

PINKHAM'S LAGOON

SANITATION OF WAIKIKI

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH THIS AFTERNOON PRESIDENT JINKHAM PRESENTS AN ELABORATELY WORKED OUT PLAN FOR THE DRAINAGE OF THE WAIKIKI SWAMPS AND THE CREATION OF A "VENICE IN THE PACIFIC."

At this afternoon's meeting of the Board of Health President Pinkham presented an elaborately formulated plan for the complete drainage and sanitation of the whole region including the so-called Waikiki swamps.

a level of from five to seven feet above sea level, all land in this tract, nearly 700 acres in all, which is now less than five feet above sea level.

The plan is not one proposed for immediate execution but for such immediate action as will enable it to be done in the future without having to destroy private improvement and incur prohibitive expense.

Honolulu, February 21, 1906. To the Members of the Board of Health.

Section 1025 Revised Laws of the Territory of Hawaii reads as follows, and is mandatory.

"Whenever in the opinion of the Board of Health any tract or parcel of land situated in the District of Honolulu, Island of Oahu, shall be deleterious to the public health in consequence of being low, and at times covered by water, or of being situated be-

**JULIA HOWE IS ILL.**

BOSTON, February 21.—Julia Ward Howe is seriously ill.

Julia Ward Howe, author of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," was born in New York in 1819. In conjunction with her husband, Samuel Gridley Howe, the eminent philanthropist, she conducted the Boston Commonwealth, an antislavery journal, prior to the civil war, and after the slavery question was disposed of became active in woman suffrage, prison reform and the cause of universal peace. She has made many valuable contributions to literature.

**BRITISH VICE ADMIRAL DEAD.**

LONDON, February 21.—Vice Admiral Greenfell is dead.

Vice-Admiral Harry Tremenhore Grenfell was born on March 9, 1845. He entered the British navy in 1858, reaching the rank of Rear Admiral in 1900, and his most distinguished service was in the Egyptian war, where he won the Egyptian medal.

An Associated Press dispatch received yesterday under a Peking date line stated that the foreigners did not feel any fear of an anti-foreign uprising by Chinese. An earlier, but still recent, dispatch dated from New York said that no cause for anxiety over conditions in China.

In view of a concurrence of testimony which seems overwhelming, these two dispatches could have originated from one of only two causes—ignorance of the conditions and situation or inspiration from some source interested in creating a feeling of security or a belief in the permanence of quiet in China.

## PORTUGUESE FOR IRWIN'S

BIG SUGAR FACTORS ARE WILLING TO LOOK AFTER TWELVE HUNDRED SOULS FROM THE AZORES—WILL GIVE OR LEASE LAND, BUILD THEM HOUSES AND SUPPLY WATER—MOLOKANS WILL BE GIVEN MILL CONTRACTS.

As soon as arrangements are concluded by the Territorial Board of Immigration for the bringing of Portuguese families to Hawaii from the Azores, W. G. Irwin & Company stand ready to look after anywhere between two hundred and two hundred and fifty families or roughly speaking, about twelve hundred souls.

that is where the plantation owns land in fee simple, land will be given in fee, when it is leased, long leases will be given the settlers. We will build them houses, supply water and so on, but of course I can only speak in general terms. The Board of Immigration must settle on the terms with the Planters, and I imagine that this is causing the delay in sending a man. The whole proposition must be fixed up in businesslike shape and thoroughly understood before anyone goes.

He further claims that, as this particular land is encroached upon, it will become an intense and constant menace to the health and every other sound interest of the city of Honolulu.

He further claims this district is incapable of reclamation by any expenditure within the means of private owners.

The president of the Board of Health recommends that the government, by its right of eminent domain, shall in an equitable and just manner acquire such ownership and rights in said district as shall enable it to transform it into an absolutely sanitary, beautiful and unique district. One that will add immensely to the Kapiolani Park and the Beach addition.

