THE BOARD OF HEALTH IN THE HIGHER COURTS

PRELIMINARY TALK WITH ENGINEER HERING.

Outrageous Wages Compensation for the Closing of Their Fishing Grounds—Usual Weekly Reports.

All the members and officials of the Board of Health were present at the meeting yesterday afternoon, when the regular weekly reports from Dr. Monsarrat, Inspector Keliipio and Agent Meyer of the leper settlement were read and approved, as the first item on the business of the afternoon.

President W. O. Smith reported the receipt of another letter from L. A. Thurston, again calling attention to the claims of certain Chinese clients for \$447.50, estimated damages sustained by them through the order of the Board of Health prohibiting fishing in the harbor. On motion the matter was referred to the Executive Council.

Frank S. Dodge of the Survey Department introduced Engineer Hering to the Board and that gentleman gave the members a talk on filtration, the various methods in vogue in the Eastern States and the probable cost. When asked as to the best method to be pursued here and the material at hand for natural filtration Mr. Hering said he had not been here long enough to be able to answer. Through President Smith Mr. Hering was offered the assistance of the Board and its officials in his work of investigation.

Bids for supplies for the next six months were opened. There were so many of them that the clerk was ordered to classify them in readiness for the next meeting of the Board, when contracts will be awarded.

Dr. Emerson was authorized to have printed in pamphlet form his compilation and rules governing Board of Health matters.

Mr. Smith announced the receipt of a letter from Minister Cooper, stating he had been entertained and shown the quarantine system of the city of Boston, Mass., by Dr. Brough, the government quarantine officer at that port.

As Usual.

The Hawaiian Hotel will serve tomorrow evening one of their famous special Christmas dinners. Every delicacy that generally graces the Christmas board will be served, as only the chief steward under the direction of genial Pete Lucas knows how. Nothing will be lacking from soup to dessert. Music as usual will be on hand and everything will tend to make you feel that this is indeed Christmas.

Christmas Dinner.

Thomas Krouse of the Arlington will serve one of the dinners for which he is famous tomorrow. Mr. Krouse is recognized as the leading caterer of Honolulu and people favoring his table with their presence will be regaled with a repast that will make their hearts glad.

Herr Nolte served the patrons of the Beaver with stuffed turkey and cranberry sauce for lunch today without extra charge.

Republic vs. Parsons and Trouseau vs. Executors were argued in the Supreme Court, prior to adjournment for the holidays this morning.

PIIPIANI COMPLAINS OF BEING DONE UP IN PRISON.

An Unsuccessful Execution Carried and Opinion Considered Subject to Appeal.

Deputy Marshal Hitchcock has made return on an execution issued in the suit of the Minister of Foreign Affairs against Lau Sun, Leong Fai Shang and Geo. Cavanaugh, for the amount of bond on a Chinese six months' residence permit, interest and costs, making \$527.80. After due and diligent search no property belonging to Leong Fai Shang and Geo. Cavanaugh can be found.

Judge Carter has continued the matter of claim for rent on the bankrupt estate of M. S. Levy to Monday next, ordering the attorney of the Tregloan estate to serve a copy of his motion on Thurston & Stanley, attorneys for Theo. H. Davies & Co., mortgagees. Castle for Tregloan estate; Henshall for Levy's assignee.

The California Feed Co. by its attorneys, Magoon & Edings, demurs to the complaint of J. F. Colburn, assignee of H. F. Poor, denying that the goods and chattels in question belonged to the assignee, also denying each and every allegation in the complaint.

Piipilani has brought a bill in equity for specific performance against George Houghtailing and C. J. McCarthy. He alleges that when he was in jail working out a fine of \$303 for selling liquor without license, at the rate of fifty cents a day, Houghtailing repeatedly visited him and, after some time, led him to believe that the only way he could get out was to convey eight certain interests in land to Houghtailing, and that upon his release Houghtailing would reconvey the land to him without valuable consideration.

