## THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL.

**Semi-Annual Meeting and Election of Officers.**  
Mr. A. J. Cartwright presided at the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital, held in the Chamber of Commerce room yesterday. The Physician's quarterly report was read and ordered published as follows:  
HONOLULU, May 31, 1892.

**TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL:**  
Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending May 31, 1892:

The number of patients at present in the hospital is 75, viz., 44 Hawaiians (29 males, 15 females), 3 Chinese, 10 Japanese and 18 of other nationalities; 27 paying.

The number of admissions during the quarter was 120; viz., 41 Hawaiians (30 males, 11 females), 2 Chinese, 24 Japanese and 53 of other nationalities.  
Discharged 110; viz., 34 Hawaiians (21 males, 13 females), 1 Chinese, 23 Japanese and 52 of other nationalities.  
Deaths 13; viz., 3 Hawaiians, males, 1 Chinese, 3 Japanese and 6 of other nationalities.

The causes of death were as follows: accident 1, apoplexy 1, Bright's disease 1, consumption 6, heart disease 3, septicæmia 1.  
The highest number of indoor patients was 86, lowest 64; daily average 74.  
Calls at the Dispensary 102. Number of prescriptions 2701. The number of patients treated in the Hospital was as follows: March, 123; April, 107; May, 105.

The semi-annual report of the Treasurer showed \$539.98 due him. A favorable report on the condition of the hospital, with high praise of the nurses, was presented by the visiting committee. Mr. Bruce Cartwright submitted a draft of rules for the regulation of the services of physicians in connection with the hospital. The election of a House Physician was deferred for two months, to give time for deliberation on the matter of changes that may be found desirable in the medical department.

An American citizen desires to suggest through this medium that a very appropriate mode of celebrating the Fourth of July, in these times of pinching circumstances among the working classes, would be a substantial feast to which the hungry hundreds of all nationalities should be welcomed.

THE RICE DUTY. There are two or three bills before the House relating to the duty on rice. One of them is to abolish the duty. Another, it is said, provides for the importation of rice for consumption by plantation laborers free, while rice for the open market shall still bear the duty.

press and by petition to the Legislature. Rice forms the second staple product of our exports. It is an immediate benefit to native land-owners, who get good rentals from the land on which it is grown.

The Hawaiian tariff is probably as mild as can be found anywhere outside of countries maintaining free trade doctrines in theory and practice. There is therefore no great hardship in any duty in itself, particularly in the case of an article competing with a home product.

There is little to choose between direct abolition and the proposed system of bonding rice for plantations. The bonding system would simply interfere with the main part of the home market of our rice producers.

The cutting off of part of the demand for Hawaiian rice would correspondingly increase the surplus for export, and here comes in a grave objection to any proposition for abolition or partial abolition of the duty.

OAHU COLLEGE. Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1892.



THE LEGISLATURE.

TWENTY-THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, JUNE 24, 1892.

Morning Session.

The Assembly convened at ten o'clock. Usual routine business transacted, after which, the following petitions were presented and referred:

By Rep. Kapahu, from residents of Honolulu, that \$6000 be appropriated for improving roads in that district. To Public Lands Committee.

By Rep. White, from voters of Waihua and Koolauloa, that their representative (Wilcox) be restored to his seat. To Judiciary Committee.

By Rep. Kanealii, from residents of Honolulu, containing 19 signatures, that a license be granted to one Yung Kum Pung to practice medicine. To Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Nawahi presented the following, (1) from the residents of Hilo, that all sea fisheries be made free. To Committee on Public Lands; (2) that the law relating to the segregation of lepers be repealed; (3) that the law relating to Homesteads be amended. Both tabled for consideration with bills on the subject. (4) From Peter Lee that the Government purchase a road built by him at Punaluu. To a special committee.

By Rep. Kamaoaha, from one J. Samoa, that \$1000 be appropriated for him on account of false arrest and imprisonment for ten hours for alleged treason. To Judiciary Committee.

Noble Williams presented a petition signed by 52 mechanics, the gist of which was that the petitioners were of "the opinion that by far the greater proportion of the manufactured articles now imported could be made in this country as well, or in some cases even better than abroad, although we candidly admit not so cheaply; but we hold that it is good policy for the Government to pay more for the manufactured articles required by the various departments, provided that the money is spent in the country, thus increasing the manufacturing capacity of our industrial establishments, the number of mechanics in the country and the taxable value of property. Your petitioners therefore pray your honorable body that suitable action be taken to restrain as far as possible the importation by the Hawaiian Government of such goods and articles as can advantageously be manufactured in this country." The petition was laid on the table for consideration with a bill on the subject.

