ENGINEERS TO GO HOME

Washington, March 9.—Four companies of the Second United States Volunteer Engineers, comprising those at Honolulu, are shortly to be called home. They have been on duty there since the outbreak of the Spanish war. They have been maintained at Honolulu and the engineer troops will be relieved either by four companies of the Twenty-fourth Infantry (colored) now in Utah, or by two more batteries of the Sixth Artillery. The batteries of the Sixth Artillery are now in Manila and the remainder of the regiment now distributed along the Atlantic coast under orders to proceed there. Although not yet settled it is probable that two or more of these batteries will be utilized for military service in Hawaii. In that case they will be detached from the expedition on its way to the Philippines. General Shafter, commanding the Department of California, has been informed that the Sixth Artillery may be utilized for this service and has been instructed to recruit the regiment to its maximum strength.

PACIFIC ISLANDS FOR GERMANY.

Belief That Spain Has Agreed to Sell Remaining Possessions.

Manila, March 9.—General Rios has been ordered by the Spanish Government to occupy the Caroline, Mariana and Pelew islands, and it is said that his orders are to hold them pending their delivery to Germany. That would indicate that the sale had been agreed upon. Rios resigned a few days ago because the Madrid Government conferred with Archbishop Nozleda, but the Government placated him.

U. S. TRANSPORT CONEMAUGH

The U. S. Transport steamer Conemaugh arrived in port and hauled alongside the Pacific Mail wharf at about 10 o'clock this forenoon, 8 days and 18 hours from San Francisco. The Conemaugh sailed March 11 at 1:45 p. m. A fine trip throughout was spent.

The Conemaugh has aboard, 60 tons of general cargo and 2500 tons of hay and grain was placed on the decks when the Conemaugh left San Francisco, for consumption on the voyage. Three hundred mules were put aboard at San Francisco, but several died on the voyage. The mules will be taken off here and kept ashore until the Conemaugh is ready to proceed to Manila, about ten days hence.

The officers of the ship are as follows: J. A. Broomfield, Captain; P. C. Rickmers, first officer; J. A. Sanford, second officer; C. L. Arey, third officer; M. A. Tucker, purser; David De Silva, chief engineer; Wm. Douly, first assistant; John Oliver, second assistant; Ed E. Cramp, third officer; Chief Steward, C. Lange.

Captain E. K. Butler of the Arkansas Infantry has charge of the men and live stock. He has under him the following: Hugh Neil [son of the Kansas Senator], clerk; J. A. Welch, veterinary surgeon; John M. Coyne, master of transportation; Harry Hill, wagon master; Ira A. Allen, T. Dowdall and John Gray, hospital stewards, and thirty packers.

Lassued a Chinaman.

In the Police Court this morning, Frank Rodrigues was fined \$5 and costs on the charge of assault and battery. Early Sunday morning, Rodrigues went into Chinatown and, going to one of the butcher shops there, lassued a Chinaman who was cutting up meat. Rodrigues started to pull when another butcher cut the rope. Rodrigues was arrested by Detective Chun Poon and others.

ANOTHER LINE OF STEAMERS

Company Formed Under the Laws of New Jersey.

To Construct Steamers to Ply Between New York San Francisco and Hawaii—More Troops.

New York, March 10.—The American Hawaiian Steam Navigation Company has been incorporated under the laws of New Jersey with an authorized capital stock of \$750,000 for the purpose of operating a line of steamships between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands. The incorporators are George S. Dearborn, Wallace B. Flint, Oscar T. Sewall and Jas. H. Post. The company will construct several large steamships to run from New York and Philadelphia to San Francisco and the Hawaiian Islands.

TROOPS FOR HONOLULU.

Washington, March 10.—In view of the possible necessity of having to use more artillery at Manila in the future than has been required in the past, the War Department issued orders to Battery B, Sixth United States Artillery, now at Fort McHenry, to move as soon as possible to San Francisco, there to take ship for Manila. Two light batteries of the Sixth are already at Manila, and the rest of the regiment has been ordered there, but some of it may stop at Honolulu, relieving the Second United States Volunteer Engineers now there. The Sixth is one of the two regiments authorized by Congress last March.

