A Clever Hedgehog.

A gentleman writes to a Kentish paper about a rather curious fact which has just come under his own personal observation. He is the rector of a country parish, and his church warden, who is also the chief farmer in the place, possesses a small herd of milch Herefords. The cows generally give an abundance of milk, but latterly their owner remarked that one of them, when milking time came, proved an exception to the rule, giving none at all. His natural suspicion was that the animal was meddled with during the night, and in order to discover the guilty party he sent for the neighboring policeman, who, with his own cowman, was requested to keep a strict watch during a whole night near the meadow in which the herd was kept. Nothing, however, occurred to corroborate the farmer's suspicions that he was being robbed of his milk, and the mystery would probably have remained one had not the cowman, at about three o'clock in the morning, paid a visit to the cow in question, which was lying down in the meadow with the rest. The man roused her up, and the thief was discovered, but the offender was not one that the policeman could well take into custody, the nocturnal pilferer turning out to be a hedgehog which was caught in the act of milking the cow.

An Old City.

Damascus is the oldest city in the world. Tyre and Sidon have crumbled on the shore; Balbec is a ruin; Palmyra is buried in a desert; Nineveh and Babylon have disappeared from the Tigris and the Euphrates, Damascus remains what it was before the time of Abraham—a centre of trade and travel—an isle of verdure in the desert; "a presidential capital," with martial and sacred associations extending throughout thirty centuries. It was near Damascus that Saul of Tarsus saw the light above the brightness of the sun; the street which is called Strait, in which it was said "he prayed," still runs through the city. The caravan comes and goes as it did one thousand years ago; there is still the shik, the ass and the water-wheel; the merchants of the Euphrates and the Mediterranean still occupy the street "with the multitude of their wares." The city Mohammed surveyed from a neighboring height, and was afraid to enter "because it was given to man to have but one paradise, and for his part he was resolved not to have it in this world." It is to-day what Julian called the "Eye of the East," as it was in the time of Isaiah, "the head of Syria." From Damascus came the damson, our blue plums, and the delicious apricot of Portugal called damasco; damask, our beautiful fabric of cotton and silk, with vines and flowers raised upon a smooth, bright surface; the damask rose introduced into England in the time of Henry VIII; the Damascus blade, so famous the world over for its keen edge and wonderfully elasticity, the secret of whose manufacture was lost when Tamerlane carried the artist into Persia; and that beautiful art of inlaying wood and steel with gold and silver, a kind of mosaic engraving and sculpture united, called damasking, with which bureaus, boxes and swords are ornamented. It is still a city of flowers and bright waters; the streams of Lebanon and the "silk of gold" sparkle and murmur in the wilderness of the Syrian gardens.

THE LATE MINISTRY.

Something of the nature of a sensation was created in the community on Saturday by a remarkable letter which appeared in the *Advertiser* of that date, from the pen of Mr. W. L. Green, the late Minister of Foreign Affairs, containing a sketch of the history of the late Ministry from the time of the commencement of the session of the Assembly until their resignation. The letter is candid and manly in tone, and while it will add to the appreciation in which the author is held by the general public, it must prove a valuable and timely help to the new Cabinet. Coming from an eminently conservative thinker, one who is intimately connected with the material interests of the country, the views expressed will have much weight. The narrative, besides, is interesting reading to those unacquainted with the workings of the inner circles of Hawaiian politics.

