Are Britons Weakening?

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Counties Liberal Federation, Lord Carrington presiding, passed a resolution demanding that the Boers should be immediately offered autonomy similar to Australia within a fixed early period.

Mr. Chamberlain's recent speech, immediately after a prolonged Cabinet meeting, is interpreted as a direct and authoritative reply to the pro-Boer suggestion that Britain should offer the enemy terms.

Henceforth voluntary surrenders will not be accepted. All Boers taken will be considered prisoners of war and deported.

The Daily News states that the Government have arrested and deported to England Miss Hobhouse, apparently for disobeying an injunction not to visit the Boer camps.

The St. Petersburg Official Gazette states that Russia is supplying 20,000 horses for South Africa.

General Ian Hamilton proceeds to South Africa as Lord Kitchener's chief of the staff.

The Boers are hovering in the neighborhood of De Jaager's Drift.

The Franco-Turkish Fracas.

BERLIN, Nov. 8.—The Cologne Gazette says there are indications that France and Russia are initiating a European Conference for early in 1902 for the execution, not the revision, of the Berlin Treaty as regards Armenia and the Balkans.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The Porte has sent M. Pabst, French Charge d'Affaires, customs drafts in payment of the claims and has communicated its decisions relating to the quays and Adazabar marches. France accepts the Porte's offer, which does not refer to education,

religion, or the recognition of Catholics instead of the Nestorian and Chaldean patriarchs.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The German press, apprehending the permanent occupation of Mytilene, urge British intervention to prevent the disturbance of the balance of power.

PARIS, Nov. 8.—M. Delcasse has assured the Powers that beyond the private claims France confines her action to upholding treaty rights and will evacuate Mytilene when she receives a guarantee from the Porte against procrastination. The circular has been favorably received.

In pursuance of the Porte's order the seizure of the Mytilene customs by France was not resisted.

Another Bankrupt.

A petition in involuntary bankruptcy was filed against T. Fujitani yesterday by Hoffschlaeger Company, H. Hackfeld & Co. and M. Phillips & Co.

In the petition it is alleged that T. Fujitani of Honokaa, Hawaii, owes debts exceeding \$1,000. The claims of petitioners for goods sold and delivered are as follows: Hoffschlaeger Company, 1,228.98; H. Hackfeld & Co., \$1,661.10, and M. Phillips & Co., \$397.95.

It is further represented that within four months past the said Fujitani committed an act of bankruptcy in making a general assignment for the benefit of his creditors, naming M. V. Holmes as assignee. December 4 has been fixed as the day for hearing the matter by Judge Estee.

The First Local Mint.

One of the institutions here which has the special attention of tourists as well as the local people is the Mint, which is established on Nuuanu street, opposite Queen Emma Hall. It is interesting to enter the large main working room, where general manager McDonough and his corps of assistants are at work. The cool and large lanai is a proper resting place and the vaults, where the "bars" to be minted and beer are kept present a very tasty spectacle. The Mint is open from 5:30 a. m. to 11:30 p. m. and during those hours the work never ceases. Visitors after looking over the place will find first class refreshments and the purest of liquors.

THE ONLY INCOMPETENT.

U. S. Congressman J. W. Gaines, of Tennessee passed through Honolulu as a passenger on the Doric. Mr. Gaines was on his way home after a visit to the Philippine islands. He wished that his time would have allowed him to spend some weeks in Hawaii, and after meeting some leading politicians here, he declared himself convinced that the removal of our impossible governor would be the salvation of the Territory.

Mr. Gaines may have been hasty in arriving at his sweeping conclusions (we did not notice the brand he used), but he certainly was correct when he said, that, as far as he had learned, Governor Dole was the only incompetent official here, and the stumbling block in the way of public improvements. Mr. Gaines was here for several hours and he immediately fathomed the characteristics of the Hawaiians and their peculiar methods. He saw at once that we are as much abused as the Filipinos, and as able to run this Territory. Mr. Gaines, after another refreshment, assured his interviewers that he would re-write his Philippine report, to apply to Hawaii, where to the knowledge gained by Gaines in two hours there was only one incompetent man, to wit: Governor Dole.

