## IN DEFENSE OF SHERIFF ANDREWS.

When the news of Sheriff Andrews' castigation by the Legislature reached Hilo, the Czar got on the dust heap and was "busy" immediately. Things began to fly, and Sheriff Andrews almost succeeded in his effort to pose as a martyr in the drama, as the following from the Hilo Tribune will indicate:

That the official conduct of Sheriff Andrews provoked a fusillade of attack from the members of the Legislature on the floor, is not surprising to people on this island, familiar with the methods of the "Czar."

The bitterest enemies of the Sheriff are slow to charge him with outright dishonesty. Few believe he would misappropriate a cent or misrepresent a fact. No one will question his indefatigable industry or his zeal in the discharge of his public duties. The outcry of condemnation at Honolulu probably affects Sheriff Andrews as much as water affects a duck when poured upon its back. Sheriff Andrews has no appreciation of criticism. He is as invulnerable to argument and reason as though he was an automaton of gutta serena.

With all his faults he is the most interesting man in official life in Hawaii. He is a surviving relic, as Speaker Beckley said, of the "best government on earth." He continues the methods which in the old days made every policeman a repository of executive, judicial and legislative power. Sheriff Andrews has this same old theory of his office and with monumental good faith puts it into practice. If a Legislature refuses to grant Andrews what he wants, he gets what he wants anyway. If the court's decrees do not suit the Sheriff, he pays no attention to them. If the Governor makes suggestions, they are complied with if it suits the Czar.

These remarks are made not in a criticizing spirit. We would be truthful and accurate. An unbiased and well drawn characterization of the official personality of Sheriff Andrews would make interesting reading even to people who have never heard of Hawaii.

One of his heaviest fortresses of defense from attack is the theory that a good intention sanctifies the deed. A proper motive exonerates an official of all culpability in mistakes that may occur along his official path. It's another way of saying "the end justifies the means," which is a doctrine that has no standing in America and which was the chief working theory of the "best government on earth," of which Sheriff Andrews is a relic.

This paper does not believe that an investigation of the sheriff's office would reveal any criminal dereliction upon which could be based charges of embezzlement, or charges of a like fibre. There would however most likely be found a looseness of administration which would scandalize any similar department in the States. But it's the old time looseness of the "best government on earth" and what are you going to do about it?

## TALKING OF VACANCY.

Governor Dole this morning referred the matter of the choice of a Superintendent, to succeed Mr Cooper in the Public Works department, to his kitchen cabinet. This was not only proper but diplomatic, for in that way the governor will be able to avail himself of unbiased opinion and will find an avenue by which he may escape from himself, or, in other words, have an excuse to not rationally for once in his life. The subject of an appointee was discussed casually and was then postponed for one week. This will enable the council to more carefully consider the names before it.

In the House there is a very pronounced feeling in favor of E C Winston for the place. The endorsement is by both Republicans and Home Rulers, and may be considered very strong. Among the Fifth District voters Mr Winston has an immense pull, and there will be a mass meeting at Kalihii camp tonight for the special purpose of booming his candidacy. We have nothing against Mr Winston except that we think he is better qualified to run a steam laundry than a public works department. He is a good fellow in his way, and has been "Jack of all trades;" but he was unfortunately born some hundreds of years too late to qualify for the important position to which he aspires. Another objection to Mr Winston is that he has been, and is, offensively partisan. He wears his partisanship as he does his coat, and it has become a familiar part of his make-up. A hide-bound partisan has no business in public office, particularly in one carrying with it a large and influential tail of "patronage." We would, therefore, advise our Hawaiian friends to think twice, and thoroughly, before endorsing Mr Winston.

As we have previously remarked, Marston Campbell and E R Adams are not wanted at any price. Eben Low is a fairly good man. The field is still open and ripe, however, for a fit name.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

When the House took a recess at noon today, Senate Bill 4 (Unpaid Bills) had not passed third reading. "Funny, isn't it, by Jove! Ah-ha-ha-ha!" And we add a refrain—"so mote it be."

The fistie bouts at the Orpheum Saturday evening showed four things, i. e.: That Millett is one of the best fighters in Honolulu; that Mattox was an overrated man; that Harris and Kaminsky are afraid of each other, and that Huibui is a better scrapper than was supposed.

In the House this forenoon, when the Hackfeld wharf item was revived, Representative Chillingworth said that that wharf was built during the time when harbor accommodations were much needed, not only as a help to the then congested condition of the harbor, but as well as an income producing venture. Conceding that it is an accommodation to the shipping, but as to its being an income producer, we say—it is not, as the facts do not bear out such a contention. We think the aged member was laboring under a delusion.