On the much mooted question of an immigration of East Indian coolies, Mr. Green is explicit and emphatical against the scheme. He says that the present Premier "has altogether too much intelligence not to perceive when he occupies the position of Minister of Foreign Affairs, as some of his predecessors have found before him, that the introduction of British East Indian Coolies into this Kingdom upon the only terms on which they ever could be introduced, that is under the supervision of a British protector, is utterly impossible, for he must be blind to the signs of the times who fails to note first, the bold and decided policy of the United States as foreshadowed by Mr. Blaine's late ultimatum to the European powers; second—the wonderfully rapid increase of the already overshadowing power of the United States to maintain such a policy when she decides upon it; and to note both in connection with the varied close relations which this Group of Islands always have had and always must have, with the Great Republic. It is hardly necessary to call attention to the fact that the coolie system is threatened everywhere by the progress of ideas, and would be altogether out of place under a Constitutional Government, or indeed anywhere but in a sugar growing Crown Colony of the "severest type," a condition which God forbid that this country should ever arrive at. Indeed every true friend of Hawaii nei must perceive that the introduction of the East Indian Coolie system into this Kingdom would, even if it were possible, be an outrage on the whole Hawaiian people, and be injurious to them politically, socially and morally."

Mr. Editor:—If I knew the address of your correspondent, "Barley-Bree," I would send him, through the Post-office, a copy of a little pamphlet lately issued from Thrum's press, entitled *Moderation, Shall We Drink Wine and Beer?*

But not knowing who it is, and fearing I shall not have the pleasure of furnishing him an entire copy, will you have the kindness to reprint from the 2nd and 3rd pages the following:

"Listen to Baron von Liebig, one of the ablest chemists the world ever produced. He says: 'Fermentation is nothing else than the *putrefaction of a substance containing no nitrogen.*' There is no dispute on this point among those who know anything about it. I merely mention it that you may understand what you are drinking when you pour down fermented, that is rotted, liquor! You would be angry if your butcher sold you putrid meat, or your grocer brought you rancid butter, or decaying potatoes. But why? You might as rationally eat decaying food as drink decaying fluids."

"Well, after all these four processes have been gone through with, and you hold your glass of beer up to the light, what do you see? In a pint of pure beer you have a little more than 14 ounces of water, a very little extract of barley, and nearly one ounce of alcohol! It is that ounce of alcohol which gives that pint of beer its fascination—it is for that and that alone that you drink it! Extract that, and you would never taste the insipid, nasty stuff!"

"But let's be a little more explicit about the amount of alcohol in beer! Pure whiskey contains 50 per cent of alcohol. Beer varies greatly from four to ten per cent. When you drink a large 'schooner' of beer, and a small glass of whiskey, you get almost as much alcohol in the schooner as you do in the small glass!"

"But is that all, alcohol and the juice of rotten barley, that is contained in that glass? By no means. The *Brewers' Guide* gives over 70 different articles used in 'doctoring' beer. Let me name only a few: Cocculus indicus, the rankest poison known, oil of vitriol, pepper, aquafortis, poppy seeds, logwood, wormwood, tobacco, coppers, sugar of lead, sulphuric acid, prussic acid and black ants! Do you call such a compound of poisons, drugs, dead insects and dyestuffs 'wholesome!' Such compounds of poison and filth might well have come from the caldron of Macbeth's witches."

"Does not any man in his senses know that when he talks about substituting 'pure wine and beer, for strong liquors, and thus do away with drunkenness, that he is advocating an impossibility? It is impossible to get 'pure wines and beer.'"

The fear of trespassing too much on your valuable space prevents my making further extracts in confirmation of the truths asserted by the "Medical Record;" but I earnestly wish your correspondent, "Barley-Bree," would get the above mentioned pamphlet on "Moderation," and carefully peruse it; and as he is a "strong advocate of Temperance," I feel quite sure he would discover where *in-temperance* begins.

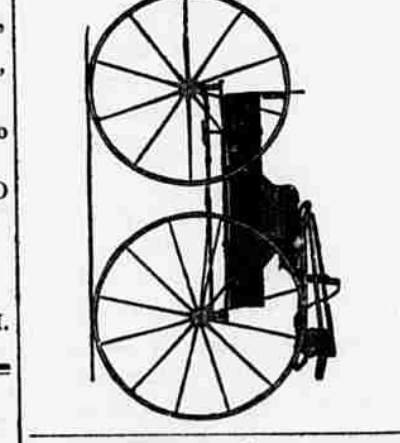
