China Submits.

HONG KONG, June 14.—An imperial edict grants all the powers' demands. The signature to the treaty will be completed at the end of June.

Chinese literary and military examinations will be suspended for five years in all provinces where there has been anti-foreign riots since 1900.

LONDON, June 14.—In the House of Commons Lord Cranborne stated that the allies had agreed upon the necessity of maintaining 6,000 troops in North China.

HONG KONG, June 14.—The permanent garrison remaining in Tien tsin consists of the Hongkong Regiment and the Thirty-first Madras Infantry with pom-poms. At Shanhaikwan the garrison consists of the Fourth Gurkha Infantry.

At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

ATTACKING ASHFORD.

We were surprised to see Mr. Thurston's organ becoming uneasy because a "C. V. Ashford" is booked for Honolulu on the passenger list of the Sonoma. Mr.—who was one of Mr. C.W. Ashford's political friends, need not go into the trouble of publishing false statements against the gentleman who for a number of years was the bosom friend of the "missionaries" and the main stay in their "revolutions," when Thurston was always unavoidably sick and in bed, and General Hartwell absent from the country of course. We differed politically with Ashford in the days gone by, because he affiliated with the Thurston crowd and rendered his valuable services to the "missionaries," who eventually threw him over and cast him in jail. We have not communicated with Mr. Ashford very frequently since 1895, and we admit that his "conspiracy" with Morrow and Markoe, whoever that may be has never reached us. Mr. Thurston's vicious paragraph against his "pal" reads as follows:

"Is Clarence W. Ashford really coming back to Honolulu? The name 'C. V. Ashford' appears on the passenger list of the Sonoma, as made up at the time of the departure of the Gaelic from San Francisco for this port. Ashford has made so many promises within the past year to return that even with his name on the passenger list those who know him are loth to believe that he is really intending to set foot on the shores which, for a few years, had been denied him. After the revolution of '95 the two Ashfords, among many others, were banished. V. V. Ashford has since died. Clarence Ashford was at one time Attorney General for a period of three years.

"Clarence Ashford is a graduate of the law department of the University of Michigan. He practiced law for some time with Hon. S. L. Kilbourn of Lansing, Mich, and subsequently with his uncle, Judge Ashford of Marysville, Cal, coming here from the latter place in January, 1883. He was in Judge Hartwell's office for a time, awaiting settlement of a difficulty with the Judicial Department of the Government regarding admission to the Bar, the Supreme Court holding that an alien could not be admitted. To save a diplomatic question, under the British treaty which gave to British subjects equal rights with Hawaiian, the King gave him letters of denization, the first issued within forty years. After that he practiced law with his brother, except for the three years during which he served as Attorney General. He was always busy in politics against the

'missionaries' and at last accounts wanted to organize the Democratic party here. During his residence in San Francisco after 1895, Ashford became conspicuous in a scheme to filibuster against Hawaii; Morrow and Markoe, the latter being billeted in case he restored Liliuokalani to the throne for 'Prince of Honolulu,' being among his associates.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Who is Bill Ass or Azbill or what ever alias he may use, that this community and the authorities should ruin the town by allowing him to, as a cheap advertising for his hash house, tell us how to run this community on a 'moral' plan as he considers morale. We predict that within a few months Honolulu will be a most vicious town and that the Azbill supporters will be only too anxious to have the High Sheriff re-establish the Iwilei stockade and drive the prostitutes, necessary in this town, from off our streets. When the men who were the patrons of Iwilei have entered some of the houses of the "reformers" and done their deadly work to the ruin of decent women and when the young scions of the goody, goody reformers have to ask their papa's to pay doctor bills, and expenses of going to sulphur spring then a general howl will arise against Azbill, the Castles, the ignorant parsons, who most likely are not any too good when the curtain is dropped, and then we will find that irreparable mischief has been done and the most virtuous H. E. Cooper will receive the credit for this damnable state of affair.

We think it is high time that Mr. Reynolds, the superintendent of the Leper Settlement, should receive a well-earned and permanent vacation. We understand that he had resigned but it is not visible to the naked eye that he has been granted his request and been told to "git." We hear that he has in his usual tyrannical manner confiscated all of the taro planted by Ambrose Hutchison in the Waikolu valley on Molokai. The high handed action, it is alleged, was caused by the planter refusing to sign a voucher for 80 bundles of paia which would be three fourths of the taro belonging to the planter, and which was pulled while unripe and wantonly destroyed. It is high time that a new system be inaugurated at the Settlement. The people there should be treated with fairness, justice and kindness. They are not criminals. They are simply unfortunate sufferers of a gruesome disease. Let a board of commissioners be appointed to adjudicate all grievances, difficulties and misunderstandings between leper and leper, and between the lepers and the management and the "living tomb" at Kalaupapa will not be so unbearable to the sick as it now is.