The Lung Divorce Case.

San Francisco, March 11.—The action recently instituted by Dr. George A. Lung of the United States cruiser Philadelphia for a divorce from his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Lung, on the ground of intemperance, was taken up by Judge Hebbard yesterday morning and a number of interesting depositions bearing on the wife's devotion to the flowing bowl were open and read. Dr. Lung charges that on many occasions Mrs. Lung whom he married in Philadelphia, June 1, 1885, disgraced him while laboring under hallucinations caused by overindulgence in liquor. These charges are corroborated in a large measure by the depositions given by various people of Honolulu.

Anarchists are Responsible.

London, March 9.—London anarchists assert that the responsibility for the explosion in Toulon arsenal on Sunday belongs to them. A French police agent, who, under pretense of being an anarchist, obtained their confidence, found an elaborate plan of the Toulon arsenal at the rooms of an anarchist club in Dean street and also learned that the dynamite cartridges used to blow up the magazine were obtained from a quarry, near the Italia frontier.

Drowned at Sea.

L. Lowman, about 40 years of age, who was from Cincinnati, but had recently visited near Los Angeles, was drowned at sea on Friday morning, March 3d, by falling overboard from the barkentine S. N. Castle, bound from Honolulu to San Francisco. The accident occurred in longitude 150 deg 35 min west, latitude 34 deg 11 min north. The remains were not recovered.—Chronicle, Mar 11.

Italian Cruisers to China.

London, March 11.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says the government has ordered three more cruisers to get in readiness to proceed to Chinese waters in connection with the demand of Italy for a concession of San Mun, province of Chekiang.

\$22,000 MORE FOR ROADS

Granted from Loan Fund for Island of Hawaii.

Formal Statement of Change in Cabinet—Nothing Settled Yet About Vacancy in Foreign Office.

At the meeting of the Executive Council this morning, President Dole announced that a commission had been issued to H. E. Cooper as Attorney General, he having resigned the office of Minister of Foreign Affairs and of Public Instruction.

After the meeting, President Dole stated that the Cabinet had not yet been filed, and there was no information to give out on the subject.

The Council voted money from the Loan fund to roads on the island of Hawaii as follows:

- Upper road from Waimea into Hamakua, \$12,000. Waipunaui to Kuisia and Paas, North Hilo, \$5,000. Branch road to Waikamala and Manua homesteads, \$5,000.

PHILADELPHIA MISSION PEACE.

Washington, March 10.—It is denied positively at the State Department that Rear Admiral Kauz has gone to Samoa on the Philadelphia to restore the status quo existing before the last emute, to depose Mataafa and restore Malietoa Tann, even if force is necessary to accomplish these objects. It is said the admiral has gone to Samoa to meet the treaty obligation that imposed upon the United States to send a warship there at least occasionally as an evidence of the interest held by the United States in the islands. While there he will make a careful examination of the conditions in the island and look into the events up to the installation of the provisional government, reporting all the facts to Washington.

ATTORNEY GENERAL COOPER

Is Introduced to Supreme Court by W. O. Smith, Resigned.

Memorial Resolutions for Judge Widemann and W. L. Holokahala—Law Library Restricted to Uses of Reference.

The Supreme Court opened in March term this morning. First Associate Justice Frear took his seat, along with Chief Justice Judd and Second Associate Justice Whiting, after several months of absence, attending to his duties as a member of the Hawaiian Commission both in Honolulu and Washington.

Judges Perry and Stanley of the First Circuit Court and District Magistrate W. Luther Wilcox were present, together with these members of the bar: W. O. Smith, H. E. Cooper, A. S. Hartwell, Cecil Brown, Paul Neumann, F. M. Hatoh, E. P. Dole, W. Horace Wright, J. A. Magoon, J. M. Davidson, Chas. Creighton, A. W. Carter, A. G. M. Robertson, A. A. Wilder, J. K. Kaula, A. M. Brown, P. L. Weaver, Geo. D. Gear, S. M. Ballou, C. B. McClanahan, W. A. Henstall, A. G. Correa, Geo. A. Davis, W. C. Achi, L. A. Dickey, J. K. Kahoookano, S. F. Chillingworth, J. M. Kaneakua, R. D. Silliman, L. Andrews, A. L. C. Atkinson, J. W. Cathcart, D. H. Case, Henry Smith, J. T. De Bolt, T. McCants Stewart, M. F. Prosser, R. D. M. ad, Geo. Hous, H. P. Weber, J. M. Vivas and J. W. Romaine. Mr. Farragher, an attorney of Eureka county, California, was a visitor.

