**MAN FOUND DROWNED.**

**Sad Ending of a Partial Cripple After a Drinking Relapse.**

The dead body of Andrew Carlson was found floating in the bay near the can buoy early Sunday morning by police officer Green. The body was taken to the Police Station on a stretcher, and there a post mortem examination was made by Dr. McGottigan. There were no bruises on the body, and to all appearances death was caused by drowning. The body was identified by friends, and the funeral took place at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the interment being at the Makiki Cemetery.

Carlson was seen on King street about 5:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon by Captain Rosehill, and later in the evening was seen knocking about in the merchant's Exchange saloon. Near closing time Carlson was sitting on a table and appeared to be under the influence of liquor. He walked out shortly, going down Nuuanu street toward the wharf. That was the last seen of the man alive. It is a general belief that Carlson was so far gone that he walked off the wharf into the bay.

Andrew Carlson was one of a batch of immigrants who came here about thirteen years ago. He worked at Spreckels' willow plantation as coachman for H. Morrison. For some time he was employed by J. A. Cummins at Waimanalo, and at divers times took care of W. G. Irwin's animals. He was a capable horseman. Some years after he came here he took a trip to the Coast, and while there met with a railroad accident, one of his feet being cut off at the instep. He secured \$3000 damages against the railroad company. After the accident he seemed to change for the bad, beginning to dissipate, and he went through the entire amount inside of one year. He returned to Honolulu and continued carousing whenever he had money. He lodged with Jans Nielsen at the corner of Merchant and Alakea streets for the past month.

An inquest was held at noon yesterday in the Deputy Marshal's office, and, after hearing the statements of Mr. and Mrs. Nielsen, the jury returned a verdict of "accidental drowning." Carlson had recently joined the Salvation Army, forming strong drink, and there is an opinion held generally that his relapse caused remorse which led him to make away with himself.

**CRICKET AT MAKIKI**

The last match of the season was played on Saturday last and resulted in another victory for the home team. The batting of Burnsides for Honolulu was very good and it is to him they owe their victory. **METHODS OF VOTING.**

Cumulative Voting for Representatives but Not for Senators.

The following provisions of the Constitution should be borne in mind by electors:

"Article 73.—Each voter for Representatives may cast as many votes as there are Representatives to be elected from the Representative District in which he is entitled to vote. He may cast them all for one Representative, or may apportion them among the several Representatives in such manner as he sees fit; provided, however, that any fractional division of a vote other than one-half shall be void.

"The required number of candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the respective Representative Districts shall be the Representatives for such Districts."

"Article 75.—Each voter for Senators may cast one vote only for each Senator to be elected from the Senatorial District in which he is entitled to vote.

"The required number of candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the respective Senatorial Districts shall be the Senators for such Districts."

**LESSONS IN Drawing and Painting.**

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Yesterday a batch of local news from the editorial rooms went astray in the printing office, in consequence of which there were many omissions in that day's issue. Accidents will happen.

Mr. Damon, Minister of Finance, in an interview published in the Star, advocates stone bridges to replace wooden ones. There is no doubt that in the long run stone or iron bridges would be cheaper than wooden. As, however, iron oxidizes rapidly in this climate, it is a happy suggestion to try the abundant native building stone. To construct bridges of durable material is one object for which it would be wise to borrow money on the national credit.

THE FINANCES.

Retrenchment is not mentioned in the platform of the party having an almost complete walkover in this election. Yet retrenchment would appear to be the great need of the Government to-day, according to the last quarterly accounts just published. The receipts for the quarter have been \$408,654.91, and the expenditures \$412,173.85. This makes a deficit of \$34,118.95 for the quarter, although a large proportion of the year's taxes are among the receipts. It is also to be considered that \$40,000 was derived from loans, and \$51,638.67 from crown lands, which is a new source of revenue since the revolution. National debt falling due was paid to the amount of \$1000, and interest on national debt of \$66,181.66. Out of loan funds also, it is fair to state, there were payments aggregating \$13,980.29 on permanent public improvements. Pay of police—exclusive of salaries of sheriffs, their clerks and deputies—amounts up as \$21,691.80; while the support of the military, not counting the expensive band, comes up to the exorbitant figure of \$25,951.24, or more than half what some of the present Government leaders thought extravagant, and opposed as such, for two years under the monarchy. Although police and military expenditures have been somewhat reduced from the terrific rate at which they were going most of the Provisional Government's time, yet their aggregate for the past quarter is at the rate of nearly \$400,000 for the biennial period.

Not only is retrenchment left out of the American Union party's platform, however, but an assault is there proposed against an important source of revenue—customs duties on foreign goods, which, under our comparatively very light tariff, forms one of the least burdensome forms of taxation. Certainly no statesmen are responsible for the presence of this proposal in conjunction with the absence of the principle of economy. It is a wonder, also, to find lawyers who would endorse the policy of differential duties between different nations all friendly to the Hawaiian Islands. There is no doubt that the adoption of such a policy would lead to international complications, from which it is unlikely that the United States would be inclined to relieve this country, even if the intentions of our Government and Legislature were solely for the benefit of that nation's trade with this country. As to whether this country is obligated to take such a radical step as that proposed, for the ostensible purpose of pleasing our great neighbor, is another subject and for separate discussion. As to how the nations regard discriminating tariffs, reference need only be made to the intention, reported in late news, of Germany to protest against the sugar schedule of the new tariff law of the United States. It is only by inference that Germany finds herself discriminated against, yet she regards the tariff on sugars from countries paying a bounty as an unfriendly measure against her especially.

