## MEETING OF COUNCILS.

Consideration of Status of Government Employees Regarding the Rebellion.

There was a meeting of the Executive and Advisory Councils this afternoon. Present: W. F. Allen, chairman; Ministers Hatch, King, Damon and Smith; Councillors D. B. Smith, J. F. Morgan, John Nott, J. A. Kennedy, F. A. Hosmer, John Ena, Geo. P. Castle, C. B. Wood and E. D. Tenney.

A communication was read from the Hilo Conservative Association, asking for the removal of Sheriff Williams of Hawaii, on the ground of incapacity and stupidity. Judge Barnard of Laupahoehoe was given as a reference. The communication was signed by E. E. Richards, secretary.

Mr. Hosmer asked for information as to the personnel of the association.

Minister Smith thought the petition should not have come before the legislative body, as it was a matter for executive action. He moved that the matter be referred to the Executive Council. Carried.

Dr. Wood submitted the following resolution from a convention of the volunteer military organizations:

"At a meeting of the properly-accredited representatives of the volunteer military and special police department, the following preamble and resolution was adopted for presentation to your honorable bodies, and we ask that you will give to the statements herein made such action as their importance may warrant:

"WHEREAS, During the past two years the condition of the loyal citizens of the Provisional Government and its legitimate successor, the Republic of Hawaii, has been such that it was only by great personal sacrifices and risks, by the most determined and united effort, and by the banding together of such loyal citizens into organizations of military and semi-military character, that their existence as a body of freemen could be maintained and the degradation of being slaves to a dissolute and unprincipled monarchy could be averted;

"We therefore assert that it was the duty of every loyal citizen during these two years of trial and danger to have become a member of some organization having for its object the support and defense of the government under which we lived;

"We further assert that if it was the duty of all citizens, regardless of their occupations and positions in life, to have become members of such organizations, much more was it the duty of those citizens who receive a regular salary—those who are employees of the Government—to have become known as its defenders, and to have been in a situation that when defenders were wanted they could have been counted upon as such, and could have assisted in the struggle for the overthrow of the rebellion at a time when every man's help counted for or against the success of the Government, instead of coming in one by one to assist when help was no longer of vital importance.

"We further assert that the following persons, employees of this Government, did not, prior to January 6, 1895, affiliate with any organization having for its object the defense of the Government, and the protection of life and property from its enemies:

[List of names.]

"Therefore, be it resolved,—That the status of every employee whose name appears herein be investigated, and if it be found that they have not proven themselves to be fully in accord with the sentiments herein expressed, they be removed at once from any position of trust under this Government, and only such men be employed as have proven their loyalty by the tests herein stated.

"Very respectfully submitted,

Dr. Wood desired that the list of names be not published, and it was so ordered.

Dr. Wood moved that the resolution be referred to a committee.

Mr. Ena moved it be referred to the Executive Council.

Mr. Kennedy referred to the discussion of a similar question two

years ago. When the United States Government began to dicker with Hawaiian affairs the matter dropped, the doubtful employees being for the most part whitewashed and allowed to retain their places. This latest trouble had brought it up again.

Mr. Tenney was in favor of retaining any employees who had turned out for the defense of the Government within a reasonable time—say under 48 hours, or before the affair was virtually settled in favor of the Government. When the matter came up two years ago, Mr. Damon was the one who opposed removal of doubtful officers, but when the resolution passed Mr. Damon was the only Minister who carried its instructions out in his Department. (Applause.)

Minister Hatch—There were two dismissals in the Foreign Office. (Laughter.)

Minister Smith (Attorney-General)—And two in the Interior Office.

Mr. Ena would not defend employees who failed to come forward until the trouble was practically over.

The amendment, to refer the resolution to the Executive, passed.

A petition was received from the Citizens' Guard against the unauthorized wearing of badges.

On motion of Mr. Morgan duly seconded the petition was referred to the Judiciary Committee with instructions to prepare an act in accordance with the petition.

