Celebration at Puunene

Athletic Sports Better Than Ever Before.

Nowhere else on the Hawaiian Islands could such a celebration take place, as was held at Puunene last Saturday. Honolulu can make more noise, and draw larger crowds, perhaps, at their annual Floral parade, but Honolulu could never give a harvest festival such as was held on Maui last Saturday. It reminded one somewhat of the grand old county fairs back in New England, where the cares and worry of business are shaken off, and the old become young again for a day.

The sports were carried on continuously from nine o'clock in the morning, when the tennis experts of Oahu and Maui began struggling for the mastery of the Pacific. Tennis was followed by a long list of aquatic sports in the new tank just completed.

The Puunene people have the reputation of doing things well, and they have certainly outdone themselves in this latest addition, to their athletic grounds. There is nothing to compare with it in the islands, and it will not suffer by comparison with anything to be seen on the coast. The pool is 75 feet long by about 45 feet wide, with ample room on all sides for spectators. At one end is a bowling alley with the regulation length for the alleys.

The tennis match was won by the experts of Oahu, by 105 games to 75. When they took to the water, however, the Mauiites overwhelmed them; in fact they swam circles around them. Some of the Honolulu contingent became a bit suspicious after the first race, when they found themselves badly defeated, that the Maui swimmers were web-footed, but there was nothing to it.

In the 150 yards relay the teams were as follows:

Maui—Taylor, Short, Hanson, Westcott, Walker, Hughes (capt.)
Oahu—Low, Rosecrans, Turner, Gibb, Castle, Waterhouse.

The Puunene bunch took the lead from the start and Hughes got home in the final spurt a tank length in front of Waterhouse, who swam a strong relay.

The other events resulted as follows:

Girls' race, 25 yards—Alice Walker, Myrtle Taylor.
Plunge for distance—W. Walker, J. Waterhouse.

Swimming under water—E. Gibb, A. Taylor, W. Walker.

Barrel race—W. Walker, A. Taylor.

Egg and spoon race—J. N. Martin, W. Walker.

Tab race—Sanford Walker, Jack Walker.

Fifty yards dash—R. Walker, E. Gibb.

It will be seen that the Walker family took the lion's share of the ribbons, members of the family securing nine places between them, and being first or second or both in every race on the program.

As soon as the tennis match was over a corps of carpenters commenced the construction of a dancing floor, 42x80, on the courts where, a few minutes before, athletic figures had been juggling the elusive ball with their rackets. By 4 p. m. the thing was completed, and all was ready for the dance. The pavilion was brilliantly lighted and a happy representative company danced beneath the moon.

Delightful refreshments were served during the evening and everything possible was done to secure the comfort and enjoyment of everybody. The music left nothing to be desired, indeed its excellence was a feature of the entire celebration. A quintet club played and sang throughout the tennis match, and again during the water spots.

County Politics

More Candidates Are Coming Forward.

Several new candidates have risen above the Maui political horizon during the week, and politics are fairly seething and bubbling within the County.

From Makawao, where a republican district nomination means an election, the report comes that Geo. Copp will run for county supervisor against W. F. Pogue, the present supervisor who is out for renomination on the Republican ticket. Also that Manuel Deponte of Paia will contest with A. J. Gomes and E. B. Carley for the republican nomination to the lower house from that district.

All of the present County officers will seek renomination. They are W. E. Saffery, County Sheriff; W. F. Kaee, County Clerk; Chas. Wilcox, Auditor; L. M. Baldwin, Treasurer, and D. H. Case, County Attorney.

During the week friends of W. G. Scott of Paia and Edgar Morton, deputy sheriff of Makawao, have announced that the two are out after the republican nomination for county sheriff against W. E. Saffery. Another report has it that the parties seeking to wrest the republican nomination for the shrievalty from Saffery, want him to run for another office, which fits in with a rumor that Saffery will be looked after and provided for.

In the Wailuku district no prominent Republican has come forward to seek the nomination for County Supervisor, but perhaps the candidates will show up plentifully after the primaries are over. On the Democratic side it seems assured that T. B. Lyons will be re-nominated to succeed himself. Mr. Lyons, even republicans admit, has been a good supervisor for the district, and, but for the political purposes only, there are no good reasons why he should be thrown out of office.

The fusionists are said to have a complete slate for County Officers wanting only a County Attorney.

