## EVANS TAKES COMMAND OF COMBINED FLEETS WARSHIPS GATHER IN 'FRISCO HARBOR

### READY TO RACE BIG YACHT HAWAII

Editor Evening Bulletin: There seemed to be a general satisfaction on the faces of the habitués of the waterfront this morning after learning that the new intended Trans-Pacific Cup-winner had made good in her race from Honolulu to Lahaina. No doubt the gallant Hawaii has the general support of Honolulu, but the glum faces of the admirers of the smaller Kamehameha were pitiful to look upon on reading in this morning's Advertiser that owing to rough weather the crew of that little bark decided to return to Honolulu.

Nobody can grudge the Hawaii the honor gained in this race, but just the same the crew of Kamehameha feel very indignant at the implied insinuation regarding their want of either pluck or sailor abilities and would just like to occupy a small

space in your paper to justify themselves.

The Kamehameha left the wharf at identically the same time as the Hawaii just to insure the same start. When outside the harbor the Kamehameha hugged as close to the wind as was possible, while her larger opponent had to get about five to six miles to leeward in order to strike a favorable breeze. The two boats kept abreast until dark, neither gaining nor losing, but it could be noticed from the Kam that, by lowering and hoisting their topsails, the Hawaii was vainly trying to shake her speedy opponent. In the morning the Hawaii was observed beating up to Kaunakakai Point, while the faster Kam had been in the same position some four to five hours ahead of her. But owing to the Kam not being

### MINISTERS AGAINST MORE PUBLICITY

Thwing Committee Told To Keep Out Of Papers

The Ministerial Union has decided to continue the existence of the Thwing social evil committee, with the proviso that it must work undercover, a strict injunction being issued against its members giving out anything in regard to its work and plans to the public press. A resolution approving of the action taken by Sheriff Laukaea was also passed.

The meeting opened with a prayer by Thwing, who asked for universal peace and for the protection of the Japanese, Chinese and Anglo-Saxon nations. He further made the statement that the recent meeting of the Sunday school children of all nations at the Central Union church had been a great source of inspiration.

Mr. O'Brien reported the work of the Boys' Clubs was progressing favorably.

The Committee had called upon the Governor and the Board of Health, as well as on Sheriff Laukaea, who had closed Twined the day after the last meeting of the Union. ### MOTT-SMITH HAS KANEHOE PLAN

Acting Governor Mott-Smith has evolved a new plan for the settling of pineapple lands by homesteaders at Kaneohe, and, from all present indications, it is an excellent one for the man with small capital. To sum it up, the proposition is this: that the land will be given out on 20-year payments, practically rentals, 10-year options, the settler not being able to take out his patent until the ten years are up, and three years' residence on the land, any residence of six months' time being counted toward the three years.

The main point to be decided by the Government has been how to make conditions that will suit all the people or, in other words, "to make the same cut of trousers fit every man." J. B. Castle would probably not be willing to give up his lease on the lands if he thought that the

The Board of Supervisors held a lively little meeting this noon at which the Advertiser was scored roundly for circulating false reports about the doings of the Board. Incidentally the matter of the park appropriation was taken up, and the usual amount given to the commissioners.

Shortly after 8 o'clock Geo. Schraeder's orchestra, consisting of six instruments, with Miss Mary Hoffmann as piano accompanist and C. D. Lufkin as cornetist, opened the performance with lively music and the curtain went up. Dr. J. H. Raymond was interlocutor, while the four end-men were Hugh Howell and D. H. Case (tambos) and D. H. Smith criticized the student affairs committee for its action in suspending the forty-one men and condemned the announced policy of President Jordan to eliminate the lower classes. This was regarded by the faculty committee as an abuse of his position as college editor and he was told to not register at Stanford again.

## SARGENT TO THWING.

Immigration Commissioner F. P. Sargent has replied to the Rev. E. W. Thwing's letter in connection with the case of Edith Lo Sun. He says: "I can not believe that the time has yet arrived when there will be any particular change in the policy of the Government so far as exclusion is concerned. My views on this question have been fully set forth in the annual report of the Bureau, and with the experience I have had I think I am not far from a proper solution of the present difficulties. But it requires time to bring about a full understanding, which would be necessary to modify present conditions."

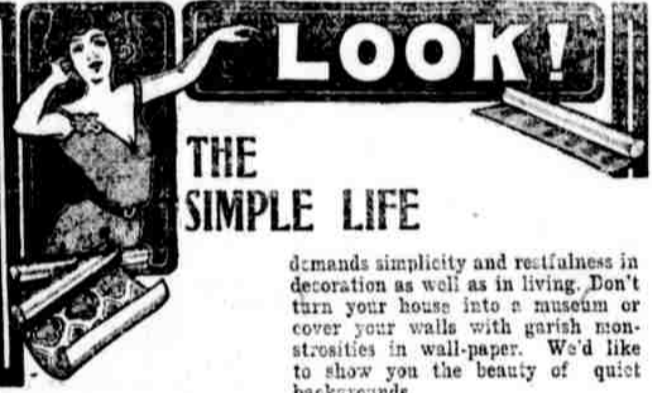