Complainant executed the conveyance and was released. Houghtailing then gave him an instrument lending to him a certain portion of the lands in question, and covenanting to pay him \$120 a year for the rest of his life. The instrument was not recorded by complainant. He alleges that since the execution of the contract Houghtailing has fraudulently sold and conveyed all of the real estate to divers bona fide purchasers, with intent to prevent complainant from enforcing any judgment he might obtain against that defendant. Among the sales of land was one to S. M. Damon, an innocent purchaser, from whom he received \$8297.50. It is alleged that Houghtailing has never paid any portion of the annuity promised. Further, that he has loaned C. J. McCarthy \$4500 repayable at the rate of \$75 a week.

Houghtailing is summoned to appear and show cause why the Court should not grant the relief sought for the wrongs alleged.

McCarthy is summoned to answer under oath questions regarding the alleged monetary transactions with Houghtailing, and the Court is prayed to enjoin and restrain him from paying Houghtailing any money without its order and direction.

Judge Carter has issued a temporary injunction as prayed for, addressed to C. J. McCarthy. J. A. Magoon is attorney for Piipilani.

In the matter of the libel against 184 cases of crackers and 480 tins of opium, counsel by stipulation have agreed to a decree for confiscation being issued, subject to appeal by any of the parties interested. S. Lowden of the Washington Feed Co. filed an answer to the libel, alleging his ignorance of the number of cases of crackers ordered, also denying that those containing opium had been ordered by his firm. Thurston & Stanley for Lowden; Attorney-General Smith for the Collector-General.

WESTON WILL WALK.

The Oldtime Champion Will Try to Repeat His Best Performance.

New York, December 5.—West on the walker," two decades ago, was well known in every household in this country and England. He had been cheered as the winner of a six-days' walk, with a record of 550 miles for the Astley belt in London, and, on May 11, 1874, Weston accomplished the great feat of walking 112 miles in twenty four hours. That was nearly twenty five years ago. On Christmas night, beginning at 10 o'clock, Weston will attempt to repeat the feat in the ice skating palace.

Nearly all the pedestrians contemporary with Weston have passed away, and his survival and the vigor that induces him to try for this record when nearly sixty years old, he attributes to his temperate habits and careful life. A committee of his friends who recall his old prowess have urged him to attempt the task. The list includes Colonel William Jay, Chauncey M. Depew, Herman Oelrichs, Joseph I. C. Clark, Theodore M. Myers, Theodore Moss, Stuyvesant Fish, Joseph Howard Jr., Colonel Emmas Clark, Foster S. Coates and Cornelius Van Cott.

FAST VESSELS FOR SPAIN.

Two Torpedo-Boat Destroyers Now Ready for Service

A late Glasgow dispatch says: The Spanish torpedo boat destroyers Furor and Terror have now completed their official tests and will leave shortly for Spain. They are bigger than any of their type in the British fleet, being 220 feet long and 22 feet beam. Their armament consists of two fourteen pound rapid fire Maxim-Nordenfelts, two sixteen pounders of the same pattern and two 37-millimeter automatic Maxims. There are also two fourteen inch deck pivoted torpedo tubes on the Schwartzkopf system. The mean of the Furor on a measured mile was one point over twenty eight knots, which speed was also maintained on a two hours' run in a hard southwesterly wind.

London's Fish Supply.

The Sheffield Telegraph's London correspondent learns that a company, with a capital of £500,000, is about to be started for the purpose of bringing fresh fish right into the very heart of the metropolis. For this purpose thirty four steam strawlers have been ordered, each one of which will cost £10,000. These will be in constant touch with the fishing grounds to bring the produce up the Thames to Billingsgate Market. Every requirement that science dictates for the preservation of fish during the voyage is being complied with, and the promoters of this giant undertaking, the leading spirits of which hail from Grimsby, are confident of revolutionizing the fishing industry as well as of establishing a most profitable enterprise.