The Hawaii Herald naturally sprang to the defense of Sheriff Andrews in his recent predicament, and other Hilo influences were aroused to defend a man in whom Hilo nor Hawaii nor the Islands have one spark of confidence. The whole thing however, is, with Andrews, much as the Hilo Tribune remarks—"pouring water on a duck's back." Andrews is a "public bed-d" man. He always was such, and with his missionary backing it is precious little he cares what the people think or what they desire. In some countries a case like that of Andrews would supply working material for a "vigilance" committee.

The matter of the Hackfeld wharf item with the interest turned up again in the House this forenoon. Vice Speaker Knudsen ruled the motion to strike out as being out of order, wherein he was most decidedly wrong, as the bill was being considered on its third reading, but he withdrew the ruling soon after making it, being no doubt so advised by Representative Harris, who went up and had a short talk with him while Representative Fernandez opposed such a ruling. The withdrawal saved the situation. But the items passed by an almost strict party vote, and it was well, too, for upon the shoulders of the majority must rest the responsibility for such an illegal action of an unauthorized expenditure ordered by the Executive Council.

May 30—Bark St Katherine, Saunders, for San Francisco with following cargo: Honolulu Sugar Co, 15,072 bags of sugar; Oaomea Sugar Co, 14,968 bags of sugar; 15 bags coffee, and hides and skins, valued at \$745.60. Total value of cargo, \$122,107.83.

June 3—Bark Santiago, Anderson, for San Francisco, with three Japanese passengers and the following cargo: Hilo Sugar Co, 6,070 bags; Hakalau, 6,000 bags; Pepeekeo, 4,128 bags; Oiaa Sugar Co, 6,200 bags; Household goods, \$51. Total value of cargo, \$100,751.31.

About Appointments.

### EDITOR INDEPENDENT:

In times gone by one of the greatest evils of the Government was the fact that men were appointed to public office, not on account of their fitness to fill the position to which they were appointed but on account of their relationship and kinship to the "Powers that were."

One shining example of this system was the case of Attorney-General Dole, who has luckily resigned, or rather was forced to resign, and whose principal claim to the office was his relationship to the Governor who was then the "Uncrowned King of all he Surveyed."

Yet after all this experience it is proposed by the Governor to appoint Mr E R Adams his nephew to the office of Superintendent of Public Works or should he not be acceptable Mr E P Low, who we are informed has a good right to claim kinship to the Governor by virtue of marriage.

Neither of these gentlemen have any qualifications for the office of Superintendent of Public Works and would be worse than useless in the position.

The citizens and voters of the Territory are up in arms against these possible appointments and also against that of Marston Campbell a California Carpet bagger who has not been in the country long enough to change his socks.

We are also informed that the Legislature has taken a good look into the matter and will take care that they will still be on the ground and in the ring when this appointment is made and should any of these "brilliant aspirants" be appointed the department of public works will have to get along on some very small salaries and appropriations.

Officers of the National Guard will have an important business meeting this evening.

Miss Eleanor Pires and J B Freitas will be married at the Methodist church on the evening of June 19.

Rose of Killarney Social Club has issued invitations for an opening dance at its hall on School street this evening.

The Holy Ghost festival was repeated privately in grounds near the Mormon church Saturday night and yesterday. About 2000 people attended.

Irish Consul Thomas McTighe has purchased the interest of J E Gomes in the liquor business of Gomes & McTighe.

Mr A P Taylor, the well known and active newsgatherer of the Advertiser's staff, will have to undergo an operation for appendicitis.

Father Valentin is confined to bed at Johnson's sanitarium with an injured foot. No serious consequences are anticipated by his physician.

Cecil Brown and his associates were given the decision by Judge De Bolt Saturday against Colonel Macfarlane and others in the First National Bank controversy.

Central Union church's annual picnic next Thursday will take place on the campus at Punahou. The German Lutheran picnic will be on the grounds of H A Isenberg, near by.

Queen Liliuokalani, who will leave by the Claudine tomorrow for Wailuku, will be accompanied by Miss Heleluhe, Joseph Aea, John Imoku and others. Robert Wilcox will probably not go on account of ill health.

Mrs Annis Montague Turner gives an informal recital of vocal pupils this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at Punahou Preparatory hall, and she will be pleased to have friends of the pupils as well as her own friends, attend without further ceremony of invitation.

