Griswold, the Republican candidate for Governor of New York, from the New York Department, containing interesting facts about the first monitor: "The fame of the Monitor and of the French Glove induced the belief that wooden walls were signaling the end of the water world to be superseded, led Congress, by an Act approved August 3, 1861, to make an appropriation of \$1,500,000 for the construction of one or more armored, or iron-plated, vessels, and the Naval Board to a model of an iron-plated vessel made by John Ericsson which they had brought with them, and suggested the propriety of building a vessel after his plan. The suggestion at that time was not received with much favor, but no conclusion was reached. These gentlemen subsequently had an interview with President Lincoln who manifested great interest in the ideas presented. Taking up the model, he examined it closely and critically; commented, in his shrewd and homely way, upon the principles involved in the construction of a vessel upon such a model, spoke favorably of the design, and proposed that they should meet him with the model at the Navy Department. This meeting suggested by Mr. Lincoln himself, was held, he being present. In their report, which was made soon after this meeting, the Naval Board recommended that an experiment be made with one battery of the vessel and portion of her machinery and other ironwork were manufactured at Troy, at the Renesselaer Iron Works, and the Albany Iron Works.
