FORWARDED IS FOREARMED.

Dr. J. C. Peters writes in *Harper's Weekly* of April 25th, a succinct history of the cholera scourge; showing the conditions and causes of its origin and propagation, and pointing out how, by very ordinary processes, the ravages of the disease may be stayed. Cholera, the terror of mankind for centuries, has now, by the investigations of science, been discovered to be, if not a curable, at least a preventable disease. It has travelled over continent and ocean, from time to time, carrying death and lamentation wherever it rested. Every successive swell of this tidal wave of death seems to have had India for its starting point. It has been known to exist there since 1503. At seven different periods, its terrible waves have been dashed upon the shores of Europe, Africa and America, besides striking eastward and northward over the great centres of population in Asia. It has had, like a caravan, distinct routes of travel. These routes have been carefully traced, and are,—(1) Through North Persia and Central Asia; (2) by way of the Persian Gulf; and (3) by way of the Red Sea. At every successive outbreak, it spread towards the west. It has in several instances been arrested in its progress through the temperate zone by the frosts of the winter season. That the scourge starts from India need not be regarded as a phenomenal fact. It is an instance of the inexorable character of the laws of nature. The elementary principles of cause and effect applied to certain well-known and established scientific facts are quite sufficient to account for the periodical germination of the cholera plague in India. And it is invariably in those cities where similar conditions exist—and precisely in proportion to the extent to which they do exist—that the scourge falls with a greater or less terrific force. Dr. Peters enumerates, in his article referred to, the conditions on which India has become the mother of pestilence for herself and the rest of the world. The first reason assigned is the immense population of 280,000,000. Reason the second is in the habits and modes of living of the people. The people are generally poor. The water is bad, and is made worse by the filthy habits of the natives, who wash themselves, their clothing and utensils in tank water, and then use water out of the same tanks for cooking and drinking. Their food consists mostly of rice, and that not always half cooked. Fuel is scarce, hence cooking is reduced to a minimum, and nearly everything is eaten cold. They have very little salt, scarcely any milk or butter, meat and fish are wanting, and tea, coffee and spirits are not in common use, as in other countries. Where the germs of cholera exist in the water supply, they have a chance of being killed in the boiling process, but when little or no tea, coffee, or cooked food is used, the germs are taken into the stomach, where they soon develop themselves. Houses in towns and villages are closely packed together, the spaces between being used for conveniency and all manner of filth. The huts have, for openings, only small doors, but no windows. And when disease breaks out in one hut, or in a group of them, the people all crowd into their neigh-

bor's huts. Add to all this, a malarial soil, and the crowding together of vast multitudes in the numerous pilgrimages that must be made every year to holy shrines and holy cities, the march of caravans, and armies, and an extensive shipping trade with all parts of the world; and no one need wonder that India is the world's great nursery and disseminator of the "black death" pestilence.

When you see a man stroking his moustache downward, present no bills, for he is out of sorts; but when you find him giving it an upward inclination, you have him in a good-natured mood, when he will probably pay up with a smile.

The revised Bible was to have been issued in England on the 19th May. It may reach our shores about a month hence. This will give those of our people who haven't quite got through reading the old one, a chance to finish before the new book arrives.

An Eastern town was, for several years, under the afflictive rule of an inefficient school committee. Argument and agitation had been expended fruitlessly on the grievance. A few of the leading spirits among the women went to work and canvassed quietly among those of their own sex who were entitled to vote. The result, of course, was a brilliant success. The next school committee was composed of men qualified, rather by worth and education than by political antecedents, for the administration of school affairs.