Spartanburg, S C, the scene of Saturday's great flood which swept away three immense cotton mills, is the home of Prof J T Crawley, manager of the Hawaiian Fertilizer Company. He has a brother, a doctor, at a town in the center of the stricken district, and is anxiously awaiting news of him.

The little Jap mysteriously shot on Queen street Friday evening, died very unexpectedly at the Japanese hospital Saturday afternoon. The wound was far more serious than had been supposed. It is now believed by the police that the Japanese was shot by a person who mistook him for another man.

Treasurer Kapaikai has arranged to issue government six-per-cent over drafts for \$150,000 and treasury notes for \$150,000 more, in order that the elaborate scheme of public works and improvements may be carried out. The overdrafts will be divided equally between the banks, each of whom tendered for the entire amount.

**IN EXTRA SESSION.**

The Second Legislatura for the Consideration of Appropriation Bills.

**THE HOUSE—THIRTY THIRD DAY.**

The preliminaries being about to be disposed of when Paele questioned the right of the stenographer to read the minutes in the absence of the Clerk, both of whose duties were clearly defined under the rules. But the Vice Speaker said that that should not retard business. The House should go on, even without the Clerk for a day or two. On motion of Keliinui, the minutes were adopted.

Kupihea presented a petition from 46 voters of the Fifth District praying for an appropriation of \$400 for fencing the Kunawai Spring and also \$400 to reimburse J Maunakea for services rendered by him under a commission from J H Boyd, former Superintendent of Public Works, in caring the said spring. To Public Expenditures.

Kealawas offered a resolution that \$8,000 be inserted in the Appropriation Bill for traveling expense of the Hawaiian Territorial Band. To Military.

The Chair ordered to take up unfinished business, when Chillingworth said that the election of a Janitor to take the place of the late Janitor, and nominates D M Keliias, son of the late Janitor, be elected in the stead of his late father. The hand of death has dealt heavily with the Keliias family. Only a few days before, a son was taken, to be so soon followed by the father. Long supported the nomination and said that it was nothing but proper that the son should be placed in the position made vacant by his father's demise.

Kaniho nominated Pulas Jr, saying that the late Janitor had held the position during the regular and extra sessions. It is as much a hardship for those who came across the seas as for those who have been heavily dealt with by death. Only a few days remain of this extra session and why not give another a chance to earn a little. Wright objected to any more boys been elected to office, as the House has enough of them already. He did not like to have it said that this House is a nursery for boys.

On the nominations being closed, ballots were collected by the Interpreter, and the result was: D M Keliias, 19; Pulas, Jr 7, and one blank. D M Keliias was declared duly elected.

Unfinished business was then ordered up, the third reading of Senate Bill 4 [Unpaid Bills.] Keliinui moved to pass bill. Fernandez moved to consider item relating to the Hackfeld wharf and moved to strike the same out of the bill, saying that it was an illegal expenditure of public funds incurred by the Executive without authority.

Chillingworth said that he was surprised that the member should move to strike out, as they both voted in favor of the item. Fernandez said with heat that he never at any time voted for it, as he was always opposed to any illegal expenditure. Continuing, Chillingworth said that he may be sadly mistaken unless borne out by the stenographer's notes, but he was in favor of leaving every item as in the bill. The work done was brought about by the needs of the time, otherwise we would lose a certain amount of shipping.

Keliinui moved the previous question and on passing, the yeas and nays were called on its being struck out and failed by almost a strict party vote of 9 to 18, Kaniho and Pulas changing their votes.

Paele moved to strike out the item of "interest at 6% for one year, \$6,288.25," and after speaking on it, it also failed by another party vote of 10 to 16, Kaudsen not voting, both Kaniho and Pulas voting together this time.

Pulas moved to insert an item "to pay W J Wright for handling tax appeal cases, \$80." This item caused a few members to ask for information and was given by Wright,

and after some bantering pro and con the item was passed by a vote of 16 to 9 and the same inserted.

Kaniho moved to insert under Department of Attorney General a new item "to refund Police officers, District of Koolau, Island of Oahu, \$540." He likened it to the refunding of police on Hawaii, but in this case, the salaries of two officers were deducted in order to pay another. While he was speaking, Andrade raised a point of order that the claim was not an unpaid bill and was sustained by the chair, who ruled accordingly. On the ruling being appealed, the chair was sustained by 14 yeas to 12 nays.

Wright also moved to insert "back pay of Dr Atcherley, \$250" and submitted a resolution with correspondence on it, but was ruled out by the chair.

A little squabble then ensued, but was presented by a motion to take a recess, which prevailed, and recess taken a little after the noon hour.