A call to have the Republican Fifth Precinct Club meet yesterday evening and re-organize caused some stir among the Republicans, and at this writing the date of the meeting has been postponed to Tuesday evening next. The object it is said is to weed out the names of dead members, the names of those who have left the precinct as well as the names of a few who have gone over to the other political camps.

Contracts Awarded.

The Board of Supervisors awarded the contract for constructing the Maliko bridge and approaches to John Duggan who bid \$7841.60 for the work and offered to complete same in one hundred days. The other bidders were A. A. Wilson, who offered to complete it in ninety days for \$8,580, and J. A. Aheong \$8,750 to finish same in 150 days. For laying the new Lahaina water supply mains, the successful bidder was J. H. McKenzie who bid \$1500 for the work, promising to complete the same in thirty days. The other bidder was H. Langdraf who offered to do the work in seventy-five days for the sum of \$1752.

No bids were received for the Spreckelsville school addition.

About seventeen Japanese will register as voters for the coming election in the County of Maui.

Prof. Abbe Likes Hawaii

Says America and Japan Shall Never Have War.

Professor Abbe, who has brought the Waseda baseball team to Hawaii, was interviewed by a News representative at his hotel this week.

The News man was acquainted with Professor Abbe in Japan, and he is therefore better able to appreciate the deep feeling of the latter when he says that Japan and America can never have war. Professor Abbe was educated at Hartford, Connecticut, and is therefore no stranger to America and American customs. He knows as well as any American of the wave of jingoism that is continually sweeping the country, fanned by the lurid articles of the yellow press. He says if Mr. Hobson would only come to Japan and get acquainted with the people he would soon learn the true feeling of the Japanese toward America. England and Japan are closely allied by written documents, he says, but the alliance between Japan and America is written on the hearts of his countrymen. America is looked upon by the Japanese as a foster father.

Professor Abbe says that when he is called upon to draw the attention of his classes to some great personality, he invariably selects some American, and he thinks Roosevelt is the greatest living example of true manhood. Other men are big in their own country, but Roosevelt is a world man.

Japan is leading in the cause of peace, and Count Okuma, one of the leading statesmen of the Mikado's Kingdom is the president of the peace society. He is having peace pamphlets translated into the English and French language, at his own expense and spread broadcast throughout the world. Professor Abbe says war makes the rich richer, and the poor poorer.

He expects to take the Waseda team to Chicago next year, the Keio ball team is also going to America, and will stop off at Hawaii.

Dr. Bruns on Maui.

Dr. Bruns, the noted European Scientist was in town this week.

Dr. Bruns, has been making a tour of investigation of the volcanoes and craters in the Hawaiian Islands. Recently he was in Hilo, went to see the volcano, but was unable to secure a guide for the more perilous ascent of Mauna Loa. Dr. Bruns, because of his coarse attire, was taken for a laborer, while on the big Island, and complains that the hotel keepers in Hilo treated him with scant courtesy. For the past week the professor has been camping in the crater of Haleakala, and he makes the positive assertion that the volcano is not yet extinct. Dr. Bruns also went into Iae Valley.

Trip Around the Island.

Rev. Dodge left Monday evening with a large party to make the trip around the Island. Among the party are Miss Sinclair, Miss Ruth Richards, Miss Laura Atherton, Mrs. Lucia O. Case, Mr. Hebard Case, and Mr. Harwood Benton. The party returned to Wailuku last evening, and are loud in their praise of the wonders of old Haleakala.

Maui Wins At Baseball

Japanese Team Play in Hard Luck.

Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, the baseball team from Waseda University, of Tokyo, Japan, and a team composed of the best players on Maui, gave us some very good exhibitions of the national game.

On Wednesday, whether because they were afraid of Waseda, or just plain nervousness, the Maui team could make no headway against the Japanese, and only once in the entire game did it look as though they would score, and then a perfect throw to the plate by the Japanese centerfielder, caught Ayau as he made a great slide for home.

The game Thursday, showed a great reversal of form. The Maui team were full of ginger and seemed to have the jump on their Japanese opponents at all times. The Japanese were dangerous in every inning, but the local boys seemed to anticipate their every play and beat them to it.

