SPEECH OF JOHN SHARP WILLIAMS.

One of the principal features of the Democratic convention in St. Louis was the opening address of temporary chairman, John S. Williams, of Mississippi, the present Democratic leader in the National House of Representatives. His arraignment of the Republican platform and policy was a most brilliant effort and elicited the greatest applause. After that he outlined the Democratic policy. Mr. Williams went to the Convention as a strong Parker man, and his opening speech proved a powerful wedge for Parker in securing the nomination, inasmuch as he was considered a quasi spokesman for the sage of Esopus. Of the Democratic policy and program Mr. Williams said:

"If you are going to have subsidies, why not have them direct? Why hide under any sort of a veil like this? The reason why the ship subsidy is worse than protectionism generally is this, that there isn't even a pretext of requiring protection behind it. That pretext hides the enormity of protectionism from the full realization of the people generally. Nothing could be there to hide the enormity of a direct subsidy out of the Treasury. Money is taken from my pocket and put into yours. If the precedent is once established, how are you going to stop? Am I at all going beyond the bounds of reason when I say that if it be right to vote money out of the Treasury and put it into the pockets of the ship owners, it is infinitely more nearly right to take the money out of my pocket and out of your pocket and pay it over to the people direct, thus relieving them of all the ills in the South and answering the tears and prayers of the West.

"My friends, I want to say a few words about the Republican platform upon the Southern question.

"Now, my friends, enough about the other party. Some few words about ourselves.

The Democratic party is going to nominate a man for the presidency who is trained in the way of the Constitution; who will not usurp the legislative function; who will not recklessly violate international law and usages, even when dealing with the weakest of nations, and no matter how tempting may be the profit to be reaped by it. (Applause.)

"It will favor economy in the administration, the enforcement of honesty in the public service; a wise and businesslike revision of the tariff by the friends of the masses and of the common weal, and not by the tariff beneficiaries and their representatives alone. (Applause.) A reduction that shall aim at the ultimate result of equality of burden and equality of opportunities for all American taxpayers; which shall, by taking conservative, sensible steps, with due regard—but no more than due regard—to existing conditions, however mistakenly, however erroneously and however unjustly brought about; but in the great work of tariff reform the Democratic party, as sensible men should, will make each step which it takes an object lesson for its own justification and an object lesson for encouragement to go yet further in the work, keeping in view always these two ideas:

"First, that the only justly derived power of taxation under the Constitution, the only right of taxation under the Constitution, is the right to support the Federal Government economically, effectively and constitutionally administered, keeping in mind that the goal of tariff reform will be reached after awhile, by steps

SUFFRAGE AND NATIVES.

In its quasi-support of the views claimed to have been expressed by Prof Moses, yesterday's Advertiser complacently advances the following:

Prof Moses says that to trust the Hawaiian with the ballot was a very unwise thing from his point of view. So it was from the point of view of the Hawaiian kings and chiefs, who did not permit unrestricted suffrage here in the elections for both houses of the Legislature and who did not approve the creation of counties or municipalities. Indeed it was the policy of the natives of the upper class to rule by oligarchy in which the king and chiefs participated with leading white men. Kamehameha V. frankly explained his participation in this form of government by saying that he could not trust his fellow countrymen with financial responsibility.

When it talks of the upper class natives, it should always bear in mind that they were merely the tools of white men, missionaries predominating. When Kamehameha V. is mentioned, it should also be remembered that although he had a mind of his own, which he carried out forcibly at the time he dismissed the Constitutional Convention of 1869 and promulgated a constitution on his own royal authority, claiming it as his prerogative as a sovereign, he was advised, urged, backed up and supported by white men. Ever since the establishment of enlightened and constitutional government and institutions in these Islands, white men (missionaries)

have been the real rulers of a restricted and limited monarchy, while the sovereign was merely the figurehead. Whenever "the natives of the upper class" asserted themselves and were supported by the masses, the whites became frothy in their mouths and used their influence to assert their rights, which they generally gained after applying a liberal dose of "prayers," beseeching them to beware of what may fall upon their heads and their country, at the same time bemoaning their attempted departure from the path of righteousness. Such is history as known in this country.

In a former issue, we gave out an incident of how certain chiefs made much of the children of missionaries, and one of the fathers present, who has already gone to his long rest, warned them, saying: "Beware of our children, for they are like snakes." This warning was given at Waianae Church, in Lahaina, long before our time, and when that place was the main entrepot of the Islands then known to commerce, and this warning, which is somewhat prophetic when we come to think of it now, has turned out to be only too true. Now if the natives do, as naively admitted, "all that the 'missionaries' contend for," then and then only are they fit and appear to be all right and sensible to do the right thing when wanted to.

It also scores Hawaiians when the "general suffrage" came with annexation, saying that "the first Legislature was probably the first one ever gathered under the American flag; the first delegate in Congress was a failure. The second Legislature swung like a pendulum between weakness and ignominy, except in special session where a creditable record was made." But who was to blame for it all? The Hawaiians, although in the majority, did not have the direct control of governmental affairs, were hampered at every turn by white men and the administration. The first delegate's failure was due to interference by white men from here and the present delegate, who is not much far behind the first, has run up against the same experience as his predecessor, in that "the better class (?) of white men," whom we may add as having no earthly use for the Hawaiians, have always shown themselves as being too willing to work against the delegate, be he Home Ruler or Republican, yet a Hawaiian and of the people of this country.

