HAWAII'S "BLUE" LAWS

CONSTITUTION and LAWS
Framed by the Missionaries

LAWS of the HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

Whoever contracts a debt, he alone shall be liable for the
debt, and his property alone shall go for the payment of it.

And lest there should be mistaken opinions as to what kind
of property may be seized for the payment of debts, it is
hereby clearly proclaimed that lands and fixed property upon
them can never be sold at auction, neither can they be per-
manently transferred. They can not even be leased for years
without the consent of the King and Premier. This kind of
property therefore can never be seized for debt for the Gov-
ernment has never relinquished its right to the soil. But
nevertheless, if a man have no personal estate, the land and
fixed property upon it may be sold at auction on this condi-
tion that no person can be the purchaser except a native born
citizen; and the right of him who purchases in this manner
shall be the same as the right of other natives to their lands.

And if any Governor, Judge, tax officer or any other Gov-
ernment agent, embezzle the Government Property, or appro-
priate it secretly to his own use, or whoever shall refuse to
pay it over to the Treasury Board, whoever shall do any of
these things shall be punished as in case of Theft, to be tried
and convicted by a competent court.

So also in case of speculation, embezzlement or fraud in
the Treasury Board or in either of them. He or they shall
be tried as in case of theft and on conviction shall be liable
to the same punishment.

This proclamation having received the approbation of the
Nobles and Representatives, we have hereunto set our names
this tenth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand,
eight hundred and forty two at Lahaina, Maui.

CHAPTER XLIX.

AN ACT FOR THE REGULATION OF TAXES, DUTIES
AND GOVERNMENT PROPERTY.

Not even wisdom itself can give protection to a nation with-
out a revenue. Money is in many cases the same as strength
and the nation, therefore, has energy in proportion to its
revenue. It is also a well established principle that the peo-
ple ought to aid every object which is for the benefit of the
country, and it is also the duty of the rich to do more than
the poor for they enjoy more.

At the present time the Government is embarrassed will
increase unless the revenue be increased. In the considera-
tion of these things the following law is enacted.

1 The Law respecting the Land Tax for the year 1841 still
remains in force for the current year. The third section how-
ever, found on the 68th page is repealed. Arrow Root will
be no longer received for taxes, for it is an unprofitable ar-
ticle.

REPUBLICAN VOTERS.

The Board of registration has finished its work and has tabulated those who have registered, according to nationality. The following is the official table:

If the figures are correct 1917 have registered and out of that number only one third are disqualified from voting for Senators. That there is something wrong is obvious. At all former elections the proportion was the other way and the voters for the lower house were in the majority over the voters, of whom a property or income qualification was demanded. To become qualified to vote for a senator, an income of \$600 a year is necessary. And the Supreme Court has decided, that such income shall have been received in cash. \$30 a month and grub was held to be insufficient to fill the needed qualification for a voter.

Now, it is absurd that out of 759 foreigners registered only 156 have earned less than \$600 a year. The soldiers who all have registered have not enjoyed the required income, but they have nevertheless been placed as voters for senators. A large number of the thugs and loafers who have registered under a special certificate have certainly not during the past year, with its "hard times," made \$50 a "month" even if they occasionally have been appointed as special police officers, spies and ministerial guards.

It appears very much as if the board of registration had registered as voters for the upper house every man to whom a special certificate was granted. If they have done so the constitution of the republic has been violated and it does not speak well for the promised honesty of our immaculate rulers, that corruption and fraud should be used in the very first election held.

We understand that Mr. Frank Godfrey is getting up a book of reference with the names of the registered voters. It will be a most useful book, and it will show the method of registration in its proper light.

It is note worthy that only 362 Portuguese have registered. 2,200 registered on Oahu, a few months ago, as voters to the constitutional convention. What has happened to bring on such a change? Did the Portuguese colony learn that they were only catpaws for the missionaries and that instead of the promised boom they found starvation under the banner of the republic?

Another interesting fact is the showing that 1331 of the registered voters received special certificates. Entitled to vote were all naturalized citizens, persons holding letters of denization, and the holders of the special certificate for services rendered to the provisional government. This shows then, that only 886 citizens of Hawaii have registered on Oahu, and that the men who are to elect the Legislature are aliens with no standing in justice in this country. If the history of these 1331 was told, we believe that even Dole would blush to find himself supported by such a gang of "heroes," pardoned or escaped. We compliment Mr. Cecil Brown and other ambitious statemen on being lifted into a senatorial chair on the shoulders of these patriotic, worthy and intelligent 1331 freemen!

A number of gentlemen who claim to be capitalists and interested in coffee left for Hilo in the Claudio yesterday. That is probably the last Hawaii will hear of them.

They Feel Unhappy.

Pope Judd and Cardinal Jones are out in the *Advertiser* this morning emphatically denying that the reverend Penrose was "fired" from the Central Union pulpit because he indulged in grape juice punch and cigars. The "protestants" claim that the idea is simply preposterous.

It is really refreshing to see that Messrs. 'Da'akibikihi' and 'Ka'uka Okolekula opio' have become so liberal that grape juice punch and cigars no longer interfere with their opinion of a man or even a clergyman.

