The Current Score.

EDITOR BULLETIN:

The BULLETIN's editorial likening the action of the Government in the conspiracy cases to that of a racing steambowl's crew in sitting on the lever of the safety valve is a most appropriate one. The government organs and officials are confident that the so-called conspirators represent a low class of white persons who fattened off the treasury in the days of the monarchy, and that the forces at the disposition of the republic can dispose of the disaffected persons "in a jiffy." Why cannot they conduct the several departments of the government in a manner that will best show a consciousness of strength. The arrest of persons having arms may not be out of order and the confiscation of arms and ammunition decidedly in order; but why refuse the persons the right of liberty on bail? The continued confinement of persons who have families to care for and business interests that must suffer savors of machine malice and vindictiveness, both traits of fear and cowardice. The writer has been told that nearly every citizen has a firearm of some description among his household effects, and if the possession of such an arm is to be taken as evidence of conspiracy to down the republic, and lead to the summary arrest and forcible separation of man from wife and children, then one may be pardoned for wishing for a return of the peaceful days of the monarchy. The Advertiser has a remarkable editorial on scars, based upon reported statements of so-called royalists of an intention to load the President with lead and do divers other things against the peace of "the best government these islands ever had."

The fact probably is that the officials of this "best government" find the strain of waiting for annexation too severe, and as a consequence nerves are giving away and hysteria threatening. The only remedy would seem to be that the scared officials should resign their duties to new men who have sufficient nerve not to scare at harmless gasconade and then take counsel of fear.

Speaking of scars the editor of the organ of the "best government" seems to forget that the warfare by scars was first carried on by the people whom he represents. The "death's head and cross bones" affixed to a citizen's gate, with blood curdling legend added, and the bag of bones found near the Queen's place and, the openly mouthed threats of assassination of the woman are overlooked by the editor of the Advertiser. He may not have been in the country when the "best government" supporters boasted that the Queen had heart disease and that scars might prove deadly. The Swedish policy of the early days of the provisional government has not been forgotten. The editor should remember that "curses like chickens come home to roost."

The editor of the organ of the "best government" is right when he says that business is suffering; but he is not frank enough to ascribe the stagnation to the scars the "best government" supports. The writer does not wish it thought that he has no sympathy for the persons who have the scars, but who are unable to hold on and scared to let go. On the contrary he is very, very sorry, and abstains from taunts and abuse.

In this issue will be found an intensely interesting article on the Pacific cable question, which has appeared as correspondence in the Montreal Witness. There is very little doubt that the Canadian-Australian cable will be laid very soon, and a Hawaiian connection, although desirable to the promoters, will not be considered as essential by them. When Hawaii will have cable communication with the American mainland, unless the American Government or American capitalists move quickly in the matter, seems to be a very remote event.

VAN GIESEN'S STORY

He Tells About the Conspiracy to Upset the Republic.

Witness Helped Bush to Run Ka Leo Only to Betray Him.

The District courtroom was crowded to the door at 9 o'clock this morning with spectators eager to hear the treason and conspiracy examinations. So stilling was the atmosphere that a large number, principally natives, were ordered out of the room. F. R. Walker, British Vice-Consul, was present in Court.

Attorney-General W. O. Smith and his deputy, A. G. M. Robertson, appeared for the prosecution; C. W. Ashford and A. P. Peterson for the defense.

The charge was again read. Mr. Ashford refused to enter a plea, but would file objections to the proceedings, on the ground that the Republic of Hawaii had not been in existence six months. Magistrate Perry overruled the objections and the prosecution opened its case.

J. H. Van Giesen, sworn, stated: Am resident of Honolulu; am a police officer in the service of the Hawaiian Government; been such since November, 1893; employed by the Marshal; have made reports to the Marshal during this period, very frequently; am acquainted with Nawahi, Crick, Bush, not especially with West; Bush has been engaged in printing business; publishing the paper Ka Leo, printed in Printer's Lane; Crick has been assisting Bush in publishing the paper; Nawahi also assisted Mr. Bush by writing articles; one press is in an adjoining building to his private dwelling, other in lower floor of the dwelling; have assisted in setting type and writing articles; have been extremely intimate with these gentlemen; am very sorry to see them in their present position; have had many conversations with defendants on different matters; on August 22 Crick informed me that blood would yet have to be shed to settle this question; replied that I thought the question would be quietly settled, that the natives would see the question and settle it peacefully; Crick said Robert Wilcox had 300 natives, and all he lacked was ammunition; the natives would follow him anywhere; he also said there were some white men; there were Tom Walker, Jas. Merseberg and others—quite a crowd; asked him when he expected an uprising; he said that the attack would be simultaneous; that prominent people would be guarded so that they could not congregate at any one place; he said they were to take the Government buildings, also the Station House; witness said it would be hard to take the latter; Crick then said that they would have to blow open the windows with explosives; this conversation was held on the veranda of my residence on Liliha street; none of my present.