Maoris Will Bathe.

ROTORUA, June 14—Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall spent an exciting but pleasant time at Rotorua and vicinity today. It was a hurry-scurry from one place of interest to another, in order to cover as many of the sights as possible in the time available, but withal the day's outing was most enjoyable and crammed full of interest for the Royal visitors and suite, who were introduced to scenes of natural grandeur and phases of human life and character which they had never before seen, and which can be witnessed in no other part of the world. In spite of the gloomy forebodings of the previous day the morning broke beautifully fine. Nothing could have been more miserable or uninviting than Rotorua on Thursday night. It was one continuous down-pour of rain. Yet this morning the sun came out brightly, and throughout the day the weather was pleasant, the only drawback being that the roads were heavy, and in some cases little better than a quagmire. On this account the decision of last night to strike out the Waitapu

trip was adhered to, and the program followed for the day was: A visit to the baths, the opening of the Duchess bath and drive through the Sanatorium ground; a visit to Ohinamutu, where a brief Maori ceremony took place; a visit to the sights of dances and haka, a small portion of the elaborate program which has been prepared for the Royal Highnesses by the Maoris. The principal part of the Maori display will be given tomorrow morning. From the race-course the Royal party drove back to the Grand Hotel to lunch. Immediately after lunch their Highnesses and party started for Tikitere, going across the lake and returning by boat. The start from the Grand Hotel was made at 10 o'clock. Their Royal Highnesses rode in an open coach, accompanied by the Governor and suite, and a number of officers from the visiting warships followed in similar vehicles.

THE DUCHESS BATH.

The first stop was at the new bath, which has been constructed in the Sanitarium grounds in honor of the Royal visit. The Duchess turned the key, and by request of the Government, named the bath "The Duchess Bath." The new bath is a great improvement on any of the present Rotorua baths. It is 40 feet by 20 feet. It is supplied with Racheal water, fitted with electric light, and covered in, the roof being high, giving the bath a fine roomy appearance. There are six dressing rooms, three on each side of the bath. These at present are most elegantly furnished. The bath has been placed close to the old baths in the Sanatorium grounds. The Royal visitors and party entered immediately on the Duchess turning the key, and their Royal Highnesses were shown over the building by Dr. Kenny.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS

The band will play at Thomas Square this evening.

Customs inspector L. N. Gay left for Maui yesterday on official business in connection with a vessel loading at Kaunapali.

The Pacific Heights railroad is now connected with the terminus of the Hawaiian Tramways Company on Nuuanuu street.

The ship "Hawaiian Isles" was towed into port yesterday afternoon by the Fearless. She was fifty-two days out from New South Wales with a cargo of three thousand tons of coal.

The Sierra arrived from the colonies last evening and left for San Francisco at noon today. The big steamer took away the Zealandia freight and a large number of passengers.

The final examinations at the St. Louis College and St. Francis School, will be held on Thursday at 9 a. m. The drawings and paintings will be on exhibition in the College hall on that day.

A Hawaiian who had been ill for some time was taken to the Queen's Hospital yesterday but died in the back before he reached the hospital. He was an elderly man evidently suffering from heart trouble.

Frank C. Atherton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Atherton, and Miss Eleanor A. Simpson were married at the bride's home in Ohio, on June 19. Their honey-moon tour will be extended to England and Scotland.

The offices of W. G. Irwin & Co. looked like the box office of an Opera Company last night. There was a string of people from Willet's office to the Irwin block anxiously awaiting a chance to get a passage on the Sierra.

Governor Cooper, who seems to be a tool of a number of cranky persons and reformers, masquerading under the name of the Honolulu Protective League, yesterday pardoned two Japanese who were found guilty in Judge Eling's Court in October last of participating in a riot. The reformers may soon have a riot.

From the Transvaal

LONDON, June 14.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Balfour, in replying to Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman, said the Boers were scattered over the Orange River and Transvaal colonies, and small portions of Cape Colony in commandos of 100 and 200, the largest mentioned being 600 strong. It was estimated that the total number of Boers in the field was 17,000. The rumors regarding peace negotiations were baseless.

LONDON, June 14.—Colonel Scobell, at dawn on the 6th, surprised Lotter's, one of Krutzinger's commandos, consisting of 400, laagered in a valley at Kingscrown, preparing to attack Barkly East. The Boer pickets on a hill gave warning.

