Queen Liliuokalani and a party of other friends, having received invitation of Mr. Imamura, the high priest of bonze of the islands, was in attendance, and sat at the left of the altar. Dr. Marques, president of the Theosophical Society, and Mrs. Marques were also invited guests.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Some one in the Thurston ring seems to feel bad because the price on opium is on the decrease. Who can it be?

We wish some of the "haoles" who call Hawaiians shiftless, lazy and impetuous had been present at the celebration of the silver wedding of George C. Beckley yesterday. They would have found bright lawyers, contractors, ranchers, capitalists all with the Hawaiian blood in their veins. And in the host they would have found a man who, through hard work from boyhood and not through patronage or college education, has proven himself an honor to his race, to his country, and to his noble ancestors.

The exhibition given on Saturday afternoon by the Fearless acting as a fire boat showed the efficiency of the apparatus on board the fine tug boat. Six hoses were throwing out strong streams at one time and it is to be hoped that the Legislature will pass a sufficient appropriation to secure the services of the tug as a fire boat. Millions of dollars would go up in smoke if a fire should start on the waterfront and a strong breeze blowing. The ships in the harbor, the wharves, the dock-sheds, the lumber yards and possibly many warehouses would be in ashes if no well equipped fire boat was available. The Commissioners of the Fire Department favor the idea greatly and we believe the Underwriters have signified their willingness to assist substantially in getting more hose for the tug. A petition, signed by all the big merchant houses of the city was presented in the House of Representatives today by Mr. Mossman, and in the interest of the community we hope that the Legislature will pass an appropriation to secure the services of the tug and thereby at some future day avoid or minimize what would prove a great calamity, the danger of the destruction of the shipping and the docks by fire. We expect of course that some legislator will say that there is no money to spare for the purpose. We believe that if the appropriation asked for is inserted in the bill and becomes law, that the merchants who signed the petition would be willing to temporarily advance the money asked for with the understanding that it should be reimbursed when the treasury is in a better condition. It is a matter that the underwriters and the whole community should consider in a most serious manner and no stone should be left unturned to secure the means with which to protect the waterfront, the shipping and perhaps the whole city against a possible conflagration.

BECKLEY'S SILVER WEDDING.

The Grand Jury

The Grand Jury continued its investigation of the alleged bribes of Legislators this morning and several witnesses were examined. Before opening its session the Jury appeared before Judge Humphreys and reported that J. A. McCandless had declined to answer certain important questions, holding that he was privileged because he at the time was a member of the Governor's Council. The Judge immediately issued a citation for McCandless to appear in the Circuit Court tomorrow and show cause.

The Jury also stated that a letter had been received from E. P. Dole placing the services of Deputy Attorney General Cathcart at the disposal of the Grand Jury.

Senator Baldwin returned from Kawai yesterday.

The Peru sailed yesterday morning for the Orient.

The Mauna Ala arrived this morning from San Francisco.

The Kawehameha defeated the Punahou at a baseball match on Saturday.

The Batchelors defeated the Benedicts at the cricket match on Saturday afternoon.

The comet is out of sight. It has gone to the Waianae mountains to recuperate its failing health.

The Hilo horses did not come on the Kinau, as was expected, and it is reported that Socialist has not yet arrived in Hilo.

The four masted schooner Kona, built by Hay & Wright for Hinds, Rolph & Co., was launched on the 11th instant at Alameda Point.

Owing to the serious illness of J. F. Morgau the band will not play at Emma Square this evening but at the Hawaiian Hotel. Mr. Morgau's residence adjoins the square.

The H. Fischlaeger Co. calls special attention in this issue to the excellent claret and best beer offered in this market at very reduced rates. That is one benefit of annexation.

Charles H. W. Hitchcock and Miss Margaret Murphy were married in Hilo on the 16th inst., by Rev. Father Maxiam. The ceremony took place at the old homestead of D. H. Hitchcock.

The stables of manager D. C. Lindsay of Paia were consumed by fire on the 15th inst. The cause of the fire is ascribed to sparks from a neighboring chimney igniting the dry straw of the stable.

During the 5th inst. Henry Chamberlain died of dropsy at the Paia Hospital. He was well known in Makawao and Honolulu, and was between seventy and eighty years of age. He was a carpenter by trade.

Commodore Beckley received this morning by the Mauna Ala a very handsome silver wedding present from his wife consisting in a fine buggy, a splendid set of harness and a whip, all shipped from San Francisco.

The Members' Reception, or "First View of the Kilohaua Art League" takes place this evening at the Art League Hall, Model Block, where the members and their invited guests will view for the first time the works of the exhibitors.

Captain Hilbus, who has for so long a time been the captain of the tug Elen, has resigned his position as such, and Captain McAllister, formerly commander of the Helene, will take his place. Captain Hilbus' resignation is due to his continued ill health.

A. P. Taylor, of the Advertiser, who fell ill of a nervous strain, is recuperating at a ranch high up on the slopes of Haleakala, Maui. A letter from him states that he will probably be able to return to Honolulu the latter part of this week.