Minister Damon said it had been found that the previous appropriation of \$50,000 for defraying the expenses of suppressing the rebellion was insufficient, and he begged leave to present an act to appropriate \$25,000 additional. He further moved in succession the first, second and third readings, under suspension of the rules, and the bill passed unanimously.

Minister Hatch introduced an act relating to martial law, trials by military commission, and the liability of officers of the Government for acts done in suppressing insurrection. He said it might be considered by some people as extreme, but it went no further than laws of the United States relating to the rebellion in that country. It grants immunity to all officers engaged in suppressing the rebellion from liability under prosecution for any act done by them in that service.

Minister Smith said there was no hurry about passing the law, and he would move it to be referred to the Judiciary Committee. Carried.

A communication was read from Dr. C. T. Rodgers, secretary of Councils, complaining that he had received no payment for his services as such since October, on the ground that the law allowed no official to draw pay for more than one position aggregating \$1800 a year, because he was getting \$150 a month as secretary of the Labor Commission. He submitted that the position of secretary of the Labor Commission did not bring him within the category of the law in question, as it was not a permanent body and was liable to cease its functions at any time.

Minister Damon argued that the Military Commission was as much a part of the Government as anything else and, if the secretary did not think it was, he was free to resign the office at any time. There were others who would be glad to perform its duties for the money.

Mr. Morgan moved, so as to get some law on the subject, that the matter be referred to the judiciary committee. Carried.

At 2:35 the Councils adjourned.

## SENTENCED.

Twenty-five More Natives Sent Up for Five Years.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17. (By Sailing Vessels.)

UNITED STATES.

Nothing has been done with the Nicaragua canal bill in the House. Judge Handley died at Scranton, Pa., aged 63, leaving an estate valued at several million dollars.

Available cash balance in treasury, February 16: \$148,258,313; gold reserve, \$18,843,687.

Delaware, Oregon and Idaho legislatures have senatorial election deadlocks.

Easton, Maryland, was in flames at last accounts, the whole town being threatened with destruction.

Pierre Lorillard is likely to send a string of horses to England for turf contests.

J. McParlin, secretary of the People's party for New York State, predicts the birth of a new party on March 4, with a platform of bimetallism and protection.

According to the Chicago Times an English syndicate has bought out the Elgin and the Waltham watch companies at a valuation of \$10,000,000. These companies turn out 85 percent of the watches made in the United States.

The question of re-submission of the prohibitory amendment was finally defeated in the North Dakota House.

Snow has fallen at San Antonio, Texas, for the first time in five years. It fell during the worst storm in fifty years.

The Committee on Woman Suffrage of the Massachusetts Legislature has decided, 8 to 3, to report a bill in favor of municipal suffrage for women.

In South Dakota the House defeated the resolution for a constitutional amendment giving women the right of suffrage which had passed the Senate.

The loss by the burning of the Dougherty and Wadsworth silk mills, Paterson, N. J., is \$300,000. A thousand hands are thrown out of employment.

Coal was offered in carload lots at \$1.10 a ton on the tracks in Chicago recently. This was the lowest price touched since the coal war commenced.

About fifty farmers came into Kearney, Neb., during the recent storm, for relief supplies. They broke into a car on the Union Pacific tracks and helped themselves.

The rescue by the Umbria of the crew of the French bark Jean Baptiste has been the means of bringing together two brothers who had not heard of one another for fourteen years.

Thomas Parker, arrested at Richmond, Va., for alleged swindling a farmer on a gold brick fraud, is now charged with having swindled a large number of people to the total amount of \$105,000.

General E. S. Bragg and ex-Governor Peck are the leading candidates to succeed the late ex-Governor Gray as Minister to Mexico.

Seattle and Tacoma are competing to get the site for the proposed U. S. Army post on Puget Sound.

Julia Marlowe is suing the Indianapolis Journal for \$25,000 damages, for an article condemning in advance the theatrical company she was engaged with.

The Court of Appeals in Washington has upheld the income tax law.

