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## WILL NOT OBEY OFFICIAL BOUSES.

The following letter has been ad-  
dressed by Cecil Brown to the vot-  
ers of Oahu:

To the Electors of the Third Sena-  
torial District of the Territory  
of Hawaii:

At the request of many voters  
residing on the Island of Oahu and  
elsewhere in this Territory, I have  
decided to run as an independent  
Republican candidate for the office  
of Senator in this Senatorial Dis-  
trict, notwithstanding the fact that  
I failed to secure a nomination from  
the Republican convention held in  
Honolulu on the 16th inst.

I claim that an unwarrantable  
interference by certain officers of  
the Executive Department of the  
Territory caused my defeat in that  
Convention, and that these persons  
used the power of their offices  
directly and coercively in the con-  
vention, particularly among the  
office holding delegates, to compel  
a vote against me regardless of the  
personal convictions of the dele-  
gates and the wishes of their con-  
stituents. Much of the proof of  
this charge came to me after the  
convention had acted, and I feel  
that the issues thus raised are of  
such importance to every citizen of  
the Territory that I should put the  
matter to the test, as I propose.

One of the chief functions of the  
Legislature is to review and pass  
judgment upon the acts of the Ex-  
ecutive branch of the Government,  
and if members of the Executive are  
allowed to manipulate the selection  
by the people of men to sit in judg-  
ment upon their official conduct,  
the evil that will result is self-evi-  
dent, particularly if office holders  
are permitted to use the power and  
prerogatives of their offices in secur-  
ing control of these conventions,  
and beating down and silencing op-  
position and protestation by individ-  
ual voters. In my opinion the Ex-  
ecutive should not interfere with  
the legislative or judicial depart-  
ments; such departments should be  
kept separate and distinct one from  
the other as each has its separate  
and distinct duty to perform in car-  
rying out the functions of the gov-  
ernment.

It had been my intention to abide  
by the decision of the convention,  
but the circumstances are such and  
the mischief of allowing such prac-  
tices to take root and establish  
themselves in our politics so mani-  
fest, the result so certain that when  
established they will naturally be  
turned more and more openly  
against good government and legiti-  
mate and wholesome criticism and  
arrayed on the side of corruption  
and bad government, and used to  
suppress and intimidate public opin-  
ion and personal freedom of speech,  
that I believe an opportunity should  
be offered in a clear and unmis-  
takable manner to the voters to express  
their judgment and conviction upon  
these methods.

Under these circumstances my  
candidacy as an independent Repub-  
lican naturally follows.

## DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

Nominee for Delegate to Congress

**Curtis Piehu Iaukea.**

## THE DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN.

The Democrats have of course nothing to do with the internecine war in the Republican camp. All we need to do is to sit back, watch the fur flying, and double our energies in electing a good Democratic ticket.

The Republicans have nominated men who can be described as politically weak. The people have very little, if any, confidence in the candidates of the Republican party, who seem to have been gathered on the high ways and by ways, because there was "no better material available." The real good men either refuse to go into public life as Republicans, and, if they do signify their readiness to serve the state, they are turned down by the hoi-polloi, who seem to dominate in the ranks of that party.

In the Democratic party there are no "bosses," and consequently there is no dissension and no corrupt methods. The Democrats stand united, and they mean to remain so, as long as there are political parties in this land.

The campaign which has now started should be carried on in the most vigorous manner. Upon the

return of Colonel Iaukea, who has met unqualified success on his tour, the campaign should open on Oahu, and the Democrats, rank and file, should doff their coats and go in to win. We are fighting a party which have the backing of an unscrupulous government, a party which will stop at no measures to gain a victory, and which commands a great deal of money to be used for corrupt purposes.

The Republican party is now torn with dissension, and the Democrats, by taking a solid and bold stand, should be able to rout their opponents and win the day. The best men in the Republican party have been turned down, and the party has in consequence been greatly weakened. Now is the time to strike and let the decisive blow fall on election day with a dull thud that will re-echo all over the Territory.

### Robertson's Position.

Mr A G M Robertson, in a lengthy answer to Mr Cecil Brown, writes that "a politician must be true to and honest with his party, even if improper methods are used to secure certain ends." In these words we have Mr Robertson's political code, which is so near to the chief doctrine of the Jesuite, that it is surprising to hear it from a man of Mr Robertson's calibre, intelligence and otherwise liberal views. Bribery, corruption, intimidation, all are fair "methods," although "improper," according to Mr Robertson, and every party man must follow his party through the political mire, as long as his party bids him so to do. The Republicans have no choice, no right to think for themselves, as long as the machine demands obedience.