Miss Rose Davison, in charge of the Hawaiian exhibit, reached Salt Lake City on May 6th, and was entertained by Governor Wells, Secretary of State Thompson, and other high officials. She was shown the places of interest and left the same day for Chicago.

A runaway occurred near Pensacola street, on Beretania, Saturday, in which a lady was badly cut about the face. She was driving a team, and it is said that the horses, becoming frightened at the steam roller, bolted and dashed the carriage against a telephone post, breaking the front part and throwing the lady against the post. While her injuries are very painful, they are not thought to be serious.

Quarantine Station For Hilo.

A site for a new quarantine station has been ordered selected for Hilo by the Washington authorities. By the late Kinau Dr. L. E. Cofer, U. S. M. H. S., arrived, and with F. L. Winter, comprise a committee to select the location. Accompanied by Sheriff Andrews, they visited a point at Puhi, near John Baker's place, and selected a tract of fifty acres, which had been surveyed by E. D. Baldwin, and plans will be referred to Washington. There will be from \$40,000 to \$50,000 expended on the buildings and grounds, and the roads leading thereto. The buildings will be constructed on the most approved system, and every precaution taken for the complete isolation of a large number of people, and the conditions for handling contagious diseases will be something that has been badly needed here, with the possibility of epidemics breaking out among the laborers imported for the plantations. The old station, Coconut Island, will likely be fitted up for a bathing and picnic resort.—Hilo Herald.

Mrs. Cronje Insane.

AMSTERDAM, May 4.—A notice from St. Helena states that Mrs. Cronje, wife of the Boer general, has become mentally unbalanced, owing to her experiences in the war and her life in her prison home at Deadwood. She imagines that she is the ex-Empress Eugenie of France.

Five other Boer prisoners also have become insane.

Mrs. Cronje, a typical Boer housewife, is devoted to her husband and followed him into exile with their child. The women of France, in admiration of her conduct, raised \$6,800 and presented her with a magnificent heart-shaped locket, jeweled and surrounded with rays of glory, violets and roses.

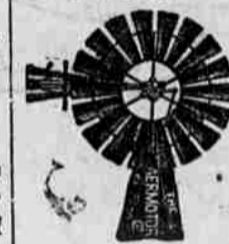

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Some one in the Thurston ring seems to feel bad because the price on opium is on the decrease. Who can it be?

We wish some of the "haoles" who call Hawaiians shiftless, lazy and impecunious had been present at the celebration of the silver wedding of George C. Beckley yesterday. They would have found bright lawyers, contractors, ranchers, capitalists all with the Hawaiian blood in their veins. And in the host they would have found a man who, through hard work from boyhood and not through patronage or college education, has proven himself an honor to his race, to his country, and to his noble ancestors.

The exhibition given on Saturday afternoon by the Fearless acting as a fire boat showed the efficiency of the apparatus on board the fine tug boat. Six hoses were throwing out strong streams at one time and it is to be hoped that the Legislature will pass a sufficient appropriation to secure the services of the tug as a fire boat. Millions of dollars would go up in smoke if a fire should start on the waterfront and a strong breeze blowing. The ships in the harbor, the wharves, the dock-sheds, the lumber yards and possibly many warehouses would be in ashes if no well equipped fire boat was available. The Commissioners of the Fire Department favor the idea greatly and we believe the Underwriters have signified their willingness to assist substantially in getting more hose for the tug. A petition, signed by all the big merchant houses of the city was presented in the House of Representatives today by Mr. Mossman, and in the interest of the community we hope that the Legislature will pass an appropriation to secure the services of the tug and thereby at some future day avoid or minimize what would prove a great calamity, the danger of the destruction of the shipping and the docks by fire. We expect of course that some legislator will say that there is no money to spare for the purpose. We believe that if the appropriation asked for is inserted in the bill and becomes law, that the merchants who signed the petition would be willing to temporarily advance the money asked for with the understanding that it should be reimbursed when the treasury is in a better condition. It is a matter that the underwriters and the whole community should consider in a most serious manner and no stone should be left unturned to secure the means with which to protect the waterfront, the shipping and perhaps the whole city against a possible conflagration.

BECKLEY'S SILVER WEDDING.

A Magnificent Celebration at the Commodore's Sea Side Resort.

George C. Beckley, the genial commodore of the Wilder fleet, entertained yesterday a large number of relations and other friends at his beautiful Aquo Marine residence at Diamond Head. It was a pleasure to his guests to be away from the heat of Honolulu and in the fresh breeze on the beach with the commodore many happy returns of the day and in sparkling wine drink the health of the absent wife and children.

