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## KAMALO IS TO STAND MORTGAGE.

At last night's meeting of Kamalo stockholders it was decided to secure a loan, if possible, of \$20,000, with which to pay off the debts and to arrange a sale of the property for not less than \$100,000. As usual with Kamalo meetings there were some pretty warm bouts between stockholders. The following resolutions were finally introduced and passed unanimously:

"Resolved that it is the sense of the stockholders of the Company that a letter be written to Mr H W S Edmunds, in reply to his letter of the 18th instant, stating that if, within a period of four weeks from date, he (Mr Edmunds) will secure a loan of the sum of \$20,000.00 for the Company, that the Company will execute to him (Mr Edmunds) or such person as he may appoint, a mortgage of all the property of the Kamalo Sugar Company, Ltd, situate and being on the Island of Molokai, Territory of Hawaii, for a period of two years and at a rate of interest not to exceed eight per cent per annum, and that further, it is the sense of the stockholders that in the event of the said mortgage for the said sum of \$20,000.00 being secured, that the Kamalo Sugar Company, Ltd, will execute and deliver to Mr Edmunds an option for the sale of all the property of the Kamalo Sugar Company, Ltd, situate and being on the Island of Molokai aforesaid, for a sum not less than \$100,000.00, said option to remain in full force and effect for the period of six months from the making thereof, and the Company will further agree, in case said Edmunds secure a purchaser for said property, at the said price, to pay to the said Edmunds the sum of \$5,000.00 by way of commissions on the said sale, and that, upon the understanding, however, that in case the said Edmunds shall secure a sum larger than \$100,000.00 for the said property the whole sum secured by him shall be paid to the Company, and the company will pay to him, over and above the said sum of \$5,000.00 the sum of five per cent on any sum obtained through the efforts of said Edmunds over and above the sum of \$100,000.00"

Stabbing at Paia.

Paia, August 22—On Sunday, August 16, at Paia, a Porto Rican woman, commonly known as Mary Go Long, was badly stabbed by her lover between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening. During the day this woman was seen driving together with Capt Police of Makawao H. Iwiend in a hack and having a jolly good time at the baseball grounds at Kuau. It seems while she was enjoying herself in the hack with Capt H Iwiend the lover of the woman was there also taking all this in, and it is believed that this was the cause of the stabbing. The one did the stabbing it is alleged to be about 16 years of age. There are 16 or 17 wounds on the woman's body and she is now at the Paia Plantation hospital being attended by Dr McConkey. It is believed that she will pull through all right. On the same evening the partner she was riding with in the hack Capt H Iwiend was arrested for being drunk and on the following Tuesday August 18 was found guilty as charged by Judge C Copp of Makawao district and fined with costs. An appeal had been noted.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Complaint is made of the inefficiency of electric car accommodations on Sunday afternoons particularly on the King street-Waikiki line. At the most busy hour of the day single cars are run. These are filled to overflowing with people, some hanging on by the eye-brows, as it were. A few trailers at that time of Sundays would not hurt the Rapid Transit Company and would be a great thing for the people.

Sir Thomas Lipton is probably now doomed to a third disappointment in the effort to capture the America cup. He has spent nearly \$3,000,000, according to the best estimates, in his three attempts and there were those on this side who had a kind of hope that he would win. Sir Thomas has made friends by his persistency, however, and perhaps what he has lost on yachts and racing has been more than made up in new customers among his American and English admirers. The worst losers in the deal are the yachtsmen of the Shamrock, who were to receive life pensions if they won.

It is a base injustice for photographers to display to tourists pictures of hula girls and natives costumed (or uncostumed) as they were supposed to be a hundred years ago. These pictures find their way to cities all over the world, carrying with them a false and derogatory impression of the Hawaiian people. Eastern people cannot be expected to know the true facts, and accept these absurd photographs, sent to them by tourist friends, as being genuine representations of

Hawaiian life and customs. Island photographers are to blame for these things. They get them up for the few bits there are in them. But as every such picture sent out creates a false impression and injures the country, mighty poor business judgment is shown in circulating them.

Dr Cooper announces his intention of at once appointing a captain of the Moequito Committee (at \$200 per month). It is to be presumed from this that the particular Republican out of a job has been decided upon for the place. Other idle Republicans need not lose heart, however. There are lieutenants, sergeants, corporals, buglers and privates to be selected, and there will be a chance for all. This mosquito committee must be a power in the County campaign, and to make it so all the jobless Republicans about town must be gotten into it. The only thing in the way is the lack of money but, of course, the people will be expected to "dig."

We were not aware of any active work at Washington against the appointment of George R Carter to succeed Governor Dole on June 14 next, but if such be true the news is good news. President Roosevelt must by this time know that Mr Carter is not popular as a candidate with the Islands people. Even those who, for personal reasons were inclined toward him have been made "suspicious" by his anxiety for the office, and they have been led to inquire "what is behind it all?" Mr Roosevelt is decidedly partial to Carter; but unless we are greatly mistaken he will consider the wishes of the Hawaiian people before making a move that will certainly create enemies out of inoffensive timber.

