"BURSTING" LAMPS. The large quantity of kerosene used in these Islands, amounting in the past year to about half a million gallons, has made necessary the passage and enforcement of a law guarding against unsafe qualities being introduced; and, so far as the oil is concerned, people may feel reasonably safe from explosions.

For these, and other reasons, we cannot be too careful how we use kerosene. Never fill a lamp after dark; never let the oil become "dead"; and never let the children carry burning lamps about the house.

FOREIGN CAPITAL. A great many people here are dreadfully afraid of national borrowing. They think it must end in increased taxation, and take no account of the increased capacity to bear taxation, which the importation of foreign capital gives to every progressive country that makes the construction of needed public works by the aid of borrowed money, a part of its policy.

Annexation in the Western Pacific.

The following telegrams on this subject appear in the New Zealand Herald in addition to those we published yesterday: Melbourne, Jan. 5.—It has transpired that Major-General Scratchley's instructions are to invite the colonies to increase their contributions towards the cost of the New Guinea Protectorate, while the Imperial Government undertakes not to expend more annually than the amount contributed under the regulations for the government of British territory in New Guinea.

THE PLENARY COUNCIL

Of the Catholic Church in the United States, at Baltimore. On Sunday, Nov. 9th, the largest council of the Catholic Church ever held in the Western Hemisphere convened at the cathedral of Baltimore, which had already witnessed several councils, the very first of which was held in 1789.

The streets between the Archbishop's house and the cathedral were thronged with thousands of people anxious to witness the grand procession of all the members of the Council. Some streets were almost impassable. First came about 130 theologians, wearing surplice, amice, red and gold cope and berretta.

Next came the bishops, numbering over fifty, and wearing rich red and golden copes, amice and plain gold mitres. Next came the twelve Archbishops, and finally the Apostolic Delegate, Archbishop Gibbons, wearing amice, alb, cincture, red stole and red cope, on his head a white mitre ornamented with gold, and in his hand his crozier or pastoral staff.

At the conclusion of the mass the pulpit was occupied by Archbishop Ryan. His sermon was on "The Church in her Council," 18 years ago. Said he: "Some of us here present beheld a similar spectacle in this cathedral, the contrast in the number of prelates present is a fair index to the progress of the Catholic Church. Forty-six then represented the Catholic Church of the United States; and now the church numbers them over 70, with a proportional advance in the religious orders and the clergy."

it is! How real! How living! The church in her councils acts for the benefit of society in three different ways: 1st, by preserving the purity and certainty of great truths, which give certain motive to morality. 2nd, by the reformation of morals amongst her own children; and 3rd, by her solicitude for the poor and suffering members of society.

After sermon the choir sang an anti-phon and a psalm. Then the Apostolic Delegate recited a prayer in Latin; the Litany of the Saints were chanted; and after another short prayer and the singing of "Veni Creator," the Apostolic Delegate declared the council opened, and all the members of the council made the profession of faith by advancing in front of the altar, kneeling down two by two before the Bible, and kissing the open page as they made their profession.

As a divine blessing of their labors, one offer of \$300,000 has been made to them by Miss Mary G. Caldwell, a young lady of New York city, as the foundation for a Catholic University, to be established in New York city or its vicinity, under the guiding hand of the Council, for the higher education of the future ministry of the Catholic Church in the United States.

Then (100 years ago) we were without organization. Now this solemn council, more numerous and more free than any which could be assembled elsewhere, is the most striking evidence of our perfect organization. Then we had no schools; now nearly half a million children receive instruction in Catholic schools.

The largest refracting telescope as yet actually completed has a light-gathering surface twenty-seven inches in diameter. This is the great Vienna equatorial, admirably turned out by Mr. Grubb of Dublin in 1880, but still awaiting the commencement of its exploring career.

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MISCELLANEOUS. In the citadel is shown a small cannon which was taken at Bunker Hill. A party of Americans were looking at the gun the other day, while a sergeant recited its history. "Yes," said a lad, "you've got the cannon, but we've got the hill." As a patriotic epigram this is worth a place in history.

Old man Blunt had a red-headed, high-tempered daughter, who eloped with her father's drayman, a drunken, good-for-nothing fellow, and a friend met him the next day. Plans and specifications may be examined at the office of the Minister on and after the 9th day of February, 1885.

The works to be constructed are— First—The basin of the Storage Reservoir, i.e., removing all trees and other vegetable growths, and excavating and removing all earth and rock within the indicated lines.

Second—Building a dam of first-class rubble masonry laid in full beds of hydraulic cement. Third—Laying the line of fifteen and twelve inch pipes and setting gages between the storage reservoir and that of distribution, and from the latter to the point of connection with the pipe system of the city.

Fourth—Constructing the distributing reservoir consisting of an excavation lined with hydraulic cement, concrete or brick-work laid in full hydraulic cement beds and joints, the crosswall and bays to be similarly constructed and the whole roofed over.

