warning note of our watch dog by the bang of our shotgun. For myself I propose presenting a charge of buckshot to the first night invader of my premises." I naturally admire the "ring" of these remarks, but as we are unable to extend our police force into the suburbs without exposing our center to the attacks of thieves and robbers, and not having any money in the treasury to pay for extra police to guard the suburbs of our town, we certainly will be left to protect ourselves. We must not, nor have we the right allowed us to use the shotgun (or any other gun) here, as *vide* a decision rendered not long since by our Supreme Bench, where all Hawaiian or foreign citizens were adjudged to be barred the legal right to use deadly weapons to protect their persons (saying nothing about their poultry). Now, sir, could any one, for one moment, be induced to believe that our courts would allow the patriotic gentleman to "bang" away into our Government pets without giving him a spell, shorter or longer, over in Captain Tripp's castle, by way of a reminder of Hawaiian jurisprudence, which allows a thief to flee without giving the aggrieved the right to fire to check his flight? No, Mr. Victim, I have examined our laws and can only impart to you my sympathizing aloha! but powerless to assist. We certainly have not the right under the Hawaiian laws to use the shotgun, not even on a Chinaman; the only alternative left us is to use a stick, ere we have the lawful right to use our influence endeavoring to put these Chinese chicken thieves out of this country. I am one of "Victim's" admirers, with always a loaded shotgun on the rack ready for action, but am compelled to allow it to remain there and trust to my running qualities to save my fine chickens getting into Chinatown. After writing the above I have seriously taken the matter into consideration and have arrived at the conclusion that it is much easier to eat my fowls than sit up at night and shoot thieves contrary to the dicta of the judges of the Supreme Court of this Kingdom, right or wrong. Yet I must confess that there would be more satisfaction, shooting down these sneak and poultry thieves without distinction, instead of being compelled to run them into the Police Station to be convicted and work for the benefit of a corrupt Government.

THANKSGIVING day is being very generally observed by the foreign population, most of the stores of English town being closed.

A SPECIAL meeting of the representatives of the Honolulu Fire Department will be held this evening at the house of Engine Company No. 2.

SEVERAL duck-shooting parties will spend the holidays shooting at Koolau. Mr. C. P. Wilder and Mr. Jas. Torbert left for Koolau this afternoon.

TO-MORROW at 10 o'clock Messrs. E. P. Adams & Co. will hold a special sale of effects belonging to the German Club; also have their regular weekly sale.

LAST night the Rifles again turned out in goodly numbers and after a smart drill they dispersed to meet on Friday night for the final shouldering of arms preparatory to the competitive drill.

Mr. F. A. Schaefer had a new side saddle stolen from the saddle house at his residence, Nuuanu Avenue, one night this week. No clue was left whereby to trace up the guilty person.

ROAD Supervisor Hart has completed repairs on the causeway opposite the wash house on King street. The ruts have all been filled, the protuberances levelled off, and the whole smoothed down with the steam roller.

THE sloop Sarah, recently sold at auction to a Mr. Phillips, ran on to the reef last night on the Waikiki side of the passage, and appears to be in a hopeless state. The bow of the sloop is under water, while her stern is high on the reef. She is full of water and will probably become a total wreck.

THANKSGIVING SERVICES. FORT STREET CHURCH.

There was a large and representative audience at this church, the edifice being well-filled. The decorations were remarkably handsome. A floral harp of yellow crysanthemums formed the center piece, standing against the choir railing. In front of the desk rose a pillar of green and yellow, and on either side were banks and bunches of verdure, comprising fern, palm and other foliage.

The services began by the congregation singing the 106th hymn, of which the following is the opening stanza:—
O God, beneath thy guiding hand,
Our exiled fathers crossed the sea,
And when they trod the wintry strand,
With prayer and psalm they worshipped thee.

Rev. S. E. Bishop offered up a prayer of thanksgiving, followed by an anthem from the choir.
Rev. J. A. Cruzan gave out hymn 1056, "America," which was heartily sung by the congregation.

Mr. Cruzan took for the text of his thanksgiving discourse the words, "Be ye thankful." It required genuine joy in the heart, he said, to make a person truly thankful. No capital of brains or energy was required to set a grumbler up in business. They were met together this morning to obey the injunction of the text. With a brief summing up of the numberless causes they had for gratitude to God, he proceeded to elaborate the idea that they should be thankful for their nativity, citing the love of their native land implanted in the hearts of all nationalities. It was not for the material greatness of their country that he felt thankful to-day, weighty as that reason of gratitude undoubtedly was. He rather thanked God for the peace and brotherhood pervading their nation, after the terrible disturbance that racked it from center to circumference a score of years ago. It took years to bring about the clasping of hands over the bloody chasm between North and South, but those years had come and gone, landing the country in peace. The completeness of the happy change was exemplified in the peaceful revolution of last autumn, whereby the very political party that had been identified with the desperate attempt to break up the Union, had by the peaceful exercise of popular suffrages been returned to power at Washington from which it had been excluded for a quarter of a century. The preacher went on with glowing eloquence to forecast the mightier revolutions that were still to sweep over America, in the subjugation of

every system of evil, all the operations to that end ever emanating from the grand old center of Plymouth Rock. As a Christian man he felt grateful to God for their native land. There was still much to be deplored there, as in every other country, from a religious point of view. Yet the forces of sin were twenty times stronger, and those of righteousness proportionately feebler, a hundred years ago than now. The story of the cross never carried more influence with humanity than to-day. Never was the Bible so widely published and purchased by the masses of men as at the present time. The preacher recalled the boast of Voltaire that two centuries would witness the extinction of the Christian religion, and set against it the growing supremacy of the gospel, as attested by the success attending home and foreign missionary devotion during the present century. Concluding, he said God loved them and their nation. Let them plant their feet upon that rock—God's love—and they would be safe and secure against all the storms of life and the forces of evil. Trials brought strength, grace and contentment to those who relied upon God, in support of which the preacher cited the cases of Job, David, and other scriptural worthies.

