The Advertiser gives implied praise to the police for their alacrity in catching two pigs in front of the station. Were the pigs greased, or the gallant officers' palms? Our contemporary's editorials occasionally seem to omit the main point.

Among the statutes passed at the late session of the British Parliament was one "to regulate the sale of horseflesh for human food." Wonder if Anglomaniacs on this side of the Atlantic would say neigh to horse steak?

Funny, is it not? The Advertiser claims a Reform Party victory, but says the action of the beaten party has dished the treaty at Washington! If the National Reform Party is so influential in defeat, what a great power would it not be in victory?

If you would hear a five o'clock tea gossip, listen to this chirruping in the Advertiser: "THE BULLETIN'S correspondents never seem to have any point to their communications. Slang and cuss words are all they generally contain." "Never," that is, "hardly ever," the antithesis of "generally!" Good boy! Now turn up "cuss" in the dictionary.

Mr. Theo. H. Davies has contributed to the Advertiser a calm and forcible protest against the now defunct draft of treaty ceding the independence of the country. He was absent when the question was alive, but, as the Advertiser first gave the intelligence that the scheme was killed in the same issue with his letter, Mr. Davies expressed his views as one deeply interested in the country's welfare.

WHY NOT HERE?

In some sugar-raising countries of experience it has been decided that it is better to keep the planting and manufacturing interests separate, than to join the two in one. That is, for the planter to be simply a raiser of sugar cane, and the mill owner simply a converter of the cane into sugar, the latter purchasing the cane of the former or making it into sugar for him at a price. In fact, doing what is almost universally done in wheat-growing countries by wheat farmers and millers.

This system is apparently not much in favor here, a very limited number of plantations being conducted upon it. Some years ago it was considerably talked about, and quite a number of experiments in that line were inaugurated; but most of those who engaged in planting on shares ultimately gave it up, many having first sunk all the capital they had at the start.

Now, what was the cause of the failure? Is there any sufficient reason why the system which is pronounced the most satisfactory elsewhere should not prove equally satisfactory here? Are there conditions peculiar to the country which make it inoperative? These are questions which practical and experienced planters are the most competent to answer. Undoubtedly, extravagance barred the success of

many a man who began sugar culture on these islands with hopeful prospects. In numerous instances where failure occurred, practical experience of the industry, combined with economical management, might have led on to fortune. This applies both to planters who planted for mills owned by others and to planters who planted for their own mills. But aside from these indicated causes of failure, those who confined themselves to planting were heavily handicapped by the terms imposed by the mills. The latter look the lion's share of the sugar for their part. We are aware of no conditions peculiar to the country which necessarily prevent arrangements equitable to planter and manufacturer, by which each may secure his fair proportion of returns of capital and labor, and by keeping the two departments harmoniously separate make them work together to the satisfaction of both.

CERTIFICATE FROM 'WAY BACK.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—It is not at all surprising that the party, so unexpectedly defeated in the late campaign, should seek consolation from some source. Its leaders had a premonition that they might require the aid of one whose skill had been tried and never found wanting. Looking back a few years they found this testimonial to the adroitness of one, who, having in some way "found who his friends" were, is a marked example of one that may be a truly "reformed" partisan. Don't print this endorsement of the "candidate of 80 lunas" lest you have a libel suit on your hands, unless indeed published Parliamentary proceedings are privileged. Here it is:

...with his characteristic gentleness and sense of fairness moved that the resolution be adopted and the previous question be put. If the member from H... was a stiff, cold corpse, and a question should come up within sound of him involving the personal character of a man, and that man had no opportunity to speak in self-defense, I should expect that the Hon. J. L. K... 's blackened and shriveled lips would form themselves into a motion for the 'previous question,' and his bony skeleton hand be raised to vote in favor of his own motion. For the sake of the reputation of our native country and the Hawaiian race, I am glad that the mover of this motion was not a native Hawaiian, but the son of an alien."

When the Reform nominations for Oahu were made there was much curiosity to know if it were a truce, or a treaty of perpetual peace between the two—the above belligerents. The G. O. P. has found instant and pressing need of all the tact and parliamentary experience it can command, and by a most striking coincidence, the very man who excels in the use of that parliamentary bludgeon, "previous question," is in the floor. The organization of an evenly divided House is at stake, which makes it hazardous to wait for the action of the Parliament itself to judge the qualification of its own members. The "previous question," as it were, is moved in the Police Court. Of course the claimant's learned counsel did not consent to answer there unless the law so provided. SEVERAL MILLIONS UNINVESTED.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—While conversing with a well-informed gentleman of the city, I was surprised to hear him say that there were fourteen millions of uninvested capital lying idle in the hands of four or five missionary firms, belonging to themselves and to others of the same stripe. Coming from the source it did, and knowing the usurious nature of the professed Christian of to-day, at least here in Hawaii, I was led to look back and study the character of the present possessors of so much wealth in so short a period, and the source from which this amount of capital received its start. to believe by them as a fact. Naturally enough, in my contemplations at such unprecedented success among missionaries in the things of this world, I looked up the life and example of the Great Moral Teacher, whom these professors had led the poor and uninitiated Hawaiians to believe they were humbly following, to see how much worldly wealth he enjoyed and left to his immediate followers when he was here on earth. I was more than astonished to see the difference between Him, whom these missionaries called their Master, and then the professing disciples. In glancing over the pages of the good Book, to see what amount of property the apostles left to be divided among their followers, I was surprised that they too only owned a staff and a scrip, and in ruminating over the precious volume, I came across what one of them said about riches and their results to those who would be heaping them up just about this time. His Christian name was James, and if the reader will take the trouble he can readily verify the quotation by looking at the fifth chapter of a book which he wrote A. D. 60. The quotation is as follows: "Go to now, ye rich men, weep and howl for your miseries that shall come upon you. Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are moth eaten. Your gold and silver is cankered, and the rust of them shall be a witness against you, and shall eat your flesh as it were with fire. Ye have heaped treasures together for the last days. Behold the hire of the laborers who have reaped down your fields, which is of and kept back by fraud, crieth; you the cries of them which have reaped are entered into the ears of the Lord of Sabaoth. Ye have lived in pleasure on the earth, and been wanton, ye have nourished your heart as in a day of slaughter. Ye have condemned and killed the just; and he doth not resist you."