Beckley has always been known as an excellent host and yesterday he was one rare excellence. The big Hawaiian lanai had been transformed into a bower of beauty and was gaily decorated with flags and palms, tastefully arranged under the supervision of Mrs. Alice Afong Hutchinson and other relatives of the happy celebrant. Tables set in horseshoe fashion were laden down with everything which can tempt a man to eat and the "fountain" from which the liquid refreshments were fetched by bewitching Hobeas was evidently inexhaustible. Speeches were made and many compliments made to the commodore in response in elegant language, deploring with all his guests the absence of his wife and children. The Quintette club was in attendance and a large staff of stewards were waiting on the party.

The commodore was in receipt of several beautiful and costly gifts, among which were a fine cut glass punchbowl and a magnificent oshabash on which a suitable inscription will be engraved and a silver band. It was a grand feast and it was midnight before the commodore could get to bed.

The Cunningham string is still on the track.

Senator Baldwin returned from Kawai yesterday.

The Peru sailed yesterday morning for the Orient.

The Mauna Ala arrived this morning from San Francisco.

The Kauehameha defeated the Punahou at a baseball match on Saturday.

The Batchelors defeated the Benedicts at the cricket match on Saturday afternoon.

The comet is out of sight. It has gone to the Waianae mountains to recuperate its failing health.

The Hilo horses did not come on the Kinau, as was expected, and it is reported that Socialist has not yet arrived in Hilo.

The four masted schooner Kona, built by Hay & Wright for Hinds, Rolph & Co., was launched on the 11th instant at Alameda Point.

Owing to the serious illness of J. F. Morgan the band will not play at Emma Square this evening but at the Hawaiian Hotel. Mr. Morgan's residence adjoins the square.

The H. H. Schlager Co. calls special attention in this issue to the excellent claret and best beer offered in this market at very reduced rates. That is one benefit of annexation.

Charles H. W. Hitchcock and Miss Margaret Murphy were married in Hilo on the 16th inst., by Rev. Father Maxiam. The ceremony took place at the old homestead of D. H. Hitchcock.

The stables of manager D. C. Lindsay of Pa'a were consumed by fire on the 15th inst. The cause of the fire is ascribed to sparks from a neighboring chimney igniting the dry straw of the stable.

During the 8th inst. Henry Chamberlain died of dropsy at the Paia Hospital. He was well known in Makawao and Honolulu, and was between seventy and eighty years of age. He was a carpenter by trade.

Commodore Beckley received this morning by the Mauna Ala a very handsome silver wedding present from his wife consisting in a fine buggy, a splendid set of harness and a whip, all shipped from San Francisco.

The Members' Reception, or "First View of the Kilohana Art League" takes place this evening at the Art League Hall, Model Block, where the members and their invited guests will view for the first time the works of the exhibitors.

Captain Hilbus, who has for so long a time been the captain of the tug E. en, has resigned his position as such, and Captain McAllister, formerly commander of the Helene, will take his place. Captain Hilbus' resignation is due to his continued ill health.

A. P. Taylor, of the Advertiser, who fell ill of a nervous strain, is recuperating at a ranch high up on the slopes of Haleakala, Maui. A letter from him states that he will probably be able to return to Honolulu the latter part of this week.

Miss Ross Davison, in charge of the Hawaiian exhibit, reached Salt Lake City on May 6th, and was entertained by Governor Wells, Secretary of State Thompson, and other high officials. She was shown the places of interest and left the same day for Chicago.

A runaway occurred near Pensacola street, on Beretania, Saturday, in which a lady was badly cut about the face. She was driving a team, and it is said that the horses, becoming frightened at the steam roller, bolted and dashed the carriage against a telephone post, breaking the front part and throwing the lady against the post. While her injuries are very painful, they are not thought to be serious.

Quarantine Station For Hilo.

A site for a new quarantine station has been ordered selected for Hilo by the Washington authorities. By the late Kinau Dr. L. E. Coker, U. S. M. H. S., arrived, and with E. L. Winter, comprise a committee to select the location. Accompanied by Sheriff Andrews, they visited a point at Puhii, near John Baker's place, and selected a tract of fifty acres, which had been surveyed by E. D. Baldwin, and plans will be referred to Washington. There will be from \$40,000 to \$50,000 expended on the buildings and grounds, and the roads leading thereto. The buildings will be constructed on the most approved system, and every precaution taken for the complete isolation of a large number of people, and the conditions for handling contagious diseases will be something that has been badly needed here, with the possibility of epidemics breaking out among the laborers imported for the plantations. The old station, Coconut Island, will likely be fitted up for a bathing and picnic resort.—Hilo Herald.

Mrs. Cronje Insane.

AMSTERDAM, May 4.—A letter from St. Helena states that Mrs. Cronje, wife of the Boer general, has become mentally unbalanced, owing to her experiences in the war and her life in her prison home at Deadwood. She imagines that she is the ex-Empress Eugenie of France.

Five other Boer prisoners also have become insane.

Mrs. Cronje, a typical Boer housewife, is devoted to her husband and followed him into exile with their child. The women of France, in admiration of her conduct, raised \$6,800 and presented her with a magnificent heart-shaped locket, jeweled and surrounded with rays of glory, violets and roses.
