From Goods Imported in Appear
Brought from Australia.

On June 1st all fruit dealers in
New Westminster, British Colum-
bia, were forbidden to sell and
ordered to immediately destroy
the Australian apples brought by
the steamship "Warrior." This
order is the result of an examina-
tion by the health authorities,
which showed that the apples
contain germs of various fruit
pests.

The above contains a hint that
should not be neglected by Pro-
fessor Koohele and the Commis-
sioner of Agriculture and shows
the necessity of examining all im-
portations of fruit of any kind to
these islands.

Some more pictures by Hugo
Fisher were snapped at the
Pacific Hardware Company's
quais yesterday. They are as
big as those mentioned before.

A pastoral scene, a meadow
with a placid, quiet stream run-
ning through it, into which
emerge a swiftly flowing brook
in the margin, grasses and wild
flowers, while in the foreground
a group of cattle are resting under

HAVOC ON HAWAII BY GREAT TIDAL WAVE.

Heavy Loss of Property in Kona District.

AN EARTHQUAKE, SHOCK FELT.

Hilo People Fearing Reception at 12th
Flood-General News Items-Children
of Progress in Hilo Sports and
Times on the Street.

Hilo, June 15, 1896.

During the early hours this
morning the Island of Hawaii
was visited by a tidal wave which
continued for several hours,
causing great loss of property and
causing many people whose
houses occupied ground in close
proximity to the shore line.

This is the first tidal wave of
any size since 1878, when Hilo
city was flooded.

The greatest losses yet reported
were felt in the Kona district.
In Keahou six houses and the
Postoffice were washed away, also
numerous fences, outhouses and
sheds.

In Kailua the water came up as
far as the Court House, and as it
receded took along the lumber
piles in the lumber yard.

Many stores were flooded to a
considerable depth, ruining flour,
meat, dress goods, etc., etc. Mr.
Scott was a heavy loser, his flour
being all deluged with water.

In that district the water stood
about twenty feet. Between the
ridings the shore line was over
one hundred yards out.

In Hilo the force of the waves
was not so great as in Kona. Here
it rose from five to eight feet.

It was first noticed about four
o'clock, and at seven and until
noon the bridge crossing Waialua
river was crowded with people,
who expected another such ex-
perience as was felt here in 1878.

At this place the crowd were all
interested in the manner in which
a snow was being handled. When
the waves would come in the ves-
sel would float off the rocks where
she had been left by the outgoing
tide. This lasted for a consider-
able length of time, until finally
she was safely held by many
guide ropes.

There was but little damage
done, the greatest losses being
felt by the owners of various
small craft which were at their
moorings in the Waialua stream,
several being considerably bat-
tered.

The racing yachts Aurora and
Astoria were somewhat disfig-
ured, but will be in the ring on
July 4th.

As a result of the tidal wave
and an earthquake early this
morning, we are anticipating
wonders from Madame Felo, who
is stationed at Kilauea. A flow
of lava is looked for in the very
near future.

The enterprising merchants and
public spirited citizens of our city
are already arranging for the
celebration of July 4th. A pub-
lic meeting has been called for
Thursday night.

J. A. Martin is regaining his
health and strength and will
again be at his Bazaar in a few
days.

Dr. Hutchinson is the happiest
man in Hilo. The doctor was the
winner of the long-looked-for
yacht race on June 11th. An
elegant silk pennant will here-
after grace the mast of the Astoria.
The pennant was the trophy raced
for.

All of the Owl baseball team
are on the streets again, as they
have fully recovered from their
recent lameness.

The Hodorick Dhu expects to
set sail for France in about ten
days.

The Kilauea Hou steamed
into this port on Friday night
last, having in tow the schooner
Ada, which she picked up off Ha-
kalei. The Ada was out about
ten days from Honolulu bound
for Hilo with machinery, etc., for
the manufacture of soap. She
was out of water when off Laupa-
hoohe, so a boat was lowered
with four men in it. While try-
ing to land, the sea caught the
boat and capsized it, drowning
one man, a Frenchman, Alboni
by name. The body has been re-
covered and ordered buried
by the authorities.