THE FATE OF A PROMINENT PREACHER IN ILLINOIS

Late in November the following shocking story was wired from Bloomington, Illinois: Jas. Miller, pastor of Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, Bloomington, was found murdered and robbed in an alley at Decatur, Ill., this morning. The revolver with which the crime was committed was lying by the dead man's side. His pockets were rifled, and his gold watch was missing. The murder was evidently committed by foot-pads. Miller had written a note to his son, Dr. John Miller, in Decatur, stating that he would visit him today, and had evident by just arrived from Bloomington. Miller was one of the ablest and best known ministers in Illinois.

Phagocytosis of Clubhouses.

Philadelphia is to have the biggest clubhouse in the world erected on land owned by Broad, Sanson, Fifteenth and Maravan streets, that has cost \$250,000. It is to be the home of the Union League. The building which are to be demolished to make room for it embraces some of the most notorious in the Quaker City. One of them is the structure from the garret window of which an unclad drunken inmate named Nola Woods lashed a crowd on the eve of city government for over an hour until a carpenter managed to saw away the bolted trans-door to make way for the admission of pers to in-ersted in suppressing her, and whose expenses of the Philadelphia gas trust finally landed Yerkes of Chicago and City Treasurer Marcer of Philadelphia in the penitentiary. That garret window speech is credited with having broken up the Philadelphia gas trust.

CHRISTMAS.

Readers of the BULLETIN all know what Christmas is, what it means, what are its obligations to superiors, inferiors and equals—as to visible station and actual holdings of this world's gear. They are all commended to make the best use possible of the merry season. "Be good and you'll be happy," about fills the bill as a motto for Christmas Eve. Do good and you'll be still happier. To one and all—patrons, borrowers, friends and foes—the BULLETIN wishes a Merry Christmas.

SHORT MEMORIES.

This paper took up the advocacy of annexation in a special way at about even date with the revived movement now under way. It was no change excepting in point of activity. As a matter of fact the subject of annexation had for long up to that time received but scant attention from any party or press. Many of the earliest adherents of the cause—including some whose forwardness as such secured them snug offices—had begun to argue against annexation and in favor of independence. From the first issue of the present series of the BULLETIN, however, not an article has appeared in it opposed to annexation. This journal has, on the contrary, constantly kept prominent the fundamental nature of this item of national policy. Its maintained freedom to criticize general details of the administration should only emphasize, with thoughtful people, the constancy of its course in regard to the cardinal aim of this republic. The BULLETIN even in its oldest series was really the prophet of annexation, holding with frequency that, when the monarchy should become no longer tenable, the United States would be the natural and rightful harbor of refuge for Hawaii. It is true that this paper has been against the raising of false hopes regarding annexation, as in the case of the absurd contention that the evasive reference to Hawaii in the Republican platform—declaring simply for a "control" that had already been established many years—meant a commitment of that party when it came into power to the annexation of these islands. An intimation in the BULLETIN some time ago, that it would propound a feasible scheme of political union, was shortly followed by the submission of a scheme involving the legislation by the American Congress of a sort of colonial system, which should not only fit the case of Hawaii but of other countries that destiny may, in the near future, bring within the moral obligations of the United States to govern or at least protect. Many men of mind have conceded the theory to be a good one, but at the same time expressed the opinion, founded on the known conservatism of American politics,

that there are quicker modes of attaining the end in view than awaiting the adoption of a colonial system by the United States. The foregoing assertions of fact respecting the BULLETIN's position—which could be fortified by others—are submitted with a challenge to disproof, for the especial benefit of all whose interest it seems to be to cultivate shortness of memory.

AN UNTRUTH CORRECTED.

There has been no presentation of the Annexation Club's roll to employees of the BULLETIN, under any the slightest constraint, for signature. A copy of the roll as a matter of course lies in the office of one of the proprietors, he being a member of the executive of the club, and has been voluntarily signed by some of the business staff. The editor finding the scroll accidentally under his hand promptly signed it, as a registered elector of this Republic from its early days and a member of the American Union party since its organization. When the BULLETIN, in its last previous series, was holding out for restoration of the monarchy by the United States Government, in reparation of the disavowed action of its agents in overthrowing it by armed force, its employers were allowed the utmost freedom of action. The native Hawaiian foreman of the BULLETIN joined the original Annexation Club, and carried a torch in the procession organized in fare well to Minister Stevens. This man's action was not resented and it was only out of curiosity that he was even asked to explain his motive. His answer was satisfactory in its manliness, and he was permitted in peace to make his honest livelihood from "royalist" employ. "I considered the future welfare of my children," was the simple explanation.

