THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION held its first annual meeting in its own hall on Friday evening. There were about thirty members present. The various officers' reports were read, from which we gather that \$3150 had been paid for the building and freehold site, and that the Association was still about \$400 in debt. Votes of thanks were passed to the retiring officers, and the election of officers was proceeded with, with the following result: S. B. Dole President; Mrs. E. P. Adams and F. Macfarlane, Directors. By a two-thirds majority it was then agreed that the dues should be \$1 per month for all members. The President declared that the hall was ready for use, on application at a few day's notice, and the meeting adjourned.