Colonel Scobell sent a squadron of Cape Mounted Rifles, under Captain Lukin, to reconnoiter the main column. Descending the hills in the darkness, Captain Lukin shouting "hands up," charged with his squadron.

The enemy bolted, leaving their spare horses and 13,000 rounds of ammunition. Fourteen prisoners were taken and a gun. At sunrise the British completed the rout of the Boers.

BERLIN, June 13.—The press is furious at the Transvaal Concessions Commission's report, because it upsets recent speculations in connection with the Netherlands Railway.

The Chinese Loan.

PARIS, June 14.—Satisfaction is expressed in France at the British proposal with reference to the China settlement, otherwise Great Britain and France would have been virtually the sole guarantors of the loan.

Closing Accounts.

All about \$9,838 60 of the deposits made in the Postal Savings Bank during the days of the Republic has been paid back to the depositors, and on July 1 this amount will be turned over to the Territorial Treasurer. An urgent call is made by the officials who have been handling the deposits for depositors to present their certificates and take away this balance in order that the books of the defunct bank can be closed forever.

Already \$754,731.71 has been paid back to depositors since Hawaii became a Territory, \$200,000 of which represents the amount paid back to the order of the Immigration Board for the return of Chinese laborers to their native land. This money was deposited by a law of the Republic compelling contract laborers to return to their homes.

An Important Resolution.

In the House of Representatives Mr. Kelikoa introduced the following resolution which was adopted by a vote of 26 ayes and 2 noes.

"Resolved, by the House of Representatives, and concurred in by the Senate, that it is the opinion of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii that the annexation of the Territory of California is contrary to the rights of the citizens and residents of Hawaii.

"And be it further resolved that one copy of this concurrent resolution may be transmitted to the President of the United States, one copy to the president of the Senate, one copy to the speaker of the House of Representatives, and one copy to the delegate of the Territory of Hawaii."

China Submits.

HONG KONG, June 14.—An imperial edict grants all the powers' demands. The signature to the treaty will be completed at the end of June.

Chinese literary and military examinations will be suspended for five years in all provinces where there has been anti-foreign riots since 1900.

LONDON, June 14.—In the House of Commons Lord Cranborne stated that the allies had agreed upon the necessity of maintaining 6000 troops in North China.

HONG KONG, June 14.—The permanent garrison remaining in Tien tsin consists of the Hongkong Regiment and the Thirty-first Madras Infantry with pom-poms. At Shanhaikwan the garrison consists of the Fourth Gurkha Infantry.

At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

ATTACKING ASHFORD.

We were surprised to see Mr. Thurston's organ becoming uneasy because a "C. V. Ashford" is booked for Honolulu on the passenger list of the Sonoma. Mr.—who was one of Mr. C.W. Ashford's political friends, need not go into the trouble of publishing false statements against the gentleman who for a number of years was the bosom friend of the "missionaries" and the main stay in their "revolutions," when Thurston was always unavoidably sick and in bed, and General Hartwell absent from the country of course. We differed politically with Ashford in the days gone by, because he affiliated with the Thurston crowd and rendered his valuable services to the "missionaries," who eventually threw him over and cast him in jail. We have not communicated with Mr. Ashford very frequently since 1895, and we admit that his "conspiracy" with Morrow and Markoe, whoever that may be has never reached us. Mr. Thurston's vicious paragraph against his "pal" reads as follows:

"Is Clarence W. Ashford really coming back to Honolulu? The name 'C. V. Ashford' appears on the passenger list of the Sonoma as made up at the time of the departure of the Gaelic from San Francisco for this port. Ashford has made so many promises within the past year to return that even with his name on the passenger list those who know him are loth to believe that he is really intending to set foot on the shores which, for a few years, had been denied him. After the revolution of '95 the two Ashfords, among many others, were banished. V. V. Ashford has since died. Clarence Ashford was at one time Attorney General for a period of three years.

"Clarence Ashford is a graduate of the law department of the University of Michigan. He practiced law for some time with Hon. S. L. Kilbourn of Lansing, Mich., and subsequently with his uncle, Judge Ashford of Marysville, Cal., coming here from the latter place in January, 1883. He was in Judge Hartwell's office for a time, awaiting settlement of a difficulty with the Judicial Department of the Government regarding admission to the Bar, the Supreme Court holding that an alien could not be admitted. To save a diplomatic question, under the British treaty which gave to British subjects equal rights with Hawaiians, the King gave him letters of denization, the first issued within forty years. After that he practiced law with his brother, except for the three years during which he served as Attorney General. He was always busy in politics against the

'missionaries' and at last accounts wanted to organize the Democratic party here. During his residence in San Francisco after 1895, Ashford became conspicuous in a scheme to filibuster against Hawaii; Morrow and Markoe, the latter being billeted in case he restored Liliuokalani to the throne for 'Prince of Honolulu,' being among his associates.