WHICH DAY?

Lately the London Times discussed with elaboration the question, not altogether new, as to whether the next century would begin with the year 1900 or 1901. It decided in effect that if the dating figures of each year are cardinal numbers the present century will end with December 31, 1899, but if they are to be taken as ordinal numbers like the days of the month the century will pass with the last day of 1900. In other words: Was the first year of the Christian era to be written 0 or 1? The Times favors the ordinal numeration, which makes the glorious XIX. close at midnight of December 31, 1900. It is probably right in its conclusion, but an ignorant man up a tree would like to ask why the astronomers, who can fix the day and the hour of a solar or a lunar eclipse a thousand years in either the past or the future, cannot inform us whether we are living in the 358th day of the 1896th or the 1897th year of the Christian era, counting by the revolutions of the earth round the sun.

It is the cordial hope of the San Francisco Chronicle that the desire of Hawaii for a cable will soon be gratified, as the value of such a means of communication to the United States would be very great. The author of so wondrous kind and unselfish a sentiment must feel the sproutings of his angel plumage.

San Francisco lawyers are reverting to primitive ways. One struck at another with his fist in court the other day. The judge said such conduct was reprehensible, but he didn't fine the practitioner for not having a pistol on him.

Turkey would rather execute reformers than reforms.

POLICE COURT MATTERS.

Judge Wilcox Has a General Round-Up of Opium Cases.

There was a very pronounced smell of opium in the atmosphere of the District Court this morning when His Honor Judge Wilcox ascended the rostrum and announced himself in readiness to administer justice as required, either in doses of the straight article or tempered with a little mercy. The smell of opium came from the numerous dope outfits gathered together by Cordes & Co. and to be produced in evidence in the various cases to be brought up.

There were twenty eight cases on the calendar this morning and all but three of the defendants were charged with opium in possession. In many of the cases where there were two or three defendants one of them pleaded guilty and the others were not prosecuted. Whether they all chipped in afterwards and helped pay the \$50 fines of the seagoats does not appear on the record, and, as one of the effects of the use of opium seems to be to close the mouths of its devotees, will probably never be known. Those fined \$50 each were King Wa, Nick Hiu and Ah Chaw. In the matter of Ah Lam, Chau Choy and Abuna charged with smoking opium in a room in the rear of the new Chinese theater last Sunday, the prosecution dropped the case after hearing the testimony of Gus Cordes and several others who made the arrests.

The gang of Chinese arrested in the Ho Sin Kee building last night for smoking opium reserved their plea until Saturday and are out on bail in the meantime.

Chin Cook, who pleaded guilty of the same offense, had his sentence suspended for thirty days to allow of his leaving the country in the meantime.

Kaili, a confirmed petty larceny thief, was given a Christmas box behind the ear in the shape of a sentence of six months' hard labor.

Cupid Kalaniadole was the next to face the stern majesty of the law. Cupid was charged with assaulting Collector Lloyd of the Electric Light Works when the latter, to use a common expression, "shoved a bill in his face." Cupid pleaded "guilty with extenuating circumstances," claiming that Lloyd insulted him without cause in presenting the bill. His Honor, without going into further particulars, made it an even \$5 fine and knocked off the costs.

After fining Lee \$20 for peddling cheap tickets Judge Wilcox adjourned court until Saturday morning and went home to his Christmas turkey with a clear conscience and that good appetite which is said to accompany it.

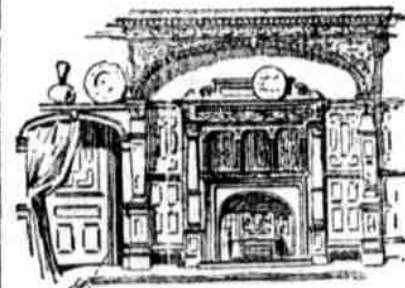

INTERIOR FITMENTS.