La grippe has released its hold
on the people in our city after a
long visitation.

A private dining room is the
latest improvement at the Hilo
hotel. It is annexed to the large
dining hall, and is very tastefully
arranged and decorated.

When Dr. Williams' cottage is
completed it will be one of the
most imposing residences in Hilo.
It will be on the corner of Pouna-
hawai and School streets.

A gun store will soon be opened
in our city.

Hilo will give its Legislative
Solons a rousing reception on
their return home.

The Hilo hotel is now prepared
to accommodate a great many
guests both at table and with
rooms. The management takes
pleasure in announcing the fact
that everything in connection with
the hotel is first class.

John Akana alias Kalikolio on
Monday of last week entered the
horse-shoeing shop of J. M. Gou-
vois, Jr., while the owner was
absent at breakfast, and stole \$68.

He was confronted the same
morning by police captain Brown,
and at once confessed his guilt.
The money was all recovered in
three separate places.

ELEVENTH OF JUNE.

Hilo celebrated the 11th of
June in good style with sports
and games, although frequent
showers rather marred the
pleasure.

A salute of twenty-one guns
was intended, but there was only
powder enough for eleven.

The Boarding School band gave
a morning concert.

An exciting baseball match re-
sulted: Holomana 23, Owls 14.

The yacht race between L. Sev-
erance's custom Aurora and Dr.
Hutchinson's sloop Astoria was
won by the sloop.

There was a series of horse
races, culminated with music by
the Hilo de Muses band. Dr. El-
lio's bay mare won the principal
scrub race. Pauline Rose rode
the winner in a ladies' race, beat-
ing Ida Wessel by twenty yards.
Horne's horse easily won the
race of the day, defeating the
horses of Hutchinson and Car-
valho.

Other Accounts of the Tidal Wave.

From a private letter the follow-
ing particulars of the flood in Ko-
na are obtained.

At Kailua the waves washed
Kupaka's house away. There was
four feet of water in McDougall's
and Kaeomakule's houses. Lum-
ber was scattered all over the
beach and every stone wall was
knocked down, the disengaged
stones being strewn everywhere.

Six houses were washed away at
Keahou. Charles Kainiki's house
was lifted up, carried to the beach
and smashed.

The Postoffice was picked up,
turned round, carried across the
bay and set down there. Three
grass houses were washed away.

Judge Hoopill's house was filled
with water.

Ten waves in succession came
in and receded before the big
wave struck.

The force of the tidal wave was
severely felt at Hookona.

There is no account of loss of
life or personal injury.

Captain Simerson of the steam-
er W. G. Hall reports that his
vessel was at Honouapo, Kau dis-
trict, when the tidal waves were
first noticed. First it was observ-
ed that the sea receded from shore.
When the sea returned, as it did
very slowly in a huge swell, the
water changed from being rough
to being quite smooth. He says
there were fifteen waves percepti-
ble in Kona, and twelve in Kau.

The greatest wave in Kona, being
third of the procession, was forty
feet high.

At Kailua the house of Miss
Paris was surrounded with water,
shutting the household up inside.
When the Hall returned Miss Paris
took passage for Makona.

At Keahou fish were caught
amongst the lantern bushes. The
wharf there was demolished. Sev-
eral natives went out in canoes to
recover goods washed to sea.
Among other floats they secured
were a demijohn of gin and a case
of samshu. They beached the
contents and returned to shore in
a hilarious condition. The natives
said they weren't afraid of tidal
waves.

At one landing Tommy White,
freight clerk on the Hall, was just
stepping into the boat, when it
dropped about ten feet below his
reach. He grabbed a rope just in
time to save himself from a bad
fall.

SANITARIUM PROSPECTS

**NOTES OF A TRIP TO THE WAIANAE
SUMMIT.**

Interview with Dr. Kellogg and Mr.
Yates—The New Cattle Pens of the
Oahu Railway, Etc.