While Mr. Ashford was arguing a point on the law of evidence, witness took out his diary and was ordered to shut it by the counsel.

Witness, continuing: Have had conversations with Bush, Crick and Nawahi several times in regard to the overthrow of the republic and the restoration of the monarchy; have had conversation with two of these men on this same subject; about Sept. 8 had conversation with Bush and Nawahi; this conversation was not exactly with me, but was between natives and half-breeds who had congregated in the office; each of those present was to prepare himself, in case of an uprising; so that they would be ready; Bush, Nawahi and Crick made these statements; among the mass of evidence which I've got in my diary, it would be impossible to locate any special date; but on Sept. 24, a map of Honolulu was obtained by Crick; strategic points were discovered; a list of the names of sympathizers with the government was shown; also their residences; witness obtained a copy of the list (list exhibited); have not the original; saw it last in the hands of Crick; the strategic points to be

guarded by armed men to prevent assistance being given to those in the Government buildings were: corner Punchbowl and Boretania streets; corner Punchbowl and Queen; King and Lolani; King and Boretania; King and Smith; Piliok and Boretania; Nuuanu and Commercial Saloon, Punchbowl and King; rear Opera House, King and Alakoa; Hotel and Alapai; Boretania and Alapai; Printer's lane and Punchbowl; attack Station House, old Palace, the Government House, jail, Electric Light Station, two telephone offices, residences of those who were to be taken prisoners: W. O. Smith, E. O. Hall, Emmeluth, Hafeh, S. B. Dole, A. Young, W. F. Allen, Wilder, King, Deputy Marshal Brown, Marshal Hitchcock, Andrew Brown, S. B. Bishop, Henderson, J. B. Castle, Tenney, Klemme, S. M. Damon, Chief Justice A. F. Judt, Capt. Andrews, J. M. Oat, C. Bolte, H. Waterhouse, J. F. Morgan, J. Nott, Geo. C. Potter, W. D. Alexander, W. E. Rowell, J. A. Hassinger, W. H. Cummings, Jos. Marsden, W. R. Castle, Jonathan Shaw, Geo. E. Stratemeyer, L. L. LaPierre, J. W. Jones; firms to be raided for arms: Castle & Cooke, E. O. Hall & Son, Wilder & Co., J. A. Magoon, T. B. Murray, Lowers & Cooke, Hobron & Newcomb; Oct. 25, remember another conversation with Crick about rifles and ammunition being in our house; there were three rifles and 186 rounds of cartridges; Springfield, Winchester and a Sharp; they were given to witness to take care of; at that time more definite plans were discussed to make preparations, so that when the day came everybody would be ready; the insurgents were to be divided into four squads, under different captains; the first squad were to intrude themselves under the stone wall surrounding the palace, and pick off the soldiers; other places to be taken were: Central Union Church, Hawaiian Hotel, Opera House, Kawaiahao Church; that would prevent any attack in the rear to those around the wall; the natives would then assemble at the street corners, and prevent the Citizens' Guard from going to the palace; smaller squads would surround the residences of those mentioned; electric light and telephone wires would be cut to prevent communication; Crick informed him he would be captain of the squad at King and Liliha streets; from conversation Crick was almost certain the native police force would turn over to them; the Schutzen Club had divided then; although they would not render assistance they would not object; the American League was looked on with more suspicion; annexation being their object; they would like to see the restoration of the monarchy.