Oi, the crack pitcher of Waseda, the man whom the Reach All-Americans claimed was the best pitcher in Japan, was sent in to do the twirling for his team, but he had an off day, and could not seem to get control, nor did he have any speed, and the Maui team are to be congratulated that they caught him on one of his bad days, because when he is right he is an extremely hard man to hit. However, be that as it may, Maui deserves great credit for winning, as they played baseball all the time. Any team that can keep Waseda from scoring when they get three men on bases, with no outs as they did in the Seventh inning Thursday, can certainly play ball, and the Maui team as it played this game would put up a fight with any teams in the islands.

The score Wednesday was 9 to 0 in favor of Waseda, on Thursday 3 to 1 in favor of Maui, and the third game is being played as we go to press.

Give Banquet to Maui Polo Team.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Peck entertained at dinner last week at their home in Hamakua-poko, Maui, in honor of the Maui polo team prior to their departure for Honolulu to participate in the inter-island games. The affair was strictly stag. The table was profusely decorated in maidenhair fern and single sunflowers, yellow and black being the club's colors. A mirror plate occupied the center of the table, on which stood a miniature polo pony of broeze, surmounted with tiny polo sticks and polo balls. Mr. Peck's guests were Harry and Frank Baldwin, Harold Rice and David Fleming, who compose the team; also Sam Weller, Thomas Skinner and Arthur Baldwin, the latter of Chicago, who is here on a visit.

Mill Castings for Puunene.

A number of heavy castings, some weighing from three to five tons each, are included in the cargo that has arrived by the Matson Navigation steamer Hilonian.

The castings are part of sugar machinery intended for Puunene Mill, and have been unloaded at Kahului. They will shortly be installed at the mill.

Roosevelt For President.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Ex-President Roosevelt was defeated by Schurman for Chairman of the Republican State Convention. The affair has caused President Taft considerable worry.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The friends of Ex-President Roosevelt will carry the fight for temporary chairman to the floor of the convention. Roosevelt will not personally enter the fight. The situation is little less than chaotic.

OYSTER BAY, Aug. 19.—Ex-President Roosevelt has announced to friends that recent events may force him to run for President in 1912.

BEVERLY, Aug. 18.—President Taft and Vice-President Sherman held a conference here yesterday, and agreed that it would be to the best interests of the Republican Party for Cannon to resign. President Taft will forward a message to Cannon, to that effect.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—Hiram Johnson was nominated yesterday for Governor, by the Republicans. Control of the party in California has thus been wrested from the Southern Pacific. The Lincoln-Roosevelt element has also secured three Congressmen.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—S. E. Keating has been nominated candidate for Lieut. Governor. The renomination of Smith for Congress is assured.

President of Chile Dead.

BREMEN, Aug. 17.—President Moutt of Chile died here today of heart failure. He was a passenger on board the Wilhelm der Gross when Mayor Gaynor was shot.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—The jury has been dismissed in the Lea Neill, Brown trial. Judge declared there had been wholesale tampering. There will be an investigation.

CARLSBAD, Aug. 17.—General Manager Hurley, of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway died here today.

GIBRALTER, Aug. 17.—The Spanish steamer Marto has been sunk in collision with German steamer Kiess. Thirty-nine drowned.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Acting Mayor Mitchell has prevented the Lang-Kaufman fight, which was to have taken place here.

DEAL, England, Aug. 18.—Moissart, the Spanish aeronaut, crossed the channel and reached here, carrying one passenger. Unprecedented record.

OAKLAND, Aug. 18.—The first through train over the Western Pacific railroad, was despatched to Salt Lake today.

CAMP PERRY, Aug. 18.—The National Guard team of Hawaii have scored 430 points.

VERSAILLES, Aug. 19.—A statue of George Washington has been presented to this city by the State of Virginia, and was unveiled yesterday.

TURIN, Aug. 19.—Great anxiety is felt by the King and Queen on account of an epidemic of cholera which has broken out.

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland, Aug. 19.—Mrs. Dan Baron, and her sister, who is the wife of Sir Gilbert Parker the novelist, were set upon by bandits at this place and robbed of diamonds valued at \$50,000.

Latest From Honolulu.

HONOLULU, Aug. 17.—F. Muir has arrived from New Zealand, with a large quantity of insects, which it is intended to turn loose upon the cane borers.

Morgan has been re-elected president of the Chamber of Commerce, and proposes an amalgamation with the Merchants Association.

One thousand Homesteads are now ready. Most of the applicants want land that has not yet been surveyed.