With its usual previousness the
Star furnished its readers yester-
day with a glowing account of the
proposed sanitarium which, to say
the least, is misleading. The site
of the proposed sanitarium has
not yet been selected and it may
be placed elsewhere than in the
Waianae mountains. If the latter
place is chosen it will not be on
the site chosen for it by the
Star, but on that picked out by
Messrs. Dillingham and von Holt,
which is not at an elevation of
3000 feet but between 800 and
1000. The Star's bubbling spring
near the spot is about a mile away;
but enough of these inaccuracies
which will be more fully exposed
below.

Leaving Honolulu on the 9:15
train yesterday morning the party,
consisting of H. M. von Holt and
wife, Frank Brown, C. B. Ripley,
B. F. Dillingham, Mr. Achilles,
Miss Belle Carter, Dr. Kellogg,
Mr. Yates, W. R. Farrington, Geo.
Manson and Ed. Towse, arrived
at the new cattle pens at Jansen's
station, four miles below Ewa,
about 10 o'clock. Extra horses
were taken from town in a box
car attached to the train,
while others were furnished
from the company's ranch. While
the animals were being gotten in
readiness time was allowed for an
inspection of the new pens, which
are the most complete of any in
the country. In the centre of the
pens is the well which supplies all
the water for the cattle at this end
of the big range, and to get to wa-
ter now the animals must pass
through several pens. Owing to
the denseness of the forest com-
posing this portion of the range it
has hitherto been impossible to
round up wild cattle, but now they
fall an easy prey to man's inge-
nuity. A large tank has been
erected near the well which is 50
feet deep, and a powerful wind-
mill erected to pump the water
up. Under the windmill and at a
height of about fifteen feet there
is a comfortable room in which
one of the company's employes
lives. Every gate in the big pens
is connected with this room and
can be closed or opened at
will therefrom. When the cattle
come up at night for water they
are shut up in the pens by the
man under the windmill, and in
the morning separated as re-
quired. This arrangement saves
all the trouble of rounding up be-
sides much expense. Mr. von Holt
told of one big steer who stood out
eight nights before he would go in
the pen for water, but at last he
gave out and had to drink. He
met his fate the next day. There
are between four and five thousand
cattle on this range and most of
them water at this point.

Leaving the pens the route
taken skirted the lower fields of
the Ewa plantation, in one of
which the two big steam plows
were at work. These two ma-
chines plow up about fifteen acres
per day and do it better than the
old way. The foothills were soon
reached and after an hour's riding
over an easy gradient the point
designated for the proposed sani-
tarium was reached. This was a
beautiful plateau, containing per-
haps 1000 acres gently sloping
towards the sea, and having an
elevation of from 800 to 1000 feet.
As Mr. Dillingham said, it was
designed by nature for just such
a purpose. The difference in the
atmosphere was at once remark-
ed by Dr. Kellogg, who was delight-
ed with the spot and the grand
view obtained therefrom. In the
canyon above are the springs
from which the water necessary
can be piped down about a mile.
The soil on this plateau is of the

richest and comparatively free
from rocks. Nothing but trees
is needed to turn it into a beautiful
park, and Mr. Dillingham's idea
is to plant the whole plateau with
trees as soon as the water is piped
down. The springs furnish
an abundance of water and more
can be obtained at any time by
tunneling.

After a short stop a detour was
made for the purpose of viewing
the Waianae pali and looking
down into the beautiful Naanakula
valley. This was reached in
about half an hour and the party
stood entranced at the marvellous
beauty of the scene suddenly un-
folded before their eyes. The
rugged and almost perpendicular
pali was alive with wild goats of
all sizes and colors, while the vivid
green of the kukui trees in
its gulches set off the more sombre
colors of the rocks and other foli-
age. "I would not have missed
this sight for anything," said Dr.
Kellogg; "nowhere in the world
have I seen a prettier bit of scenery."
But some one said "lunch" and
the spell was broken. Following
the ridge the party then made for
the Pukaua spring, below which
in a grove of kukui trees the
natives with packmules had
brought up the lunch by another
route. Here is the camping place
of the goat hunters and a board
nailed to a tree bore the legend
"Camp Walter Dillingham." It
was only a few minutes before
everyone was doing justice to the
excellent lunch provided by Mrs.
von Holt, Mrs. Dillingham and
Miss Carter, washed down by
pure water from the mountain
spring above. Within a few feet
of the camp a nest of wild tur-
key's eggs was found.