If we may draw logical conclusions from existing and clearly approaching facts, let us try to predict the possible and probable future of Honolulu.

Incalculable financial economy, eminent results and opportunity are secured by foresight in municipal affairs. It has been claimed that the higher ground and hillside are preferred for residence purposes. In Los Angeles the growth of the city has not been toward the hills but it has spread out on the level grounds toward the southwest. The finest residence sections of the city of Boston are in filled ground where the state government reclaimed the Back Bay and conforming to a well conceived plan of park avenues, parks and lakes made it the attractive and refined part of the city.

Waikiki, to the extent the beach front will permit, is the choice part of the city of Honolulu for it offers the close attraction of the sea. The land bordering on the sea commands high prices and little can be secured.

Other than a few lots on Kalakaua Avenue there are in the Waikiki District hundreds of acres that could be made, at comparatively small cost, exceedingly attractive and desirable by a comprehensive plan under governmental control that must otherwise remain of only agricultural value for rice and banana culture or valueless, or be gradually occupied by a class of population that limited means force onto undesirable and unsanitary land.

On map "A" your president confined his estimates to the area, 687 acres, within the dotted and shaded lines, but believes the limit should be the avenue leading from just beyond the junction of King and McCully streets to the Kapiolani Road near Campbell Avenue, and McCully streets to the Kapiolani Road near Campbell Avenue, and that this avenue should be parked one hundred feet or more mauka, and thus form the mauka boundary of the reclamation district, with the Kapiolani Road and Kapiolani Park to Kalakaua Avenue the south-eastern boundary.

It is presumable that adjustment and self interest would eventually bring in the other property on Kalakaua Avenue.

The manner in which this scheme has been laid out would bring every residence block within one block at least of the sea, the lagoon or a parked avenue, with the exception of seven blocks out of ninety-two.

This proposition is financially practicable.

This proposition is not presented for immediate execution in its details for it would require some years for that.

This proposition is presented, first, for public consideration in the hope it will commend itself to the public; second, that immediate steps will be taken to secure government control of the entire area involved.

Section 1205 Revised Laws stipulates the Board of Health shall report "together with a brief recommendation of the operation deemed advisable to improve such land."

Except for brevity, of which the case does not admit, this report conforms with the mandate of the law.

To install an adequate sewer system and proper surface drainage the entire Waikiki District, and some adjacent land, under consideration requires to be raised to a grade ranging from five to seven feet above sea level. Neither the hills mauka nor the beach can physically or economically furnish the material.

It occurred long since to your president to seek the material in the rice and banana fields and swamps themselves.

He has caused a series of borings to be made throughout the district, Kapiolani Park and the beach addition. On Map "A" each boring is located and numbered. Profile "B" shows each strata of material, its depth and character.

No more desirable, economically workable or sanitary filling has ever been discovered anywhere. Its depth ranges from twenty feet to beyond thirty-seven feet, our deepest boring. The length of pipe line for delivery is moderate and practicable. The method of dredging would be suction, as employed in the harbor.

THE LAGOON.  
In order to secure filling material a great lagoon would as a consequence be formed. This circumstance would give the opportunity to create a quite marvelously beautiful, unique district, a Venice in the midst of the Pacific. Within such a lagoon might be anchored the pleasure yachts of our great neighbors.

Man is becoming discontented with short distances and tame sport. He desires ocean racing and thirty-one seconds per mile automobilizing. What may happen if Honolulu can furnish the most attractive means of satisfying these longings in our incomparable climate may be imagined. The filling required would necessitate a waterway nearly 250 feet wide, twenty to twenty-eight feet in depth, and including the Maake branch fifty feet wide, 2,762 feet long, with channels to the deep sea 4,900 feet additional length. The lagoon would furnish the best boat racing course in the world. Straight away nearly two miles with a full course of four miles without doubling back is secured.

Frequent boat landings are suggested.

Illuminate the lagoon and boulevards, on each side of the lagoon, with electric lights and no where on the face of the earth could the scene or attraction be paralleled.