W. O. Smith, on the opening of the Court, announced his retirement from the office of Attorney General and the appointment, by the President, of Henry E. Cooper in his stead. Mr. Smith expressed his appreciation of the consideration and courtesy always extended to him by the Court. He also desired to acknowledge the excellent services of E. P. Dole as Deputy Attorney General.

The Chief Justice, in noticing the change in the Attorney General's office, paid a high tribute to the faithful services therein for the past six years of Mr. Smith. He was a native of the country who had made his home in it. As Attorney General he had held the entire confidence of the Court, and administered the office in a manner most satisfactory to the country. Mr. Cooper was welcomed as a public man of long experience, including service as a Judge of the Supreme Court. He administered the oath of office to Mr. Cooper.

Attorney General Cooper announced that Mr. Dole would continue as Deputy Attorney General, and the other assistance in the office would be unchanged.

Hon. Paul Neumann arose and stated that at a meeting of the bar a committee had been appointed to present resolutions to this Court on the death of Hon. H. A. Widemann, who was a former Justice of the Supreme Court. In a few feeling remarks he bore high testimony to the generosity of Mr. Widemann's nature, his kindness to strangers, his ability and his spotless integrity, in the large private and high public capacities of his long career in this country. Mr. Neumann closed with the reading of these resolutions:

Whereas: It has pleased the Omnipotent in His wisdom to remove from this World our brother the Honorable Hermann A. Widemann, Second Associate Justice of the Supreme Court from July 10, 1896, until February 18, 1874; be it

Resolved: That through the death of Judge Widemann the Bar mourns the loss of an honored, and the community a conscientious and upright man, a faithful public servant and a loyal friend. Resolved: That our sincere

LAWTON WILL LEAD THEM

Americans Will Now Attack the Insurgents Capital.

Gen. Miller Retired—Transports Arizona and Newport Leave for San Francisco—Otis As Governor General.

New York, March 10.—The Washington correspondent of the Herald telegraphs: The arrival at Manila today of General Lawton with reinforcements, as called to the War Department, means the beginning of an active campaign against the Filipinos. General Lawton will have, under General Otis, command of all military operations in Luzon, while Otis, as Governor General, will direct the conduct of civil affairs and the military operations in other islands.

It was thought the advance of General Hale's brigade several days ago was the beginning of a forward movement, but it is supposed that General Otis decided to await the arrival of Lawton. Now it is expected that offensive operations will begin at once and be directed toward Malolos, the seat of the insurgent government, which the officials say will soon be occupied by American troops.

Instructions were cabled to General Otis today directing him to detach Brigadier General M. P. Miller from the command of troops at Iloilo and order him home for retirement. General Otis will choose General Miller's successor, who will probably be General Anderson or General McArthur.

General Miller's retirement on March 27 will create a vacancy in the grade of brigadier general of the regular army, which in all probability will be filled by the appointment of General Sumner. The latter is likely to be retired at once and General Anderson made brigadier of the regular service so that that officer will not be given a volunteer commission as major general, as originally determined.

The cablegram received at the War Department today dated Manila, March 10, says the transport Grant arrived with the troops in good condition. The Arizona and Newport leave today for San Francisco, the Arizona via Hongkong and the Newport via Nagasaki. The Grant carried to Manila the Fourth Infantry and four companies of the Seventeenth Infantry. This adds to the troops under the command of General Otis 42 officers and 1716 enlisted men.

Peace Conference to Meet May 18.

The Hague, March 9.—The Peace Conference, otherwise the conference of representatives of the powers, called by the Czar to discuss the possibility of taking steps toward a general disarmament, will meet here on May 18.

