GOVERNOR DOLE IS SUSTAINED

HE HAS THE HEARTY RESPECT AND SUPPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATION.

AN OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT BY ROOSEVELT. The Governor Appears Before The Senate Committee on Pacific Islands. Judge Little's Candidacy Collapsed.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The following official statement was made at the White House today: "The President, after making careful investigation and hearing as many men as possible, and hearing from others, has come to the conclusion that Governor Dole's course has been such as to warrant his continuance as Governor of Hawaii and entitle him to the respect and hearty support of the Administration."

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The Senate Committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico today heard Governor Dole and other Hawaiians on two bills pending before the committee. Governor Dole and Senator George R. Carter spoke in favor of the bill for the apportionment of Senators in Hawaii and Delegate Wilcox and Edgar Clayless opposed it.

The Advertiser publishes the following dispatch from its Washington correspondent: WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—President Roosevelt's announcement retaining Dole and giving him the administration's hearty endorsement, causes great rejoicing here.

ACROSS THE WATERS LONGEST WIRELESS SEA TALK RECORDED. Kaiser Wilhelm And Lucania Hold Converse When Many Miles Apart—Practical Utility of System.

Capt. Hagemann of the North German Lloyd steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, had the longest wireless sea talk on record with the Cunarder Lucania on a recent trip to Bremen from New York. He says that the Marconi apparatus on both ships worked unusually well.

On the return trip to New York, while in mid-ocean, the Kaiser passed but did not sight the Kronprinz, her sister ship, bound east. They swapped positions, and passengers sent messages across forty miles of water.

The election in the Fourth District was an endorsement of Governor Dole and was a straw to show which way the wind blew. The endorsement of Governor Dole's policy and the support it will have from the chief executive of the nation is not a straw, but a very beam showing which way the cyclone is coming from.

There will be a rise in Hawaiian securities shortly, now that it is known we have a permanence in our executive. The conservative element will begin to feel that there is some chance for investments coming to the desired fruition, instead of being ruined as they would have been had the anti-Dole faction been able to make its point.

The Pacific cable bills in Senate and House seem to be shelved, leaving the route clear for the Mackay cable. We may fairly look forward to the establishment of the cable by November or December of the present year. It will be the last link forged binding Hawaii to the civilized world. The pulse beats of the heart of nations will be felt as readily in Hawaii as in Washington, London or Paris. The first day we receive a through message will be a great day for Hawaii.

Governor Dole and Senator Carter, on one side, and Delegate Wilcox and Cayless on the other, before a committee upon the Hawaii ditch question will settle that matter speedily. Cayless probably has never seen the lands in question and certainly has no intimate knowledge of them. Wilcox is hardly better equipped. Governor Dole has full and accurate knowledge of all land matters, and his evidence will be convincing to the committee and invaluable to those whose rights might have been injured by the blundering bill which Wilcox put in.

Cholera seems to be very prevalent in Manila and the outer districts of Luzon. We have had one serious bout of cholera here, which cost us a considerable amount of money, and with such a warning our health authorities should exercise the strictest vigilance in keeping disease from our shores. The Federal authorities have their duties, and the Hawaiian Territorial officials have theirs. Neither can delegate duties to the other. If the Federal officials fail, it will be no excuse for the Territorial officials. There will have to be the greatest care in protecting the Territory from an insidious and dread disease.

VINDICATION.

The vindication of the policy of Governor Dole is so complete and full that his traducers will now be hurrying like rats to find holes which they can pull in after them. The administration fully endorses Governor Dole, and gives him the honor which he deserves. The Star long ago urged upon Governor Dole to go to Washington and justify his accusers. He had the right as a Governor, to visit the capital and consult with the President, thus becoming acquainted with him, but the Governor would not go until he was summoned. He knew of the calumnies that were being circulated about him, both as to health and as to policy, and he knew how inveterate his enemies were. But he felt that his duty kept him at his post, and he stayed by it nobly, never considering his own private interest for a moment.

It only required a few moments conversation for President Roosevelt to understand and appreciate Governor Dole. The simulaerum of Dole which had been so carefully built up by the anti-Dole faction of Hawaii crumbled into dust. The work of circuit judges neglecting their duties in the Territory for the sake of making political capital, the work of ranchers who were looking for a lead pipe cliche on water franchises, and the work of non-Republicans was all swept away as a warm wind sweeps away the snow off a dyke side.