Witness at this point was asked to identify the three rifles mentioned. After much fumbling, he did so. On Nov. 7 a fourth rifle was brought to witness; Crick told witness that there were three more rifles at Bush's, and four at Mr. Cummins'; the man trouble he said was to get enough to buy them from the Portuguese and the Chinese; Crick seemed to be the agent to make these purchases; some \$45 were still owing for arms purchased; Nawahi and Bush during that month (November) said that the Women's Hui Aloha Aina had \$175 in their treasury which they did not wish expended for this thing; they wanting it for something they were going to do after restoration; Nawahi at this time seemed sorely vexed at this refusal; was told by Nawahi that there were 1100 arms scattered through the city in the possession of their party, known as the royalist party; they were principally at the points to be guarded in the possession of natives; after the arms were left with witness they were put in the bedroom; one evening after that he came home terribly excited; he said that he had it straight that a warrant had been issued for the searching of houses for arms, and that the place where they were then was not a secure place; he advised them to be buried, and they were; before being buried the arms were well-oiled and serviceable, not as they are at present, rusty; frequent allusions have been made by Crick and the other two defendants to the use of explosives; was told by Crick how easy it would be to throw nitroglycerine into the crowd which would assemble at the wharf on the return of the President from Hawaii; a bottle of this, if placed carefully, would be sufficient to blow up the Government building; saw arms at Bush's house; a rifle and two large revolvers; they were in the possession of Bush; Bush said he kept these for the purpose of defending himself; the revolvers were Colts; Crick told witness that a mortar had been sent for to the Coast to throw a 20lb. shot; have inquired later of Bush and Nawahi and was told that it had not yet arrived; many times matter about the Hui Aloha Aina came up, to be firm for things to happen in the future; instructions were given to branches of the hui to obtain arms and sell their lands to get money to buy guns; saw Nawahi writing these instructions; witness advised Nawahi to write the instructions on the mimeograph, but advice was not followed; during one conversation with Crick in November he told him that instructions had been sent to natives at Irwin's place at Kahuku and at Ewa to fire these places; waited several days but no news came; came to the conclusion that the natives were too cowardly to do it.

At this juncture Attorney General Smith requested that a recess of five minutes be allowed, counsel on both sides wishing to retire for that time.

Resuming, witness was shown two revolvers. Identify these revolvers; they were at the witness house and were given him to be cleaned by Crick; they were kept in a bureau where the clothes were; one was placed nightly on a chair; recollect conversation when three defendants were present; it was on theme to overthrow the Provisional Government and restore the monarchy; the theme was to secure that and by peaceful means; after the return of the commissioners they found that they had to depend on their

own efforts, that the United States would not interfere; then the theme was dropped; remember a conversation between John Colburn and Bush; conversation was during the past six months; am not sure whether it was during regime of Republic.

Cross examination: Been here since 1879; been employed as Government school teacher; Government health agent and secret service; employed by the Board of Education in 1881; was also employed at Lahaia; began teaching Waiale school, Kauai, was there two years; at Kalakaua's coronation was employed by the Board of Health; was teaching last at Waiale; change in the administration caused my leaving the Board of Health; was at the receiving station and Moloakai, then took Halawa school in 1881; left school for professional reasons (witness objected to making further explanations); up to the present day I have nothing but surmises why I was let out; no charges were made against me; suspect the reason was because of the change of the monarchy to the Provisional Government; took Halawa school in 1888 or 1889; was dismissed by W. Jas. Smith in July, 1893; think the reason why I lost my school bill at Halawa was because I had a child by one of my pupils; am married; wife was on Liliha street; applied to the Marshal for any position under the Government in November, 1893; lived at Halawa from time lost school position until coming to Honolulu and joining the secret service; was in the customs service watching two nights; applied first to customs department for employment; was out of the customs service about a week when witness received commission as a member of the secret service; the nature of my employment was to get acquainted with people of bad character, gain their confidence and watch them; Crick was one of the men to be watched; was introduced to Bush and during a period of acquaintance got into his employ; was visiting in January or February when Crick was introduced; duty was to prevent crime, not to detect; gained Bush's acquaintance by professional means; commissioners from Washington returned the latter end of September, during the ten months previous witness made frequent reports to the Marshal at his house, not at the Police Station; drew \$100 a month as salary; never been suspended; all the game is not yet bagged; have brought in three, the crime has been prevented, not detected.

Recess was taken at noon.

NOTES.