After a rest of an hour the
party returned by another route
which led to Honouliuli station.
On the way down Mr. Dillingham
and Dr. Kellogg made a detour to
examine the springs which will
supply the proposed sanitarium.
The railroad was reached
about 4:15, the animals put
aboard and at 5:40 the
party were all safe and sound in
Honolulu, tired, dirty and dusty,
but feeling all the better for their
day's outing.

While returning by the cars the
BULLETIN representative talked
with Dr. Kellogg and Mr. Yates
concerning their plans. The doctor
said:

"Some thirty years ago, in con-
junction with my brother and
others, we established the first
sanitarium in the United States
at Battle Creek, Michigan. It was
a grand success and has led us to
establish others at different places.
We have seven now, all direct off-
shoots of the Battle Creek estab-
lishment and controlled by the
same corporation. These are lo-
cated at Chicago; St. Helena, Cal-
ifornia; Guadalajara, Mexico;
Cape Town, Africa, and Samoa.
It is our purpose to establish a
sanitarium in the Hawaiian is-
lands, but we have not yet decided
on the locality. I am particularly
impressed with the many advan-
tages of the spot shown us today,
but of course we shall look at other
sites before deciding on any. The
objections to the proposed site are
the want of a good road and the
water. These Mr. Dillingham
promises to make good, and if we
can make suitable arrangements
with him to that effect those ob-
jections will be removed. The air
is simply perfect, and the view of
Pearl Harbor and the plantation
below could not be improved on.
You understand that large bodies
move slowly, and as our first ex-
penditure will be \$75,000 or \$150,-
000, we must necessarily be sure
what we are about. You may be
assured we intend to establish a
sanitarium somewhere near Hon-
olulu, but just where we cannot
tell until we have visited other
spots recommended to us. Per-
sonally both Mr. Yates and my-
self are very favorably impressed
with Mr. Dillingham's sites, but
there are others to be consulted
and it will be at least a year
before any move of magnitude
is made. We may start on a
small scale at once, however. I

LATE RECEPTION OF DELEGATE ATTENDING IN MAY 1-1906.

Members of International Reformers Union Monthly Meeting HELD AT THE ALBION HOTEL.

A plague of grasshoppers has struck the country near Kalaheo, Kauai.

Writings at St. Louis would not receive adopted resolutions to the Republican convention.

John Simon, the distinguished French statesman, formerly Premier, died on June 8, aged 85 years.

Montreal is to increase the water power of Lac Beauport in the St. Lawrence for producing electric light and power.

James B. Yeoch, a real estate agent of Pasadena, Cal., is charged with perjury through fraud and forgery amounting to \$15,000.

Madame Spreckels has bought a lot in the Western Addition, San Francisco, for \$1,000,000 and will erect on it a mammoth residence.

Two important by-elections have just been won by the Liberals in England, in each case the seat being a gain from the Conservatives.

Senator Morgan has been trying hard without success to secure consideration for another strong joint resolution against Spain in regard to Cuba.

A Socialist attack upon the French Government was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies, the order of the day being adopted by a vote of 318 to 238.

Her Majesty's ship Imperieuse, 10,000 tons, on route to Kaguwaku as flagship of the North Pacific Squadron, is expected to call at San Diego from Acapulco.

Austin Corbin, Attorney and railway president of New York, was killed in a runaway accident on the Clinton farm, near Newburg, New Hampshire, on June 7. He was about 60 years of age.

Anthrax is raging in Chittagong, Assam, and neighboring countries in Lower Burma and Malabar. Hundreds of heads, many cattle and thousands of other animals have died from the disease.

Good Brides and Harry Burpenter are turning their attention to the mining regions of British Columbia, and now have an expert at Kalaheo, who says there is ten times more wealth in that district than South Africa ever saw.

have brought my wife and children here and intend to stay. I also have brought two trained nurses with me and with others I can obtain here I could open at once if a suitable building was obtainable."