HONOLULU, Aug. 18.—The Federal government and the owners of the Fort Street property that is to be taken over, may transfer their case to the California courts in the event of an amicable settlement not being arranged.

It is rumored that Representative Candler will come to Honolulu to boost the Democratic party.

HONOLULU, Aug. 18.—Oahu defeated the Cavalry 16 3/4 to 21 1/2 in the polo game here today.

Flags will be saluted today in honor of the 80th anniversary of the Austrian Emperor.

HONOLULU, Aug. 19.—Arrangements have been completed for the extension of Bishop street.

It is thought necessary to place the land office under the supervision of an official who can devote his entire time to its affairs.

Wreckage from the ship Helga is strewn along the Waikiki Beach. The masts fell yesterday.

Graft and the Grafters.

IN every part of the country are sundry crafty gentlemen, whose business it is to live by graft. Usually they keep within the law. If you were to inquire of one of these plunderers what excuse he had to offer for his mode of living, he would tell you that "business is business."

But the crooked merchant, the cheating manufacturer, the adulterating druggist, seldom offer this excuse in vain.

Committees of Investigation, are holding sessions in different parts of the United States today to investigate the land frauds, and other forms of graft, but what will be the outcome. Some one will suffer, but it will not be the real grafters.

The whole country stands amazed at the effrontery of that King of Grafters, Patrick Calhoun, and his lawyers, openly defying the majesty of the court in San Francisco, recently. Yet they get away with it. But it will long remain a blot on the State of California, that its courts of law, can be made use of for political intrigue.

Since men began to buy and sell, and those without consciences began to cheat and steal, "business is business" has been a trade proverb.

The man who, in private life is reasonably honest, and who is a regular depositor in the contribution box at church, discovers that he can change all this in his line of every day work, and excuse himself, by announcing solemnly that "Business is business."

The Sugar Trust, not content with the enormous profits incident to almost complete monopoly, began to cheat the very government that had granted that monopoly. In the prosecution that followed who suffered? Not the real grafters.

It is all very well to condemn grafting, but the honest citizen has not done his full duty until he refuses to countenance the individual grafter. It is right and proper to decry thievery and trickery, crookedness and corruption, but the force and effect of the cry are nullified if the trickster is hail fellow well met in the ordinary walks of life, or if the corruptionist receives the glad hand when he goes forth.

We may tell our boys that honesty is the best policy, but they will naturally view our statements with doubt if they see dishonesty boldly and successfully stalking throughout the land. We may tell them that the corruptionist is a man to be distrusted,—an enemy of society; but they are bound to doubt us when they see us shaking hands on the street corner, and swapping yarns with the man whose crookedness is a matter of common comment.

Dishonesty will disappear only when the dishonest man is ostracised. Bribery will pass out only when the giver and taker of bribes are both refused admission to the councils of honest men. Grafting will become unpopular when each and every grafter loses popularity. Years of empty preaching will not otherwise diminish them. This does not apply to any particular person or locality; it means every city and town and village in the land. Grafters and rogues and rascals exist everywhere, and are everywhere tolerated.

If the Advertiser could only forget, and let the chip slide off its shoulder, become part of the Republican Party, and not imagine continually that IT IS the Republican Party, there would be less political bickering over in Honolulu.

Not content with swinging the big stick over the other newspapers of Honolulu, the Advertiser is now trying it on the Republican Party, but the G. O. P. has a thick hide.

Sidney Hoben Comes to Wailuku.

Mr. Sidney Hoben, who has but recently arrived in these islands from Australia, on a tour of the world, and who is a distinguished graduate of Leipzig Conservatory, will shortly appear in Wailuku.

Mr. Hoben has given several recitals in Honolulu, with unvarying success. The Honolulu papers unanimously declare Mr. Hoben to be the greatest pianist ever heard in these islands. Following is copied from the Hawaiian Star:

Mr. Sydney Hoben has only been here since February, when he arrived from Australia en route to London, and like so many of our residents who originally only intended a week or two's stay, stopped on. Introduced on arrival to Honolulu society at a reception at Mrs. Theodore Richards, where his playing instantly aroused enthusiasm. Mr. Hoben has had the support of our social leaders on all occasions. He gave a recital at the Young Hotel some weeks after landing, and had a large and extremely fashionable audience. Mrs. Walter Frear headed a long list of patronesses, the creme de la creme of Honolulu society. Later he gave an organ recital at the Central Union Church, where his skillful organ playing came as a surprise to those who had recognized him only as a piano virtuoso. There too, most of our best known people could be seen in the large audience.

