SATURDAY : : : March 27th. POINTS ABOUT PROTECTION AND THE GOLD STANDARD.

There are not wanting signs of a reaction in favor of a protective policy, to some extent, in England. A dispatch from London, of date March 2d, states that "the associated Chambers of Agriculture of Great Britain had that day adopted resolutions favoring the imposition of import duties on foreign corn."

Between 1878 and 1884 the increase of spindles in England was 142,281; in India, 711,901, and between 1880 and 1884, both inclusive, the exports of cotton yarn from England to China and Japan fell from 46,425,800 pounds to 39,856,100 pounds, while the Indian export increased from 26,401,346 pounds to 65,297,183 pounds.

A Double Standard Association has been established in Germany, which is pressing a bill in the Landtag and Reichstag, containing the following cardinal points: 1. Silver money to be made legal tender. 2. Re-coinage of token money over one mark. 3. Free coinage of silver. 4. A fixed ratio between gold and silver.

In England a similar Double Standard Association has been formed, prominent among the members of which are the ex-President of the Bank of England, several members of Parliament and the leading manufacturers of Lancashire.

Between 1878 and 1884 the increase of spindles in England was 142,281; in India, 711,901, and between 1880 and 1884, both inclusive, the exports of cotton yarn from England to China and Japan fell from 46,425,800 pounds to 39,856,100 pounds.

These points are of value to this country, because they tend to show that no matter how wealthy or enterprising a community may be, if by law a discrimination is made in favor of gold as the sole measure of value, it must ultimately impair business, reduce prices, and place the industries and wealth of the country under tribute to money changers.

Death of a Soldier. The steamer W. G. Hall, which arrived yesterday from windward, brought the news of the death of Second Lieutenant J. K. Solomon of the Royal Household Guards, which took place at Kailua, Hawaii, last Saturday morning between 2 and 3 o'clock.

An Accident. Yesterday afternoon, shortly after 3 o'clock, a native named Kakuhiine, formerly coachman for Queen Emma, was driving into town from Palama, when, opposite the stables of the Hawaiian Livery Stable Company, the horse he was driving took fright and commenced kicking. Kakuhiine was thrown out of the wagon to the ground and received severe injuries to his head.

An Opium Raid. On Thursday night about half-past 8 o'clock Officer Marcos entered a house on Smith street and arrested three Chinamen, who now stand charged with having opium in possession. One of them is a dealer; the other two were evidently customers. Marcos seized a tin nearly full of opium and another about half full; also several kukui nut shells full of the drug, and a pair of scales.

Steamship Movements. Either the steamship Zealandia or the Geo. W. Elder will leave San Francisco to-day for Honolulu, and may be expected here Sunday morning, April 5th. The Oceanic Company's Royal Mail steamer Alameda will be due here April 10th from the Colonies, on route to San Francisco, and the Union Company's Royal Mail steamer Mararoa will be due from San Francisco April 17th, on route to Auckland and Sydney.

Domestic Produce Receipts. Following are the receipts of domestic produce for the week ending Friday, March 26th: Sugar, 62,676 bags; rice, 512 bags; awa, 213 bags; coffee, 55 bags; wool, 101 bales; molasses, 40 barrels; oranges, 8,000; salt, 200 bags; goat skins, 8 bundles, and 104 hides.

IMMORTALITY. (From "H. H. W." "Reorganism.") The fool asks, "With what shall I joy or pain? Helpless, unhelped and lonely or again surrounded by our earthly friends? I know not; and I glory that I do not know; that for eternity's great end, God counted me as worthy of such trust. That I need not be told. I hold. That if it be less than enough for any soul to know itself immortal, immortality in all its boundless spaces will not find a place designed. So small, so low. That to a living sense such soul can go. Out to the earthward brink Of that great timeless sea. Light from Christ's garments streams. I must arise. I joy, not that I ask or choose, But simply that I must. I love and fear not, and I can not lose One instant this great certainty of peace. Long as God ceases not, I can not cease; I must arise.

