CORONERS' INQUESTS.

One can scarcely read any of the large Australian or New Zealand weekly journals without finding records of Coroners' Inquests. In those colonies all deaths from accidents, and all violent and unexpected deaths, from any cause whatsoever, are inquired into and pronounced upon by a coroner's jury. In all cases of sudden deaths with no visible cause, an autopsy is made, and the result reported to the jury, by the medical examiner on oath. Whether or not a post mortem shall be held or an inquest instituted is not left to the choice of the friends of the deceased. This question is decided by the Government authorities, without reference to private wishes, and in all suspicious or doubtful cases they invariably decide for inquiry. The usage was adopted, and is continued, in the interests of humanity, and it is so viewed and accepted by the people, who have the sense to see that it is the surest way of minimizing, as well as the most likely means of detecting and punishing, foul play.

We venture the opinion that the cause of humanity would be served and the interests of medical science advanced, in this Kingdom, by a closer imitation of Australia and New Zealand's example. Instead of insisting upon coroners' inquests in all cases of death from doubtful cause, our authorities evince a disposition to evade the responsibility of inquiry whenever possible. This is a state of things which renders crime of a certain character practicable, with little danger of discovery. The press has often called attention to the matter and advocated amendment, particularly the Commercial Advertiser, during the term of Mr. H. L. SHELTON's editorial management; but there is very little, if any, improvement between now and ten years ago. "Great bodies move slowly;" but as long as there is some "movement" there is a kind of satisfaction and expectation kept alive. Our ponderous, phlegmatic Government requires vigorous outside pushing before the slightest "movement" is perceptible in the direction of beneficial reform.

ACCIDENTS.

On Monday afternoon a young boy named Moses Kamanao was oiling the machinery in Lucas' Planing Mill. While he was oiling under the circular saw it got started accidentally. Luckily for him he did not raise his head or the injuries might have been fatal. As it was he received two severe scalp wounds about an inch and a half long. Medical assistance was at once procured, and the boy was placed under Dr. McKibbin's treatment who pronounces that the boy will be all right very soon.

A South Sea Islander named Billy yesterday had his skull fractured by a block falling on him from the foremast of the Likelike. At first he was thought to be in a dying state and medical attendance was procured. Afterwards he was taken to the Queen's Hospital where his wound was dressed and examined. Good hopes are entertained of his recovery.

POLICE COURT—DECEMBER 11. CRIMINAL DOCKET.

Kahoohana, w., having opium in possession, nolle pro. requested by prosecution.

Kekula, k., having opium in possession. Plead guilty to the charge and admitted to the Court that he had served out a sentence before for the same offence. Sentenced to 3 months' imprisonment at hard labor, and to pay a fine of fifty dollars and costs taxed at \$1.

Lee Sing, Lau Chiu, Lee Ving, Lee Ying, violating the Sabbath, forfeited bail, \$10. The above four Chinamen were caught playing dominoes. Besides these there were 22 others, chiefly for being drunk or for affrays, who were fined, as usual.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—An Act was passed in the last Legislature to "Provide for the licensing of Dairies," &c. Possibly the law was meant to drive all those who cannot afford to pay for a license into making butter, which sometimes is a scarce article, and let somebody monopolize the milk business.

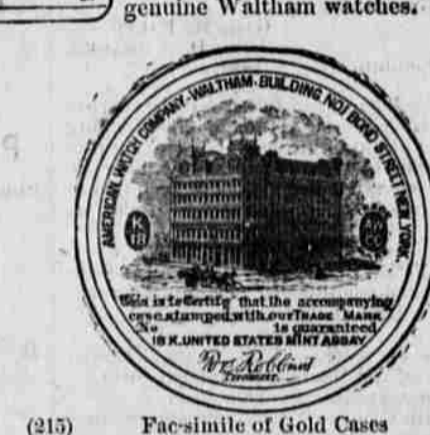

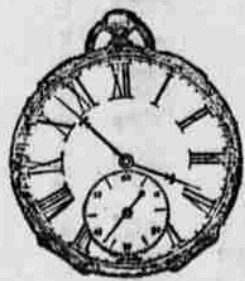
