Noted Writer Visits Maui

**Mrs. Katherine Yates Calls Here On
Tour of Group. Inspects Auto
Roads.**

Mrs. Katherine Yates the well known writer, who has been contributing special articles to mainland magazines, and who runs her own column in the Honolulu Advertiser, is a visitor to Maui.

Mrs. Yates is writing up the whole group, from the standpoint of the motorist. She has completed her work on Kauai, Hawaii and Oahu, and is now busy on this island. Besides writing special articles, Mrs. Yates is compiling data for the Hawaiian Promotion Committee.

"Although I have been in the islands for three years," remarked Mrs. Yates to a MAUI NEWS reporter. "I have only visited Maui once before. From what I have already seen of this island, I feel that you 'Valley Islanders' have something to be proud of.

"The roads, so far as I have seen, are perfect, and this place would seem to be an ideal one for automobilism. I intend to travel over the most of Maui, and may, possibly, remain on the island for some weeks."

Mrs. Yates had a most enjoyable time on Hawaii, and she had the best guide possible to obtain. H. W. Kinney, Editor of the Hilo Tribune, took it upon himself to show Mrs. Yates around the big island. The party went around Hawaii, and made the trip in fast time.

The visitor was impressed with the good roads traveled over but, it must be here remarked, that Mrs. Yates could not have become acquainted with the celebrated "Mud Lane." That delightful "road" is known to most travellers, and is spoken of with horror by everyone.

When asked as to the view she takes on the construction of an automobile road to the summit of Haleakala, Mrs. Yates was emphatic in her reply.

"A road to the summit of Haleakala would be the finest thing possible," she declared, "and even if the cost was \$300,000, the money would all come back before very long. That eight miles of road should be constructed, and then tourists from all over the world would be attracted to Maui. The horse-back ride does not appeal to people, and that is the reason the finest sight in the world is neglected."

Mrs. Yates has gathered much data regarding the possibilities of autoing in the group, and her impressions will be read with interest when published.

Men Escape From Jail.

Two escaped convicts are at large at present, and Sheriff Crowell is hot after their trail. The two men got away from a work-gang last Monday and, so far, have managed to elude the searchers.

Both the escaped prisoners are under sentence for horse-stealing, and they had eighteen months, each, to serve.

When the men made a break for freedom they had, in the way of provisions, one loaf of bread and two cans of ham paste. As this supply will not last long, it is thought that the men will start petty thieving from country houses.

**Senior and Junior Oarsmen Sail For
Honolulu. Take Best Wishes Of
Everybody.**

On Tuesday last the two crews of Maui oarsmen left for Honolulu. They took with them the best wishes of all Maui, and there will be great rejoicing here when the news that our crew has won, comes through.

Solons Have Long Session

**Maui Supervisors Pass Accounts and
Discuss Many Matters. School
Affairs.**

Routine matters occupied the attention of the Board of Supervisors for the first day of their regular monthly meeting which began on Wednesday last. Communications were read, and bills passed for payment. Supervisors Pogue (Chairman), Henning, Lake and Meyers were present. Supervisor Drummond of Hana, was unable to be present owing to the ill health of his wife.

School matters were discussed, and Supervising Principal Copeland explained the need of his department in the way of buildings.

J. N. S. Williams, for the Kahului Railroad Co., asked that the County fill in a ditch on the side of the main Kahului road, halfway between Puunene avenue and the Kahului crossing. If the ditch is filled, the Railroad Co. will make an opening in their fences, and thus open a new crossing. The change would accommodate a number of people and save them a long walk.

The Supervisors agreed to the suggestion of Mr. Williams and the ditch will be filled.

The interesting fact that 890 people are residing in Kahului, was brought out during the talk over the ditch matter.

NORMAL SCHOOL HAS ADMIRABLE FEATURES

**Some Facts and Figures About Honolulu Institution--
Good Showing Made Is Recognized By Experts
From Other Countries--Comparisons Prove
School To Be Right In Front Rank.**

Fair play is a jewel and everyone who considers any matter, should look at both sides of the question. The public school question has been argued and fought over in these islands for a long time past.