It is to be hoped that all who shall be elected to the Legislature will ponder over the foregoing remarks, and while insisting on retrenchment to rescue the country from threatened bankruptcy, at the same time observe great caution against getting the country into foreign complications.

Judiciary Jottings.

Geo. E. Boardman, assignee of James Nott, Jr., has filed receipts for a first and final dividend to creditors on a basis of less than five cents in the dollar. Judge Whiting has granted the petition of J. H. Paly, guardian of the Cavary minors, for permission to sell real estate.

The board of trustees of the Sailors' Home Society will hold a special meeting in the Chamber of Commerce at 10:30 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Narrow Escape at Waikiki from the Bolting of a Horse.

Mrs. J. T. Stacker narrowly escaped serious injury in a runaway accident yesterday. She was driving in a brake into the premises at Waikiki when the horse became frightened and bolted in amongst a grove of cocoanut trees. The brake collided with one of the trees and was smashed up. Mrs. Stacker was thrown out, and landed on the ground, luckily escaping collision with a tree, the yard being full of them. The lady fortunately escaped with a few bruises. There was a possibility of her having suffered internal injury, but Dr. Day on examination found she had not. Mrs. Stacker was resting comfortably to-day and will be able to be out again in a day or two.

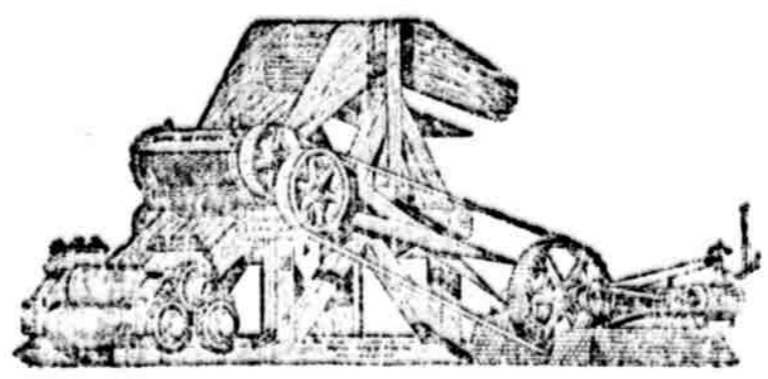

#### TO THE VOTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF HAWAII.

We, the Delegates of the American Union Party of the Island of Oahu, Republic of Hawaii, in Convention Assembled, this 13th day of October, 1904, announce and declare these to be our Principles, and this the Platform of our Party:

1.—We declare unequivocally that the foremost mission of the American Union Party shall continue to be unreserved effort to secure the political union of Hawaii with the United States of America.  
2.—We cordially commend the efficient, courageous and honorable conduct of public affairs by the officers of the Provisional Government and Republic of Hawaii.  
3.—We are proud of the party's policy of internal improvements and development, and in witness point to the inauguration of extensive public works, to practical projects of similar nature, and to plans of settlement for open lands.  
4.—We oppose the employment of prison labor in any mechanical pursuit.  
5.—We are opposed to the employment of Asiatics upon any public work.  
6.—We declare against the importation of labor or material of any kind whatever by the Government.  
7.—We recommend that the Government at once secure absolute ownership of all water front lands in every harbor throughout the group, and the possession of such lands by other parties is detrimental to necessary wharfage facilities.  
8.—We favor a revision of the tax system, whereby all property, improved or unimproved, shall be taxed on an equitable basis, and recommend a consideration of the graduated tax system.  
9.—We favor such legislation as will promote the occupancy of all public lands by small holders, and foster the development of varied industries, believing it to be of vital importance that "many acres should be for many men." We ask that Hawaiians have the opportunity to secure homesteads upon more favorable terms than granted to others.  
10.—We are in hearty sympathy with the spirit which actuated the government in its dispatch of a commissioner to search for European labor for the industries of the island; as a further earnest of the intent of the dominant party in these premises we refer to the creation of the Labor Commission by the Councils of the Republic.  
11.—We pledge all the power and influence this party may possess to aggressive endeavor to bring about at once the restriction of Asiatic immigration. In this connection we again point to the menace of Asiatic encroachment, and demand legislative protection from these people for Hawaiian, American and European mechanics and tradesmen.  
12.—We urge the enactment at once of a law that will cause the Asiatics brought to these Islands for plantation labor to continue in that service, or return to their homes.  
13.—We demand such revision of the Tariff as will prohibit competition with American products and manufactures; protection to which America is justly entitled by virtue of the Treaty of Reciprocity, and which we deem necessary to insure the existence of our merchants, who are being rapidly superseded by an element having nothing in common with the principles lying at the foundation of our institutions.  
14.—We urge the Government to secure for the Islands cable communication; that no exclusive franchise be granted, and that no agreement or contract be made which does not meet with the unqualified approval of the United States.  
15.—We ask that there be continued effort in the direction of extending and improving the system of free schools.  
16.—We declare our opposition to Monopolies and Trusts of any kind.  
17.—We declare full allegiance to the Republic of Hawaii, citing its Constitution and the present peaceful condition of the country as work of the American Union Party.