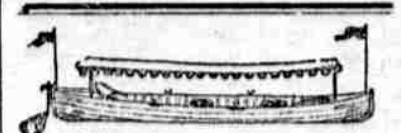

LATE NEWS OF WAILUKU

Hermit Spaniard Castro Found Dead in His Hut.

St. Patrick's Day Celebrated at Spreckelsville—Commissioner Kenny a Visitor—Police Force Expresses Esteem for Mr. Smith.

Wailuku, Maui, March 18.—Mrs. W. A. McKay, post mistress and wife of the District Magistrate, left for Honolulu per Mauna Loa last Tuesday. She leaves for the Coast per S. S. Doric to spend a well earned vacation. Judge McKay will attend to the duties of the postoffice during her temporary absence from the country.

Genial Manager W. F. Pogue of the celebrated Kihai Plantation paid Wailuku a flying visit on Monday of this week. He reports everything going on harmoniously at Kihai.

Mr. Kahala an old hand on the Wailuku plantation has gone to Kihai. He is said to be an all round plantation man, as he understands plantation work to a nicety, from the care of males to laying flames along precipitous places.

Senator A. N. Kopoikai took the Kinau last Wednesday morning at Maalea for Waimea, Hawaii.

Among the visitors to Wailuku town this week was a Mr. Zetwitz who is said to be a fine musician. He was Austrian vice consul at San Francisco for some time, so his friends claim.

Ex British Commissioner W. J. Kenney was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. L. von Tempsky this week. The noted visitor paid visit to the great extinct crater of Haleakala and today Mr. Kenney visited Lao valley. He returns to Honolulu per Claudine.

The members of the Wailuku Hai Aloha Aina (Native Patriotic Society) met at the skating rink last Wednesday evening for the purpose of getting up resolutions of condolence relating to the death of the late Prince Kauiulani. The meeting authorized Messrs. Tom Clark, J. T. Alali and S. E. Kaina as committee to formulate the resolution and forward to the Hon. A. S. Cleghorn.

Geo. Hons, of the firm of Hons & Coke, goes to town today. But he has no aspirations after the attorney generalship of the Republic.

The news of the resignation of Mr. W. O. Smith from the Cabinet was received with profound regret by all Maui today, and the Wailuku police force as a small mark of their esteem for their departing head raised a subscription and in a little while over \$100 was collected. The money will be forwarded to the Marshal today.

The road from Waieba to H. nokohau has been so damaged by the recent freshet that traffic has been impeded. A new bridge 32 feet long by 16 feet wide is greatly needed at the present time and Mr. D. Crowell, the head jailor of Wailuku, has already submitted his plans to Sheriff Baldwin as head of the Road Board; but of course the drawback is as usual "no appropriation." Means however will be devised for raising the necessary \$600 to enable Mr. Crowell to go ahead with the erection of the bridge. There are two bridges on either side of the proposed bridge.

A ball will be given by the Spreckelsville ladies and gentlemen this evening at their dancing hall. The evening is in commemoration of Kamehameha III. and St. Patrick's Day combined. A great time is anticipated. Some of the Wailuku swells will be on hand. About eight of the Wailuku leading young men celebrated Kamehameha III.'s Day on Friday afternoon at the Market street restaurant.

G. B. Robertson, manager of the Windsor, one of Wailuku's favorite resorts for visitors, is having an annex to his hotel built. He has an eye to the coming summer vacation.

Sheriff Baldwin was summoned to the Kula district yesterday to look into the matter of the reported death of an old Spaniard by the name of Joe Castro. It seems that this man about 80 years old afflicted for years with asthma had for years lived by himself in a small hut built by

his own hands. His friends have always desired to care for him, but the eccentric old Spaniard did not care for the attentions of society, so he always preferred to live the life of a hermit, even when old and almost helpless. A Chinaman who lived within 1000 yards of the old Spaniard, missed the old man for a long time and on his going with others the other day to Castro's hut, they found him dead and in a very advanced stage of decomposition as if dead almost a month. When the Sheriff accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Wm. King of Makena reached Kula yesterday, they were directed to the place. They found the body of the old man still lying prostrate on his bed with his face upward. It was a difficult matter for the Sheriff and others to drive away the faithful dog of the old man which was found still keeping constant vigil by the deathbed of his master. By order of the Sheriff the old hut was knocked down and stones heaped upon it in order that the remains may be there undisturbed by wild animals. The Sheriff after making most careful investigations from other Spaniards who knew the deceased, decided that it was unnecessary to hold an inquest. It was the dog, it is claimed, that kept the dead body from being eaten up by pigs long ago.