There are many people who declare that the system is wrong. There are, likewise, many who think that, under the unique circumstances, as regards the different nationalities, the school system is a good one.

The Territorial Normal School of Honolulu is, in many peoples' opinion, a fine institution. On behalf of the Normal School, the following claims have been made:

1. Developed under the present administration from Grammar school rank in 1897 to Collegiate rank in 1906.

2. Recognized as equal to State Normal Schools in 23 States.

3. Policy and conduct of the school have been indorsed by the Ministers and Superintendents of Public Instruction and practically by all the Commissioners.

4. The work of the graduates of the school has been endorsed by a large majority of the Supervising Principals and their average standing exceeds that of all other teachers employed.

5. The teaching force has been unusually permanent and their loyalty to the school increases with length of service.

6. The methods of instruction are in the front of educational ideals and the school ranks with the best training schools in America.

7. In the administration of the school the aim has been to strengthen and make more efficient the weak teachers rather than to seek their dismissal. Only once, in May 1912, has it been necessary to ask that a teacher be not reappointed, because of persistent defiance of all authority. This action was deemed necessary chiefly on account of the evil influence on the teachers in training.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL.

In 1897 the school ranked as a grammar school while now it academically ranks as a High School and professionally it is recognized by Columbia University as doing work of collegiate rank and students entering the Teachers' College of the University are given credit for one year of professional work.

COMPARISON WITH OTHER SCHOOLS.

In 1906, the State Board of California on the recommendation of Dr. Elmer Brown, late Commissioner of Education, Washington, accredited the four year course of the Territorial Normal School as of equal rank with the four year course in the State Normal Schools of California. This accrediting carries with it recognition in 23 States. (Bulletin of the State Board of California, No. 82, 1906.)

ACADEMIC STANDING.

The College of Hawaii admits graduates of the Normal School without examination, and Teachers' College, Columbia University, admits graduates on the recommenda-

ENDORSEMENT OF THE POLICY AND CONDUCT OF THE SCHOOL.

The policy and conduct of the school has had the endorsement of all the Superintendents of Public Instruction.

The Hon. E. A. Mott-Smith as Minister of Public Instruction enquired into the entrance conditions of the Normal and the adaptation of the Course to local conditions and then gave the school his most hearty support.

Supt. A. T. Atkinson investigated the school from the standpoint of policy, administration, subject matter of curriculum, methods of teaching and character of the work done by the graduates.

This investigation occupied about a year and included inspection of the class room work, consultations on the subject matter and methods of teaching and an examination of the work of the graduates. The Principal, as a result of this investigation, was asked to be chairman of the committee to revise the Existing Course of Study along the lines of the work of the Territorial Normal.

Supt. W. H. Babbitt conducted a detailed examination into the work and methods of the School and held conferences with the Principals of the city on the Course of Study, and with those Inspectors who wished changes in the course and in the work of the Normal School. Supt. Babbitt, after this investigation, gave the school his unqualified support. On his recommendation the Principal of the Normal was appointed a member of the School Fund Commission.

ENDORSEMENT OF FORMER COMMISSIONERS OF EDUCATION.

The following ex-Commissioners have always given the school their hearty support and their interest in the institution has grown with its development. They have assured the principal of their continued interest and endorsement: Prof. W. D. Alexander, Mrs. B. F. Dillingham, Mrs. E. W. Jordan, Mr. Harry von Holt, Mr. W. A. Bowen, Mr. W. R. Farrington and others.

ENDORSEMENT OF THE GRADUATES OF THE SCHOOL.

The work of the school has the endorsement of the large majority of the Supervising Principals: Mr. J. C. Davis, Mrs. Nina Fraser, Mr. I. M. Cox, Mr. G. W. Baldwin, Mr. H. E. Maui Invites Sec. Fisher

**Chamber of Commerce Appoints Com-
mittee to Look After Distinguished
Visitor.**

There was a meeting of the Maui Chamber of Commerce last Wednesday afternoon, and there was a good attendance of members. The meeting only lasted half an hour or so, but some important business was done.