In response to questions about the Battle Creek Sanitarium Dr. Kellogg said: "It is the largest and most successful institution of the kind in the world. There is an average attendance of 1200 patients and visitors during the summer months and about 900 in winter. The main building is simply a large hospital and hotel combined, containing the very latest improvements of both. It is a summer resort as well as a place for invalids to recuperate. There are a gymnasium, swimming bath, concert hall and other means of amusement provided, and including the resident physicians and nurses there are about 500 employees at the sanitarium. It takes a separate five story building to house the nurses alone, besides cottages and other buildings for the physicians and officials. To get such an institution in running order takes time and money, and that is the reason why we are going slow here."

Mr. Dillingham was also interviewed on the subject and said: "I intend to do everything in my power to get these gentlemen to locate on the line of the railroad. I have shown them a good place and they seem to be well pleased with it. To show you that I mean business I will tell you the offer I made them. I asked Dr. Kellogg how much land he required and he said twenty acres. I told him I would give him that much land for one dollar. In addition to that I have offered to grade a suitable road from the railroad to the proposed site and also to pipe the water to the spot at the expense of the railroad. I don't think they can ask anything more. I want the Sanitarium established on the line of the road and am willing to do anything in my power that is reasonable to help it along. I even went farther than what I have told you, for I offered to deliver all the lumber and material for the building at the nearest point to the new road free of charge. It would be a good thing for the railroad in the long run and I don't think anyone can say that I am not doing the right thing."

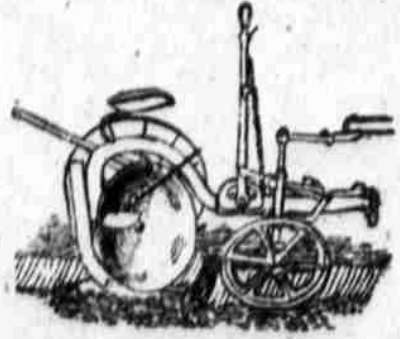

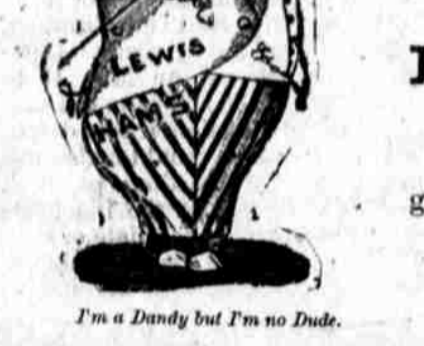
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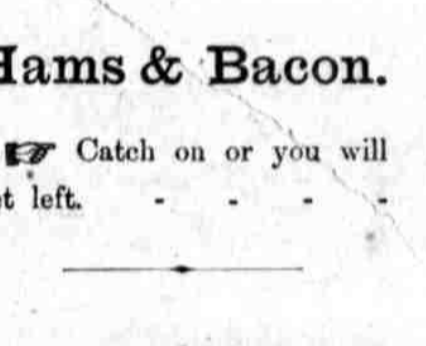

THE WATERFRONT

WHITE CRUISER CHARLESTON IN PORT.

Barquentine S. G. Wilder from the Coast-Bark Highland Light With Coal from Newcastle.

Salutes were exchanged between the U S cruiser Charleston and the shore battery this morning.

Captain Calhoun of the bark Ceylon expects to sail tomorrow for San Francisco, with a full cargo of sugar.

Tomorrow—High tide large, 6:32 a. m.; high tide small, 11:59 p. m.; low tide large, 5:38 a. m.; low tide small, 7:25 p. m.

Yesterday afternoon, the barkentine S G Wilder, 11 days from San Francisco, arrived. She will discharge at Brewer's wharf.

The Lehu put 1500 bags Honoum sugar into the Commodore, and the Kilauoa Hou 3334 bags Laupahoehoe sugar into the Irngard, today.

The steamer Keaouhu arrived from the Garden Isle this morning with a cargo of sugar, paddy and rice. She returns to Kilauoa this evening.

As an old friend, the U S S Charleston will be welcomed in Honolulu. The big white cruiser of Uncle Sam's navy arrived in last night, about 12 days from Yokohama.

Engineer Farnsworth of the Elen, with the assistance of Pilot McCauley, attempted to become the master of a "bike" this morning. Although not entirely successful, he may become a speedy rider.