Last Tuesday evening, the sleeping apartments of Sing Chong, an employe of the Hackfeld & Co.'s Lahaina store, was burned, but no damage was sustained as the fire was extinguished.

Why not name J. H. Soper for Minister of Foreign Affairs?

The simplicity of Coin Harvey and 16 to 1 isn't "in it" when compared with the "financial studies" of the official organ.

Night does not follow day with more constant regularity than the other papers follow the lead of the BULLETIN in publishing the news of the day.

It is rather tough when the veteran of two wars who has succeeded in dodging leaden hail, should be seriously "done up" in a cricket match.

The Iroquois may be a little thing, but her captain knows how to make his boat indisputable to local marine interests as well as the United States government.

There certainly is a limit to the advance in sugar stock values. When will the limit be reached? Is what is worrying those who watch the stock board figures.

The official organ has decided that in the discussion of the Cabinet crisis it is the time for disappearing. For once in its career the organ has shown itself politically wise.

Herbert Myrick, the great I am of the beet sugar industry in California booming beets and incidentally condoning Hawaii. Herbert ought to come to Hawaii and see what it is like.

The time is not far distant when the automobile carriage will be an active factor in the rapid transit problem of Honolulu. High priced horse feed is doing good work in the line of up-to-date transportation progress.

It is not surprising that an open fight is on between the President and Speaker Reed. At the present stage of the game McKinley has the unqualified support of the majority of his party and the people as well.

If it is true that contract Japanese laborers are being landed at ports of the northwest, Hawaii is not the only American locality whose attention should be called to the text "If sinners entice thee." The chances are that general anti-Asiatic legislature is not a far distant proposition.

A Hilo correspondent writes, "I see by the BULLETIN that we are to have a railway out of Hilo. Is it really true?" The fact that the BULLETIN says so is sufficient. Hilo will most certainly have a railway if the Cabinet does not block the progressive activities of some of our best business men.

It now appears that the friendship of Porto Ricans for the American troops is of a decidedly negative type. Uncle Sam's new army will doubtless have sufficient opportunity to distinguish itself during the coming year. Driving out Spain is by no means a play company with establishing American sovereignty.

Conditions in the new possessions continue to hold a very prominent place before the public. The most serious development is the appearance of a disposition toward revolt in Cuba and Porto Rico. Although freed from Spanish tyranny, the century part of opposition to outside sovereignty has not been rooted out.

Comparative quiet reigns in the Philippines, but now that General

Lawton has arrived the indications are favorable to a general advance all along the American line. Aguinaldo will be attacked in the capitol of his struggling republic and before many months he will be taught that independence can be gained only through submission to a power in whose capacity for control the nations of the world have confidence. The people anticipate that something decidedly positive will drop when Lawton gets in the field.

Resolved: That this Honorable Court be moved that when it adjourns this day it adjourns out of respect to the memory of its Ex-Member, the late Honorable H. A. Widemann.

Hon. A. S. Hartwell, who had been a colleague of Justice Widemann on the bench, spoke in high praise of his ability, referring especially to his dealing with the land laws. Mr. Hartwell concluded with sentiments of personal affection for the departed gentleman. He was a man of large ideas, there was nothing mean about him.

Hon. W. O. Smith briefly added his tribute to the public and private worth of the lamented jurist, speaking from a long and intimate acquaintanceship.

Chief Justice Judd said he was the successor of Justice Widemann on the bench, and, briefly eulogizing his qualities, made special reference to the great share he had taken in developing the material interests of the country. He ordered the resolutions spread on the records, and announced that when the Court adjourned at 12 o'clock noon it would be for the day in respect to the memory of the late Judge Widemann.