Governor Dole will do the correct thing in commuting the sentence of George Ferris to life imprisonment. We understand this afternoon that that course has been decided upon, and are sure that it will meet with the favor of everybody except the Star. Ferris was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged. After every court had been resorted to for a new hearing without avail, evidence came in voluntarily which showed that the man, in killing Watson, had acted in self defense. The jury that convicted Ferris subsequently signed a petition to the Governor asking that the sentence of murder be set aside and he be given merely imprisonment. The proposed action of the Governor will meet with general approval.

If the Bar Association is sure that the candidates it will recommend for additional Supreme Court judges will get preferential treatment at Washington, it should by all means press for the increase. But nothing could be more unfortunate than to let the control of the Court pass from jurists to politicians.—Advertiser

The above is a curio that any man interested in the proposed reformation of the Supreme Court might well note. To the Advertiser a man tarred with the same brush as Frear and Perry is a jurist; others are politicians. The public, however, has not only the recent disbarment decisions to make it look at the matter just the other way, but it has the rulings of years to prove conclusively that almost every decision by Chief Justice Frear and Justice Perry has been dictated by politics. ## CORRESPONDENCE

District Court Doings and How a Flagrant Assault was Treated.

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:

At Waimea, Hawaii, on the 10th instant, C A Widemann was arrested, on the complaint of James Bright, for assault and battery upon the person of one of complainant's sons. The assault was committed a couple of days before by being hit over the head with the fist and then ducked under water. Defendant was let out on depositing a bail of \$50, the case being set for the next morning before District Magistrate Wm Hookuanui.

The defendant failed to put in an appearance on time the next day. He telephoned Mrs Atcherley that he was on his way, she, in the meantime, notifying the Court of such a fact. Upon Mrs Atcherley's request Attorney Z Paakiki asked the Court for such a favor, although he was not counsel in the case, and thereupon Mr Bright, the complaining father, who also acted as prosecuting attorney, told the Court that Mr Paakiki was in contempt as not representing the defendant. Mr Paakiki answered that as an attorney and a member of the Court, he had a right to speak for one not represented by way of rendering assistance. And the Court declared the bail forfeited.

It was noon when the defendant arrived and the Court reconvened to hear the case and was defended by Mr Paakiki, who immediately asked the Court that before the hearing, the forfeited bail be first repaid, as the defendant was before the Court. The forfeited bail money was thereupon returned to the defendant upon such a demand and after due consideration.

Your correspondent will here say that such a method may be only known in Judge Hookuanui's Court. In one breath, he declares a bail forfeited, and within a few hours, in virtually the same breath, he orders its repayment.

On the case being heard, the prosecution produced testimony from those who saw the assault upon the lad, but they varied. The lad testified that he was struck over the head ten times, which was done, he said, in the presence of four others, F Spencer, Maka, Manuela and H Akona, and was ducked under water the same number of times without being seen by anyone. But in the testimony given by those mentioned, Manuela said that he saw two blows struck on the head, Spencer once, Maka not at all, and Akona two slaps. On these evidences, the defendant was found guilty and fined to pay \$25 and costs. An appeal was noted to the Circuit Court.

Prior Incidents to the Jones Tragedy.

The late Mrs E M Jones worked the whole of last week at Mrs Dickerson millinery parlors. Mrs Dickerson's says that on being paid last Saturday afternoon, Mrs Jones asked whether she was to come to work on Monday and was answered in the affirmative, and she went off seemingly happy. From other, it is learned that after receiving her pay as above, she bought herself a new pair of shoes and then went home, going out later in the evening for an electric car ride. Her divorced husband was also a passenger on the same car with her, about 9 o'clock, she going out to Waikiki and he alighting somewhere out Pawaas.

Mrs Parmenter's Condition.

Mrs Parmenter, who was shot, reputedly by E M Jones, Saturday night, is getting along as well as could be expected. This afternoon the doctor was summoned on account of what seemed to be a re-opening of the wound but he said that the bleeding would be a relief and benefit rather than doing harm. The wounded part of the face and neck has taken on a bluish color, which, however, was to be expected. The bullet, which is supposed to be in the lower part of the neck, has not yet been definitely located.

The Coptic sailed at 9 o'clock this morning for Yokohama and China.

Tonight's concert by the band will be at the railway depot in Palama.

Governor Dole will this afternoon return the call of Admiral Terry at the naval station.

A meeting of the Board of Agriculture and Forestry has been called for tomorrow afternoon.

Governor Dole and the Bankers are in conference this afternoon in regard to the loan bonds.

The Gaelic arrived early this morning from Yokohama and will sail at 6 p m for San Francisco.

Freear, the travelling entertainer, has arranged to put on a program at the Orpheum next Saturday evening.

High Sheriff Brown has signed a warrant formally charging E M Jones with murder in the first degree.

The Bar Association's meeting in the hall over Castle & Cooke's this afternoon will take place at 4 o'clock.

W O Smith has been appointed administrator of the estate of the late Judge W L Wilcox to serve without bonds.