The first thing taken up was the nominating and election of the Rev. R. B. Dodge as a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

After that pleasant duty was performed, Judge Kingsbury introduced two resolutions which are given below. The expected visit of Secretary Fisher to Maui was discussed with pleasure and President F. F. Baldwin named three gentlemen to act as a committee to take care of the Secretary's party: W. O. Aiken, Judge Kingsbury and J. N. S. Williams will look after the comfort of the visitors. Judge Kingsbury resolution follows:

RESOLVED: That the Maui Chamber of Commerce hereby extends to Honorable Walter L. Fisher Secretary of the Interior of the United States, a hearty greeting and an earnest invitation to, with Mrs. Fisher and any and all others whom he may be so gracious as to invite, visit this Island of Maui, and be the guests of our citizens, at his earliest convenience, and to remain with us as long as his pleasure and exalted duties permit.

RESOLVED: That the Chairman appoint a Committee of three who shall be a general committee of arrangements—to manage for and to manage at, all receptions, functions and doings for the pleasure, convenience and entertainment of Honorable Walter L. Fisher, Secretary of the Interior of the United States, Mrs. Fisher and their whole party of friends while they visit Maui, which we hope may be soon and as long as their pleasure and convenience will allow.

Large Sum Now Ready

At the meeting of the Board of Supervisors, accounts for August, amounting to \$24,511.94 were passed. Chairman W. F. Pogue presided, and business was rushed through with certainty and speed.

The proposition of the Lahaina Ice Co., Ltd., concerning electric lights for the town of Lahaina was read.

Mr. Lake moved to approve the lighting proposition for the town of Lahaina as submitted on general lines, subject to further and more complete consideration later on. Seconded by Mr. Meyers and carried. Mr. Henning moved that the matter of lighting the County Buildings and Parks be deferred to the next meeting. Seconded by Mr. Lake and carried. Communication ordered filed.

The Chairman declared the time for receiving bids for the Ulupalakua-Makana branch of the Kula Pipe Line as expired. One bid was received.

Mr. Henning moved to accept the bid of A. C. Dowsett to construct a pipe line according to specifications and plans from Ulupalakua to Makana, to be completed within 60 days. Seconded by Mr. Lake and carried.

Notes From Capital City

**Kuhio's Cause Very Weak And No
Backing To Charges. Other
Matters.**

(Special Correspondence.)

Honolulu, September 11.

The conclusion reached by the layman up to the present moment of the investigation of the Kuhio charges against the governor may be summed up in a few words. It seems evident that Kuhio imagined that his word, as to alleged shortcomings of Governor Frear, would be sufficient to cause his removal and when it did not so act and a rumor floated that a commission would come this way, the supposition and belief, was that he would be one of the set of superannuated ex-senators who could be handled much as was a commissioner of labor who called to investigate conditions. Things would be easy for the opponents of the governor. But when President Taft selected Secretary Fisher the affair assumed unexpected proportions.

Of course Kuhio knew of Fisher; he may have met him in his capacity as delegate but there could have been no intimate relations or the delegate would have known he was a foeman who could give cards and everything else to Attorney Ashford, and others of the bunch, who would oust the governor. Fisher is a man of brains. Courty as the word implies and keen as a blade. When Kuhio was asked to get into the ring his tongue clove to the roof of his mouth when he attempted to answer the first question. As the Advertiser put it he was "tonguetied." All he could utter was an excuse that in the absence of his attorney he preferred not to speak. So far as the public is concerned Kuhio was down and out from that moment. F. M. Swanzy was called upon and answered questions in a manner that clinched the opinion already set upon Kuhio. He frankly admitted that the man who could fill the office of governor to the satisfaction of everybody was not to be found in the territory and, he could have added, out of it. Swanzy was a good witness for the governor.

Swanzy was followed in the first relay by Ashford who was entered as the attorney of record for petitioner and if Kuhio could be said to have been tongue-tied certainly Ashford stuttered himself into a state of least resistance to the administration. Worth O. Aiken, who appeared yesterday proved an excellent witness for Frear and when relating the settlement of Maui lands by The California Association, this being one of the nails

FREAR WINNING OUT.