The Republican party managers may place in nomination rogues and incompetents, Mr Robertson will vote for them as a sacred duty. The "party" has endorsed the ticket for Representatives in the Fifth, and Mr Robertson gladly cast his ballot for men he knows to be unfit to hold office, and he squares his conscience with the words "party duty, party fealty."

If such principles were advanced by some political slyster and ward healer, we should not have been surprised; coming from Mr Robertson we can only express a deep regret, because Mr Robertson, in placing himself in the field as the willing slave of the political machine, has ceased to be a good citizen and has become a man, in whom the people no longer can have any confidence.

### Support Democrats.

If the taxpayers on the other islands want local self-government, if they entertain a serious desire for managing the expenditures of the taxes they pay through County government, they must support at the coming election the candidates of the Democratic party. While we will not dispute that there are a number of Republicans, who desire a County Act, there is no doubt that the leaders of the Republican party, as well as the Governor and his advisers are absolutely opposed to the establishment of any form of government which will decentralize the power now wielded by them. In spite of the Republican platform,

in the face of their campaign protestations to the contrary, the evidence is there, that if the Republican leaders had been sincere in their expressed wishes for government by counties, an Act would have been passed by the last Legislature, which would have passed muster before any judicial tribunal, and which would have secured for the Territory government by counties.

### Docking Salaries.

The next Legislature should make a searching investigation into the action of the administration in docking the salaries of government officials for campaign purposes. We are opposed to the bringing of politics into the offices of government employees. The Legislature passes appropriations for the payment of necessary officials, whom they expect to do the work of their offices in the interest of all the people of the Territory and not doing politics for a political party or a clique only. Officials, who allow themselves to be taxed in the interest of the local Republican party, should, in case of a Democratic victory on election day, be removed without courtesy or consideration. The taxpayers pay the officials for doing the work allotted to their offices and not for mixing in politics and doing political stunts. This method of carrying a campaign, introduced here by Governor Carter, should meet a severe rebuff on election day.

### No Political Machine Wanted.

If the Republicans of Hawaii Territory desire to build up a party machine, like unto that created by Senator Quay in Pennsylvania, then A G M Robertson, Esq. is right in his contention for party fealty. If the wish is rather to set up a government of the people, by the people and for the people, the American ideal, then the Hon Cecil Brown is right. The last thing that our Territory should endorse is a political machine.

### TOPICS OF THE DAY.

When Mr Robertson talks about "healthy and honest party politics," we hope, he doesn't mean to insinuate, that such are found within the ranks of his party.

Who is Kaleiupu, one of the Republican candidates for the House in the Fifth District? Why not give him his initials with which he is better known? He is none other than A S Kaleiupu, and as such he is better known to us. A Home Ruler originally, then a Kuokoa and now a Republican.

It is to be hoped that when we are to have a Federal building here, a new structure will be erected. Remodelling and altering buildings erected for other purposes will always prove a failure, and such a step will surely be regretted in the future. Of course somebody would like to sell the Young hotel.

The trouble with the Republican party is that its members confuse the selfish interests of the party with the best interests of the Territory. The wise voter should not encourage such a policy, and the true friends of Hawaii will refuse to cast a vote for a single man on the Republican ticket. The Democrats,

who are willing to run for office, do so in the interest of the people at large, and are not urged on by any selfish motives.

Prince Cupid wants the Chamber of Commerce's assistance to pay for a competent secretary to the Delegates in Washington. Would it not be better and cheaper to elect a Delegate who can attend to his duties himself and does not need a secretarily purse? Colonel Iaukea would be just such a delegate and he should receive the support of the Merchants' Association and other commercial bodies here.

"The unwarrantable interference by certain officers of the Executive Department" is what Mr Cecil Brown claims to be the cause of his failing to get a nomination in the Republican convention. THE INDEPENDENT has frequently called attention to the shameless interference in politics by office holders, and we have pointed out the bad faith of Governor Carter, who openly prohibits officials from taking an active part in politics and secretly says—"go it boys, for all you are worth" These officials, who are simply the governor's political tools, should be removed from office at once when a political change shall take place, and when such an action should be followed by a calamity howl, all that is necessary is to refer the howlers to the doctrines of the Republican party here.

Governor Carter and party will be expected back by the Likeli on Wednesday.

The Zenda Social Club will dance in the roof garden of the Odd Fellows building this evening.

The report of the President of the Board of Health for the year ending June 30, 1904, has been issued.

The Iroquois returned this morning from Midway Islands. Her freight for the cable station was all safely landed.