Senator Perkins, from the committee on education and labor, has submitted a bill to provide for the arbitration of labor disputes. It is estimated in the committee's report that the aggregate loss to all concerned on account of strikes during the past six years has been \$98,556,859.

SUGAR IN CONGRESS.

The Senate finance committee reported favorably the bill repealing the one-tenth discriminating duty on sugar from countries paying a sugar bounty, and Mr. Aldrich submitted a motion to recommit the bill to the committee with instructions to add provisions for reciprocity, a bounty on domestic sugar, and for meeting the treasury deficiencies resulting from the removal of the duty on sugar. No action was taken on the motion.

THE SEAL FISHERIES QUESTION.

A scheme adopted by the House ways and means committee is to authorize the President to invite the governments of Great Britain, Russia and Japan to unite with the United States in sending a joint commission to investigate the seal fisheries of the North Pacific and Behring Sea. Pending the report of the commission, a modus vivendi would be arranged with those powers for the protection of the seals. In case the other nations refuse to join the United States in an investigation, the Secretary of the

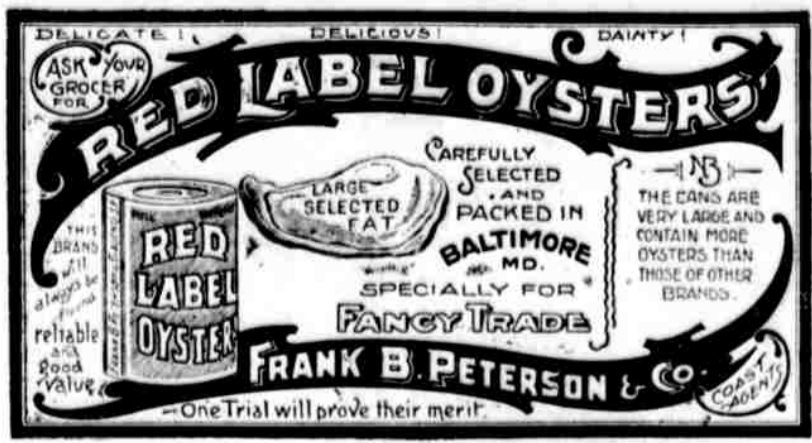

Treasury will be empowered to kill the seals under the terms of the Dingley bill.

#### THE GOLD PURCHASE.

Boston bankers have sent a petition to Washington urging the New England Congressional delegation to vote for the bill providing for an issue of gold bonds to complete the contract with the syndicate that is to furnish gold to the Government.

The ways and means committee has agreed to report a resolution authorizing the issue of \$65,000,000 three percent gold bonds, payable in thirty years, provided that none of the proceeds of the sale of such bonds shall be available for the payment of current expenses of the Government.

Representatives in London of the American bond syndicate deny that they will reap any special advantage from the sale of gold to the United States Government. They claim that, on the contrary, they have earned the gratitude of the American people for facilitating the loan.

A syndicate of the leading jobbers on the British consols market has been formed to secure \$5,000,000 of the issue, which is said to be certain to be freely taken up in London, as there is entire confidence that America will pay gold anyhow.

The executive board of the Knights of Labor have engaged the following named counsel to fight the Government's gold policy in the Supreme Court: Ex-Judge Jere Wilson of Washington, Congressman Lafe Spence, Senator Allen and J. Raston of Washington. They will also attack all Government payments of gold on silver-certificate obligations.

#### EUROPE.

Rivers in Spain are overflowing. The Czarewitz, Grand Duke George, is dangerously ill in Crimea, where he is wintering on account of lung trouble.

It is reported again in London that a match is being arranged between Consuela Vanderbilt and the young Duke of Marlborough.

The British ship Topaz, at Havre from Savannah, reports that when in latitude 43, longitude 17 west, she sighted a vessel about 150 feet long on board the burning vessel.