We believe however that the reason of such liberality is not to be found altogether because they have changed their sentiments and become less bigotted but is solely due to the unhappy state of their minds regarding the Central Union Church which threatens to become a white elephant on their hands.

Honolulu is known as a very religious community and we regret to say that the town has not improved in that direction during the last year but on the contrary has become still more saintly and religious.

The Central Union as the successor of the Fort Street Church is no longer the absolute ruler of the [elastic] consciences of Honolulu's "best" classes. Pope Judd is tottering on his infallible throne, and his faithful aid Jones sees with despair a vanishing congregation when he passes the hat around. The solid pillars whose purses were always open to the call for subsidy to the ruling Church have deserted their church, their pope, and their Jones; and now, bend their knees to other clerical rulers.

The reverend Garwin holds forth to the deists who call themselves Campbellites and his work has made inroads on Judd's little lamb—or elephant.

The reverend Peck presides over a Methodist congregation among which the Waterhouses form the financial and solid center.

The salvation army besides driving out devils and capturing a few poor reformed drunkards is ensnaring many of the farrest and most devote of Pope Judd's flock. And finally the Theosophists are holding high carnival with a number of sceptics and help to deplete the treasury of the great pope and his church.

The empty seats in the church would be of no account. They could in case of necessity be filled from the nursery and there is never any lack of nursery material in the missionary circles. It is the financial subsidies that are missed and the disagreeable prospect of having to feed the white elephant without material support make the virtuous writers of the Penrose letter feel very uncomfortable indeed. When all other sources slip. When despair makes them rush into print let them remember that even if deserted by Theosophists, Campbellites, Methodists, Salvationists and others they still have the sympathy of the HOLOMUA. And we are Jews!

A Nice Lot.

The Hawaiian Republican club which is the name of a political organization composed of Hawaiians (mostly office holders) met last evening and "nominated" the following gentlemen for senators and representatives:

For Senators: P. C. Jones, Henry Waterhouse, H. W. Schmidt, J. A. McCandless, J. M. Wright, Cecil Brown, J. B. Casle.

For Representatives: D. L. Naone, L. C. Ables, C. L. Carter, Captain Clunie, Walter Waiaman.

It speaks well for the Hawaiians who adhere to the republic that they couldn't find a single one of their countrymen suitable to serve as senator. A special fight will be made by the club for Cecil Brown and D. L. Naone these two being considered the least obnoxious to the community. This is a nice forerunner of what is coming.

A GROSS INJUSTICE.

The *Star* in its Monday issue contains an outrageous editorial headed "Elated Japs." The insulting language used in the article towards the Japanese individually is not deserving of any attention, but the braggart who writes for the *Star* makes a statement in which he tries to place the Japanese in the light of cowards. He says that the Japanese "have fallen into the error that it is the guns which win a battle and not the men behind them."

We don't believe that the *Star* man knows much about guns or for that matter about men, but we do know that there isn't a braver, a more warlike and better fighting nation than the Japanese. That they, when they were made acquainted with modern war implements immediately placed themselves in possession of them is certainly to their credit, and it shows that they were no fools in recognizing a good thing when they saw it. They have not alone got the guns, but they certainly have got the men behind them. The warlike spirit among the Japanese of today has not abated one whit from that of the days when they fought and bled like heroes, and furnished their poets with ideal material for their glorious songs.

The *Star* does not realize that Japan is not a small island like Hawaii. The Emperor holds his sway over 40 millions of people and everyone of them is a Japanese. How many "Americans" does Emperor Cleveland rule over? How many Americans are there in the United States navy? The Japanese are not alone great warriors, but they have proven themselves shrewd statesmen. If they were not known to be both, the Russian Eagle might today be where the Rising Sun is or the Rose of England have supplanted the Chrysanthemum. The bravery and skill displayed by the Japanese during the present war entitle them to the respect of all. Every great power knows Japan well enough to adopt a policy of "hands off."

A SILVER KING.

The big English melo-drama "Silver King" was given last night to a large house and the dramatic portion gave excellent satisfaction. The only feature that marred a completely perfect presentation was the bungling work of the stage artisans. Mr. Dailey had prepared a number of new and artistic settings including two revolving sets and in the movement of these the stage attaches proved very inefficient. The railway station; the wood in winter and the two ship yard scenes were both effective and proved Mr. Schloth to be an excellent artist. We shall look forward to some late and artistic interiors sets in the near future.

The dramatic action of the piece is particularly intricate and from the murder in the first act to the arrest of the real culprit, the audience is carried through a succession of scenes that are numerically to numerous. As Winfred Denver, Mr. Snow was graceful and effective; Mr. Hallett played Capt. Skinner, "the Spider" in a careful and forcible manner and Miss Dalglis was a sweet Nellie Denver. There are numerous minor characters, requiring a number of doubles, in which some appeared to good advantage but in some the transposition was not distinct enough. It is to be regretted that we have not the facilities on our local stage for such presentations, as so much space is lost in the Auditorium that could be used to advantage back of the curtain and Manager Dailey continually constructing new material will tend to crowd it still further.