His Filipino report reads as follows:

"The Filipino people have been much abused and I am settled in my opinion that there are men among them who are as capable of conducting the affairs of government as you will find in the United States. There are any number of men in the States who are incapable of self-government.

"I met men among the better class of Filipinos who are finely educated, speak several languages and impress one with their mental capacity. I talked with Mabini, Mencominto and others of Aguinaldo's cabinet. They are men of sense, intelligent and capable of holding high office. It is the dream of the Filipinos to establish a new eastern island nation.

"I had an opportunity of talking with Aguinaldo. He is a leader, a warrior, and a man with wonderful capacity for leading others. He is a man. He told me, however, that he desired above all things to have peace established.

"Governor Taft is the man of the hour, and one of the great men of the world. He is a strong man for

the position he occupies, and uses discerning judgment in the manner in which he administers the affairs of the complex government there. He has placed in positions of trust the Filipinos who have been regarded as former insurgents. For that matter every Filipino is patriotic, a lover of his country, and it will be difficult to find a native of the islands who does not come under that category.

"I do not speak for General Chaffee, for he said little on the subject, but from what I learned from the army officers, it is to be regretted that the military rule was so soon supplanted by the civil. The recent developments in the Island of Samar and Cebu have illustrated that the Filipinos need more of the military medicine.

"The attempt to make a blanket franchise and blanket laws for the entire group of Islands is a mistake. Being an insular people, they are different from other peoples and always will be, and to attempt to Americanize so many different peoples by the same means will be a failure. Judge Taft, however, has done all he could to apply laws for the peoples of one island, and apply others for neighboring islands, and so on, and has succeeded admirably.

"I had heard so much while in Congress of the incapability of the Filipinos to govern themselves that I determined to investigate. I went there by transport by the Suez route, and am therefore completing the circuit of the globe. But you can rest assured that I would never have undertaken to spend five months of my time and money on such a trip, had I not desired to learn the truth—the facts—as they were. I have learned them, but I am not ready to express an opinion until the commission's report is made public."

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The greatest precautions are taken by Dr. Cofer, the federal quarantine officer, against any epidemics here, and he deserves great credit for the discretion, he has shown under present circumstances.

Judge Humphreys at present is in a very anti-Chinese mood and want all Chinese coolies shipped out of the country. His paper, however, keeps on urging the re-establishment of night schools for the purpose of educating coolies, so that they can compete with Hawaiians and whites with whom the Judge suddenly has become enamored. There have been Chinese coolies here who became great taxpayers and benefactors to whites and Hawaiians and, while we are opposed to a further influx of Asiatics, we certainly cannot endorse Judge Humphreys' sweeping remarks against the Chinese whom he want to "git" to "give elbow room to Hawaiians and whites." What's the matter with the Judge anyhow? No dividends?

Russia And China.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Standard's Shanghai correspondent states that it is understood that the Chinese Minister at St. Petersburg has warned the Dowager Empress that Russia fully intends to retain Manchuria. If the Convention is renounced terms will be exacted gravely menacing China's independence.

PEKING, Oct. 31, 7:40 p. m.—The contents of the Manchurian Convention to be concluded between Russia and China, consisting of four articles, had been telegraphed to the court at Sain by Li Hung Chang. The Emperor and Empress Dowager asked the opinions of Viceroy Chang Chih-tung and Li Kuang-yi in the matter.

The replies of the two Viceroys were to the effect that although the new Convention seems reasonable as compared with the old treaty, which failed to be concluded, the proposals as to the term of evacuation and the training of Chinese troops under Russian officers are likely to lead

the Powers to prefer similar demands on China. For his reason the Viceroys advised the court to reject the demand of Russia though it may offend her feeling.

The Emperor and Empress Dowager approved the memorial of the Viceroys and gave instructions to Li Hung Chang to renounce the Convention.

Look Out For Trouble.

LONDON, Oct. 7, 1:45 a. m.—Similar reports received here tonight announce the death of the Ameer of Afghanistan. The Ameer died on Thursday.

Mrs. A. J. Smithies gave a dinner *a la Hawaiian* to some lady friends from San Francisco last Friday evening. It was not on Saturday evening as stated by other contemporaries.