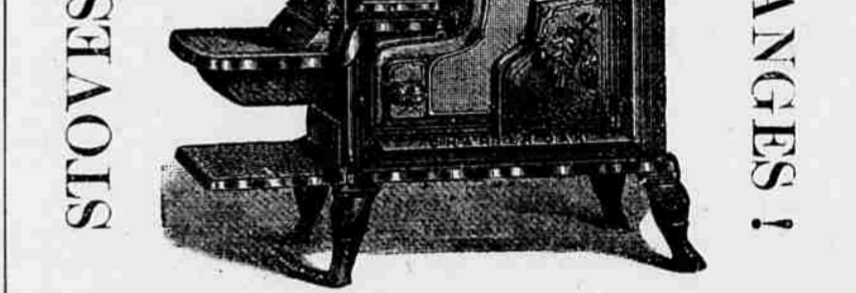

Mr. Chas. Turner, who was received
most enthusiastically, rendered with
great effect a pretty song of Blum-
enthal's, "Her Name." The Choral
Club showed to excellent advantage
in the manner in which they gave
the part song, "Good night, be-
loved." Miss Annis Montague next
appeared, and the grand aria, "Ah
fors e lui," from La Fraviata, was
executed brilliantly, with a clearness
of tone that was inspiring, her trills
and runs being almost faultless. The
audience was captivated and insisted
on an encore, which was acceded to
with, "Way down upon the Swance
River," rendered with such tender
pathos as to go directly home to the
hearts of her listeners. No song
creates a greater display of feeling
than this one. The Quintette Club,
with Mr. Berger at the piano, accom-
panied the aria finely, while Miss
Castle played a delicious accompani-
ment to the encore number. Mr.
Yarnley next gave a violin solo,
Elegie by Ernest. We have heard
him play it before, but never better
than on this occasion. He was most
deservedly encores. On Mr. Turn-
er's second appearance, he gave in
fine style a song of Stephen Adams',
"The Romany Lass," and was com-
pelled to respond to an encore. Miss
Montague sang a romance from
Thomas' Mignon with so much ten-
derness and feeling that the audience
recalled her, but she did not re-
spond. After Miss Castle and Mr.
G. L. Babcock had played a pleas-
ing piano duet, the concert was
concluded by the tower scene from
Verdi's Il Trovatore, Miss Montague
as Leonora, and Mr. Turner as
Manrico. The former acted the
part to perfection and sang with
great sweetness and simplicity, her
refined taste in vocalization being
very marked, especially in "D'amor
sulle ali rosee." Mr. Turner as
Manrico sang better than we have
ever heard him before. The orches-
tral accompaniment was delightful,
and the male chorus very effective.
During the evening Mr. Babcock
played the various accompaniments
with much precision and taste. The
third concert will be given Monday

A SUNKEN VESSEL.

The British vessel Earl Dalhousie
which has been at this port with
Portuguese immigrants, sunk in the
bay at San Francisco, May 12th,
while in tow of the tug Relief.
Eighteen persons on board at the
time had a narrow escape. The
Captain valuable library and six
months' stores were lost. She is
lying in six fathoms, with the waves
making a clear sweep of her. The
vessel was valued at \$75,000 and is
fully insured.

POLICE COURT.

FRIDAY MORNING.
Before Police Justice Bickerton.
W. L. Davis and Nuuholani, for
drunkenness, had to deposit \$6 each.
Leu Chong, for importing opium in-
to the kingdom, was remanded for
trial until the 25th inst. A case of
assault and battery against Joe was
discontinued.

A sharp run, to a person unaccus-
tomed to it, produces a severe and
dangerous strain upon the cords and
valves of the heart.

An Amsterdam firm is erecting
a special workshop for the cutting
of a single diamond of 475 carats,
the largest in the world, recently
brought from South Africa.

Spain is preparing for an invasion
of cholera. Eighteen physicians of
Valencia, and a large number of
others, have been inoculated with
cholera microbes.

FOREIGN NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

Secretary Manning has given di-
rections to stop the issue of one and
two dollar notes at the Treasury,
with the view of forcing into cir-
culation the obnoxious silver currency.
When the banks find out that they
cannot get one and two dollar notes,
they will pay out small silver, of
which about \$32,000,000 still re-
main in the Treasury.

There is an impression that Gen-
eral Rosecrans has received the col-
lectorship of the port of San Fran-
cisco.

Ex-Secretary Frelinghuysen is
stated, by his physician, to be grad-
ually but surely dying. His only
nutriment is milk.

The count of moneys and securi-
ties in the Treasury is completed.
The missing two-cents were found
on the floor.

Judge Wallace of San Francisco
was expected to be selected suc-
cessor to John Russell Young as
Minister to China.

Angus Cannon, Milton Musser
and J. C. Watson were all sentenced
at Salt Lake, for unlawful cohabita-
tion, to \$300 fine and six months'
imprisonment.

Paris, Idaho, was the scene of in-
tense excitement some two weeks
past. Three Deputy Marshals who
had gone to arrest a batch of eight
polygamists, were marched out of
town by an armed mob. Marshal
Fred Dubois, of Oxford, started
with a posse on the 5th to bring
Paris to terms. Dupois was expected
to be able to vindicate the national
honor in the execution of the laws.

GENERAL GRANT.

The latest accounts of General
Grant's condition are less favorable
than those by last previous mail.

