I appreciate very much the opportunity given to me, via this means, of conveying to you and the members of the Oahu Counselor's Association in convention assembled my greetings and best wishes for the success of your endeavors.

Education in America, fortunately, is not geared to the creation of memory machines but rather, in recognition of the individuality of its students, stresses instead the development of the capabilities and potentials inherent in each. In so doing, the child is guided also in learning more of himself and in finding a place and a useful function in his society. The task is not often an easy one for it calls for an abundance of patience and an intimate knowledge of the intricate workings of each individual student. Unfortunately, this is often denied or cursorily applied because of too many students, too little time, and too few teacher-counselors.