During the course of the examination Counsel Ashford raised several objections on points in the law of evidence. These were over-ruled by Judge Perry, and the counsel stated that he would not raise any more objections.

The witness's credibility was attacked by the defendant's counsel. The latter stated that he would undertake to prove the witness to be one of the biggest scoundrels in the country.



to £778,250, or, more than twice the cost of the two cables laid from Singapore to Port Darwin. The Eastern Extension Telegraph Company, which now connects the different Australian colonies with Asia, has a watered capital upon which it pays seven percent dividends, its stock selling at 160, and its four percent debenture stock at 116. The Great Northern Telegraph Company, operating in the same territory, pays over eight percent dividends, and its stock is selling at 200. This demonstrates that there already exists a large and profitable business in this territory.

The laying of a Pacific cable on a sound business basis should result in securing the same success on the Pacific Ocean that has been attained by the Eastern and Great Northern Companies, and also by such Atlantic companies as are managed and financed on sound commercial principles. A heavy traffic already exists, and the completion of the cable between Australia and British Columbia would immediately divert to this missing link an immense business, which is capable of the greatest possible expansion. Vancouver is now in close telegraph communication with the leading land lines and existing cable systems throughout the world, the establishing of which has taken millions of money and years of experience to perfect, and this makes the Pacific cable a much simpler and safer problem than it would be, were this vast system of feeders yet to be created.

Through government subsidies, exclusive rights, and other advantages, Sir John controls, through his eastern companies, the existing routes to the far east, and it is to the Pacific cable that the various countries interested must look for relief.

Sir John and his associates fully realize that when once attention is directed to the Pacific Ocean as a field for cable enterprise, the Vancouver and Australian cable will be but the commencement of extensions that will connect Vancouver with South Africa, and even India is among the possibilities. Japan is to-day dependent upon China and Russia for her telegraph outlet. Four million dollars, the cost of a first-class ironclad, would give her a cable of her own between Japan and Vancouver, and five hundred thousand dollars more would continue the cable to Vladivostok, Russia, giving Vancouver a connection with the Russian land system in Asia and Europe.

Within a few years Montreal will be one of the leading telegraph centers of the world. It will, in fact, be the telegraph 'hub' of the universe.

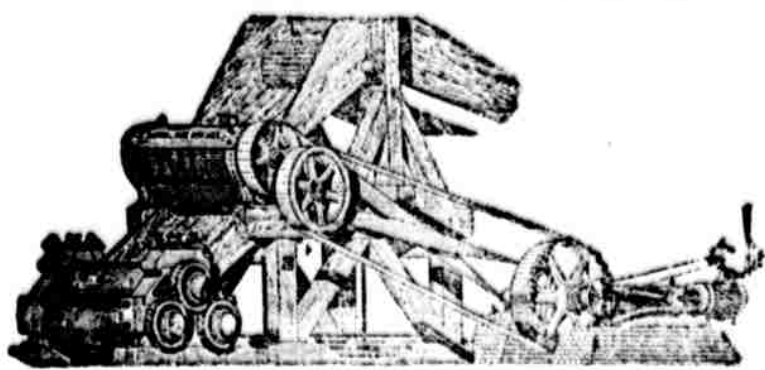

SIR JOHN PENDER'S RECORD.

The Pacific Cable Will Go and Will Benefit Montreal.

(From the Montreal Witness.)

