THIS DAY'S DOINGS.

WORKING MEN'S UNION.

The regular weekly meeting was held on Tuesday evening in a room above the store of Mr. Gartenburg, fifty members were present.

Ten new members were elected. The Executive Committee reported that 8 women and 16 children, families of the German laborers from Koloa plantation, had arrived unexpectedly on Sunday morning.

The Committee appointed to prepare a series of questions on the labor subject, for submission to candidates for the legislature, were granted a month's extension of time.

The Employment Committee reported that a situation, at \$100 per month, had been obtained for one man; that another wanted a situation as groom or stable man, and that some of the German women were ready to obtain employment.

A tinmith and a book-binder, who were present, applied for work; and it was stated that there was a vacancy for a good painter. One man had been dismissed from a plantation, and had arrived here, penniless, asking for a meal.

A letter was read from Mr. John Russell, stating that he would avail himself of their invitation to visit the Association, acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the constitution and by-laws, and expressing his sympathy with the design and expressed intentions of the Association.

A donation of \$10 from Mr. Lederer was received, and several subscriptions and dues were paid.

Mr. Crowley said their movements were looked upon with suspicion and he did not know why. Their meetings were open to everybody. That evening, by order of the Governor, they had been refused the Armory. He thought their connection with the Germans had given mortal offence to some people.

They wanted the authorities to come and watch them, and perhaps then they would join the Union. They were not expected to feed the hungry, but had been compelled to do so; that was a duty of the Humane Society, he believed there was such a society with ten or twenty members.

They wished to do everything above board and on the square. An article in the 'Advertiser', relative to the German laborers, said that everything must be thoroughly sifted and could not remain as it was now. These men could not be, for ten years, on the roads, with the women maintained at their cost.

He held documents in his hand, which would be sworn to, and which, if published would be damaging to a plantation, but they would not see the light till there was an enquiry. He then moved that a respectful petition be presented to the King, praying that a Royal Commission, consisting of two members of the Planters' Labor & Supply Co., two members of the Working Men's Union, and a gentleman, if possible a lawyer, be appointed by His Majesty, to enquire why these laborers refuse to return to their work, the enquiry to deal with them from the time of their engagement, and the commission to have power to examine witnesses on oath.

Mr. E. ff. Ward did not believe in Royal Commissions. It would be months before there was any result. He thought the case had been properly ventilated. The men had been wavering, saying they preferred to remain at the Government stroke, and afterwards returning to their work. It had been stated that the overseer refused to let them work, and he could not understand how they had been sent to jail again without another trial. If there were a Royal Commission, they might all be dead before any result was obtained from it.

The President did not agree with all the remarks of Mr. Crowley. There were now some new features to investigate. He believed in the old German proverb "Do what is right and fear nothing."

Mr. Marchand thought it best to await the results of a new trial. He would forego his claim to being an American loyalist if he could benefit the human race. He had always worked and had no prospect of becoming a millionaire.

Mr. Cavanaugh moved as an amendment that their legal adviser be instructed to watch the cases before the Court and that the motion of Mr. Crowley be postponed. The amendment was carried.

The President said that the Germans had not demanded \$2 a day each, for the time they were in prison. He referred to some paragraphs in a paper issued on Saturday, and said the writer had evidently not studied the labor question and was too superficial in his "otherwise" remarks.

Mr. Z. Squires read a paper on the labor question as affecting these islands, the introduction of Chinese, in direct opposition to the wishes of the natives, and criticized the action of the Premier in not sanctioning or condemning the present labor act in the paper representing his views, and saying that he believed the Premier was in favor of allowing the natives and the laboring class to drift into a state of degradation.

THE Kahului "dukes" have played the base-ball match with the Spreckelsville nine and were beaten by 25 runs. Dudes 8, Spreckelsville 33. As the Dudes are to the Spreckelsville nine, so are the Spreckelsville nine to the Honolulu Club.

MR. LEDERER, of the O. P. M. B., contributed \$10 towards the fund for assisting the German women on Tuesday evening. The money was received during the meeting, and the donor was loudly cheered.

THE Madagascar Envoys have been strangled; a correspondent thinks that if a similar course were pursued with regard to the Hawaiian Envoys, that it would be the means of saving considerable money, which might be better utilized in repairing roads and bridges.

THE WRECKED OREGON.

The ship Star of France, which recently arrived, reports that on August 28th the ship Leicester Castle, bearing the survivors of the wrecked Chilean bark Oregon, was spoken. The story gleaned from the crew of the Oregon was as follows: On August 22d the ship went ashore on a reef off the Oeno Islands. Upon perceiving that it was impossible to get the vessel off, the mate and half the crew took one of the boats and put off for Pitcairn Island, leaving the remainder of the crew on board. Pitcairn Island was reached in safety, where a whaling boat was procured. The mate returned to rescue those remaining on the vessel. In the meantime, however, the survivors on board the Oregon became tired of waiting and put to sea in another of the boats. They were subsequently picked up by the Leicester Castle. The mate who left Pitcairn Island in the rescuing boat has not since been heard from. The Captain of the Oregon was drowned while attempting to leave the wreck in one of the boats. —Examiner.

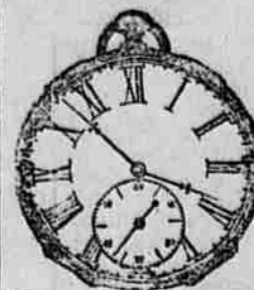
