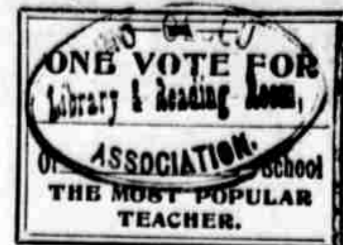

BROWDS CHEER GOOD RACES

Record Breaking Meet of the Hawaiian Jockey Club.

Splendid Management Throughout—Detail of Events of Saturday and the 11th—Jolly Crowd and Good Order.

The Hawaiian Jockey Club has every reason to be proud of the race meets at Kapiolani Park on the 9th and 11th. Everything was done in an orderly and quiet way, and there was a dispatch about the running off of the races that was most acceptable to everyone. The officers of the Jockey Club, and particularly the secretary, Mr. Paul R. Iseberg, were indefatigable in their efforts to make people comfortable. There was a good crowd out Saturday afternoon, but yesterday the grand stand was packed to overflowing, while the fences were lined with people nearly the whole way around the track.

The first day's racing was as follows: One-mile bicycle race—Prize, Sterling bicycle, presented by C. J. McCarthy. Won by R. A. Dexter in 2:41. J. F. Silva second and Emil Nebrecht third.

Maiden race. One-half-mile dash for all horses that have never won a race—Purse, \$100. Won by Naples in 0:49 1/5. Ahulmanu second.

One-half-mile dash, free for all—Purse, \$150. Won by Sir Cassimir in 0:49 1/2. Venus second.

Five-eighths-mile dash, free for all—Purse, \$200. Won by Garteline in 1:02. Vioris second.

Merchants purse. Trotting and pacing to harness (best 2 in 3)—Purse \$150. Won by Albert M. in 2:29 1-5 and 2:31 1/2. Fred Eros second.

Five-eighths mile dash for Hawaiian breds—Purse \$150. Won by Amarino in 1:06. Antidote second.

One mile dash, free-for-all—Purse \$200. Won by Aggravation in 1:47. Weller second.

The races of the 11th were as follows: One-half mile foot race, free-for-all—Prize, gold medal. Won by A. J. Coats in 2:12 1-5. Three entries.

Union Feed Co.'s Cup, free-for-all. To be won twice—\$150 added. Won by Vioris in 1:49. Venus second.

Trotting and pacing to harness, 2:24 class, best 2 in 3—Purse \$150. Won by Directress in 2:28 1/4 and 2:28 3/4. Billy second.

Five-eighths mile dash for maidens—Purse \$150. Won by Ahulmanu in 1:03 1-5. Flameret second.

California Feed Co.'s Cup, trotting and pacing, for Hawaiian breds, best 2 in 3—\$100 added. Won by Leahl in 2:59 1/4 and 3:05. First heat won by Edith R. in 3:31.

Irwin Cup. One-mile dash for Hawaiian breds—To be won twice by members of Jockey Club. \$150 added. Won by Antidote in 1:48. Amarino a close second.

Rainier Cup (presented by Seattle Brewing & Malting Co.) Trotting and pacing, free-for-all, best 2 in 3—To be won twice, \$200 added. Won by Viola in 2:20 and 2:19 1-5.

Waikapu Cup. Three-fourths mile dash, free-for-all, Venus' record of 1:16 to be beaten—\$150 added. Won by Garteline in 1:16. Sir Cassimir second.

Ronita Challenge Cup. One-mile dash, free-for-all. Winner to beat time of Angie A., 1:45 1/4—Purse \$200 and \$50 added if record is beaten. Won by

Vioris in 1:45. Aggravation second. Record broken.

Criterion Cup. One and one-half mile dash, free-for-all—To be won twice, \$50 added. Won by Weller in 2:47. General Cronje second.

Consolation race—Purse \$150. Won by Evereth in 1:48. Allegro second and General Cronje third.

Notes. Late in the forenoon Marshal Brown ordered no more beer or liquor sold and the men under the grandstand were forced to shut down. Later on, they were allowed to sell beer only. This refreshment ran out at about 3:30 and there were, of course, calls for "hard stuff" but Paddy Ryan and his associates kept their word and would not serve a drop, serving out ice water free of charge.