THE TALK OF A DENTIST. How Work on the Teeth Has Been Perfected—Advances of Science. (Philadelphia Times.) "A ton of gold goes under ground nearly every year, said a prominent city dentist, "buried in the teeth and claws of people who have at one time or other been in the dental chair. The repair and refurbishment of the teeth has got to be a profession of the highest skill and proficiency. High standing in the profession is repaid with the richest rewards. The establishment of the University department of dentistry has given a great impetus to the study. Scores of able and expert young men matriculate annually. They come from all parts of the world—South America, Cuba, Mexico, the continent and Japan. This city is foremost in dental operations and dental surgery. Some of the work turned out here is wonderfully perfect. Many men and women prefer false teeth to the natural ones, if the latter are the least bit defective, and few people have a perfect set of teeth.

"Instruments! Why, yes, the instrumentation of a first-class dentist is comprised in several large cases like that," pointing to a series of handsome rosewood cases and pulling out drawer after drawer filled with delicate probes, chisels, burs and forceps. "The manufacture of these is a great trade in itself. There is the dental engine, one of the greatest inventions in the profession, indispensable now, with its flexible screw. The electric mallet, another modern invention unknown to the old-fashioned tooth-carriers, is used by nearly all dentists, and requiring a battery to run it. The rubber dam or appliance placed over the tooth and of a patent to prevent moisture and saliva reaching the part operated on is the greatest of the modern discoveries. Any one who has been in a dentist's chair under the old plan, which necessitated packing the mouth of the patient with napkins, and since under the rubber dam, can see what infinite torture this scientific adaptation has relieved him from.

"Twenty thousand dollars a year. Yes, there are dental surgeons in this city who make that much by their profession. A clientage very often includes a whole family and the care of the teeth of each from infancy until adolescence and beyond. American dentists have the highest repute abroad. Dr. Evans, for instance, whose patients in Paris and elsewhere were emperors, kings, queens and princes of "Gold is the best material yet found for filling teeth. Silver and composition of various kinds being cheaper, are used, but the royal metal is the only one which ought to be used. The manufacture of gold foil or leaf for our business is immense and hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth are consumed every year.

"The teeth should be looked to often by a good dentist. Individual care early in life saves much dental work and expense. It used to be the idea that the deciduous teeth, as they were temporary affairs, needed no attention. They should be treated with greater attention than the second set. They are not filled now as much as formerly, but extracted when carries attacks them. The biblical expression, 'skips of the teeth,' is true. There is a delicate animal, resembling epidermis in its microscopic delicacy, and covers the teeth with a beautiful mosaic, which is susceptible of a perfect polish, which you see giving on the teeth of some young people and Africans. Acids do for this and once broken in upon carries ensues. Good and bad teeth are hereditary, but early care and professional skill will do much even with a bad natural set of teeth. A Philadelphia father I know—client of mine—has in each of his children's rooms over the lavatory the following motto: 'Say your prayers, wash your face; comb your hair; brush your teeth.' It is a good one.

HUMOROUS ELEPHANTS. How Their Greed Was Changed Into Complete Satisfaction. A young friend asked me once to show him some elephants in undress, and I took him along with me, having first borrowed an apron and filled it with oranges. This he was to carry while accompanying me to the stable, but the moment we reached the door he had set up such a trumpeting—they had scented the fruit—that he dropped the apron and contents and scuttled off like a scared rabbit. There were eight elephants, and when I picked up the oranges I found I had twenty-five. I walked deliberately along the line, giving one to each. When I got to the extremity of the narrow stable I turned and was about to begin the distribution again, when I suddenly reflected that if elephant No. 7 in the row saw me give two oranges in succession to No. 8 he might imagine he was being cheated, and give me a smack with his proboscis—that is where the elephants falls short of the human being—so I went to the door and began de novo as before. Thrice I went along the line, and then I was in a fix. I had one orange left, and I had to get back to the door. Every elephant in the herd had his greedy gaze focused on that orange. It was as much as my life was worth to give it to any one of them. What was I to do? I held it up conspicuously, coolly peeled it, and sucked it myself. It was most amusing to notice the way those elephants nudged each other and shook their ponderous sides. They thoroughly entered into the humor of the thing.—Leaves from the Life of a Correspondent.