Hon. W. O. Smith then moved, seconded by J. K. Kaulia, the resolution of respect for the memory of W. L. Holokahiki, who at death was the oldest member of the Hawaiian bar, with the exception of Hon. D. H. Hitchcock. Both mover and seconder made appreciative remarks on the character of the departed attorney. Mr. Smith laying stress upon his high respectability and strict honor.

The Chief Justice, with kindly remarks of his own, made an order in accordance with the resolutions.

Chief Justice Judd called attention to the removal of books from the Law Library. Members of the bar had every facility of consulting the books on the premises, and the value of the library was much impaired by books being out when wanted.

A general discussion ensued. Some speakers thought young and struggling attorneys would be at a great disadvantage if not allowed to borrow books.

Ultimately Mr. Ballou moved that the Law Library be strictly reference and no books be removed therefrom except for use in the courts, which carried on a show of hands by 36 to 6.

The calling of the calendar was then begun.

Would Not Stop His Car.

While Car No. 2, driven by a Portuguese, was going toward Palama in the vicinity of Muna, Kea street 1:55 p. m. Sunday, a Chinaman hailed it. The driver paid no attention to the would-be passenger and drove on. The Chinaman grasped the front part of the car and, running along by the side, tried to jump on. As he did so he fell partly under the car and might have had his arm crushed, had he not drawn it out suddenly. Much of this kind of work has been done by Portuguese car drivers of late. In this case, the driver was entirely to blame.

THAT CHINESE RAILROAD.

Satisfactory Understanding Said to be Reached With Great Britain.

London, March 10.—The Daily Graphic, usually well informed, made the following announcement today:

The Niu Chwang loan contract crisis has been amicably settled by a direct exchange of views between the British and the Russian government. The Russian assurances are completely satisfactory. The whole difficulty is ended and the two governments are arranging a scheme by which their relations in the Far East may be permanently regulated.

The London Times, in its financial article on February 1st, announced that a Chinese 5 per cent railroad loan of \$11,500,000 had been arranged by China with a British syndicate, the loan being specially secured on the Chinese Northern railroad.

China, it was added, had given Great Britain a pledge that these railroads would not be alienated to any foreign power. It is apparently against this loan or its terms that Russia protested, the transaction since becoming known as the Niu Chwang, or Hongkong loan. Niu Chwang is the Chinese port at the head of the Gulf of Liao Tung, the port of Muckden, capital of Manchuria.

"POOR LITTLE JO."

Kipling Bears the Death of His Favorite Child.

New York, March 10.—"Mr. Kipling is still improving," said Mr. Doubleday tonight.

Mr. Kipling had taken some sweetbread for supper and had been able to eat more of solid food than at any time since he became ill.

Unable to keep Mr. Kipling in ignorance of the death of his favorite daughter, Josephine, the news was broken to him tonight by Dr. Dunham. The blow was a heavy one, but the father bore up bravely.

"How long was she ill?" he asked.

He was then told as much as the attendants thought wise. Tears stood in the poet's eyes, and he murmured half to himself, half aloud, "Poor little Joe." It was thus he always called the little one.

The doctors believe it was best to break the news, as the worry and distrust he seemed to have in all the replies given to his queries about the little one would probably have been more harmful than to let him have the truth.

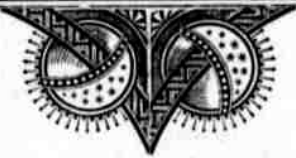

Helen N. Kimball. The owners of the schooner Helen N Kimball are wondering what has become of their vessel. She left Eureka on December 3 last in company with the schooner Esther Bubne. The Kimball was bound for Panama with a load of lumber and the Bubne for Honolulu with a similar cargo. The Bubne arrived at this port December 30, discharged and loaded and was back in San Francisco on February 2. A week later she was on her way to Puget Sound and March 8 she sailed again from New Whatcom for San Francisco. The Kimball has not been heard from since she left Eureka 107 days ago. Panama is about 1200 miles further south of Eureka than is Honolulu, but the Esther Bubne has covered three times that distance since she left Eureka in company with the Helen N Kimball.