ALOHA AUSTRALIA.

The steamer Australia sailed at noon to-day. The usual crowd thronged the wharf and besieged the vessel. Berger's band sent forth the sweet strains which have ever lent a sentimental aspect to the steamer embarkations. To the casual, uninterested visitor the scene was but one of many similar episodes incident to commerce. Many a passenger walked up the gangplank with a consciousness that this foreign trip, is a slight variation of business routine. To such this voyage is fraught with no special significance. But to many this embarkation is a turning point, an epoch. Many a life may really commence to-day and the voyage across the sea may bring the traveler nearer to objects unattainable here. The great ship loses its grasp on the shore and is soon adrift. The pallid cheek which attracted so many sympathetic glances may elsewhere acquire a rosy hue. And the bounding pulse which denoted such excess of vitality here, may in another clime slow its beat at the behest of sickness. Hands waving kerchiefs on wharf and vessel may never again know a mutual clasp. All sail for San Francisco and yet to some its beautiful land-locked harbor is a haven of joy while to others it is a refuge of despair. Hearts are wrung with grief and faces are wreathed with smiles on the same wharf and vessel. And the band played on, performing its prelude to joyful dramas and swelling with its forebodings of sad tragedies. Shore and ship divide, the music ceases, the curtain rings down, and the audience disperses.

THE MIKADO.

A rehearsal of the Mikado took place last night at the Arion Hall. The solo cast embraces nine and the entire number of singers on the stage will be about fifty. The rehearsal showed the effect of judicious direction on good voices. Despite the depletion of number from unavoidable absence the ladies sang their choruses with marked vigor. The choruses of males and the joint choruses of the sexes were very effective and the blending of voices admirable. The solo parts have been assigned to good voices. The catching melodies are interpreted with chic and spirit. Without doubt proper dramatic rendition will supplement the melodious vocalization. The performance may be expected in about three weeks.

HAWAIIAN-BOUND VESSEL IN DISTRESS.

Mr. F. W. Prescott, His Majesty's Consul at Dover, G. B., has written under date of January 27 as follows to His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs: "I have the honor to state that the German bark Adonis of and from Bremen for Honolulu, with a general cargo and two passengers, put into this port yesterday through stress of weather.

"The master reports that a succession of strong contrary gales have been encountered, and although the ship has been at sea for thirty days she has only now got 300 miles from the port of departure. She will require sundry small damages and sail for Honolulu first opportunity."

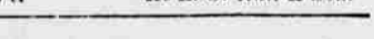

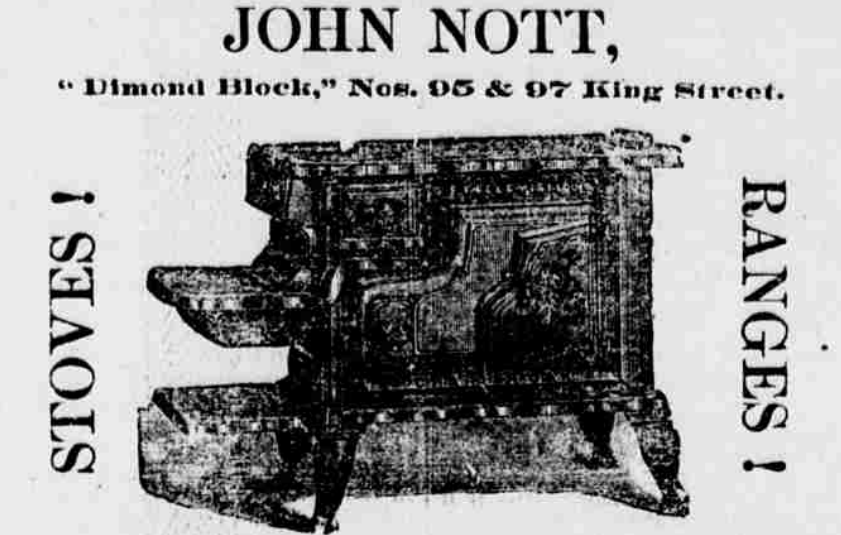