Treaty of Japan and Russia.

The text of the long heralded Manchurian convention between Japan and Russia, signed July 4 at St. Petersburg, has been made public. It is one of the shortest important treaties of modern times, being just 237 words in length. It follows:

The imperial government of Japan and the imperial government of Russia sincerely attached to the principles established by the convention concluded between them on July 17-30, 1907, desirous to develop the effects of that convention with a view to the consolidation of peace in the extreme east, have agreed to complete the said arrangement by the following provisions:

Article 1. With the object of facilitating communication and developing the commerce of nations, the two high contracting parties mutually engaged to lend each other their friendly co-operation with a view to the amelioration of their respective railway lines in Manchuria and the improvement of the connecting service of the said railways, and to abstain from all competition prejudicial to the realization of this object.

Article 2. Each of the high contracting parties engages to maintain and respect the status quo in Manchuria resulting from the treaties, convention and other arrangements concluded up to this day between Japan and Russia, or between either of these two powers and China. Copies of the aforesaid arrangements have been exchanged between Japan and Russia.

Article 3. In case that any event arises of a nature to menace the status quo above mentioned, the two high contracting parties shall, in each case, enter into a communication with each other in order to arrive at an understanding as to the measures they may judge it necessary to take for the maintenance of the status quo.

The state department has received a dispatch from the American embassy at Tokio which seemingly disposes of the rumor that a secret treaty had been signed by the two countries.

Heralded as a direct and powerful blow at the United States, the convention is regarded by officials of this government as little more than a harmless appendage to the convention between Japan and Russia in 1907.

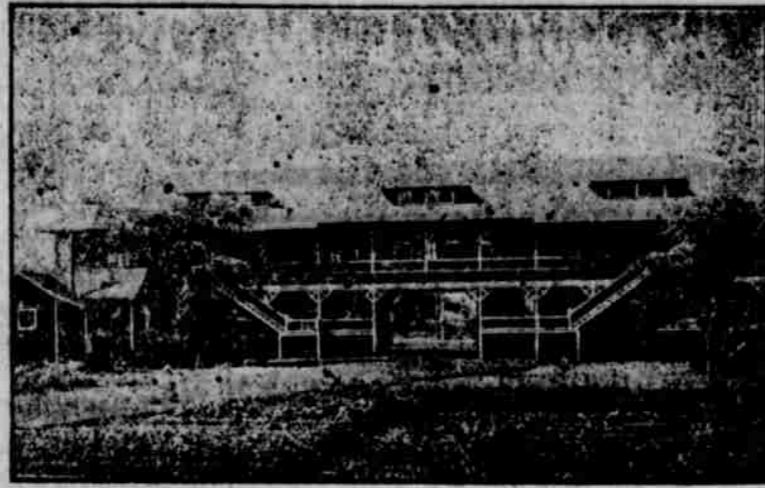
Reiteration of loyalty to these principles, taken in connection with the general principle that the two powers can not bargain away rights of a third nation, such as the United States claimed European powers were about to do in regard to the Chinese railroad loan, makes the new treaty unobjectionable, it is understood here, to either the United States, Great Britain or Germany.

Florence Nightingale Dead.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Florence Nightingale whose name has become a household word throughout the entire world as founder of the Red Cross Society, died here today. Miss Nightingale was born in Florence, May 15, 1820. Her first nursing was done in the Crimean War. She was frequently consulted by government commissions regarding field and camp hospitals.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 14.—In a collision between a locomotive and a crowded street car, three were killed and 20 injured.

COLUMBUS, Aug. 14.—Twenty more police officers refused to obey the mayor today, and joined the strikers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The Seismograph at Georgetown recorded a terrific earthquake shock today, lasting 23 minutes. The earthquake is supposed to have occurred about 2,500 miles to the southeast.

CAMP PERRY, Aug. 13.—Ohio rifle team won the Herrick match SEWARD, Alaska, Aug.—Mt. Shishaldin has broken out again after a short sea-on of quiet, and is now in violent activity.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Ex President Roosevelt will surely attend the Republican Convention as a delegate.

LENARK, Aug. 13.—Drexel reached a height of 6,730 feet during a flight today. This is a world's record.