The newspaper men are more than thankful to the members of the Jockey Club for the kindness they have shown in providing such an excellent box for them. They were made exceedingly comfortable by this foresight.

McAuliffe, the jockey who rode Allegro in the third race yesterday was called from the starting point and made to pay a previous fine of \$100 before riding in the race. This was about the only delay in the day's sport.

A large crowd collected on the roof of the Jockey Club stand yesterday. Some of the people refused to come down so Captain Parker and his officers did their duty.

Directress traveled like a machine in the second race yesterday. The "nigger-in-the-slot" combination back of the grandstand made a lot of money Saturday.

Jimmy Logue caught the jockeys of Flameret and Allegro napping in the third race Saturday and got a big lead for Ahulmanu, winning the contest easily.

The saddling paddock was handled in fine shape. A very few people were allowed in, thus permitting of despatch.

Prince David Kawanakoa had a number of his friends for luncheon at his stand yesterday. Hawaiian flags were prominent.

Marshal Brown, Deputy Marshal Chillingworth, and Captains Parker and Fox did excellent work at the track yesterday. There was absolutely no boisterousness.

SERIOUSLY INJURED. Charles Clark, the young Hawaiian who was left in charge of the Kalihii detention camp when the place was closed, met with an accident Sunday that will keep him in bed for the best part of two months.

Clark was driving about the place in the camp wagon when his horse took a notion to run away. In order to be better able to check the animal, Clark stood up and began to tug at the reins. The horse suddenly kicked furiously and caught Clark in the leg, just below the knee, causing a compound fracture and a very bad external wound.

As soon as possible Dr. Howard went into the camp and attended to the injured man. He was taken to his home near Captain Parker's on Liliha street. The leg cannot be set just now as it is necessary that the external wound shall be healed before a plaster cast can be used.

Departing Democratic Delegates. Prince David Kawanakoa, John H. Wise, Col. Wm. H. Cornwell and Col. John D. Holt, four of the six delegates to the National Democratic Convention elected last night, will leave for Kansas City, Missouri, in the steamer Australia tomorrow.

Opium Towed to Sea. The tug towed 3454 tins of opium to sea on scows this morning and, when at a proper distance outside, the tins were cut open and the contents dumped into the sea. Dr. C. L. Garvin had charge of the work.

DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION

No Representative of Island of Hawaii in Organization.

Delegates and Alternates to National Convention—Instructed for Bryan-Territorial Organization Scheme.

Col. C. J. McCarthy called the Territorial Democratic Convention to order at 8:10 p. m. yesterday. It took about ten seconds for the meeting to elect Frank Brown temporary chairman by acclamation.

Mr. Brown thanked the meeting for the honor before ascending the platform.

J. M. Sims of Kauai was elected temporary secretary.

On motion the chairman appointed a committee of credentials, one member for each district, viz.: 1 and 2, no delegate present; 3, Dr. Boote; 4, W. H. Johnson; 5, Eugene F. Sullivan; 6, J. M. Sims. The committee retired and brought a report finding the following gentlemen entitled to sit in the convention:

A motion to proceed to permanent organization having been passed, Col. Rhodes was nominated by Mr. McCarthy and elected by acclamation.

Edmund H. Hart, nominated by Major Camara, was similarly elected permanent secretary.

Col. McCarthy, on taking the chair, said that he hoped long speeches would not be made. The Democratic party had started here under good prospects. He was satisfied the party would work for the interests of the country. It had the advantage of not containing any job-chasers. He called for nominations for six delegates to the National Democratic Convention.

Mr. Brown nominated E. B. McClanahan, John H. Wise, David Kawanakoa, Wm. H. Cornwell.

Mr. McClanahan declined for strong personal reasons. As he had not heard all the other names he would nominate David Kawanakoa, John H. Wise, J. D. Holt, Wm. H. Cornwell, Charles T. Wilder, C. J. Campbell.

Dr. McGrew was nominated by Major Camara, seconded by Mr. Hayselden, but declined because it would be impossible for him to leave home.

Mr. Withers declined a nomination, but was coaxed to stand.

There being apparently seven candidates, Mr. Sims and Dr. Boote were appointed tellers to take a ballot. Captain Campbell stated to the chairman at this stage that he positively declined to stand. Thereupon the following gentlemen were elected by the joint ballot of the convention:

David Kawanakoa, William H. Cornwell, John H. Wise, John D. Holt, Charles T. Wilder, W. S. Withers.