All proposals must be enclosed in a separate envelope for each of the above items, and must be addressed to the Minister of the Interior, Honolulu, Hawaii.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Mr. Hanly, who was fined \$150 with \$24.50 costs for assault, paid his fine and was released last Sunday evening.

There was a beautiful display of cirrus clouds, yesterday afternoon, bokening more wind, if not rain.

Mr. J. L. Smith, who has been employed at the Reciprocity Sugar Co's mill as book-keeper for some few months, died last week quite suddenly.

Dust is beginning to make itself felt—forming a coating nearly as thick as that substance on everything. What is needed is a smart rain.

Professor Wayland, of Yale College, with the Chief Justice, paid a visit to "the reef," that is, Oahu Prison, last Sunday. They were shown over the gaol by Captain Tripp, and expressed themselves much gratified at the order and neatness that prevailed.

Gas pipes are being laid for the purpose of supplying light to the lobbies of the Government Building. Heretofore, when any evening sessions of the courts, or other work has been going on in the building, the lobbies have been lit with lanterns.

Part of the real estate belonging to the late Prince Lileiokoku was sold at auction yesterday. His Majesty the King brought a number of the lots, as did Mr. James Campbell and Judge Bickerton.

Mr. John Russell, who has been at Wai-kiki for the past few days, was taken quite ill on Sunday last, and yesterday morning was in a critical state.

The Colonel came in yesterday for a moment, and with a knowing wink informed us that he had as nice a lot of "Berks" down by the W. G. Irwin as had ever landed here.

SUPREME COURT—JANUARY TERM, 1885.

Chief Justice Judd presiding. SATURDAY, JAN. 17th, 1885. DIVORCES.

The following divorces were granted this morning: Piliako vs. Hana, W. A. Kinney for Plaintiff, Palola vs. Kaiwi; J. M. Poepe for plaintiff, J. Kuaana vs. Mary Kaee; A. P. Peterson for plaintiff, Nabolowa vs. J. Kiakaha; W. R. Castle for plaintiff.

In the case of C. Brewer & Co. vs. Geo. H. Luce, on motion of W. R. Austin for plaintiffs, the Court ordered the case to be heard on the 23rd inst.

Court adjourned at 11:30 A. M. MONDAY, JAN. 19th.

In the case of H. A. Bridges, convicted of manslaughter in the second degree, Mr. E. E. Ward stated that he was retained as associate counsel for the defendant, and gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

Yim Chin Kee, convicted in the Police Court of selling opium, was tried on an appeal, before a foreign jury. A verdict of not guilty was returned, and the prisoner was discharged.

In the case of Akiona, on trial for perjury in the second degree, it being stated that Mr. Russell, counsel for defendant, was ill, Mr. Hartwell, for the prosecution, made a motion that the case be continued. The Court then ordered the case to be tried on the 27th inst. the defendant to procure other counsel by that time if Mr. Russell was unable to go on with the case.

Police Court.

BEFORE POLICE JUSTICE BICKERTON. Monday, Jan. 19. Three drunks paid a fine of \$6 this morning.

Three riotous individuals, though they plead not guilty of an affray on Sunday last, were fined \$6 each.

Kanakaole, brought up on a remand from last Saturday, with three others, were brought up for gaming. They were all remanded until next Friday.

Chook Hoon, who was remanded last Saturday on a charge of embezzlement in 1879 or '80 was found guilty, and sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for six months, and to pay \$3.30 costs. Mr. Kawelo, who appeared for the defendant, noted an appeal.

Portuguese Immigrants.

By the British bark Dacca, which arrived at this port yesterday morning, 114 days from Madeira, there was received 313 Portuguese immigrants, men, women and children. Immediately upon her

arrival she was boarded by the health officer, and all her people were found to be in good health and spirits. There were 46 stowaways on board, and during the passage there had been five births and only one death. Chief Clerk Hassinger, Mr. Atwater and Mr. Marcus perfected their arrangements during the day for the landing of the immigrants, and the work will commence this morning.

The Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, Inspector-General of Immigrants, visited the vessel and inspected the immigrants and quarters. He expressed himself as highly pleased with the cleanliness of the vessel, and he was of opinion that it reflected credit upon the captain and officers.

The Minister of the Interior has advertised for bids for the transportation of these people from the vessel to the depot, and also for food for them while under Government care. There are but 64 "contract" people in the lot.

The "Tropical Planter."

The Christmas number of the Tropical Planter was received by the S. S. Australia. In addition to the usual quantity of news concerning the sugar industry, the number contains a Christmas illustration, a page of Christmas poetry, and three or four short and seasonal stories.

Several interesting notes are published, two being credited to our Planter's Monthly. The whole number is an interesting one, and up to the general excellence of the publication.

Our New Police Station.

The basement story of the new Police Building has just been completed by the contractor, Mr. John F. Bowler, in a manner which reflects great credit upon his skill.

Great care was then taken in the excavation for the foundation, that it might have a solid bearing upon the underlying coral.