H C Vida will not stand for the Republican nomination for sheriff. He will support the candidacy of High Sheriff Brown.

J O Carter has been appointed administrator of the late Thomas J Cummins to serve without bonds as prescribed by the testator.

Robert Plunkett, a student at Kamehameha school, fell in a fit at noon today. He was removed to the Queen's hospital for treatment.

Insurance men of Honolulu had a meeting yesterday with Insurance Commissioner Kepoikai at which the new law was thoroughly gone over.

The funeral of the late Miss Juanita Dreier will take place from the Roman Catholic Cathedral at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. Bishop Libert will officiate.

The Right Reverend Libert, Bishop of Zuégma, was banqueted at the Hawaiian hotel by young men of his communion last evening. About eighty were present.

Queen Liliuokalani returned this morning to Washington Place, her city residence, after a fortnight's outing at her Waikiki beach resort. She is enjoying good health.

The wife of Barnie Ordenstein died early this afternoon at the family residence near the pumping station in Palama. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon.

Governor Dole has practically decided to commute the sentence of George Ferris to life imprisonment. He was sentenced to be hanged for the murder of an old man named Watson. Since then, however, new evidence has come in to show that he acted in self defense.

**Burglar Is Arrested.**

Robert Nery, the soldier accused of being the principal in the robbery at the Ocean View resort in Waikiki Saturday night, was captured by Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth at Ewa plantation last night and brought to town this morning. Chillingworth received word yesterday that the refugee was at the plantation and took the late train for the place. He found his man in bed and arrested him. Nery was arraigned in the district court this morning on the charge of burglary in the first degree. Hearing was postponed until tomorrow.

The other two men mixed up in the affair were identified at the Camp Moaday morning and arrested.

**Hawaiians Misrepresented.**

The following is reproduced from the Advertiser for the reason that it abounds in good sense and carries a suggestion that should be heeded by photographers and picture dealers:

Editor Advertiser: I have met numerous Hawaiians who, during our conversation, have asked me why the majority of residents in the eastern states consider the native Hawaiian little above the standing of Samoans, and deem them partly savage. For instance, residents in New York, Washington, and other cities are surprised to see Hawaiians, who visit their city, act the same as the residents.

My one answer is this: Go into any curio store where photographs of natives and Hawaiian scenery are for sale, and one will invariably find that nine pictures out of ten show the native in the scanty costume of a sash around the waist and a wreath upon the head. These pictures are purchased by tourists, and sent to friends in the States and as these are about the only ones that arrive, the impression is made that the native is little more than a savage.

If pictures of beautiful scenery with a group of residents of Hawaii, native or otherwise, as they are today, were sent to the States in place of "hula hula" dancers, the general impression of Hawaiians would be changed considerably.

**At the Royal Mausoleum.**

The caskets containing the remains of members of the Kalakaua dynasty and others of our Chiefs (Allies) were removed last night from the Royal Mausoleum to a building recently erected for their reception on the east side of the same, preparatory to undertaking the proposed repairs to the vault as well as the building itself. There were 24 caskets in all removed. Queen Liliuokalani and Prince Kalaniana'ole were personally present. By direction of the Queen, Col C P Iaukea superintended the removal, and by request of the Prince, T R Lucas attended to the mechanical part of the removal. Retainers of the Queen, the Princess and of the late Queen Emma did the labor of removing their respective Allies. Others of chiefly connections were also in attendance.

**Jones Still At Large.**

Up to press hour this afternoon all efforts to apprehend E M Jones, the alleged murderer of Mrs E M Jones, had failed. Detective McDuffie returned to the city early this morning after scouring the valleys and mountains with a posse for nearly two days. He was sent out immediately on a new trail. Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth is working almost day and night on the case and every police officer of the island is also on the lookout. The opinion is gaining ground that Jones is being concealed by friends until he can be spirited away to the other islands in the hope of getting him out of the country.

**Pearl Harbor Opened.**

Pearl harbor was entered yesterday for the first time by a war ship or any vessel of considerable draught. The vessel was the Iroquois. From her peak she flew the flag of Admiral Terry, and on board with the Admiral were Captains White, Niblack, Rodman and Parker.

Entrance to the harbor was made without trouble. The Iroquois then proceeded into the West loch and cruised down to the end. Returning she entered the extreme South-East loch, passed through most of it and then anchored opposite the proposed naval works. There the Admiral and party went ashore for the purpose of inspecting the ground.

Admiral Terry was immensely pleased with the harbor and the plans for improvements there.

**Shamrock Loses Again.**

Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock III again came out second best in the cup race today, although the distance between the two boats at the finish was less than in the race of Saturday. The Reliance took the lead at the start and gained upon it to the finishing line, crossing it three minutes ahead of her opponent.

The next race will take place on Thursday, and should the Reliance win then it will settle the contest, the competition being best three in five.

The Chinese theatres now have an opposition in the shape of a graphophone. A free singing exhibition is given nightly from some upper story window and the Celestials gather about below listening to the music. Such was the case on River street Sunday afternoon, the Chinese standing about and some sitting along the wall of the stream, and the same on Hotel street last evening.
