AID has two year contract with University of Hawaii. Under this contract the University of Hawaii will prepare up to 120 provincial representatives per year for service in Vietnam with AID field operations program. For the first year the project will cost \$575,000.

Representatives will serve in 43 provinces of Vietnam in AID's ongoing development program to assist the South Vietnamese build local government and increase pace of their social and economic development. In addition to the 120 representatives there will be up to 30 public administrators advisors in the same program over the course of the next year.

It will be a series of six-month programs beginning quarterly.

AID trainees will receive intensive instruction in Vietnamese language, American-Asian studies, rural sociology, agriculture, engineering, health, public administration, and education and portions of training will be conducted at former Navy installation at Pearl Harbor. This training will be supplemented by practical field exercises onisland of Hawaii where they will live and work in rural villages and participate in survivzl and in isolated valleys.

This program will be administered through *the* Office of International Programs.

The Chief of Engineers has approved a Federal project for construction of a flood control project at Kuliouou Stream on Oahu, the office of Senator Daniel K. Inouye was advised today.

The project is now authorized for accomplishment under the small project authority provided by Section 205 of the 1948 Flood Control Act, as amended.

The authorized project provides for dredging a 300-foot channel into Maunalua Bay; constructing a reinforced concrete rectangular channel, utilizing and improving existing cement rubble masonry walls for about 1300 feet.

The City and County of Honolulu will be required to reconstruct the Summer Street bridge and one access bridge about 4100 feet from the mouth of the stream.

Total first cost is estimated at \$1,500,000 of which \$1 million would be borne by the City and County of Honolulu.

The Honolulu District Corps of Engineers presently has \$90,000 available to complete preconstruction planning work for flood control improvements on Kuliouou Stream, and work is expected to be completed December 1966.

Initiation of actual project construction is dependent upon availability of funds at the time preconstruction work is complete.

The Chief of Engineers has authorized further investigation of a flood control project for Wailupe Stream, Oahu, and has made \$63,000 available to prepare a detailed project report, the office of Senator Daniel K. Inouye was advised today.

A reconnaissance report on the flood control project was recently completed by the Honolulu District Corps of Engineers.

The improvement of planning consists of enlarging and lining the existing channel with concrete for a distance of approximately 6,100 feet. The improvements would extend from the mouth to approximately 100 feet upstream of the Ani Street bridge.

Estimated first cost is \$1,190,000 of which \$1,000,000 would be borne by the Federal Government and \$190,000 by the City and County of Honolulu.

The studies are expected to be completed in the 1968 fiscal year and if they indicate that Federal participation is warranted, a favorable recommendation will be sent to the Chief of Engineers and the project will be placed on the list of approved projects awaiting construction funding.

The Honolulu District Corps of Engineers will recommend a single-purpose local flood control project for Iao Stream, Wailuku, Maui, the office of Senator Daniel K. Inouye was advised today.

Federal first cost of the project is estimated at \$1,660,000, and the non-Federal first cost is estimated at \$240,000.

The proposed project will provide a debris basin to reduce the amount of boulders and other material that would otherwise clog the channel. The channel will be improved from just above Market Street bridge downstream to the ocean.

A bill introduced by Senator Daniel K. Inouye which authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to make real estate mortgage loans on Hawaiian Homes Commission lands in Hawaii has been reported out for Senate floor action by the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry.

The legislation would allow lessee-operators in Hawaii, including homesteaders on Hawaiian Homes Commission lands, to qualify for insured loans under the provisions of the Consolidated Farmers Home Administration Act of 1961.

Senator Inouye explained that under the existing law only owner-operators of not larger than family farms qualify under the loan insurance program.

If the legislation becomes law, Senator Inouye said, loans can be made on Hawaiian Homes lands on the security of a guarantee by the Hawaiian Homes Commission without necessarily requiring encumbrance of the leasehold.

STATEMENT BY SENATOR DANIEL K. INOUE BEFORE THE SUBCOMMITTEE
ON CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS, SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE
June 10, 1966

Mr. Chairman:

Equality before the law is so basic to democracy that it should require no explanation or defense. Yet in certain racial and economic groups in this country this principle has been violated for so long as to make these violations an almost approved part of our social conventions. Striking examples of these violations have been seen in the selection of juries where specific segments of the population are denied the right to determine guilt or innocence. It is seen in housing where segments of the population are excluded from enjoying the privilege of living in certain areas because of race; in education where equality of opportunity can be denied without the offended party having recourse to justice. It can be seen in the denial of the free exercise of the vote; in the inequality in public accommodations and employment; in the use of common carriers and even in participation in federally assisted programs.

Often accompanied by intimidation and violence, these abuses could not have become so deep seated in this country had those who were offended been able to bring and present their case effectively before objective juries. Conversely, these problems would never have developed had the processes to insure equal justice been established in the first place. These abuses will not be remedied until, as part of the remedy, steps are taken to establish those processes which will insure justice for the particular situation we now face in this country.