The entire structure, foundation, walls, arches, and floors is a monolith, composed of concrete made in the same proportions used in first-class structures elsewhere, namely: Four parts of hard, broken rock, two parts of California North Beach sand, and one part of the best English Portland cement.

The dimensions of the building are 63 feet frontage, by depth of 58 feet. The height from the floor to the spring of arches is 7 feet; the rise of arch 16 inches, or one-eighth of span; depth of center of arch 17 inches.

The basement contains ten cells, averaging one hundred square feet of floor room, and one large cell 9 feet by 31 for the special convenience of refractory plantation hands, or any unruly mob who may be guests of the Government. Each cell is ensured a perfect ventilation, in addition to the natural draught through doors and gratings, by a system of four-inch pipes passing from the top of arches to the side walls through which they run to the top of the fire-wall of the building, and are there surmounted by "Banner" cowls.

The corridors are 8 feet in width throughout the building, and all cells and corridors are arched on a radius proportionate to their width. The iron gates and cell doors are not yet in position, but are being made by Mr. Robert More, the well-known machinist, and will probably be completed inside of thirty days.

All the cells and corridors are to be whitewashed, and the now-excellent light will be thereby increased.

Great fears were expressed by some of our citizens, while the building was in course of construction, that the light and ventilation would be entirely inadequate. But a short visit would now convince even the most skeptical that it might be a very desirable place to spend some of our warm days—even as prisoners.

The design of the building is by Mr. Julius Smith, the Superintendent of Public Works. From an inspection of the plans it is evident that the new Police Station will prove to be a very commodious and well-arranged building. The most has been made of the site and of the money that could be devoted to its construction.

With the details of the concrete work now completed Mr. Smith appears to have taken the most praiseworthy pains and he may be proud of the result, which is undoubtedly the finest work of its class that has been done on the islands, and would be a credit to architect and contractor anywhere.

It has already been said that the construction of this substantial basement reflects credit on the contractor, who has done his work faithfully, although those who are acquainted with the work say that it must have been carried on under the disheartening assurance that it would end in a loss to him. Mr. Bowler's works in his own line are well known in this town, and he is a man who values the reputation he has won as both skillful and honest in whatever he undertakes. All the disadvantages he found himself laboring under with this contract seem only to have made him the more determined that the basement of the new Police Station should be the best piece of concrete work ever turned out in these islands, and he has succeeded.

In view of this being the first complete structure of the kind in Honolulu, it may be of interest to our

readers to learn what has been done with the same material elsewhere. The Vanne aqueduct for supplying water to the city of Paris is thirty-seven miles in length, embracing from two and a half to three miles of arches of uniform span of thirty-nine and one-third feet, and also eight or ten bridges of from seventy-five to one hundred and twenty-five feet span, with a thickness at the crown of fifteen and three-quarter inches.

The light-house at Port Said, Egypt, is one hundred and eighty feet high, without joints, and resting upon a monolithic block of concrete, containing nearly four hundred cubic yards.

At Vesinet, near Paris, an entire Gothic church, also a complete monolith, with its foundations, walls and steeple, was built; the steeple being one hundred and thirty feet high, and is in a perfect state of preservation.

The entire floor of this church is paved with the same material in a variety of beautiful designs, and with an agreeable contrast of colors.

In constructing the municipal barracks of Notre Dame, Paris, the arched ceilings of the cellars were made of this concrete, each being a single mass. The spans varied from twenty-two to twenty-five feet, the rise in all cases being one-tenth the span, and the thickness at the crown eight and two-third inches. In the same building the arched ceilings of the three stories of galleries, one above the other, facing the interior and all the subterranean drainage, comprising nearly six hundred yards of sewers, are all monoliths of concrete.

Several large houses, some six stories in height, have been constructed in different cities. In these the entire masonry, comprising both the exterior and partition walls, the chimneys, with flues, cellar arches, cistern, etc., is a single monolith of concrete.

Concrete has been in general use for more than a quarter of a century, and in the numerous and varied applications which have been made of it in Europe, America and elsewhere, it has received the most emphatic commendations from all prominent engineers and architects.

For warehouses, churches and large buildings of every description; for foundations, quay walls, light-houses, jetties and piers; for abutments and massive walls of all kinds; for sidewalks, platforms and flagging, and for many other minor purposes concrete possesses not only comparative cheapness, but all the essential merits of brick and stone with respect to strength, hardness and durability; while for many purposes, such as cellars and cellar floors, cisterns, reservoirs, tanks and fountains; arches, vaulted ceilings and vaults, tunnels, aqueducts, sewer and water pipes, and ornamental work of every description within the province of the architect or engineer, it possesses advantages peculiar to itself, and not equally shared by any other material.

The contract for the remaining two stories of the police building, which will be of brick, has been let to Mr. E. B. Thomas, who will commence operations shortly, and we hope soon to chronicle the completion of a building which, though it may not be a "joy forever" to some, will be an object of pride to those of our citizens who may not be forcibly detained therein.