By Noble Thurston, from J. F. Colburn that the sum of \$124.38 be paid for bill due by the previous Road Board. To Finance Committee.

By Rep. Bipikane, from certain police that the sum of \$241.50 be paid them for deductions in their pay. Also from 26 Hawaiians that the sum of \$5,000 be appropriated to pay them for secret service duties. Both were referred to the Committee on Police.

By Rep. Waipuilani from Kona, containing 40 signatures, and opposed to the cession of any portion of Pearl Harbor in exchange for any treaty; (2) that the importation of foreign laborers be stopped; (3) that the law relating to tax-assessors in chief be repealed. To Committee on Miscellaneous Petitions.

By Rep. Ashford that the sum of \$5 be paid to Manuel Vierra for twice paid taxes. To Finance Committee.

Noble Williams reported Bill No. 67 printed.

Noble Neumann from the Judiciary Committee reported on the following matters:

(1) On Bill 41, relating to Justices of the Supreme Court, the Committee say that the bill is not in form and recommend that the bill be tabled until considered with the report on the Judicial Commission Act. Report adopted.—(2) On Bill No. 35, relating to the carrying of lights on vehicles, and recommended the passage of the bill with the following amendment, namely, that the words "which shall be driven" be inserted after the word "purpose" in line 2 of Section 1 of said bill. Tabled for consideration with said bill.—(3) On resolution relating to the power of the Attorney-General to abandon the prosecution against R. W. Wilcox and others, the Committee find that the Attorney-General is plainly authorized by law to decline to present an indictment against any person committed for trial at any time before such trial. The Committee deems that the explanation made by the Attorney-General disposes of any statement of promises made. Adopted.

(4) On items of salaries of the shorthand Reporter and Interpreter the committee recommend the passage of the item of the former as in the bill and they will introduce a bill defining his duties. They recommend that the other item be made to read "Salary of Hawaiian Interpreter and Translator \$6000." On petition No. 73, that "the Government be continued under its present form," they recommended said petition be laid on the table. Adopted. (5) On Bill No. 52, providing for liens in favor of persons who pasture, feed or shelter animals, there was a majority and minority report presented. The former favored the passage of the Bill and was signed by four members. Rep. Ashford as the minority opposed passage on the ground that the beneficiaries of the bill would obtain undue advantage over other creditors of owners of animals. The report was tabled with bill for consideration as special order of the day for Tuesday next.

The Minister of the Interior replied to a question of Rep. Inoué to the effect that the wharf at Haunaa, Maui, was on the private lands of the Reciprocity Sugar Co.

Noble J. M. Horner read for the first time a bill entitled "The Hawaiian Bank Act."

Minister Whiting gave notice of bills, (1) relating to the preparation of jury lists and the drawing of jurors; (2) regulating the manner in which peremptory challenges shall be exercised; (3) to tax the losing parties in civil cases for fees paid to jurors.

Noble Macfarlane gave notice of a bill to amend Chap. 35, Laws of 1886, relating to the currency of the Kingdom.

Noble Marsden offered a resolution granting the Ways and Means Committee permission to notice bills after the expiration of the time limit adopted by the House. Adopted.

Rep. Smith gave notice of a bill to limit the number of licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors and to regulate the issuance of the same.

Noble Williams gave notice of a bill to define the duties of the Ministers and other executive officers of the Government in the purchase of manufactured articles.

Rep. White read for the first time a bill to regulate the practice of dentistry.

Minister Parker presented an answer to the question relative to the oath of allegiance having been taken by his chief clerk, and to the effect that denization papers bearing date of March 2, 1891, and citizenship papers dated March 26, 1891, were in the possession of his clerk.

Rep. Kamaoaha read for the first time a bill to create the Hawaiian Board of Health. Also, a question to the Minister of Interior relative to the disposition of funds appropriated for opening a road from Smith street to Vineyard street.

Rep. Kanealii offered a resolution that a select committee of 13 be appointed to visit the Leper Settlement and that the President of the Board of Health be authorized to supply a vessel for their conveyance thither.