Dr. Barker said, while bidding
the General good-bye, at his last
consultation previous to leaving for
Europe, "When I come back in the
autumn I shall expect to find your
literary work finished to your satis-
faction." "You don't expect to
find me, though, do you?" said the
General. "I shall hope so, any-
how," responded Dr. Barker as he
went away.

At five o'clock on May 10th,
General Grant took a walk toward
Madison avenue, attended only by
his servant, and returned without
showing unusual fatigue.

The 13th was acknowledged to
have been a bad day for General
Grant. He suffered with his throat
and could only speak with difficulty.
The afternoon brought no relief, and
he only fell into a slumber, by the
aid of morphine, early on the fol-
lowing morning. It took more than
the usual five drops of morphine to
neutralize the pain. Dr. Douglas
ascribes his relapse, not so much to
an increase of the disease as to
neuralgic complication induced by
bad weather.

THE CANADIAN REBELLION.

A REBEL DEFEAT.

Gen. Middleton's forces had a hot
encounter with the rebels at Batou-
che on May 9th. The plan of the
Canadians was to shell the houses
where the rebels were sheltered, and
to storm their works. Fighting con-
tinued, off and on, up to the 11th,
when Gen. Middleton made a gen-
eral attack and carried the whole
settlement. The Canadian loss, so
far as could be ascertained, was five
killed and ten wounded.

The prisoners held by the rebels
were all relieved.

The steamer Northcoote was going
up the river with a detachment to
cut off the retreat of the rebels.
The latest is that the steamer was
safe, but passed through a terrible
fire from both sides of the river.
Three men on board were wounded.
The rebels were giving themselves
up.

The Indians captured a provision
train near Battleford.

Women and children were leaving
threatened points under cavalry
escorts.

The Government has information
that men from Chicago, New York
and Boston are with Riel, and that
a master mind—not Riel's—is di-
recting the movements of the half-
breeds.

ENGLAND AND RUSSIA.

AN IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT.

Mr. Gladstone, in presenting the
papers regarding the situation in
Afghanistan, stated that an arrange-
ment had been effected between
Earl Granville, Foreign Secretary;
Earl Kimberley, Secretary for India;
Baron de Stael, Russian Minister to
England, and Mr. Lessar, Special
Russian Agent in London, in regard
to the Afghan frontier, that was
satisfactory to Her Majesty's Gov-
ernment and Earl Dufferin, Viceroy
of India, and that the draft of the
agreement had been forwarded to
Russia with Baron de Stael's sup-
port.

THE QUESTION.

A despatch from Vienna says,
The Kaiser will accept the position
of arbitrator, and that the question

narrows down to this: Did either
Afghanistan, the Russian Ally of
England, or Russia intentionally
break the agreement as to the neu-
trality of the military forces during
the boundary negotiation.

NEGOTIATIONS.

The basis of the Anglo-Russian
agreement will likely consist in the
abolition of a neutral zone in favor
of a direct boundary.

Negotiations between the two gov-
ernments were making satisfactory
progress on the 14th. At that date
no advices had been received of any
further Russian advance.

THE NEW BOUNDARY.

The proposed new Afghan fron-
tier, it is said, starts from a point
north of Zulfikar and runs thence
eastward to Chamara Biel, thence
northward down to the Kuslik River
to Gauzit-Khan, and thence east-
ward and south of Penjdeli to Kallu-
jah Sahl.

PREPARATIONS.

Earl Kimberly announced in the
House of Lords a plan for the ex-
penditure of £5,000,000 for railways
and military roads, including a line
to Quetta for the defense of India.
Russian war preparations proceed
unabated, and she is said to have
120,000 men between the Caspian
Sea and Herat.

The railway plant which had been
collected for the Russian line from
the Caucasus to the Black Sea has
been diverted to the construction of
a strategic line from Vladikaukase
to Petroffski on the Caspian Sea.
It is reported that a permanent gur-
rison of 5,000 men will be stationed
at Sebastopol.

THE SOUDAN AFFAIR.

Lord Hartington, Secretary of
State for War, stated in the House
of Commons on May 11th, that a
decision had been reached by the
Government which practically in-
volved the abandonment of the
advance on Khartoum. It had been
resolved to make Wady Halfa—the
most advanced position—the per-
manent defence of Egypt. The
British troops would be withdrawn
as soon as the Nile rises, probably
about the end of May. Efforts
would be made to establish an ad-
ministration in the province of Don-
gola, and to complete the Nile Rail-
way as a commercial enterprise.
General Wolsley had advised the
Government to retire to Assouan
from the Soudan. The General
attached great importance to sending
armed boats to Egypt, to be used in
patrolling the Nile. Suakim was
not to be evacuated until some ar-
rangement could be effected for
holding it against hostile rebels. At
present Suakim could not be held
without fighting. Osman Digna had
for months past been besieging the
place, and frequently declared him-
self determined upon driving the
garrison into the Red Sea. Lord
Hartington was not ready to state
the Government's intention regard-
ing the projected railway from
Suakim to Berber.