SPOKANE, Aug. 13.—Forest fires are threatening many towns throughout the entire northwest.

COLUMBUS, Aug. 13.—The police refused to do duty here today, when the Mayor requested them to go on the street cars and protect the strike breakers.

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 16.—Governor Gillet will probably call an extra session of Legislature for the purpose of issuing bonds for Panama Exposition.

Floods Devastate Japan.

TOKYO, Aug. 13.—Floods are raging throughout the entire country. Great tracts of land are completely inundated. Railroads and bridges are destroyed, accompanied by great loss of life.

TOKYO, Aug. 15.—The Sumida river is rising rapidly, and the thousands of families along its banks are moving to a place of safety. The Kawasaki river is a raging torrent. Nearly the entire stretch of country between Yokohama and Tokyo, a distance of 18 miles, is under water.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—F. C. Thompson of Los Angeles, became the all-round champion of America at the A. A. U. meet. He scored 6991 points. No records were broken.

BEVELLY, Aug. 15.—The Associated Press continues to send out the report that Speaker Cannon and Senator Aldrich will be forced out this fall. Aldrich denies.

POINT ARENA, Aug. 15.—The steam schooner Phoenix's boiler has exploded off this place, killing 4. The schooner was drifting helplessly when picked up.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—It is reported that Senator Fry of Maine will retire. Senator Fry was first elected to Congress from his home town in 1871, and has been almost continuously before the people since that time.

SULPHUR, Oklahoma, Aug. 13.—Testimony in the Land Graft investigation shows that the hoodlums would have cleaned up not less than \$4,000,000, as a result of their operations, had they not been interrupted by the investigation.

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—In an address here tonight Speaker Cannon said he would again be a candidate for the Speakership in Congress, and that there would be no reorganization.

OYSTER BAY, Aug. 16.—Lloyd Griscom, will be the bearer of a message from the Republican Party to President Taft on the subject of party harmony.

SAN FRANCISCO, The fight for governor will be between Curry, the present State Secretary, and Johnson, the anti-Southern Pacific candidate.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The Department of Commerce and Labor has received a protest against the landing of 600 East Indians.

HONOLULU, Aug. 14.—Kauai defeated Oahu for the polo championship. Score, 5½ to 6½.

St. Louis defeated the All-Military team here yesterday. Williams, the pitcher, won his own game with a home run, with men on bases. The score was 7-2.

HONOLULU, Aug. 15.—Chief McDuffie has recovered a large quantity of silver taken from the Grill by a prominent society lady. It is claimed the lady is a kleptomaniac. Name withheld.

Capt. Wall, of the ship Helga says he dropped his anchor in four fathoms of water and that the wind forced his ship on the reef. He says First officer Royal had an enormous appetite, but was well fed.

HONOLULU, Aug. 16.—The Liquor Commission is busy looking into cases of disobedience to liquor regulations. One proprietor was reprimanded for drunkenness, another for selling doped whisky, and a third was suspended for two weeks for selling liquor to minors. Chas. McCarthy has sold the Criterion Saloon to P. Peacock.

Chas. Notley has again received the nomination for delegate to Congress from the Home Rule party.

Wharf Commission reports adversely to plan for government ownership of wharves.

The Republican Central Committee will investigate the charges against Lorrin Andrews.

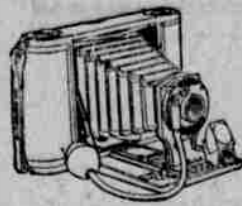

A Poi Dealers' Trust.

A peculiar condition of affairs exist among poi dealers and taro growers in the district of Wailuku. Two months ago taro was selling at \$2.25 a bag and was a scarce article at that figure.

Another planter with a small crop of taro can find no purchaser for his crop at any figure short of making a present of it to poi dealers.

That such staple food articles as poi and taro, so generally used by all classes of our cosmopolitan population, can become unsaleable at a time when the taro crop itself is short is ascribed by several Hawaiian planters to the fact that Chinese planters who control much taro land rented from Hawaiians are working in combination with poi shop men.

Chinese poi dealers have agreed to buy all the taro they need from the Chinese taro planters only, and other taro planters not in the favored circle can find no purchaser for their crops even at a time when poi is still selling at a price way above what would be normal at times when taro is scarce.

As an Hawaiian planter puts it, poi may be selling at a price, but if you do not belong to the combination your crop of taro will rot in the patches and yet no poi dealer will buy it from you at any figure.