A FEVER CURE.

Mr. Alex. E. Sweet, in an Open Letter to William Nye, Esq., Imparts Some Valuable Medical Information.

NEW YORK CITY. To WILLIAM NYE, Esq. Still at large. In one of your recent pastoral addresses to the general public, you describe with ghastly fidelity the sufferings of an unfortunate man whom you, and some other heartless miscreants, undertook to cure of a fever by strange and abnormal methods heretofore unknown to respectable practitioners.

It seems that you were out in the woods on a pleasure party, probably hiding from the officers of the law. Under the pretext of curing the invalid you stood him against a tree and filled his garments with warm ashes. The man with the fever began to perspire, which moisture formed a chemical combination with the ashes, and produced what is known to commerce as concentrated lye in a liquid form. The lye, I don't say which one began to remove the cuticle of the sick man, consequently he lifted up his voice and jarred the geology of the eternal hills with it.

You seem to regard the sufferings of your victim with levity, but, I, who have suffered similar outrages, will shed a silent tear for him as soon as I can get an off day.

What your victim suffered on the outside I suffered on the inside. I was made to drink a pint of tea made of Mexican chiltepin peppers, compared with which cayenne pepper tastes like a spoonful of ice cream.

I was a mere boy in San Antonio, Tex., when chills and fever, which were doing a large retail business in the town, seized me and flopped me down hard on a couch of illness. He did not break up the fever, which was perpetual in session, but he succeeded in transferring into my system most of the materia medica of a drug store in which he owned a half interest.

I had no idea of ever having any more use for it myself.

Just at this crisis an old lady, named Brown, came up from the country, and hearing that I was lying in state, and that it was a free thing, came in to take a look at me.

She scoffed at the idea of my dying. She knew of a plain, simple, Mexican remedy that would get me out of that bed in two weeks. Her remarks were prophetic. It got me out of bed in two seconds—but I anticipate.

"I'll have that boy up and stealin' peaches again in no time," she said. N. B.—She had once been a neighbor of ours, and owned a peach orchard.

"Now," said she, "if you will keep that rickety boy alive for ten minutes I'll fix him up some cheap pepper tea, he will be up to some devilry before to-morrow night."

She went into the kitchen and in a short time she returned with a bowl of pepper tea which she bade me quaff. I quaffed about a pint of it, and then I had to use my mouth to yell. It was scalding hot, and my throat, and all the appendages belonging, was parboiled.

She passed out of the door just in time to avoid stopping the bowl, and the rest of the pepper tea with her head. Arrayed in a long graceful robe de nuit I arose from my couch of illness and executed a beautiful song and dance movement among the broken furniture and the weary watchmen who cooped out through the windows and left me alone with my grief.

Looking back at this little incident through the vista of years, I am still convinced that the old lady was trying to get even with me for stealing her peaches, and I can lay my hand on my heart and say that she did. I am also persuaded, Mr. Nye, that you had a spite at the man on whom you tried the hot ashes experiment. If you had known about the red pepper tea, I expect you would have simultaneously given him a gallon or so of it to soothe him internally.

BIRDS OF BEAUTY.

An Hour with an Ornithologist—Humming Birds' Wonderful Plumage. [Washington Star.]

The catalogue of the Smithsonian Institution and the National Museum contain a record of 105,000 specimens which have been received in the ornithological department. There are now on hand in the cases and chests, in which are stored away the ornithological wealth of the museum, 65,000 specimens. Of course, there are many birds of the same species. In addition to the type specimens preserved for exhibition and study, a duplicate collection is maintained, and besides that, there is always on hand a large stock known as the reserve collection used in making exchanges, by means of which the museum is enabled to get rare birds from collections in other countries.

Mr. Robert Ridgway, the ornithologist, is now engaged in completing a duplicate collection of North American birds, with the view of having always on exhibition in the museum a complete collection. In the cases in Mr. Ridgway's gallery and work-room are 35,000 specimens. The collection of North American birds, which takes most of the space, is the finest of its kind in the world. Next to it is the collection of South American birds, which is rated as the second best in the world. A private collection belonging to a wealthy gentleman in England, who spent much time and money in perfecting it, and recently presented it to the British Museum, is considered as the finest collection of South American birds. Central and South America are especially rich in birds, as about one-third of the known species of birds in the world have their habitat there. The department under Mr. Ridgway's care comprises, also, a very full collection of birds from the Old World.