Alternates were nominated and elected by acclamation as follows:

J. L. Coke, J. M. Sims, F. Brown, Dr. McGrew, Colonel McCarthy, Major Camara.

Mr. McClanahan, in a short, but eloquent speech, moved that the delegates from this convention cast their vote for William Jennings Bryan as candidate for President of the United States.

The chairman, in formally announcing the passage of the resolution, said he noticed that every time the mover had mentioned Mr. Bryan's name the big light in front of the platform flared up. He then called for proposals on permanent Territorial organization.

Dr. Boote moved the following resolution, which, being seconded by Mr. Hayselden, carried unanimously:

Plan of Organization. "Resolved, That the permanent organization of the Democratic party of the Territory of Hawaii shall consist of a Territorial Central Committee of fifteen members selected from the several Senatorial Districts as now constituted, as follows: From the First, 4; Second, 3; Third, 6; Fourth, 2.

"Also, a District Central Committee of five in each Representative District. "Also, a Precinct Central Committee of five in each election precinct.

"The duties of the Territorial Central Committee shall be the general management and oversight of the affairs of the party in territorial matters; to call territorial conventions, and arrange for the holding of the same, and to be the medium of communication with the Democratic National Committee, and they shall have powers to elect their own officers and make their own rules.

"The duties of the District Central Committee shall be the general management and oversight of the affairs of the party in their respective districts; to call district conventions and arrange for holding the same, and generally to promote the interests and success of the party in their respective districts.

"The duties of the precinct Central Committees shall be to provide for holding precinct primaries, whenever such are called; to look after and secure the registration of all Democratic electors, and secure their attendance at their respective polling places on election days, and generally to work with the District and Territorial Committees in the conduct of the campaign.

"That the delegates of this Convention from the several Districts shall nominate to this convention the persons they wish to represent them in the Territorial Central Committee, to serve until the next Territorial Convention.

"That the members of the Territorial Central Committee from each District shall as soon as may be appoint the District Central Committee each for their respective Districts, to serve until the next District convention.

"That the several District Central Committees shall select the precinct committee men for the several precincts of their districts to serve until the next District convention, when the manner of selecting the District and precinct committees shall be arranged by the District convention in such manner as shall be suited to its local circumstances.

At the suggestion of the chairman the respective delegations retired apart to nominate members of the Territorial Central Committee. They returned with the following reports, which were adopted:

Maul—J. L. Coke, W. R. Boote, F. H. Hayselden.

Oahu—C. L. Rhodes, C. J. McCarthy, John E. Bush, F. S. Peachy, F. Brown, E. P. Sullivan.

Kauai—Levi Kauai, J. M. Sims.

Mr. Sims moved a vote of thanks to the committee that called this convention, and to Dr. McGrew, its chairman, who had done hard work in the water-carried.

Mr. McClanahan moved "that the secretary be instructed to send a wire by the Doric to-morrow addressed to the National Central Committee, or its chairman, informing that committee of the action of this convention and such other matter as the secretary shall deem best to put in the telegram, so that arrangements may be made for the reception of our delegates."

Mr. Effinger, seconding the motion, suggested that the telegram be mailed to Charles T. Wilder for transmission. The motion carried.

Major Camara moved, Mr. Rhodes seconded and it was carried that this convention adopt the platform adopted by the recent mass meeting of Democrats.

A vote of thanks was passed to the chairman and secretary, and at 9:52 the convention adjourned.

CLOSING SPEECHES OF HAWAIIAN CONVENTION

In the neighborhood of 600 natives—among them a large number of women—heard the speeches of Jas. K. Kaula, Kalaauokalani, R. W. Wilcox and John H. Wise outside the drill shed, Saturday night, in connection with the objects of the Independent party.

It was after 8 o'clock before the speakers took the stand and then Kalaauokalani as chairman, told of the Independent party and its objects. He made substantially the same remarks as at the convention of delegates in the drill shed on the morning of the 6th inst. R. W. Wilcox, who followed Kalaauokalani, was greeted with rounds of applause. He traced his work in Washington on behalf of the Hawaiians. The speech was the same as the one made to the delegates. Mr. Wilcox mentioned Pettigrew as being a great friend of Hawaii. The new things said by Mr. Wilcox were as follows:

"Those who say we are anti-haole are liars. We are American and so are they. Why should we work against our own people. The people who have been your oppressors are the ones who are spreading this story and trying to lead you astray. They want to get us under their cloaks.