The injunction suit of the Oahu Railway and Land Company has been continued by Judge Estee until next week on account of the absence from the city of Superintendent Boyd.

The Sierra arrived yesterday afternoon and was docked at the Naval wharf. Passengers departing on her had to show official health certificates, and no one besides passengers were allowed on the vessel.

The buck which Mr. Desky had brought from Molokai to Pacific Heights has killed the doe which accompanied him. Mr. Desky will send to Molokai for another doe, and see that in the future no "doe" is stabbed on the Pacific Heights.

The full Court of Fire Claims heard important Chinese merchandise claims today, all the Commissioners being present. A re-hearing was given Yee Wo Chan Co., who filed a claim of \$77,703.78, to verify the value of certain shipments of goods from Japan.

Mr. Ernest Parker went to Hawaii today where he will meet his father, and attend the celebration of the first anniversary of little Herman Parker Widemann who will be one year old tomorrow. Mr. Ernest Parker and his brother James will leave for the Mainland with their father, Colonel Samuel Parker on December 4, and will there finish their education, prior to returning to their Hawaiian home.

Judge Stanley left in the Sierra last night. He takes a trip on business as well as pleasure. The Judge will attend to the 1895 claims on behalf of the claimants and will make representations in Washington and in London. The Judge will pay a visit to Dublin, to see that the Emerald Island is still there, and he will return as soon as he has ascertained the status of the claims with the different governments.

The Primo Beer Saloons.

As mentioned in yesterday's issue Judge Estee sustained the demurrer of defendant in the case of E. C. Macfarlane & Co. and al vs. the Treasurer of the Territory. In an oral decision the court held:

1. The petitioners have not shown in their petition that they are injured by the alleged acts against defendant, or that they have an interest involved in the action, or that they have suffered any damage by the acts of the defendant.

2. No demand is shown by the petitioners to have been made on defendant to cease to issue the licenses referred to.

3. Plaintiffs fail to show that they have not an adequate remedy at law.

The demurrer is therefore sustained with leave to petitioners to amend and file an amended petition within ten days.

The Planters' Association.

The annual meeting of the Hawaiian Planters' Association adjourned last evening. The principal work done was the reading of reports, and the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God to call from our midst Mr. Hugh Morrison, late manager of the Hawaiian Sugar Company, on the Island of Kauai, a valuable and esteemed member of this association, be it

Resolved, that the members of this association deeply deplore the death of Mr. Morrison, and keenly feel his loss, and desire to extend to his widow their heartfelt sympathy and condolence, and be it further

Resolved, that an engrossed copy of this resolution be prepared and signed by the proper officers of the association and forwarded to Mrs. Morrison.

Death of Osborn.

News came by the Sierra yesterday afternoon of the death at Apia, Samoa, Oct. 27, a week prior to the arrival of the steamship, of United States Consul-General Luther W. Osborn. Nothing but the bare advices of the official's death were brought by the Sierra: His body has not yet been shipped to the United States and it will probably be brought to San Francisco by the battleship Wisconsin when the Tilley court-martial is concluded. The late Consul-General's official residence was at Apia, Samoa, and he was also accredited to Nukualofa, Tonga.

Osborn was a stepson of Robert Lewis Stevenson and a half-brother to Isabella Osborn Strong, and well known here.

The Dead Viceroy.

YOKOHAMA, Nov. 7.—According to a Peking special to the Nichi Nichi under date of the 7th inst., Li Hung Chang, Viceroy of Chihli, died on the same day at 11:30 a. m. at his residence. Knowing that he could not recover from his serious illness, Li Hung Chang has recommended Yung Lu to succeed him and at the same time wired to Yuan Shikai urging him to make increased exertions for the sake of his country. A Peking correspondent of the Asahi also reports the death of Li Hung Chang and says that before he died the Russian Minister, M. Lessar, urgently pressed the old Viceroy, despite his serious illness, to sign the Manchurian Convention.

The Drill Postponed.

At the special meeting of the line officers of the National Guard held last night the date for the competitive prize drill was definitely fixed for April 27th. The change was made to allow all companies ample time to drill for the cup, and for that reason it was agreed that Washington's birthday, February 22, would be too early. The drill is to be held in the afternoon and the Hilo company will take part.