#### THE SILVER QUESTION.

A resolution has been introduced in the German Reichstag instructing the Government to issue invitations for an international conference to take measures to bring about the rehabilitation of silver as a circulating medium. Count Herbert Bismarck, in supporting the resolution, expressed his pleasure at the stand taken for the cause in England by his friend Balfour.

#### IMPORTANT MARITIME EVENT.

Germany invites all the maritime powers to take part in the naval display and fetes on the opening of the Baltic and North Sea canal, June 18. Emperor William is taking a keen interest in the opening of the new canal, which, it is expected, will serve to bring back the waning prosperity of Lubeck, Dantzic, Stettin and other ports. The fetes will be on a grand scale and last several days. It is understood that President Faure will accept the invitation to be sent to France.

#### BRITISH POLITICS.

In the British House of Commons it was moved by Clancy, member for North Dublin, that the sentences imposed upon Irish political prisoners be reconsidered. Home Secretary Asquith replied that he was convinced that the prisoners had been justly convicted. In view of the atrocious character of their crimes, he found himself unable to extend clemency. Morley, chief secretary for Ireland, denied the assertion that he had promised amnesty to dynamiters.

In the debate on the address in reply to the Queen's speech, Joseph Chamberlain offered an amendment declaring it was contrary to the public interest for the time of Parliament to be occupied in the discussion of measures which, according to the Ministers' own statements, had no prospect of passing into law, while proposals involving grave constitutional changes had been announced, on which the judgment of parliament should be taken without delay. He said the refusal of the Government to disclose the terms of their proposed resolution against the House of Lords was disrespectful to the House. The Government was tottering, and could not longer represent the interests of Great Britain in the councils of Europe. Neither could it enact measures for the enforcement of its domestic policy.

Herbert Asquith said it would not be the Government's fault, but that of the House of Lords, if the measure did not become a law.

Henry Labouchere said that his party was dissatisfied because a leader, Lord Rosebery, who was a member of the House of Lords, had

#### The Deportation Question

#### EDITOR BULLETIN:—

The editor of the Pacific Commercial Advertiser in this morning's issue has apparently settled to his own satisfaction, and that of a few immigrants like himself, the great question of forcible deportation of political and other offenders from one country to another.

No doubt learned jurists of every nationality will be grateful for the clear and pungent deliverance of this "New Daniel" case to judgment. It is really refreshing in these unquiet days to have from such an able authority an opinion covering so much controverted ground; ground which has proved in the past—over and over again—highly dangerous both to "sovereigns and statesmen," and which may yet prove very harrowing to this little San Marino of the Pacific.

It is pleasing to note the dexterity with which "Daniel" gets over his fences. The poor captain of the S. S. Warrimoo by a biased, infamous, vulgar British Court, has been put under bonds (his ship libeled) in the sum (Great Scott) of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. "Daniel," however, is undismayed. We ask the following question: Was the Hawaiian Government exercising its "prerogative rights" in deporting by compulsion the offenders mentioned in a British royal mail steamer to a country bearing the ship's flag? It has always been held that such vessels should not be used for any purpose but those clearly defined by law; and it is evident: 1st, That the captain had no means at his disposal to resist the alleged "prerogative rights," or it is nearly certain he would have done so; 2d, It is also certain that at least two of the supposed offenders were unwilling to avail themselves of the "prerogatives," paid fare, etc., etc., of this paternal government.

"Daniel" is level when he writes that the United States, acquiesced in by England, insists on the right to expel criminal or pauper immigrants, but then "Daniel" ought to have stated that such persons must be sent whence they came, and that all countries—even by the will of Uncle Sam—are not dumping grounds for such people.

"Daniel" is apparently mixed and ravelled, with regard to rights of nations, when he holds that if the captain of the Warrimoo is liable in an action brought against him—not in a foreign country, but in his own—for doing in San Marino an act justified by its laws; when he says that such a course would be to upset "American and English [we prefer "British"] judicial decisions over a century back."

We believe, may know that the Government of the country these forcibly-deported men were sent to would have been within its undoubted rights—knowing the facts—to have declined to allow of their landing, and simply ordered Captain Bird to return them "to the place from whence they came."