Reduction in Price.

The price of a yearly subscription to the News, paid in advance, has been reduced to \$2. This applies to all old subscribers who pay in advance, as well as new ones.

How the Rolph was Wrecked.

The Examiner of August 4 gives the following account of the wreck of the schooner James Rolph:

Less than twelve hours after leaving this port under favorable conditions, and with all sail set for the port of Hana, Maui, the fine four-masted schooner James Rolph piled up on a jagged rock at Point San Pedro, thirteen miles south of the Golden Gate, at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday night.

Above the low fog that hung over the sea at the time, Captain Olsen could make out the cliff at the point, and the hills beyond, but although he instantly undertook to sheer off, the big schooner was carried by the current head on into the surf, striking immediately afterward. Then the skipper and crew saw the cliff looming above them. The sails were set as the vessel leaped through the breakers. They rattled down on the mast rings as the schooner settled on a pointed rock.

Water poured into the hold of the James Rolph the moment the vessel struck, and the lime and hay and other merchandise below deck became a ruined mass. The lime, in fact, upon being submerged, began to smoke, and rendered the hold a dangerous place.

The schooner had left rather light, having only 200 tons of general freight in the hold, and with 14,000 feet of lumber, most of the latter being on deck. A part of the lumber is all that can be saved. The vessel was under charter to bring a cargo of sugar from the Islands to this port.

Immediately after striking, the schooner swung around with her head to the north and took on a slight list to starboard. Efforts to get her off under her own sail were unsuccessful, and Captain Olsen set signals of distress. It was morning, however, before the vessel's predicament was known, when Operator Parker of the Postal Telegraph Company saw the schooner from his office at San Pedro Terrace, on the Ocean Shore Railroad, only a few hundred yards away. He wired the news to the city, and also forwarded a telegram from Captain Olsen to the owners, Hind, Rolph & Co. in this city. The skipper in the meantime reached shore in one of the boats.

This is the first accident that Captain Olsen ever had in his life, and he shipped when he was 10 years old. He has put into nearly every port in the world. He has been master of the James Rolph for nearly ten years. Before that he was captain of the Honoipu, a schooner that sailed all over the world.

S. Kuwada Gets Wife By Habeas Corpus Writ.

The troubles of S. Kuwada and the differences between himself and a meddling father-in-law got into the limelight of Judge Kingsbury's Court Thursday last in a habeas corpus proceeding brought by Kuwada against Genzo Kugiya for the custody of Shina, his wife and daughter of the latter.

The evidence went to show that S. Kuwada ran away with Shina to Lahaina some six months ago where they got married. The pair returned to Paia and remained a while. Later they went to work on a cotton plantation at Wahiawa, Oahu. Genzo Kugiya followed them there some time after and induced Shina to return with him to Paia. When Kuwada came after his wife, Kugiya refused to allow him to see her and used his influence to keep the two apart, claiming that Shina was only fifteen years of age.

It was contended on the other side that Shina was of age, and that the marriage was legal; and there was an intimation that Genzo Kugiya, who did not enjoy a very good reputation among his countrymen, wanted his daughter for other purposes more or less shady. On the showing made the Judge awarded custody of Shina to her lawful spouse, and warned the father not to interfere in the affairs of S. Kuwada and his wife.

S. Kuwada was represented by Judges Kepoikai and Burehard, attorneys, and Genzo Kugiya was represented by counsel.

The following ordinance passed first reading August 13th, and will be taken up for further consideration at the regular September meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Maui:

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PASTURING, GRAZING OR FEEDING OF ANY ANIMAL OR ANIMALS UPON ANY PUBLIC-SCHOOL LOT, SQUARE OR PARK WITHIN THE COUNTY OF MAUI, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Supervisors within and for the County of Maui: Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to pasture, graze or feed any horse, mule, ass, swine, goat, sheep or other animal of which he is the owner, or in whose possession and control the same may be, upon any public school lot, square or park within the County of Maui.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than \$5 nor more than \$15, together with costs of Court; and, in the event of default of payment of such fine and costs shall be imprisoned until the same shall have been discharged by operation of the general laws applicable to such cases.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its publication once a week for a period of two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the County of Maui, and the posting of a true copy thereof upon a bulletin board in front of or near the rooms occupied by the Board of Supervisors.