This Leading Feature in Decoration Wonderfully Transforms a House.

The term fitments is most comprehensive, including, as it does, paneling, archways, overdoors, window seats, bookcases and cupboards, in addition to fitted furniture for bedrooms, libraries and rooms of every description. They have become quite a leading feature in modern decorations, being used with most of the prevailing styles, and by their kindly aid, combined with judicious management, an ugly square room may be transformed beyond recognition. All kinds of wood are employed for fitments—oak, mahogany, walnut, pine and the modest bamboo—and each may

produce a good effect if appropriately applied. Oak and mahogany look best in dining room, library or hall, while walnut and painted pine are suitable for drawing room or bedroom.

Archways are a simple fitment used always with Moorish decorations, and they are also a pretty addition when used between two rooms, in place of folding doors and nicely draped with handsome curtains.

The overdoor is an immense improvement to dining room or hall, as it lends importance to the entrance and renders the squareness of the opening less noticeable. In the same way the window seat gives an air of comfort to both sitting room and hall, and no other fitment is so easy of construction. All that is required is to have the seat sufficiently wide to form a comfortable lounge and the cushions well upholstered.

Perhaps the most universal fitment has been the so-called "cozy corner," of which little is now heard.

Fitted bookcases are both decorative and useful, welcome and apropos in almost any room and quite essential in a library. Some are fitted from floor to ceiling, while others go only half way, forming a sort of dado, and are finished with a shelf ledge, useful for the display of a few choice ornaments. Among other most useful fitments are cupboards, and these, again, can be made of any kind of wood and take up their position in hall or bedroom.

Many libraries are now furnished

with fitted furniture. The mantelpiece, bookshelves, writing table and window seat are so arranged that a part of one piece often goes to form part of the next. The same with bedrooms. The bed, dressing table, washstand, wardrobe and fireplace are all fitments designed specially for the place they occupy.

Such arrangements make exceedingly tasteful and elegant rooms, economizing space and suiting the furniture to its position in a way which could hardly be done with separate pieces.

Points About Boiling.

Mrs. Ewing, in her "Art of Cookery," mentions some points about boiling that may not have suggested themselves to all the housewives. When the density of water is increased by the addition of salt or sugar or some other substance, it retains heat longer and requires a higher temperature to make it boil, but on mountains, or where the pressure of the atmosphere is lessened by any cause, it boils at a lower temperature. The thermometer shows that under ordinary conditions at the level of the sea water boils at 212 degrees, and that after it has reached the boiling point and begins to escape in steam it is only a waste of fuel to increase the heat of the fire. The water will evaporate or pass off in steam more rapidly by the addition of more heat, but it will grow no hotter, and articles immersed in it will cook no sooner by being rapidly boiled.

Evening Dress For Men.

In evening dress fabrics finer, softer and more beautiful blacks are distinguishing features. Favorite materials are twills, plain, sharp raised, dress, corkscrew and whipcord in the finest of worsteds, some of which are dull or dead faced; undressed worsted twills, worsted broadcloths, dress vicunas, vicuna hopsacks, tibets, dress granites, dress crapes, all of which are used for a complete suit, although the trouserings are generally a trifle heavier than coat and vest. White silk and marseilles vestings are favored to such a degree that it has come to be considered old foggyish to wear the black waistcoat with evening dress, except on certain occasions when the white vest would be obviously out of order, according to the New York Herald, which reports the foregoing.

A. P. A. IN CALIFORNIA.

Some Libel Suits Pending at San Francisco.

In a recent issue some particulars were given of a libel suit against President Hudelson of the American Protective Association, brought by persons whom he had charged with corrupt transactions in the name of the order. A late San Francisco paper tells of a warrant having been issued for the arrest of Father Peter C. Yorke, editor of the Monitor, on the charge of criminal libel.