There are about 3300 bags more sugar at Kilauoa, where the Keaouhu goes tonight for another cargo. Makaweli has about 650 tons more to grind, and Lihue and Hanalei have about finished.

After several delays, the Japanese S S Toyo Maru got away for Japan at 5 o'clock yesterday evening, with a couple of hundred of the small men and women of the "land of the chrysanthemum" as passengers.

The American bark Highland Light, Captain John Hughes, 60 days out from Newcastle, N S W, arrived in the harbor at noon. She brings 125 tons of coal, consigned to order. The captain is accompanied by his wife.

The British ship Glenfinart, Captain Longmuir, and the German ship Marie Hackfeld, Captain Wolters, arrived at Cork on May 18th. Both vessels left San Francisco together on January 22d. In a few hours after sailing they parted company and did not see each other again during the passage.

They arrived at Cork within a few hours of each other. Both Captains report having experienced fine weather during their passages. On comparing notes of their passages the captain of the Glenfinart ascertained that in passing certain places such as Cape Horn, Falkland Islands, the equator and the Western Islands, their positions were often reversed, the German being ahead at one place, while the British vessel was leading at another.

IN THE HIGHER COURTS

EQUITY SUIT TO WIND UP RECIPROCIY SUGAR COMPANY.

Japanese Made Bankrupt—Case of Director—An Attorney on Supreme Court Bench.

Judge Perry has adjudged Tokodaki bankrupt.

Joseph Luahiwa has brought an action for divorce against his wife Annie.

Attorney W. R. Castle is sitting with Justices Frear and Whiting, in the Supreme Court, owing to disqualification of Chief Justice Judd, for the hearing of A. F. Judd et al. vs. C. A. Brown, reserved questions of law. Kinney & Ballou for plaintiff, Magoon & Edings for defendant.

C. Brewer & Co., Ltd., A. S. Wilcox, G. N. Wilcox, H. P. Baldwin and Welch & Co. have brought a bill in equity against the Reciprocity Sugar Co., for the appointment of a receiver to wind up the business of the Company and to distribute its assets. The plaintiffs are all stockholders in the defendant corporation, with the exception of Welch & Co. of San Francisco. They hold mortgage bonds of the Company, amounting to \$150,000 drawing interest at eight per cent per annum, in the following proportions: C. Brewer & Co., \$32,000; H. P. Baldwin, G. N. Wilcox and A. S. Wilcox each \$31,000, and Welch & Co. \$25,000. The company owed C. Brewer & Co. as its agents \$37,888.69 on May 17, and the latter under agreement had given them ninety days' notice ending with that date to stop further advances. Between that and the date of filing this complaint \$6618.82 additional advances had been made. Complainants offered on May 17 to throw off \$62,888.69 from the sum total of their claims if the defendant corporation would make provision for the immediate payment of the remainder of the indebtedness, but, up to the date of suit, the company had been unable to do anything to liquidate its indebtedness or accept the offer of the complainants.

Service of summons was made on the Reciprocity Sugar Company, through W. R. Castle its secretary, on Tuesday of this week.

GRADUATING EXERCISES.

Pauahi Hall Filled With Friends of the Class.

The graduating exercises of the class of 1896 of Oahu college took place at Pauahi hall last evening in the presence of a large audience.

The class was composed of Albert Fayerweather Afong, Thomas Huddy Bartow, William Richards Castle, Jr., Anna Isabella Forbes, Charles Edward Hapai, Mary Ethelwynn Rice and Clifton Howard Tracy.

The exercises commenced with an organ solo by Prof. Ingalls and the invocation delivered by Dr. Hyde. After a song by the College Glee Club, which was encored, came an address by Inspector-general of schools H. M. Townsend, who took for his subject "Purpose." The address was full of good advice to the young graduates.

After a selection by the College Orchestra by Professor Berger, Professor Hosmer announced that the prizes for the year in English composition, rhetoric, declamation and debate were awarded as follows: First prize, Miss Carrie Howland; second prize, divided between W. B. Gouffrey and A. W. Fook.