DISCUSSING THE CREDIT.

In answer to a question by Henry
Chaplin, Conservative, Mr. Glad-
stone said the Government was
unable to say at present whether any
portion of the \$22,500,000 credit
for the Soudan account would be
saved. Mr. Gladstone then moved
for a second reading of the consoli-
dated fund bill (the \$55,000,000
combined war credit). In his speech
he declared he was unable to under-
stand the differences which existed
on this subject between the Oppo-
sition and the Government.

A VIRULENT ATTACK.

When Mr. Gladstone quit speak-
ing the Conservatives opened up on
him and his Government the bitter-
est attack within their power to
make. This was led by Lord
George Francis Hamilton, member
from Middlesex, who was Under
Secretary for India from 1874 to
1878. He moved a consideration of
the amendment given notice of the
previous Friday by Sir Stafford
Northcoote. In doing so he charged
the Government with abandoning
the Soudan after announcing their
intention of taking Khartoum and
after murdering 6,000 or 10,000
men. The Government had sur-
rendered every one of the questions
between it and Russia, and his ob-
jection to the Premier's policy was
that from the very day he took office
he had shown a readiness to sacri-
fice anybody and anything to save
himself.

Mr. Chamberlain, president of the
Board of Trade, defended the Gov-
ernment, and closed by saying that,
"when the general elections come,
the Government would remind the
Opposition of their policy and it
would then be seen whether the
country was tired of peace."

THE GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED.

Lord Hamilton's motion was de-
feated, 290 to 260. The majority
consisted entirely of Liberals. The
Parnellites voted with the minority.
The House received the result rather
listlessly.

NEGOTIATIONS.

A London despatch of May 14th
says negotiations are pending with

Turkey for the latter's occupation
of Suakim and the Soudan, on the
following basis: The Porte engages
to assist in suppressing the slave
trade and in developing external
commercial relations, besides the
formal proposals made through
Fehmi Pasha. If the Porte accepts,
an English company will obtain
the option of securing a concession
to construct a railway to Berber and
will receive other trading rights.

FROM THE FIELD.

Kassala was still holding out
against the rebels on April 12. The
Egyptian troops were compelled to
eat donkeys to relieve their hunger.

When the British withdraw from
the Soudan, 12,000 Egyptian troops
will be added to the Egyptian army
already there.

The brigade of the English guards
has been ordered home from the
Soudan.

The longest sitting ever held by
the Canadian Parliament was occu-
pied with the woman suffrage ques-
tion. After a fifty hours'
siege, the Opposition carried an
amendment striking out the clause
giving the suffrage to unmarried
women and widows.

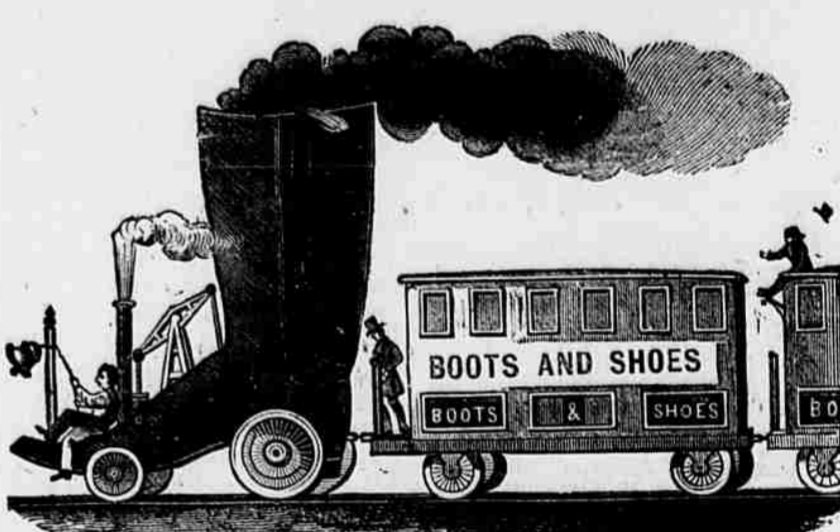