SECRETARY FISHER'S visit of investigation cannot but result in good. All the rumors, statements and hints, regarding the homesteading problem in these islands will be traced down and proved false, or true. And to anyone, who is unbiased, or not controlled by the Kinney-Ashford faction, it seems that there can be but one ending to the Kuhio "charges." Governor Frear will be absolutely vindicated, and his administration will be upheld. Frear has fought the fake homesteader for all he is worth. The dummy proposition received a knock out blow at his hands, and the way was opened for such homesteaders as are at present settling the Haiku lands on Maui.

The men who are attacking Governor Frear are doing so for their own ends. That fact will be made clear to Secretary Fisher before the investigation ends. The "charges" have, by letters, been shown to be false and, now by word of mouth, they are also being made look foolish.

The visit of Secretary Fisher will do good in the way of refuting, once and for all, the rash statements that are made by people who know nothing of the good homesteading work done by Frear. That the present government will be reappointed, is a certainty and some people have known that since last May.

MAUI NO KA OI.

MAUI will be well represented at the Annual Regatta of the Hawaiian Rowing Association, and it is up to the citizens of "God's Isle" to root for, and encourage as much as possible, the young athletes who are going to uphold our honor on Honolulu harbor next week.

The Valley Islanders—to use a rather hackneyed expression—are made of the real stuff. They are imbued with the right sort of spirit—the Maui spirit—and they will do or die in the two races in which they will compete.

The Myrtles and Healanis are good sports, too, and the Coast crew—the Alamedas—are cast in the same mould. There will be a great tussle next week, and may the best crew win.

Next year the Hilo crew will be in the game, and there will be an added interest. Hilo will, in 1914, invite the other crews to compete in straight-away course races—and then will the Hawaiian Islands be truly engaged in the rowing game.

MAUI IS A LADY.

HAVE you ever noticed the startling resemblance that the map of Maui bears to the head and shoulders of a woman? The map compiled by W. D. Alexander and Bishop, looks for all the world, like a female, wearing a colored shawl. West Maui forms the head. The nose is at Olowalu, the mouth at Papalau, the chin from Kamanawai to Keanapakai. The neck starts at Keawantui and reaches to Kalaepohaku. From that place to Nukuele the shoulders can be seen. The stretch between Launiupoko and Lahaina makes the forehead while, from the latter place—right around to Kahului—the rest of the head is outlined. Hamakuaopoko, Hamakualoa and the Koolau districts form the rest of the shoulders of the lady. In the colored map the resemblance is more pronounced. No wonder Maui attracts everybody!

Hilo is certainly growing fast. The latest sign of development is the appearance of a daily paper. This move has been predicted for some time past, but it was thought that either the Tribune or the Herald would be the first to jump at the opportunity. With the extension of the railroad along the Hamakua coast, it was thought that many new subscribers could be gained, and that the advertiser's would also come through with the necessary support to make a daily paper a success. Dr. Elmer Brown while Commissioner of Education at Washington, endorsed the school before the State Board of California and later in Washington assured the Principal of his continued interest in the growth and development of the school.

Dr. John Dewey, Columbia University, stated that the school was well to the front in educational ideals, but would probably meet opposition in its development along the line of those ideals.

On May 19, 1912, following the series of articles in the Advertiser Rishop H. B. Restarick after an inquiry into the work of the school wrote the Principal as follows: "I assure you of my hearty support and cordial friendship in the work which you are doing.

I consider now, as I have always done, that, with very peculiar material and with most difficult problems, you have done splendid work, and this I shall maintain at all times against any criticism."

THE TEACHING FORCE.

The teaching force of the school is composed largely of residents of the Territory and is satisfactory and comparatively permanent as shown by the following names:

Miss Ziegler, 13 years; Mrs. Marshall, 12 years; Miss McDonald, 7 years; Mrs. Bridgewater, 6 years; Miss Soper, 6 years; Miss Kluegal, 6 years; Miss Cook, 6 years; Miss Winter, 4 years; Miss Peck, 4 years; Miss Monsarrat, 4 years; Miss Freeth, 5 years, etc.

ACTIVITIES OF THE SCHOOL.