The boulevards on each side would furnish eight miles of asphaltum streets for automobilizing, not to mention eleven miles of parallel streets or avenues, to say nothing of the additional streets adjacent.

As laid out on Map "A" the lagoon starts fifty feet wide at the Beach addition, passes through Kapiolani Park, the fields, under McCully street, and turning, goes under Kalakaua Avenue, and makes to sea through the Ala Moana long bridge. At the beach, Maake inlet and Ala Moana outlet sea walls are extended to deep water.

In the lagoon the water would be constantly freshened by the entrance of tide water and valley and surface drainage. Tide gates at the beach and Maake entrances would be closed at high tide and the waters be thus forced through the lagoon to the exit at the Ala Moana bridge.

The feasibility of this plan has been proven by us for the past nine months in flushing by automatic tide gates on a moderate scale at Waikiki. Several bridges would necessarily cross the lagoon, and a design for a bridge is submitted to give a crude idea of what might be appropriate.

## JUDGING FOR THE PARADE

UNIFORM RULES FOR THE WORK OF THE OFFICIALS WERE APPROVED THIS MORNING.

The last loose ends of the arrangements for tomorrow's big floral parade and festa in honor of Washington's birthday were tied up at a meeting of committee and officials which was held at the Young Hotel this morning.

The only absence was Mrs. Van Vleet who unfortunately was kept away by illness at home and who for the same reason had to resign as one of the auto judges. The committee reluctantly accepted the resignation. Mrs. E. B. Walbridge accepted the appointment in her place.

The principal matter discussed, and this at some length, was the methods of judging and the marking.

After a thorough conference the following rules for the uniform judging of the different classes were adopted:

Points to be assigned in judging Pa-u riders: Horse, 1; equipment, 1; costume, 2; grace and poise of figure, 2; riding, or horse-womanship, 2; color scheme, 1-10.

The pa-u riders will ride in a body just the judges' stand and then as single riders or in pairs they will ride past the stand at a gallop, stopping their horses immediately in front of the judges. The judges will select 15 or 20 as possible winners during these maneuvers. The entire body will then pass in single file before the judges and the possible winners brought to the front. These will be required to maneuver for the judges and from these the winners are to be selected and reviewed until final awards are made.

Points to be assigned in judging carriages: Conception of design, 1; consistency of design, 1; color scheme, 1; completeness, 1; consonance of occupants, 1; horsemanship, or driving, 2; teams, 2; equipment of teams, 1-10.

Each vehicle contestant must have prepared for the judges a brief statement, giving class under which entered, conception of design of his or her vehicle, flower used in the decoration, name of entrant and occupants of vehicle.

Points to be assigned in judging automobiles: Conception of design, 1; consistency of design, 1; color scheme, 1; completeness, 1; consonance of occupants, 1-5.

Each automobile contestant must have prepared for the judges a brief statement, giving conception of design of his or her vehicle, flower used in the decoration, name of entrant and occupants of vehicle.

Points to be assigned in judging riders: Horse, 2; equipment, 2; grace and poise, 2; riding, 3-10.

The general scheme for judging the riders will be the same as outlined under pa-u riders.

Points to be assigned in judging automobiles: Conception of design, 1; consistency of design, 1; color scheme, 1; completeness, 1; consonance of occupants, 1-5.

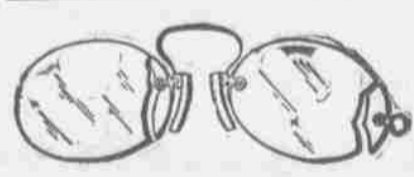

tween high and low water mark, or of being improperly drained, or incapable by reasonable expenditure of effectual drainage, or for other reason in an unsanitary or dangerous condition, it shall be the duty of the Board of Health to report such fact to the Superintendent of Public Works together with a brief recommendation of the operation deemed advisable to improve such land.

