The top of the lantern reaches a height of a little more than 60 feet above high water mark. This is the first public improvement made in Lahalna, since the islands were annexed to the United States. 



A Better Attitude

The attitude of Governor Carter towards the county campaign, as now stated by himself, is a vast improvement upon the position that has been assumed in the past, and fairness and propriety suggested by

The Star several days ago. It is not right that employes of the public by simple reason of being such employes, should become controlling powers in precinct and district politics,-when the power is acquired by means of control over public money which pays a large force of subordinates who are voters. The governor is quoted as saying "From what I read of his power, I should say that Sam Johnson could have settled the whole thing long ago." Nothing could more strongly show the correctness of what The Star has contended for than this statement. It shows the need of an absolute rule preventing men in such positions as that of Sam Johnson from interfering at all. It also shows that for the good of the party in the long run, the Republicans would have done well to have adopted the rule suggested some time ago and rejected, that government officials shall not hold places on the party managing committees. Sam Johnson happens to be an honest The most efficient preparation for the official, and if he "settled the whole thing" might do it very well. But that is not the right way to have it settled and some day the job of settling under similar circumstances might fall to a very different sort of

In trying, at least, to keep the administration out of the county fight Governor Carter is following the example of the federal government, which keeps its chief employes out of ward politics. It is an important and new stand for the Territorial administration to take. The governor applies it to the present county campaign, which is the only one under discussion now. But as a principle it is just as applicable to Territorial campaigns. 