The Great Australasian Empire comprising, as it does, at least eight semi-independent states, can even take the above stand against its own venerable august mother.

There will likely be other expressions of opinion—both American and British—and we dare to affirm that the Advertiser's position will be found utterly untenable. S.

### STRIKE AT OAHU COLLEGE.

Portuguese Mechanics Go Out in a Body and Japs are in Their Place.

Arthur Harrison, the contractor and builder, who has the contract for building the new Oahu College building, had trouble with his Portuguese mechanics this morning. Twenty Portuguese—stone-cutters and quarrymen—left in a body on strike. The Portuguese state that Mr. Harrison violated his agreement with them. They claim that the contractor promised to pay the stone-cutters twenty-five cents more than any contractor in town, and that he has not done so. They complained about this violation to Mr. Harrison, but he would not see it. The men were getting \$2.25 a day. This morning the Portuguese went to work, and they say that they saw Japanese at work. Not wishing to work with Japanese they all quit in a body.

Arthur Harrison when seen stated that the strike was only the work of a few ringleaders who have probably been put up to it. "I have to do this work in a certain length of time," continued Mr. Harrison, "and I must have more labor. If the Portuguese can furnish me a sufficient number of men, I would not wish for better mechanics. I can't even put on a native. The Portuguese I have working for me hate the very sight of natives. I have sent for four white men, and I suppose they would have gone out on strike if I employed them. The men are striking every week for a raise in their wages, and what was I to do? I couldn't do that. They came around on Monday of last week with their Sunday clothes and refused to work. They did work, however, but on Saturday the chief ringleader refused to take his pay. I could have kept it, but when he came back I gave it to him. I must do something to finish the work. I did not employ the Japanese until after the Portuguese had left. I expected to see the Portuguese in the quarry still at work, but when I went there they were gone."

This is the first strike in Honolulu since the strike of the native lumber carriers on the city front about four years ago.

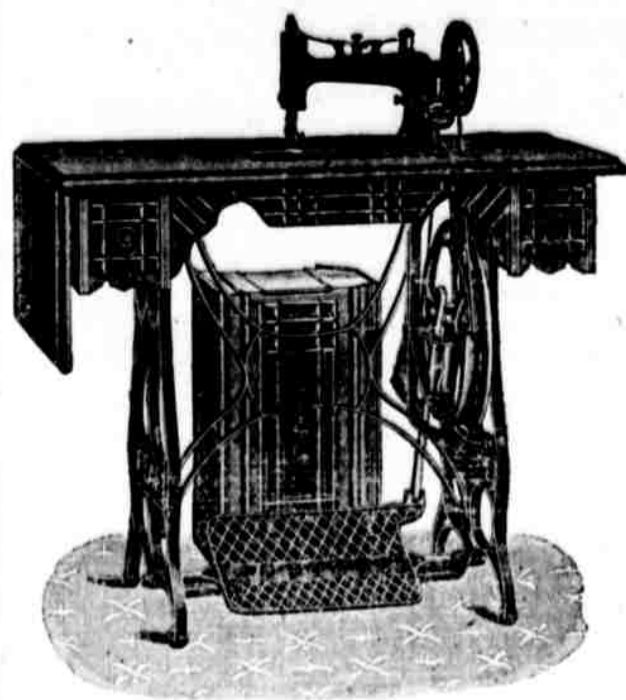

WHALER ARRIVED.

Catches Off Hawaii West Indian Skipper and Hawaiian Sailors.

The whaling bark Gayhead, Captain Shory, arrived yesterday morning from San Francisco, which port she left on Dec. 18. The Gayhead has been cruising about during the passage. On Friday, Feb. 22, while the whaler was off Kealakekua bay, Hawaii, five sperm whales were harpooned. On Friday of last week the Gayhead experienced a very heavy gale which continued until next day. On Saturday morning the flying jibboom snapped. Shortly after arrival off port the crew was set to work to put the whaler in shipshape and she is now ready for sea.