On motion of Rep. Smith the motion was amended to read "the members of the Sanitary Committee and 8 members of the Assembly to be appointed by the Chair," and passed.

Rep. Kamaoaha read for the first time a bill authorizing the Minister of Interior to issue licenses for the sale of opium. Also notices of (1) a "Stamp Act," (2) that suitable buildings be erected for the sale of taro and manufacture of poi, (3) a location in the market for the display and sale of vegetables, fruit, live stock, etc.

Noble Cornwell gave notice of bill to allow free access of freight and passengers to wharves where the owners now charge tolls.

Rep. Waipuilani offered a resolution that the following moneys be appropriated: (1) \$5000 for St. Louis College, (2) \$1000 for Kawaiaha Seminary, (3) \$1000 for Makawao Seminary, (4) \$400 for Mr. Davis' Boarding School, (5) \$600 for a wharf at Napoopoo, Hawaii. Tabled for consideration with the Appropriation Bill.

At 12 o'clock recess was had till 1:30 p. m.



# THE LEGISLATURE.

TWENTY-SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, JUNE 23, 1892.

Afternoon Session.

The Assembly re-convened at 1:30 and discussion was continued on Bill No. 35, "to compel drivers of vehicles to carry lights during the hours of darkness."

On motion the bill was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

On motion of Rep. Wilder Bill No. 69, relative to the construction of kerosene warehouses, was taken from the table and referred to the Committee on Commerce.

Clerk McCarthy read a communication from Mr. W. B. Oleson, President of the Kamehameha School, inviting the members of the Assembly to be present at exercises at Bishop's Hall on the evening of June 28th.

On motion of Rep. Smith the invitation was accepted and the Clerk instructed to forward a reply.

Bill No. 36, relating to the keeping of Government accounts in Hawaiian and English, was read a second time and referred to Finance Committee.

The following bills were also read a second time and action taken on them, as follows:

Bill 37, to re-establish the commission for the settlement of boundaries. To Public Lands Committee.

Bill 48, to impose a duty upon hogs imported from foreign countries. Returned to introducer for correction.

Bill 49, to repeal Chapter 7 of the Penal Code relating to the law to mitigate. To Sanitary Committee.

Bill 39, to amend Section 517 of the Civil Code relating to duties. To Finance Committee.

Bill 40, to repeal Section 8, Chapter 82, of laws of 1890 relating to Board Boards. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 41, relating to the Justices of the Supreme Court. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 42, to amend Sec. 1420 of the Civil Code and relating to Masters and Servants. To the Special Labor Committee.

Bill 43, to repeal the duties imposed upon rice from foreign countries. To a special committee to be known as the Rice Committee.

Bill 44, imposing specific duties on rice, paddy and raw sugar imported into this Kingdom. Referred to Rice Committee.

Bill 7, defining the work hours of each day and to mitigate the condition of laborers under contracts between Masters and Servants, and to repeal Chap. 47, laws of 1876. To Labor Committee.

Bill 8, providing a place for holding the terms of the Court of the Second Judicial Circuit of the Kingdom and repealing subdivision third of Section 870 of the Civil Code. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 9, to repeal sections of the Civil Code relating to the vaccination of children. To Sanitary Committee.

Bill 10, to provide a Police Justice for the first division of the district of Hana, Maui. To engrossment and for third reading on Saturday, 25th inst.

Bill 45, to amend Sec. 388 of the Civil Code relating to fisheries. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 46, to provide for a police justice for the district of West Kau, island of Hawaii. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 47, to amend Sec. 1037 of the Civil Code relating to the limitation of actions. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 51, to prevent the use of explosive substances in taking fish. Referred, amid a fire of plaudits, to the Military Committee.

Bill 52, giving liens to persons who pasture, feed or shelter animals. To Judiciary Committee.

Bill 53, to amend Section 120 of Civil Code relating to keepers of stables. Referred, amid much laughter, to the Sanitary Committee.

Bill 54, to amend the law "regulating the sale of spirituous liquors" and providing for additional licenses. To Temperance Committee, consisting of Nobles Marsden, Macfarlane, Reys, Ashford, Aki and Smith.

Bill 55, to authorize the Minister of Interior to grant a license for keeping a house in which to carry on gambling of all kinds.

Rep. Smith moved to reject the bill and pending discussion and action the Assembly, at 4 o'clock, on motion of Noble Marsden, adjourned.