In 1902, a fund was established for needy and deserving students. This has assisted a large number of students to complete their course who would otherwise have given up their work. Through the University Honor Loan and Trust Association, the school has been instrumental in aiding eight teachers of the Territory to attend Teachers' College, Columbia University.

The faculty of the school has spared neither time nor money in supplying teachers all over the Territory with material to assist them in their work.

The following extract from the "Advertiser" is from an interview with Mr. Woolsey, agent for the American Book Company for the Pacific Coast during a recent visit to Honolulu.

EXTRACT FROM COMMERCIAL ADVERTISER.

"Hawaii has a reputation all over the country as leading the whole world in the matter of language teaching and she has the honor of originating the idea upon which is based the latest language next books in American schools," said P. S. Woolsey, agent of the American Book Company, who is here on one of his periodical visits. The American Book Company, sometimes called the "Book Trust," supplies most of the books for the department of public instruction here, and for many years Woolsey has been coming at intervals to consult with the authorities. He has been an interested listener at the sessions of the Supervising Principals.

"To Prof. Wood of the Normal School is due the credit of furnishing the idea upon which the new American Readers are being gotten out," said Mr. Woolsey. "The old text books which began in the primary grades with the uninteresting and meaningless phrases, such as 'This is a cat,' 'See the dog,' etc., are giving away to books in which, in equally simple language, some striking and interesting story is told. The suggestion of this change, which is going on all over the country, came from Professor Edgar Wood of Honolulu.

In the matter of the instruction of foreign children in the English language, Hawaii has had to specialize, and she has the reputation

among the leading educators of the country of having throughout and adopted the most effective system known. The reputation of the School Department for efficiency and scientific work is something for the Islands to be proud of."

The following communication from Mr. D. P. McConnel, B. A. Supt. of Schools, Queensland, Australia, received last month, gives a disinterested schoolman's opinion of the Honolulu Normal School.

Dear Mr. Wood:—I have never forgotten my visit to the Honolulu Normal in 1908, nor to tell every one about it. I have looked in vain for anything approaching your ideal school. It seems there are only three others in the States. Dr. Dewey's school in connection with Chicago University, Wm. Baldwin's Normal School at Hyannis and the Speyer School in New York under Teachers' College. This last is a wonderful place. Of course it is in the city and cannot quite carry out the program of the Honolulu Normal. But the idea is the same in all four schools, to bring the outside into the school, to bring the children's interests in, to make them understand what life is and thus to prepare them for the most useful, intelligent kind of a citizenship.

You may have the satisfaction of knowing that you are right in the front of educational ideals. Old methods are disappearing fast. The old dry drill of the three R's—the old senseless round, memorizing, memorizing, memorizing—is all going fast and the reasonable treatment of the children as little undeveloped human beings is coming in. No community will long be able to stay behind the new methods. You have psychology, physiology, reason and common sense behind you. I have many times thought of that delightful day four years ago when I saw for the first time how education might be made according to Nature. Now, I know the reason why. Your sympathy and genius have done it for you in Honolulu as they have guided Dewey, Baldwin and Bowser. Long may you be successful in your efforts. Where could your plan be more appropriate than in the Hawaiian Islands? You have a great variety of peoples, and languages and of inherited ideas to cope with. By going to the heart of human nature you meet them all on common ground and from that meeting place the ascent is easy. The effect could be seen in every face among your pupils.

I have just finished all my written work for the Ph. D. I think my visit to your school convinced me I must seek my road in the States.

upon which Kuhio hung his charges, Ashford was obliged to admit that there could be no objections to it. Albert Hörner will probably go on the stand today or tomorrow and tell his plan for settlement by homesteaders incorporating in it a central mill and the interests to be safeguarded by the appointment of two trustees each, by the planting and mill interests and the fifth by the governor of the territory. It looks like a feasible plan and one that will result to the good of the country. Yesterday Mr. Ivers told of the lack of water in a majority of plantation companies stock, forgetting the while his testimony before the tax appeal board, Hilo when in referring to Paauhau, he mentioned about the capitalization of Hamakua climate.

POLITICAL MATTERS.