The hymn, "He leadeth me," was sung by choir and congregation, and Rev. Mr. Cruzan dismissed the concourse with the benediction.

ST. ANDREW'S PRO-CATHEDRAL. The Thanksgiving Day services at the Pro-Cathedral were conducted by Bishop Willis, with Revs. Messrs. Wallace and Barnes. The service for the day was read by Rev. Mr. Wallace, and included Psalms LXV, CXLIV, and CXLVII. Rev. Mr. Barnes read the lessons, Deuteronomy VIII, and 1 Thessalonians v. from the 12th verse. The sermon was delivered by the Bishop from Psalm xxiv. : 1. "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof."

The day of thanksgiving is the same as regards the Christian Church, as the Feast of Tabernacles in the Jewish. The same principles should govern the thanksgivings of the present as of the past. The observance of the day is a recognition of the truth of the text that the earth is the Lord's. Days of thanksgiving are intended to recall to our minds from time to time our dependence upon God who gives the increase of the fruits of the earth. Nor is it enough that thanks be offered for the mercies of the year, for we are reminded in this service of our obligation to set apart a portion of our substance to the special service of God. The covenant made by Jacob devoting a tenth of his substance to the Lord, was afterwards incorporated in the law of Moses. Other nations are also known to have adopted the rule of being allowed periods of rest, in order that the soil might recuperate its strength. The history of the chosen race is a vindication of the righteousness of God's laws; and conveys to us a solemn warning that only by a faithful observance of these laws can we enjoy the fruits of the earth for ourselves and convey our interests to posterity. Their history also intimates to the people of Christian nations that their possessions are not their own, but the Lord's. Obedience to God's will is the sole condition on which any people are assured that they shall inherit the earth.

WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT—CONTINUED.

When we consider the wonderful growth of general public sentiment upon temperance topics, compared with the lethargy which was upon individuals, churches and the nation a few years ago, we cannot doubt that this organization has been a potent agent in producing the rapid change.

On the other hand, the forces under the alcoholic demon, are organizing themselves, and preparing to fight as for their lives. It is estimated that every saloon controls ten votes.

Is it not evident, then, that the armies of God and Satan are again spreading themselves abroad? And the battle is not to be fought in America alone, but in all civilized countries, and even in our little Hawaii!

Thus it has come to pass that the temperance question is taking a prominent place in politics. The rapid rise of the Prohibition party is one of the most striking and interesting signs of the times.

On this our first anniversary, the little W. C. T. U. of the Hawaiian Islands comes together to-night with no heroic tales, nor songs of victory.

Our Union was undertaken with many fears, and with great timidity. We were all of us entirely inexperienced in temperance work.

Licensed and unlicensed saloons were filling the land, and this Hawaiian people, for whose enlightenment and salvation so many noble lives have been spent, seemed to be drifting away from all Christian influences.

We want to present the subject of scientific temperance instruction before school boards and teachers. We desire to present it on its own merits, not asking consideration as a favor to ourselves; and we hope that the subject which has met such acceptance with educators and legislators in America, may be equally successful here.

We need more thoroughly organized effort to distribute temperance literature, both in English and Hawaiian, in public places, in prisons and police stations, at steamboat landings, in hospitals, among sailors, and wherever it may be available.

We ought to have a band of hope, or some similar society, among our children; partly that they may be taught to take a decided stand upon this great question while young, and also that they who must soon take our places may be much better informed, and thus more able to do this work intelligently than their parents have been.

We ought also to have in Honolulu a temperance lunch room, or Friendly Inn, presided over by a woman who would give a homelike meal at a reasonable price. Though it might involve some expense at first, we are sure, from the experience of others, that it would soon become self-supporting and more, and might ultimately increase to a boarding and perhaps a lodging house.

These and other departments of work which might be mentioned, we have not been able to pursue as actively as we wish we could, because it has not been possible to find ladies to superintend them who feel that they can devote the time required to carry them on successfully.

Our greatest want is now helpers. The work spreads out on every side. It is a work which must command the sympathy of every mother and sister. Many ladies whose hearts are with us are so bound by home duties, that we cannot ask nor expect more than their occasional presence and earnest sympathy and prayers.

Before closing, I wish to call your attention to the statements I have placed upon the board. The first is compiled from the Custom House Report, and is said to be a low estimate. This is equivalent to a tax of more than ten dollars and a half for every man, woman and child in the Kingdom, estimating the population at 80,000.

It will further be seen that for every dollar which this nation expends for all religious purposes, more than seventeen dollars is spent for that which can do no good, and whose tendency is to ruin the soul and body, while more than six and a half times as much is spent in this country for liquor, as is paid for all religious and educational purposes combined.

truth of my figures. I shall be happy after the meeting to state how they were obtained.

And this is Hawaii! The country which owes all it has come to be to these very religious and enlightening influences; the nation which has, for more than half a century, stood before the world as the brightest example of what the religion of Christ can do for a heathen nation.

Is there not call for effort? Can we sit idly by and let things go on from worse to worse? Is it not time that every true man and woman should place himself and herself openly and decidedly on the side of this question which God approves, and which only can secure the salvation of the nation?