"They say we are out for revenge. That is not so. What we want is good government and that is what the Independent party stands for. Our oppressors' sway has gone. Now ours is here."

Just here, Kalaauokalani referred to Queen Liliuokalani, telling the natives they should always keep an aloha for her in their hearts. That could certainly do no harm. He stated further that, as Governor, Mr. Dole should be respected.

Jas. K. Kaula read the platform of the Independent party and then broke out into a tirade against the missionaries, prefacing his remarks with the words, "Kill the snake," repeated three times.

John H. Wise, introduced by Chairman Kalaauokalani, spoke in brief as follows:

"Aloha. Some of you have probably been unable to understand what has been said by the previous speakers in justice to the cause for which we stand and, in justice to the Hawaiian people, I will attempt to speak in English.

"In the first place, we have been dubbed an anti-haole party." Here Mr. Wise gave illustrations of the kindness of the Hawaiians to the haoles from the time the white man first landed here.

"The opposition has seen fit to claim we are anti-haole. Very well, then, look at the record of the past and see if we have treated the white man as he has treated us."

Mr. Wise said he would not go back to the time of the missionaries as that was not necessary. "Go back only to 1890. The Hawaiians commanded the ballot box at that time. Of the seven-nineteen members of the House of Nobles, nine were white men and eight were natives. Follow the history up to 1893. Were the natives against the haoles then? No. They were not at that time and they are not so now.

"In 1893 the whites got control of the government and all Hawaiians who did not believe as they did were fired out of office. The family compact got hold of things and filled their pockets from your taxes. Did you ever see an Hawaiian come out of the Legislature with his pockets full of coin? How about the white man? One day he was walking through your streets with nothing while the next he was living in a Roman mansion. You know where the money came from.

"Why lay against us the charge that we are going in for the spoils? The Hawaiian knows his friends and those who stood by him when his troubles were thickest, will never be forgotten.

"We are accused of looking for revenge." Mr. Wise said that vengeance lay with God, who would certainly punish those who had been active in wrong doing.

Mr. Wise's speech ended, the people left for their homes.

Neills on the Way. The present will be the last week when prospective patrons of the coming fashionable Neill season at the Hawaiian Opera House will have an opportunity to procure season tickets and their attending advantages. Many local society leaders have already secured them and there will doubtless be a rush when others realize that the time is now growing short. The great Neill company leaves San Francisco tomorrow and will be here next Wednesday on the Mariposa.

Fashionable Wedding at Noon Today

Miss Mabel Keolu Hart of this city and Charles Allen Elston were united in marriage by the Rev. Alex. Ackintosh in St. Andrew's Cathedral shortly after 12 noon today in the presence of a large number of friends.

The cathedral was beautifully decorated with ferns, palms, greens of various kinds and white flowers. The principal piece was a tennis net interlaced with greens and marguerites and hung so as to hide the choir.

It was at about 12:20 that Wray Taylor took his place at the organ and started the Lohengrin bridal march which was sung by the choir. Just at this time the maid-of-honor, Miss Juliette King, followed by the three bridesmaids and three ushers, came in from the side door and marched down the aisle. Next came the groom and his best man from the vestry and then the bride, advancing up the middle aisle of the church leaning on the arm of her father, Judge Hart.

While the ceremony was being performed Harold Mott-Smith played the intermezzo from Cavalleria Rusticana on his cello in a most effective manner, the accompaniment being played by Wray Taylor on the organ.

As the wedding party advanced to the altar, the choir sang "Blessed are all they that fear the Lord" and then as this part of the service was being completed, soft strains were played on the organ.

While the wedding party was marching out to the vestry to register the choir sang the hymn that was used exclusively at such a time. Mendelssohn's wedding march was played as they returned and marced out of the church with the guests following. The newly married couple with the wedding party went immediately to Waikiki where the wedding breakfast was served.