Democratic delegates of the Fifth District will complete their caucus on candidates in Waverley hall this evening.

Carl Du Roi, manager of Eblers & Company, returned by the Alameda today from a lengthy visit to the East on business.

Fujimoto, who pleaded guilty to the charge of burglary, has been sentenced by Judge Gear to imprisonment for five years.

The Good Government club will hold a mass meeting on Monday evening for the purpose of endorsing candidates for the Legislature.

Another attempt to sell the lease of the land of Kawaihae 2, which failed on Monday last, is to be made tomorrow morning at Morgan's.

The Alameda brought down a big lot of fruits and vegetables. Inspector Austin was on hand to see that no "bugs" were landed.

Chinese had a parade from Liliha street today in honor of the full moon. The chief attraction in the procession was an immense model of a dragon.

The statement in yesterday's INDEPENDENT that M G Silva was "proprietor" of the new Kamehameha saloon, in Asia street, should have read "manager."

Said Pasha, a lively comic opera, will be repeated tomorrow evening at the Hawaiian Opera house. The amateur players deserve to get a bumper house for the benefit of the Myrtle Boat Club.

Frank Harvey will run on the Democratic ticket for the Senate despite the objections of the I I S N Company. He will undoubtedly be nominated without opposition in tomorrow's convention.

At its meeting yesterday afternoon the Merchants' Association discussed the matter of a site for the proposed new Federal building. It may be recommended that the Young building be purchased.

Judge and Mrs Kepoikai are expected down by the Claudine Sunday morning. They come to attend the wedding of their niece, Miss Ellen Holt to H E Murray, which is to take place next Wednesday evening.

It is understood that John Emmeluth will not take a Fifth District Democratic nomination for Representative, and that, for business reasons, he will stay out of politics. Persons interested with him prevailed upon him to attend to business instead of politics.

Street corner politics was started yesterday noon by the Republicans at the old King and Bethel streets south corner, and Geo Markham fired the first pistol. The performance was reported today and will be kept up till election day is over, getting hotter and hotter every

**Republicans at Waianae.**

Instead of a successful meeting last Wednesday night at Waianae, as reported in last evening's Bulletin, it was a cold, bleak and frosty one and the poor reception accorded the candidates does not augur well for that party's success in the Fifth District. And that further, Mrs Pushi, a part Hawaiian woman well known in this city, did not advise the Waianae people to support the Republican ticket, but rather she gave nearly all of them a good scolding. She is a staunch Royalist, a former strong worker among the Home Rulers, but she now leans towards the Democratic party, and was formerly an agent of the late Queen Kapiolani.

When Delegate Kalaniana'ole spoke on the issues of the campaign, Mrs Pushi gave him a good grilling, particularly with regard to the Morris incident with him while in Washington as his secretary. His answers were unsatisfactory and our informant says that she would not face him nor in his presence. The crowd of natives seemed to be with and on her side. The other Republican candidates who went down also made speeches, but the cream of them all was Jack Dowsett, who was selfish, speaking only for himself and not for his running mates nor for any of the others. A Sol Kaleiupu also spoke, but got a dose of physic from her. Really the crowd was with her, but most decidedly unRepublican.

Hardly any enthusiasm was evinced by those present. Although the meeting was presided over by Mr Hui, it was only done by him in a half-hearted manner, as he has, prior to that meeting, given preference for the Democratic party. They will receive like treatment the further they go on that line.

**The Case of the Lena.**

The question of the Russian warship has been settled by the President without ruffling the dignity of Japan or Russia. He gives her two months in which to make repairs and get out, and as an alternative she must go now or disarm and lie here till the close of the war. Of she will disarm and rock ingloriously on the bay until peace comes.

On some grounds it will be regretted that her Government does not accept the two months' time for repairs. She could be patched up and coaled in that time, and then Japan would have a cruiser waiting outside the three-mile limit, and when they met there would be a sea fight right off our western water front. There would be standing room only on the hills from Mount Tamalpais to the Twin Peaks. The Cliff House would look like a bee hive about to swarm and there would be lively betting on the rounds. It would be a sight worth seeing, and if the Lena's sailing date were set long enough ahead, San Francisco would have a bigger crowd than came for the Knights Templar. It is many a long year since hostile powder has been burned near our coasts, except in the Civil War, and such a fight as might be here would have the zest of novelty, with the additional pleasure that we could see the show without costing us a cent in men or ships or powder.

Japan would be willing to do her part in the spectacle, and if Russia had any regard for the feelings of our people and the Czar had a spark of the genuine circus spirit in him, he would say the word "go" and furnish us some real sport.—San Francisco Call, September 15.