There could be nothing more satisfactory than the endorsement given to the Governor by the Chief Executive. It is a grand endorsement, and is worthy of the man who gave it forth. In Governor Dole President Roosevelt found a man, and he at once recognized a man. He had no mere self-seeking politician before him, he had no man whom mere accident had put into office, he had no mythic mixture of missionary and pirate as had been represented to him by the hungry office seekers who were after billets for themselves and were ready to turn out any number of Hawaiians to provide for their friends. None of these did he have, but he had a dignified gentleman of mature years, of pleasing and quiet manners, but whose face showed the power of firmness which had tempered the energy of youth. Then when the President in conversation found how deep and how thorough was the knowledge of Hawaiian affairs possessed by Governor Dole and how clear were his ideas, is it any wonder that the result was reached which confirmed Governor Dole for the rest of the present administration and should the administration continue, and the Governor wish to continue, probably for four years longer after the pre-

son form. This is something that the anti-Dole faction had better consider very carefully. With the Governor well known at Washington, and the Governor assured of a long administration, there is a long time ahead of the faction.

Though the vindication of Governor Dole appears in the news columns, The Star wishes to place on record in its official column the official statement which was issued from the White House, April 14. The statement says:

"The President, after most careful investigation and hearing from others, has come to the conclusion that Governor Dole's course has been such as to warrant his continuance as Governor of Hawaii and entitle him to the respect and hearty support of the Administration."

This rings like a trumpet call. It is the kind of thing that Napoleon used to win his soldiers with. What could a man wish for more than to be told that he was entitled "to the respect and hearty support of the Administration?" If in old Rome the worthy citizen gained his laurel or his civic crown, which his descendants treasured as almost a patent of nobility, Governor Dole has won a grander honor than either Roman civic or military crowns or medieval patents of nobility. He has been sustained by the president of the greatest republic that the world has ever known, in his course of action in dealing with one of the most difficult problems that have ever been presented in an honorable, fair dealing and able man.

It is not The Star's purpose to write a panegyric upon Governor Dole. His career from boyhood, through middle age and up to the present has been well known to all who have been connected with him. His astute knowledge of law has been shown again and again, even when his views were against those who were his intimate colleagues. His courage stands unimpeached. When necessity came he was ready to lay down his life even if the United States demanded it.

There need be no further cabals against Governor Dole. The anti-Dole men will have to seek some other person to attack. But all the cabals are going to feel remarkably unhappy. People without a grievance are apt to prey upon themselves.

There is a talk of giving Clara Barton an annuity of \$5,000 for her services as president of the Red Cross society. She certainly deserves some national recognition, but whether it should take a money form is quite a different matter.

Congress will pass the pension bill for Mrs. McKinley. It is almost the last honor that can be paid to the memory of one of the ablest administrators that has been at the head of the United States.

There is some one who wrote "the Devil can quote scripture for his purpose" and it looks very much as if the Judge of the First Circuit Court had equal facility with his Satanic majesty. Not that any one would make a comparison between the two spirits. Far be it from The Star to make comparisons, but some forensic intellect might argue the question as to whether the Circuit Judge would feel more complimented at being compared to His Satanic Majesty, or whether the latter would feel a glow of satisfaction at being compared with the Circuit Judge. It is a question which might be argued at a debating society.

Volcano Marshall seems to have come up against it more quickly in the Philippines than he did in Hawaii. Marshall is an unfortunate man. He is perfectly fearless, believes in the cause he takes up and then becomes the cat's paw of those who have political and other axes to grind. He was used here by designing persons, and he has evidently been used in Manila by the same class of people. Marshall gets his hands burned and the other people get the chestnuts if there are any. One can see in a moment how Marshall has been voicing a cowardly crew who dared not say what he was not afraid to say, and who supplied him with one-sided information which brought him to his unfortunate finish.

Vice Consul Goo Kim is on the point of closing out his business, and retiring from business. He is an excellent example of the thrifty Chinese. Starting with nothing but his own shrewdness, and his innate thrift, hampered by a lack of knowledge of the English language, he has, like many of his countrymen, obtained for himself a competence upon which he can live for the remaining years of his life. And Consul Goo Kim has not been penurious. He has brought up his family on liberal lines, and whenever there has been a call for charity, no matter what the nationality, Mr. Goo Kim was ready with his purse most liberally. There have been and are many successful Chinese merchants of which this city may be proud. They have made their wealth here, but they have spent and are spending their wealth here. They have been good progressive citizens, who have improved lands which would otherwise have remained idle. They have bought and sold the goods manufactured in the United States, and so helped the American working man, and they have given an example of honest and honorable dealing which is worthy of imitation. Mr. Goo Kim retires from active business with the good wishes of a very large circle of friends.