These birds preserved for study and comparison are stowed away in flat cases, which in turn fit securely, one over another, in the rows of drawers. Upward of a dozen are placed in a tray of glass, the sash or edge of which is fitted with a tongue, which drops into a groove in the edge of the drawer, making a perfect protection against the invasion of insects. The insects love to get at a dead bird, and as the fabled donkey took pleasure in kicking at the dead lion, the bird-hunter secures the skin of the bird, preserves its head, plumage and legs complete. The professional collector skins a bird very neatly, so that it can be mounted by the taxidermist with very little trouble. When the skin is received by the curator it is filled out with a little padding of cotton and placed away in its proper case. A complete record is kept of each specimen received.

If it is desired to mount the specimen the dried skin is sent to the room of the taxidermist, Mr. Marshall. There it is "buffed" for two or three days in damp air, and when it is resuscitated the skin is soft and pliable. The unmounted specimens, however, with proper care may be kept for years, and are just as valuable to the scientist as when they are stuffed and prepared by the taxidermist. Some of the specimens of North American birds in the collection belonged to Audubon, and were used by him in making illustrations for his work on birds. The humming-birds form one of the most attractive parts of the collection to one who looks at it from the aesthetic standpoint. There are 450 kinds of humming-birds known. While they differ widely in size and appearance, they bear a resemblance structurally, and have similar habits, feeding upon honey and insects.

The collection comprises nearly all known kinds, from the giant humming-bird of Mexico, which boasts of proportions nearly as great as those of the robin, to a tiny humming-bird of Jamaica, scarcely more than an inch long. There are humming-birds with bills longer than their bodies, which they use for extracting honey from deep-cupped flowers, and humming-birds with no more beak than an ordinary wren. Many of the different varieties of humming-birds are distinguished only by the marking of their feathers. The colors are rich and gorgeous. The crown, throat and breast are marked with topaz, gold and ruby, in the most exquisite shades. The colors seem iridescent.

A peculiarity of some of the birds which Mr. Ridgway pointed out to the reporter is that you can only see one color at a time. When the throat or breast is thrown back at a certain angle the first color seen disappears and another color comes out through the feathers, a sheen or gloss like burnished gold or gems, and in some cases are so nearly luminous that the colors become more pronounced in a dark place than in the twilight. In every variety where this gloss or sheen exists, except one, the pattern becomes visible only when looking at the bird from its front. If the bird was flying from one the colors would be dull and lusterless.

Nearly all the South and Central American birds are conspicuous for the richness of their plumage. The feathery gorgeousness reaches its climax in the royal bird of the Aztecs, a magnificent creature considered to surpass the famed bird of paradise in grace and exquisiteness of color.

The markings of birds differ very strangely sometimes, and form the only distinction between two varieties. In Ecuador, for instance, one variety of humming-bird, marked in a peculiar way, is found only at a certain elevation on the side of Chimborazo. Upon a neighboring mountain, at a certain elevation, is found another humming-bird the exact counterpart of his Chimborazo cousin except in color. The pattern upon which the colors are laid are the same, but the colors themselves are different. In some valleys a few miles in extent are found birds peculiarly marked, which have never been found elsewhere.

Heading in Towns. [The Century.] How can the tide of population be turned back from the cities to the farms? The economists have been diligently warning the country people against the cities now these twenty years; but in spite of their exhortations, the cities are constantly growing at the expense of the country districts. In several of our most prosperous cities during the last winter, one-tenth of the population received charitable aid from city authorities; and a considerable proportion of those who were thus started on the road to pauperism were formerly living in comfort in country places. The knowledge of this fact will not greatly check the movement toward the cities. The prospect of starvation does not daunt those who are tired of the loneliness of rural life, and long for the stir and contact of the denser populations.