The President of the Board of Health after months of study and investigation asserts the Waikiki District under consideration is at the present time "deleterious to the public health."—"is low covered and partly covered with water"—is not drained at all—"is incapable of effectual drainage" and is "in an unsanitary and dangerous condition."

# SUPERVISORS DROP THE CHARGES

NO PETITION CIRCULATED AGAINST THE DEPUTY SHERIFF OF KOOLAULOA AND THEREFORE HERE IS NOTHING FOR THE BOARD TO ACT ON—PLUMBING ORDINANCE ONLY HAS THE SUPPORT OF TWO MEMBERS.

The Board of Supervisors last night dropped the charges of misconduct against the deputy sheriff of Koolauloa and he will presumably remain in office. The matter was disposed of by the filing of the following letter without action:

"D. Kalauokalani, Esq., Clerk County of Oahu, Honolulu, Hawaii.

"Dear Sir: I have your favor of the 8th inst. in which you state that the Board of Supervisors desire me to present charges against George Kekauoha, Deputy Sheriff of Koolauloa, and that I secure a petition of 25 voters of the county requesting his removal from office.

"In reply thereto I desire to say that I shall hold myself in readiness at any time to substantiate the statements made by me in my letter to Sheriff Brown relating to Kekauoha. I am not, however, prepared to circulate any petition for the removal of Kekauoha. I have brought the man's character to the notice of the authorities. If they do not see fit to take what steps are necessary to impeach him, well and good.

"I herewith return my letter to Sheriff Brown for your records.

Lucas said that Castle had spent \$20,000 to bring the Molokans here, and he didn't think there was any wrong in allowing Johnson to go. A motion was carried, Moore voting no, to approve the action of Adams and Lucas in giving Johnson leave to go.

Park Expert Robinson, said Lucas would be ready to give his suggestions for the beautification of the town in about eight days. Lucas said that the roads would be in first-class condition for the autos and pa-u riders on Thursday. Moore suggested that Park Expert Robinson come before the board and make a statement of his intention and Lucas replied that this would be done.

It was decided to advertise for tenders for a sixteen-foot concrete culvert at Hauula.

Tenders for the Kahauiki bridge will be advertised for in the immediate future, bids to be acted on at the board's meeting on March 6.

He conveyed the body of Dr. Livingstone from Zanzibar to England and returned to Africa with Henry M. Stanley. He spent three years in the Klondike at the time of the first great interest in that section, and came to Honolulu five or six years ago where he has resided since.

**JAMES A. LAING PASSES AWAY**

CLOSE OF A LIFE WHICH HAD BEEN FULL OF STIRRING INCIDENTS IN FAR PLACES.

James Arthur Laing, a well known figure about town, will be seen no more in his accustomed haunts as he passed away yesterday after an illness of some weeks. He was 64 years of age though he looked much older. He was a most interesting life. He was an English university man but he went into mercantile life and in 1872 was agent for the British India Steam Navigation Company in Zanzibar. He it was who conveyed the body of the great African explorer Dr. Livingstone to England and he attended the funeral in Westminster Abbey. He returned to Africa and accompanied the late Henry M. Stanley on some of his most dangerous trips into Central Africa. After knocking about in odd corners of the world he went to the Klondike for three years and over two years ago he came here intending to remain only for the winter.

The deceased was a close student of contemporary history and at the recent Russo-Japanese war progressed he was wont to keep accurate record of the movements of different commanders, with characteristic British obstinacy however, he would take nothing as fact until he received his file of the London Times.

The only relative he is known to have is John Laing, M. A., of Oxford University, who conducts a large preparatory school at Victoria, B. C. The remains are to be cremated.

Among the incidents of his life which he was fond of recalling was the time during his residence in Zanzibar when Sir Bartle Frere, the British Commissioner, arrived to conclude a treaty with the Sultan. The treaty was literally forced on the monarch of Zanzibar as it set free all the slaves from Cape Guardafui to Mozambique.