The best man was George Fuller and maid-of-honor, Miss Juliette King. The bridesmaids were Miss Eula Elston, a sister of the groom, Miss Gretchen Koppe and Miss Elston, while the ushers were Robert Mist, C. E. Jacob and Arthur Mackintosh.

The bride wore a white satin gown with a train and a large hat with white feathers. She carried a bunch of white carnations with maiden hair and a trailing spray of decorative asparagus. The bridesmaids were all dressed in pink with black velvet trimmings and black hats with plumes. Each carried a bunch of maiden hair. The white man first landed here.

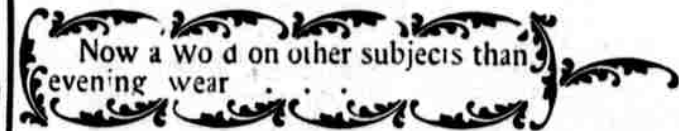

If Governor Dole is considering seriously the name of F. A. Hosmer as Superintendent of Public Instruction, he will find that the public will endorse the appointment. Mr. Hosmer may be classed as an aggressive "young American," a thorough gentleman, and his loyalty to Mr. Dole's cause would certainly recommend him to the official life which must necessarily be friendly to the Chief Executive.

THE HAWAIIAN-AMERICANS.

The convention of native Hawaiians closed Saturday night with the political harpies of the morning organ, engaged in trying to force Hawaiians into a race war, utterly discredited and dishonored. The Hawaiians by their dignity of speech and conservative action have upheld their reputation for strength of character and won the general approval of the citizens of the Territory. The anti-haole cry has come, not from the lips of native Hawaiians, but from a factional mouthpiece that urged Congress to make a race distinction with class legislation, that first raised the color line antagonism, that nurtured race prejudice and has done all in its waning power to fan into flame an impossible spark of race hatred.

The native Hawaiians are to be congratulated on the fairminded, conservative course they have pursued. Throughout the United States with its Irish-Americans, German-Americans, Swedish-Americans, etc., none of the political activities as voiced by individuals or in convention offers more or better proof of patriotic loyalty to the nation than has this convention of Hawaiian-Americans. Granted the right of franchise their determination is to use it carefully and with full understanding. When a former foreign people enter upon the responsibilities of American citizenship in such a broadminded, thoughtful spirit, they cannot, in exercising their rights, go far astray from the fulfillment of the foundation principles of the Great Republic to which they give allegiance.

LOVE FOR THE FLAG.

To what lengths the manufacturers of the anti-haole campaign are driven is evidenced by the effort made by the morning organ to cast discredit upon the young Hawaiians disposed to withhold from taking part in flag raising ceremonies at the High School. It is cruel, cowardly, despicable to interpret the sentiment of these young Hawaiians as an outcropping of local politics. The attack is unjustified by facts, devoid of the gentlemanly recognition of that national sentiment found in the heart of every citizen of every nation large or small. One has only to recall the day of the flag raising at the Executive building, the words of regret expressed by foreigners, the cheer for the new flag tempered with sadness because of their love for the flag that went down.

Let those whose debased and sordid minds cannot grasp the tender associations that cluster around a flag that is lowered forever be first to impute a sinister motive in the hesitator to vociferously cheer, to eagerly grasp the halyards of the flag that bespeaks Hawaii's new birth. Such imputation does not come from the heart of honest Americanism, nor does it find response in the hearts of the American people.

The people of these Islands have the deepest respect for the Hawaiians who, with honest loyalty accept the new situation, but cannot for the time being overcome the feelings of reverence for a national individuality that has passed into history with the lowering of its emblem. Though the future offers greater, grander and better, the memories of the past linger and cannot, should not be forced into oblivion by the harsh, heartless sneer of political harpies seeking to discredit the motives of the Hawaiians, an honest, loyal kindly people.

Recent Deaths.

Mrs. Ed. Saffery, a native of Olowalu, Maui, died in Honolulu on Saturday at the age of 70.
U. B. Gossage, a native of California, died at the Queen's hospital last Thursday. His age was 27 years, and the cause of death heart trouble.
Miss Margaret H. Rees, an English nurse aged 21 years, died at the residence of Albion F. Clark, King street, on Saturday. She had been employed in Victoria hospital, and her death was through drinking bichloride of mercury by mistake.