Who is Bill Ass or Azbill or what ever alias he may use, that this community and the authorities should ruin the town by allowing him to, as a cheap advertising for his hash house, tell us how to run this community on a 'moral' plan as he considers morals. We predict that within a few months Honolulu will be a most vicious town and that the Azbill supporters will be only too anxious to have the High Sheriff re-establish the Iwilei stockade and drive the prostitutes, necessary in this town, from off our streets. When the men who were the patrons of Iwilei have entered some of the houses of the "reformers" and done their deadly work to the ruin of decent women and when the young scions of the goody, goody reformers have to ask their papas to pay doctor bills, and expenses of going to sulphur spring then a general howl will arise against Azbill, the Castles, the ignorant parsons, who most likely are not any too good when the curtain is dropped, and then we will find that irreparable mischief has been done and the most virtuous H. E. Cooper will receive the credit for this damnable state of affair.

We think it is high time that Mr. Reynolds, the superintendent of the Leper Settlement, should receive a well-earned and permanent vacation. We understand that he had resigned but it is not visible to the naked eye that he has been granted his request and been told to "git." We hear that he has in his usual tyrannical manner confiscated all of the taro planted by Ambrose Hutchison in the Waikolu valley on Molokai. The high handed action, it is alleged, was caused by the planter refusing to sign a voucher for 80 bundles of paia which would be three fourths of the taro belonging to the planter, and which was pulled while unripe and wantonly destroyed. It is high time that a new system be inaugurated at the Settlement. The people there should be treated with fairness, justice and kindness. They are not criminals. They are simply unfortunate sufferers of a gruesome disease. Let a board of commissioners be appointed to adjudicate all grievances, difficulties and misunderstandings between leper and leper, and between the lepers and the management and the "living tomb" at Kalaupapa will not be so unbearable to the sick as it now is.

Maoris Will Baths.

ROTORUA, June 14.—Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall spent an exciting but pleasant time at Rotorua and vicinity today. It was a hurry-scurry from one place of interest to another, in order to cover as many of the sights as possible in the time available, but withal the day's outing was most enjoyable and crammed full of interest for the Royal visitors and suite, who were introduced to scenes of natural grandeur and phases of human life and character which they had never before seen, and which can be witnessed in no other part of the world. In spite of the gloomy forebodings of the previous day the morning broke beautifully fine. Nothing could have been more miserable or uninviting than Rotorua on Thursday night. It was one continuous down-pour of rain. Yet this morning the sun came out brightly, and throughout the day the weather was pleasant, the only drawback being that the roads were heavy, and in some cases little better than a quagmire. On this account the decision of last night to strike out the Waiotapu

trip was adhered to, and the program followed for the day was: A visit to the baths, the opening of the Duchess bath and drive through the Sanatorium ground; a visit to Ohinamutu, where a brief Maori ceremony took place; a visit to the sights of dances and haka, a small portion of the elaborate program which has been prepared for the Royal Highnesses by the Maoris. The principal part of the Maori display will be given tomorrow morning. From the race-course the Royal party drove back to the Grand Hotel to lunch. Immediately after lunch their Highnesses and party started for Tikitere, going across the lake and returning by boat. The start from the Grand Hotel was made at 10 o'clock. Their Royal Highnesses rode in an open coach, accompanied by the Governor and suite, and a number of officers from the visiting warships followed in similar vehicles.

THE DUCHESS BATH

The first stop was at the new bath, which has been constructed in the Sanatorium grounds in honor of the Royal visit. The Duchess turned the key, and by request of the Government, named the bath "The Duchess Bath." The new bath is a great improvement on any of the present Rotorua baths. It is 40 feet by 20 feet. It is supplied with Roshel water, fitted with electric light, and covered in, the roof being high, giving the bath a fine roomy appearance. There are six dressing rooms, three on each side of the bath. These at present are most elegantly furnished. The bath has been placed close to the old baths in the Sanatorium grounds. The Royal visitors and party entered immediately on the Duchess turning the key, and their Royal Highnesses were shown over the building by Dr. Kenny.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS

The band will play at Thomas Square this evening.

Customs inspector L. N. Gay left for Maui yesterday on official business in connection with a vessel loading at Kaosapali.

The Pacific Heights railroad is now connected with the terminus of the Hawaiian Tramways Company on Nuuanuu street.