The late Mr. Laing's close associations with Henry M. Stanley did not inspire him with any affection for that intrepid explorer though he had nothing but admiration for the man's force

of character and resourcefulness. "The man was a brute," he has often been heard to say, an opinion that was generally shared by those who remember the story of "the rear column." Now both Stanley and poor Laing are on an exploring expedition the record of which will never be read by mortal eyes.

A verdict of not guilty was rendered by the jury in Judge Lindsay's court yesterday afternoon, in the case of Mary Kallina, charged with selling liquor without a license. The testimony as to the sale was "spy" evidence, and the jury apparently would not believe it.

IMPORTANT SHIPMENT IS ON THE VENTURA CONSIGNED TO CALIFORNIA BOARD.

A very important shipment is aboard the S. S. Ventura for the California Board of Horticulture. The shipment is sent from New Zealand and is being forwarded by George Comper the well known entomologist. It consists of eleven cases of the parasite to destroy the codlin moth.

Comper discovered this parasite some months ago. An account of discovery was published by the Star at that time. The first shipment of the parasite's larvae is now being made.

It is thought that the new parasite will be able to cope with the moth. The codlin moth has had a very destructive effect upon the fruit in California and efforts have been made to cope with it. If the present shipment of parasite larvae proves satisfactory other shipments will undoubtedly follow.

**TRANSFERRED STOWAWAYS.**

The transport Meade brought four stowaways to this port from San Francisco and transferred them to the transport Buford yesterday for return to San Francisco. The Buford transferred a similar number from Nagasaki to the Meade. No indigent citizens from the Philippines left the transport Buford at this port during the recent visit of the vessel.

THICK WEATHER DETAINED VENTURA

COLONIAL LINER MADE PORT THIS MORNING A FULL DAY BEHIND HER SCHEDULE TIME.

Twenty-four hours late the S. S. Ventura came into the harbor this morning from the Colonies and Pago Pago. Thick weather from Sydney to Auckland and heavy weather from Pago Pago were the causes for her delay. She left Sydney February 5 going to Sydney she struck heavy, thick weather. The air was so thick with mist that the vessel had to be run under a slow bell. She left Auckland 16 hours late. Heavy head weather and head seas to Pago Pago were then encountered and strong northeast trades and head seas from Pago Pago to this port were met. She arrived off the harbor at 4:16 a. m. today, her time from Sydney being 16 days 10 hours and 44 minutes.

The vessel had 145 tons of cargo for Honolulu, a much larger amount than usual. Most of this consisted of sulphate ammonia 7331 bags. The other consignments were 3 packages of plants 518 crates of onions, 60 cases champagne 3 crates of smoked fish and 110 cases of Geneva gin. For San Francisco she has 1,152 tons of freight.

There landed at Honolulu 9 passengers and for San Francisco she has 127 passengers.

TO PREVENT EMBEZZLEMENT

FEDERAL GRAND JURY CRITICIZES THE SYSTEM OF AUDITING ACCOUNTS.

The federal Grand Jury this morning made a final report to Judge Dole, condemning the "method and infrequency" of postal inspections in the Territory. The jury says that there should be more frequent and thorough audit of postal money order offices. The custom has been to endeavor to audit each office at least once a year, but in some cases two or three years intervene between examinations of accounts. The work is too much for one man, it is said, and as a means of protecting the community from defalcations, better arrangements should be made by the government.

A GREAT PIANIST.

The music loving public of Honolulu will learn with satisfaction that Miss Kroostchoff, the distinguished Russian pianist, who has just concluded a very successful tour of the Far East, has consented to give a concert during her stay here. From hence she goes to the States where she will make an extended tour, proceeding thence to England and Europe. She is giving her concert here, not for the money that she will make out of it, but because she has been solicited to do so by a number of musical enthusiasts who are desirous of having an opportunity of hearing her play before she passes on to the mainland.