The libel complained of was published in the Monitor of October 17. It was in the shape of an article that reads as follows:

"Spicy minutes of Council No. 1. The records of the doings of Council No. 1 is becoming awfully spicy. We ask our readers to pursue this week's installment very carefully, as it tells the tale of the Sacramento convention. Old Thistleton of the defunct Jolly Giant told the members how he was an A. P. A. before there were any A. P. A.'s and how Rome's red hand finally landed him in San Quentin."

The complaint continues that Father Yorke, in making this statement about the complaining witness, wilfully and maliciously libeled him, as it is false and defamatory.

Judge Campbell fixed Father Yorke's bonds in the sum of \$1000, and the warrant was handed to a policeman to serve upon him.

As soon as it was known that there was a warrant out for the arrest of Father Yorke there was the greatest excitement in the City Hall, and a large number of people called at Judge Campbell's chambers to learn the particulars.

Oakland, Cal., Dec. 9.—The Rev. Father Yorke, in his lecture at Oakland last night, referred to the suit as follows:

"I have just escaped from San Francisco, where, I am told, there is a warrant out for my arrest on a charge of having spoken disrespectfully of something that has long been a stench in the nostrils of respectable people on both sides of the bay. I am told that I have been sued for having spoken disrespectfully of one Thistleton. If I have ever said anything about him I trust it was disrespectful. I would not recommend this Thistleton to the care of the police, but I think he should be inspected and fumigated by the San Francisco Board of Health."

TO OPEN THE HELLESPOINT.

Project of Powers to Solve the Turkish Problem.

London, Eng., Dec. 3.—The Daily News will tomorrow say that the powers will shortly consider a project having its object the occupation by Russia of the northwest corner of Turkey, formed by the Bosphorus, which, together with the Hellespont, will be dismantled and the powers will assume the protection of the Hellespont and Constantinople. The paper adds that the project provides for the Sultan retiring from the rulership of Turkey.

How to Tell a Horse's Age.