For this reason, the composite legislation proposed in S. 3296 and in other legislative proposals presented before this Committee are so important. S. 3296 provides that the Attorney General, an agent outside the local offending scene, may instigate action whenever there are reasonable grounds to believe that any person has engaged in, or about to engage in any act or practice which would abridge or deny others any of the privileges mentioned in this legislation. This provision is particularly important since many of those offended are not able to make effective their own defense. Also important are the guidelines specifying exact procedures for jury selection

and the clause which places the burden of proof for impartiality in the exercise of justice, upon the state or local office in cases of doubt.

Finally, it is necessary to make intimidation and violence an offense since the exercise of human rights cannot be performed in an environment of fear. I also favor legislation which would designate the exact penalty for infraction of these rules.

My own State of Hawaii is demonstration enough that people of different racial ancestries can live together in a high degree of harmony. A number of factors have contributed to the high degree of equality under the law enjoyed there--organized cohesive ethnic groups, a relatively wide distribution of wealth, the availability of education, and the organization of unions. In the absence of most of these elements in minority racial groups in this country, such far reaching legislation as proposed, is necessary. It will establish the basis on which all racial groups, both minority and majority, can move toward a greater degree of acceptance and respect. Hawaii has shown that this goal can be accomplished.

STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF H. R. 15192, TO AMEND TITLE II OF THE
MERCHANT MARINE ACT, 1936, TO AUTHORIZE THE ESTABLISHMENT AND
OPERATION OF SEA GRANT COLLEGES AND CERTAIN EDUCATION, TRAINING
AND RESEARCH PROGRAMS, BEFORE THE SUBCOMMITTEE ON OCEANOGRAPHY,
HOUSE COMMITTEE ON MERCHANT MARINE AND FISHERIES.

Mr. Chairman:

I wish to speak on behalf of H. R. 15192, to authorize the establishment and operation of sea grant colleges and certain education, training and research programs.

We in Hawaii are interested in this proposed legislation because we are excited about the future of oceanography and the vast potentials it holds in store for our state and our nation.

I think we are agreed that it is in the national interest to develop the necessary skilled manpower, including scientists, engineers, and technicians, and the facilities and equipment necessary to exploit these resources.

The question before this subcommittee today is how best to pursue these goals.

The problem which faces Hawaii and her sister states in coastal areas-- states best equipped to carry on oceanic research projects because of their proximity to the sea--is one which this bill is designed to solve.

Oceanographic research in this country is still in its infancy. It needs a broad approach on many fronts, a gigantic thrust forward.

Our efforts to date have been diluted because federal research funds are scattered across the entire government spectrum. These funds are being used by individual agencies to seek solutions to specific problems as they arise.

But if we seek the maximum return on the research dollar, I believe these studies should encompass broad areas of interest. This research should be coordinated by a single agency to achieve maximum effectiveness.

This bill offers these desirable features. It calls for a broad research approach and it wisely suggests that the first step which should be taken to implement the program is to initiate and support programs at sea grant colleges for the education and training of participants in the marine sciences.

Hawaii needs this legislation because we have few natural resources. We are convinced, however, that our greatest wealth may lie in the ocean which surrounds us.

The State of Hawaii has already invested heavily in ocean science projects. We have already organized a Department of Oceanography at the University of Hawaii. This is one of only 45 such institutions in our country which offer courses in oceanographic training and research. We are also one of the 16 institutions which offer graduate training in this field.

We have established three research centers which function in conjunction with the University of Hawaii: The Hawaii Institute of Geophysics, which has physical facilities on campus and a research vessel operating out of Honolulu; the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology, complete with laboratory facilities; and, upon completion of a building, there is to be a Pacific Biomedical Research Center for research in marine animals.

The private sector of our economy has also been active in this field. The Lockheed-California Corporation has two research vessels operating out of Honolulu under charter from the Scripps Institution of Oceanography. This company has a \$2 million contract with the Navy's Bureau of Ships.

Also in Hawaiian waters is the FLIP, owned by the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, an instrument vessel under contract to study sound waves beneath the sea. The USS Pathfinder of the Coast and Geodetic Survey has also been engaged in a special project for the Environmental Science Services Administration. The designated drilling site for Project Mohole is also in Hawaiian waters and we are still hopeful that the Congress will see fit to go ahead with this project.

I believe that these projects will help to underline the growth of Hawaii as a center for the study of ocean science.

We have made a small but significant beginning. The bill before this committee today offers the kind of support we need before we can begin reporting significant breakthroughs. I, therefore, ask that favorable action be taken on this measure.

United States troops in Viet Nam will begin R&R (rest and recuperation) leaves in Hawaii in early August, Senator Daniel K. Inouye said today.

Senator Inouye said current plans call for the airlifting of 1,000 troops per month to Hawaii in August and September.

A Department of Defense spokesman indicated that the first two months would be in the nature of a shakedown operation and that the monthly quota would increase in the late fall.

The spokesman said that the Military Airlift Command was unable to contract for the necessary aircraft in July. Five monthly flights are scheduled in August and September.

Senator Inouye said he was "delighted with the speedy implementation of the program by the Department of Defense in view of the enormous logistical problems involved.

"I know that all Hawaii will be waiting with a warm aloha for the men on R&R leave," he said.

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