SIR:—I note your editorial of Nov. 19, with reference to Sir John Pender and the Pacific cable, and feel that you do not fairly estimate that gentleman's position in the cable world. While it is true, as you state, that Sir John and his associates were pioneers in the Atlantic cable business, and look great risk in that enterprise, nevertheless they were not there as philanthropists, and did not neglect to seize and retain every advantage they could secure in connection with this undertaking. There are still in Montreal, and elsewhere throughout Canada, shareholders in the first Atlantic Cable Company, who feel that if the original investor is to be classed as a philanthropist, then they are most certainly entitled to this distinction, for they have had very light dividends, and did not participate in the handsome profit that was divided up among the insiders at the time the Newfoundland Company was absorbed by the Anglo. Exclusive rights were secured in Newfoundland for a great many years, it being thought at that time that the utmost length that a submarine cable could be worked was from Ireland to Newfoundland, and these gentlemen thought they had secured a monopoly of the business for a lifetime. The history of Sir John Pender's connection with Atlantic telegraphy, whenever he has met competition, has been that of a 'despot.' He has been for years the soul of the Globe Telegraph and Trust Company, which, with a share capital of £3,000,000, purchases the shares of various cable companies, assisting the cable ring to control different cable organizations, with a view of maintaining or forcing harmony of action. Through this and kindred combinations Sir John Pender and his associates have been able to force nearly every competitive Atlantic cable company that has ever been started, into his Atlantic cable 'pool.' The first was the Direct Cable Company, which, through a war of rates, was forced into the 'pool' in 1875. Then came the French Cable Company, which, through similar pressure, was knocked under in 1880. In 1881 Mr. Jay Gould loomed up, but Sir John did not dare fight him, fearing not only Mr. Gould's great ability and wealth, but also the Western Union Telegraph Company, whose land lines he controlled, and such terms were made with Mr. Gould as permitted his turning over to the Western Union Company, on a basis of \$14,000,000, two Atlantic cables that had cost less than half that sum. The next man who appeared on the scene was Mr. John Mackay, who, with Mr. James Gordon Bennett, was inspired by Sir John not to waste money in such a foolhardy enterprise, as it would be impossible for them, as amateurs, to succeed against such pioneers in the business as he and his associates. Sir John is appealing now, in a similar strain, to the different governments who propose laying the Pacific cable, with the practical reservation, however, that if they are bound to squander their money, he is the man to entrust with it. In this connection the President of the Ottawa Colonial conference sums up his position: 'Sir John Pender makes three distinct statements, first, that the cable cannot be built; second, that if built it cannot pay; third, that if it is to be built, he wants to build it.' Mr. Mackay and his associates were, however, not to be intimidated, and the two cables of the Commercial Company were laid in December, 1884, and a tariff of forty cents per word was adopted, as against the previous rate of fifty cents. Sir John and the cable pool protested against this reduction, and threatened that unless the rates were raised, and the Commercial Company accepted its pro rata proportion of a 'pool,' such a war of rates would ensue as would ruin all concerned. The Commercial Company, however, was obdurate, with the result that the rates were reduced to twelve cents per word and Messrs. Mackay and Bennett found arrayed against themselves one of the most gigantic combinations of capital ever organized to crush out a competitor. For twenty-seven months the twelve-cent rate prevailed, and the Anglo Company's receipts, which had been £200,000 in 1874, when it had the entire traffic, and £450,000 in 1884, when it had to 'pool' with the Direct, French and Gould companies, dropped in 1887, under this interecine war, to £188,000. This ended in the 'pool' companies suing for peace, and the Commercial Company preserving its independence, which it still retains. This company's stock, owing to its low capital and sound business methods, is now recognized as a first-class investment, paying a regular dividend of seven percent, and earning considerably more, while the other Atlantic cable companies, with which Sir John is connected, are in a bad way, on account of their over-capitalization. It is to these concerns that he no doubt points when he says to the public that Atlantic cable investments have been so unprofitable that even governments would not be warranted in risking their money in the Pacific Ocean. The impression was at first industriously circulated that it would be impossible to lay and maintain a cable in the Pacific Ocean. Nevertheless, a construction company, which Sir John's friends control, has sent in a tender, along with the other leading cable manufacturers of the world, offering not only to lay this cable but also to maintain it.

The Australian and New Zealand Governments have contributed, and are under contract to contribute to Sir John's companies, a sum equal

Treasurer Macfarlane read an elaborate report, showing that the gain for fifteen months had been \$3977.30, or equal to a dividend of nearly nine percent on a capital stock of \$55,000. Under an authorization at a previous meeting, for the issue of \$10,000 of bonds to discharge an indebtedness of \$10,529.87, bonds to the amount of \$8900 had been taken up. They are payable in five years, and bear interest at the rate of eight percent per annum. The treasurer reported the past three months as the most profitable since the inception of the company. He commended the management of Peter Lee as being in all respects satisfactory. Tourist travel for 1895 promised to show a large increase. Two Cook excursions are already arranged.

More Ammunition.

About forty rounds of ammunition were got in all, besides a small can of powder. Officer David Knapp and another made the search.