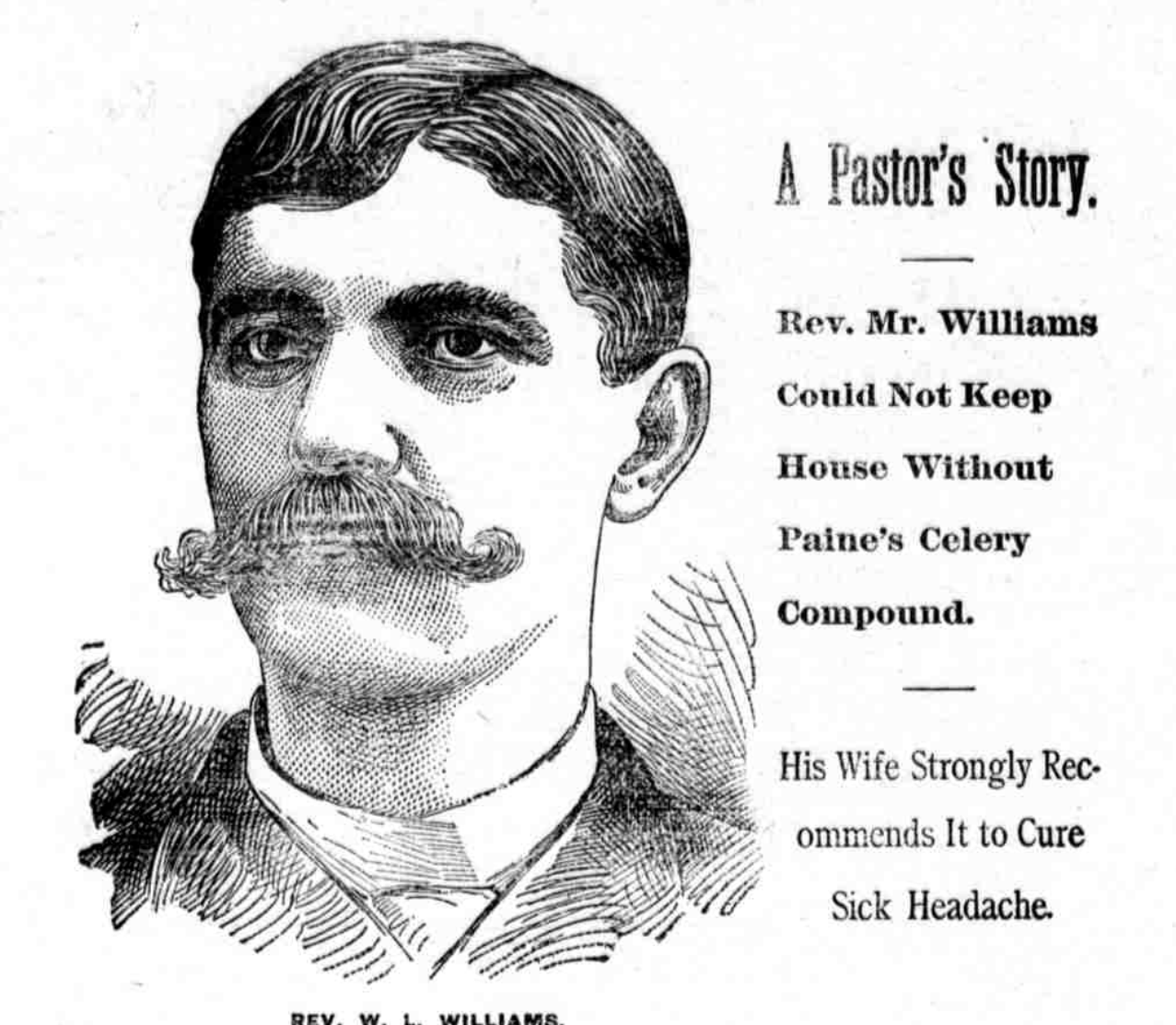

ON THE CITY FRONT

THE BARK OAKBANK DEPARTED FOR NEW YORK.

The German bark J. C. Glade Inward - Mikahala in Port - Other Notes of Interest.

The P M S S China from San Francisco may be looked for tonight, she being due tomorrow.

The steamers Lehua and Waiwalele leave at 4 this afternoon for Hawaii and Kanai respectively.

Tomorrow, high tide large 7:42 a.m. high tide small 8:48 p.m.; low tide large 2:72 p.m.; low tide small 6:7 a.m.

The steamer J. A. Cummins came in this forenoon with a light cargo - she had a rough trip from windward Oahu.

The sailings will leave for San Francisco on or about the 10th of January. The vessel will take up the first cargo of 1897 sugar from this port - Hilo Tribune.

A chance for aptown people to see the new steamer Albatross in all the splendor of electric light will be given tonight, she is lying at Inter-island wharf.

A large forenoon vessel was sighted 7 miles south of Oahu today. The captain of an island steamer says she looked to be light, and is probably one of the sugar fleet.

The steamer Keahou arrived at 1:30 today from the Garden Isle with a heavy cargo of paddy and 15 deck passengers. She experienced the rough weather now prevailing.

The steamer Mikahala arrived from Hawaii and Maui this morning. Very rough weather was experienced during the round trip, on account of which the steamer brought a light cargo.

The British bark Oakbank, Robert Seobey, master, sailed this morning for New York. She took 41,575 bags of sugar, weighing 5,195,541 lbs, and valued at \$153,271. The cargo was shipped by Wm. G. Irwin & Co to the American Sugar Refining Co.

The German bark J. C. Glade arrived in this morning, and anchored in the stream. She cleared on Aug 15, and sailed on the 16th from Liverpool, Eng. with a full cargo of general merchandise. Fine weather was the rule throughout the voyage, during which there was no sickness or serious mishaps on board. J. C. Blumstein is a passenger by the Glade.

It is not generally known that there are a number of actors on the waterfront. They usually congregate on the top of a pile of merchandise on some dock, and accuse one another of being "a fake." There are "Bill," the comedian and minstrel, "Doc," the "wheel of the front," "Beardless Bill," the military dramatist, and several others of lesser fame. There was a reunion on Brewer's wharf this morning which was very amusing to a few people who do not belong to the Waterfront Ex-actors' Club.