Political matters here are strangely mixed for last night the politickers of the fifth district, "Achi's Own" turned him down so hard that he drenched himself copiously with linament after the meeting to remove the soreness. Opposition to Breckons, who aims to be chairman of the Territorial Convention, developed during the caucus last night so that the Cheyenne bunch does not know exactly where it is at. During the primary election at Kaimuki last Saturday night Allie Clarke, who aspires to leadership in the Republican party, in the first precinct of the fourth district, was defeated and Towse, who for more than a fortnight had been considered politically dead, polled the biggest vote in the precinct to Clarke's near-smallest. And while the ballots were being counted a wordy war between these two rivals to leadership ended in a fight in which Clark did not get the decision though he might have had not been for the fact that fraternal influence was brought to bear and he accepted a public apology from Towse. Mr. Murray says he is out for good and Krueger was believed to be willing to follow but mention of his name favorably in the caucus in the fifth last night may change matters. In the primary election Murray's ticket was defeated without much struggle.

THE WHISKEY RING.

Today the Advertiser mentions a whiskey ring and gives names of the men who are running the lines to victory or defeat. It is said that Sam Johnson was defeated in his wish to be delegate from the Waikiki district by this bunch and influence is being brought to bear upon Harold Castle to keep Johnson from being a candidate for supervisor. The opposition to him is mainly based upon the fact that he was instrumental in keeping a party from getting a license for a saloon at Pahoehoe where he formerly lived. Johnson is a good man and will probably be elected in spite of the opposition, if he wants the place. Mixed with the liquor ring in this connection is what is known as the "Bitulithic Bunch." Its a sure thing that politics were never so tangled as now.

POSTOFFICE RULES.

The new order of things which keeps the post office closed on Sunday is both good and bad in results. Even the boxes are free from letters which happen this way on the Sabbath, which is bad. But it seems good that the generally overworked clerks in the wholesale stores who work hard six days in the week are not to be forced to their stores on Sunday to answer letters that arrive that day and to pick out orders for Monday steamers.

Lahaina News.

During the vacation months at Lahainaluna Principal C. A. Mac Donald, his assistant teachers and the boys have accomplished extensive improvements. The large buildings have been repainted a colonial yellow with white trimmings. A new printing shop has been constructed, and the blacksmith and carpenter shops have been much enlarged. The ground for the new dining hall which is to be built on the other side of the road, opposite the old dining building, has also been leveled off.

Altogether the school presents a smart and prosperous appearance.

On Friday night Sept. 13th Manager George Freeland of the Pioneer Hotel is expected back from a trip to the coast. Unfortunately the question as to the title of the present hotel site is still pending in the courts, so that Mr. Freeland's plan of building a large and finer hotel in place of the old one cannot be carried out. However a small kuleana adjoining the hotel property having been recently acquired, a two story addition in which a sitting room for guests will constitute a part, is to be immediately constructed.

This week Ex-Senator Alfred Hayselden is also expected back for a visit to his old home. Mr. Hayselden, who has been away for two years, has been quite successful in a business way in Alabama. He is the president of a bank there which he organized, and has other important position of trust in the community in which he has settled.

On Mondays and Fridays the "Makenu Maru" from Ulupalakua, gayly sporting a large American flag sails into Lahaina with a cargo of beef. The "Makenu" is a large two mast sampan, or yacht, with its sides built upward into a sort of cabin to accommodate a 40 horse-power gasoline engine and a cold storage plant. At present the boat delivers beef only to Kihei and Lahaina but in January it will be taking it again to Honolulu. If possible the 40 horse-power engine will be replaced by a 70 horse-power.

Weather—No rain for two years in Lahainalalo—so it is frequently stated.

The funeral of Mrs. Elizabeth Aipo, wife of the lighthouse keeper at Kahukuloa point, took place at Wainee Church on Tuesday morning Rev. D. W. K. White read appropriate selections, offered prayer and gave an address. The Hawaiian version of "Nearer, My God, to Thee" was sung. Mrs. Aipo was 34 years of age, and passed away at the Japanese Hospital. She leaves a husband and three children.