The ship "Hawaiian Isles" was towed into port yesterday afternoon by the Fearless. She was fifty-two days out from New South Wales with a cargo of three thousand tons of coal.

The Sierra arrived from the colonies last evening and left for San Francisco at noon today. The big steamer took away the Zealandia freight and a large number of passengers.

The final examinations at the St. Louis College and St. Francis School, will be held on Thursday at 9 a. m. The drawings and paintings will be on exhibition in the College hall on that day.

A Hawaiian who had been ill for some time was taken to the Queen's Hospital yesterday but died in the hack before he reached the hospital. He was an elderly man evidently suffering from heart trouble.

Frank C. Atherton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Atherton, and Miss Eleanor A. Simpson were married at the bride's home in Ohio, on June 19. Their honey-moon tour will be extended to England and Scotland.

The offices of W. G. Irwin & Co. looked like the box office of an Opera Company last night. There was a string of people from Willet's office to the Irwin block anxiously awaiting a chance to get a passage on the Sierra.

Governor Cooper, who seems to be a tool of a number of cranky persons and reformers, masquerading under the name of the Honolulu Protective League, yesterday pardoned two Japanese who were found guilty in Judge Eling's Court in October last of participating in a riot. The reformers may soon have a riot.

From the Transvaal

LONDON, June 14.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Balfour, in replying to Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman, said the Boers were scattered over the Orange River and Transvaal colonies, and small portions of Cape Colony in commandos of 100 and 200, the largest mentioned being 600 strong. It was estimated that the total number of Boers in the field was 17,000. The rumors regarding peace negotiations were baseless.

LONDON, June 14.—Colonel Scobell, at dawn on the 6th, surprised Lotter's, one of Krutzinger's commandos, consisting of 400, lagged in a valley at Kingscrown, preparing to attack Barkly East. The Boer pickets on a hill gave warning.

Colonel Scobell sent a squadron of Cape Mounted Rifles, under Captain Lukin, to reconnoiter the main column. Descending the hills in the darkness, Captain Lukin shouting "hands up," charged with his squadron.

The enemy bolted, leaving their spare horses and 13,000 rounds of ammunition. Fourteen prisoners were taken and a gun. At sunrise the British completed the rout of the Boers.

BERLIN, June 13.—The press is furious at the Transvaal Concessions Commission's report, because it upsets recent speculations in connection with the Netherlands Railway.

The Chinese Loan.

PARIS, June 14.—Satisfaction is expressed in France at the British proposal with reference to the China settlement, otherwise Great Britain and France would have been virtually the sole guarantors of the loan.

The Y. M. I. Smoker.

An excellent program was rendered last night at Progress Hall by the young people who constitute the Damien Council, No. 563, Young Men's Institute. The music was very fine and the addresses were delivered in a manner which proved the brightness and talent of the members. Mr. Barry, who is the president of the Institute made a very pleasing address, and C. M. White, who is not a member, made one of his witty and brilliant talks which put the audience in good humor and gained the talented poet of the railroad a round of enthusiastic applause, deserved because he didn't recite any of his own "poems." "Jim" Thomp on the clerk of the Court is entitled to great credit for the success of the "smoker." Everything went off in an exceptional fine style and all hoped that the "smoker" will be repeated in a not far future.

Closing Accounts.

All about \$9,888.60 of the deposits made in the Postal Savings Bank during the days of the Republic has been paid back to the depositors, and on July 1 this amount will be turned over to the Territorial Treasurer. An urgent call is made by the officials who have been handling the deposits for depositors to present their certificates and take away this balance in order that the books of the defunct bank can be closed forever.

Already \$754,781.71 has been paid back to depositors since Hawaii became a Territory, \$200,000 of which represents the amount paid back to the order of the Immigration Board for the return of Chinese laborers to their native land. This money was deposited by a law of the Republic compelling contract laborers to return to their homes.

An Important Resolution.

In the House of Representatives Mr. Keliikoa introduced the following resolution which was adopted by a vote of 26 ayes and 2 noes.

"Resolved, by the House of Representatives, and concurred in by the Senate, that it is the opinion of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii that the annexation of the Territory of Hawaii to the State of California is contrary to the rights of the citizens and residents of Hawaii.

"And be it further resolved that one copy of this concurrent resolution may be transmitted to the President of the United States, one copy to the president of the Senate, one copy to the speaker of the House of Representatives, and one copy to the delegate of the Territory of Hawaii."

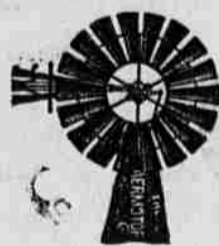