Captain Shory is a West Indian. He is accompanied by his wife and child. There are four Hawaiian boys on the Gayhead, named Albert Mitchell, Sam Kalua, Sam John and John Thomas Mitchell has been with Captain Shory for the past three years, and has been promoted from sailor to boatsteerer. The captain and some of his crew were ashore yesterday and to-day. The Gayhead will leave direct for the north in a couple of days.

been planked upon them. He blamed Lord Rosebery for pandering to the "jingo" party. There had been undoubtedly a change of the attitude of Liberal officials since the retirement of Mr. Gladstone, both in regard to home rule and the position of the House of Lords. The change was due to the influence of the House of Lords. Mr. Labouchere warned the Government that the country had not changed its view of the question, but demanded the abolition of the House of Lords. He urged the Government not to pursue a course which would surely lead to disaster.

**OTHER LANDS.**

Affairs between Mexico and Guatemala have taken a peaceful turn, although danger of war is not yet over.

The rebellion in Colombia is considered at an end. Trouble is brewing in San Domingo. The President of that island, it is stated, has been acting with a high hand in seizing the funds of some French merchants. The French will also claim indemnity for the death of one of their countrymen. The French now have five men-of-war lying at Hayti ready to pounce upon the little island.

A plot of the natives involving murder has been discovered in Tjaddea district, Island of Java. It was the intention of the plotters to murder all the Europeans and Chinese in the district, if possible. All the chief movers of the plot and fifty followers have been arrested.

Canadian finances are reported to be in a bad way, the deficit for the current year being estimated at \$5,000,000.

In the civic corruption case at Vancouver, B. C., an informer gave evidence that McFarlane, manager of the British Columbia Iron Works, had told him that he had given Alderman McCraney \$1000 to secure for them the contract for an electric light plant.

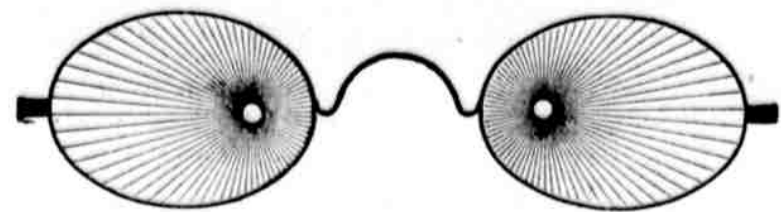

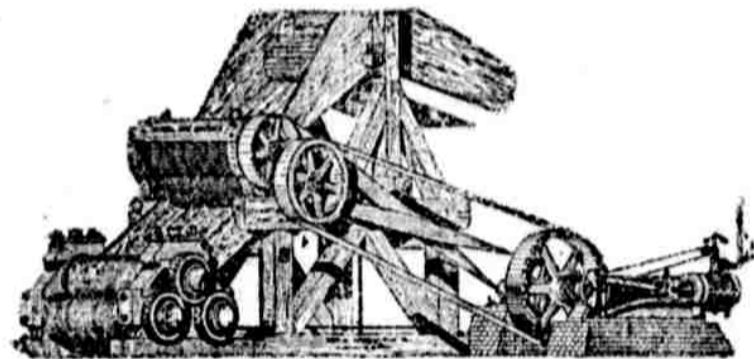

#### Is the Bicycle Undignified?

The ground taken by someone in the vatican that Catholic priests in America ought not to ride bicycles because it is undignified to do so raises a highly important question of fact.

According to the Rev. Sam Jones, who sometimes makes strenuous attempts at infallibility, dignity is nothing but "the starch of a shroud" at any rate. But that view is untenable. Dignity is an essential of civilization and an inevitable incident of greatness. And no old maid in bloomers ought ever to venture on one under any circumstances, for when she does she becomes what may without irreverence and with perfect accuracy be described as a holy show.

As for the priests of Wilmington, it is entirely in keeping with their dignity to keep up with the march of civilization, and they cannot do so if they ignore the wheel.—New York World.