But a word as to the suffrage. Under Hawaiian monarchs, it is true the people enjoyed only a limited suffrage, but in that they were content, because they had it to themselves and were not much hampered by carpet beggars like those we have here at the present time. With the present universal suffrage, the people are being hampered at every turn, even in the majority. It is also true that the Hawaiian people is the controlling element, but that is only in numbers and not in fact, the whites being in the actual control of affairs, as there is not a single Hawaiian in the present "official family," as none is wanted.

Hawaiians in the past two sessions of the Legislature since the establishment of the Territory have merely followed in the wake of the examples set by the revolutionary sessions, called a Legislature, since

the overthrow in 1893, when white men took the reins of government away from the rightful people of the soil. We will pass over the first session and come to the second when the control of both houses were in the hands of Republicans. Much was done in order to establish a "good record," but the odium was worse than the first. Those who were of the moralists went astray. Hawaiians predominated and they got the worst of it, but they redeemed themselves during the special session in spite of the objections raised by white men, led by the Advertiser's crowd and the business community generally, which the Advertiser says "we choose to regard that record as the turning path of the Hawaiian legislator. It showed him in a new and better light." So mote it be.

As long as the Hawaiian accepts the lead of the white man, then he is all right and safe; but as soon as he asserts himself, then he's all wrong and unsafe. But for ourselves, the suffrage is perfectly safe with Hawaiians, who have enjoyed free and enlightened government, in a limited way, long before this new Moses made himself known. The former government of the Hawaiian people was established and recognized, but white men interfered and forcibly overthrew the same by connivance with the United States of America, who finally annexed the Islands as the result of the Spanish-American war. But the granting of the suffrage since then, as far as we are concerned, is no nightmare and that no grave mistake has been made.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

When have ever Hawaiians given "their aloha" to an island administration which has not a single native in its official family? When may we repeat. No aloha has as yet been given, not until next November, when the ballot box will decide the issue.

If the Vladivostok squadron of the Russian fleet does not succeed in checking the importation of American contraband of war into Japan, it will at least draw the Port Arthur fleet of Japan away from that place. The interesting point, however, is how the Russians are to get back to Vladivostok in case their ships are sighted by the Japs.

No attention has been paid by the authorities to our frequent references to which Aala park is being put to by Oriental children. Why not make a formal opening and then declare the park open to the public. It is "better late than never," before the beautiful grass lawn is ruined beyond beauty and recognition. The park itself needs more care before being trampled upon.

As was to be expected, the Advertiser this morning attacks the Good Government Club, an institution organized by citizens who believe that the safest policy for Hawaii in the future is to support the best men for public office, irrespective of their leaning in National politics. The Advertiser, judging from its past utterances, does not really object to the system; but because its missionary hui did not organize and does not control it the morning press sulks and says things. It is better for the Good Govern-

ment Club, however, that the Advertiser is opposed to it. That opposition is a healthy advertisement. It will draw to the club scores of members that would otherwise not have interested themselves in it. Shoot 'em up again, Tiser.

Tomorrow night the Territory is to be treated to some more kindergarten politics. In all the precincts of Honolulu the Republicans are to assemble, amid all kinds of cock-a-doodles, adverse compliments, the scurrying of hacks and all the other things that go to make up a situation to indicate that something is doing, to wind up with a few kegs of beer at the expense of the local brewery. Mark Twain thought the Hawaiian government was a Great Eastern in a sardine box. He ought to come here now and take a quiet squint at the methods of the Republican party.

Have you noticed of late that nine out of every ten Japanese women met on the street is accompanied by a child strapped to her back? It does seem that the Mikado's subjects in Hawaii have started out systematically in the commendable work of family building. The Portuguese were thought some years ago to be particularly strenuous in this line, but the Japanese are going them several times better. The matter is of especial interest in that every Japanese brat met on the streets is an American citizen and when he becomes 21 years of age will have a vote. There are now forty or fifty thousand of them. This means a Japanese legislature and Japanese representation in Congress in a very few days.

A MIND OF HIS OWN.

King Kamehameha V. Brook No Interference by a Meddler.

Speaking elsewhere of Kamehameha V. as a sovereign with a mind of his own, it may not be amiss for us to give out one incident in his life wherein he showed his strong will power. He did not take kindly to any dictations from anyone beneath him in authority.

A British war vessel was then in port and the King gave out orders for an entertainment in the usual custom of the country, including hula (dancing) closely to Nature's garb.)

The late Chief Justice, C C Harris, was then Attorney-General.

On learning of the proposed entertainment, Mr Harris made a call upon the King, and on being ushered into the august presence of his royal master, he said: "Your Majesty, this entertainment must not take place. It would be a disgraceful exhibition." To this the King immediately and caustically replied with much brusqueness, at the same time pointing out to the makai gate of the then Iolani Palace, in about the same position as it is now: "Mr Harris, I am King and will do as I please here. Your place of business is across. When I want your advice I will send for you."

And Mr Harris left his sovereign's presence and the entertainment came off that same evening, much to the discomfort of the meddler who failed in his efforts.

Speech of John Sharp Williams.

(Continued from 1st page.)

taken sensibly by sensible men, is a tariff for revenue to support a Republic effectively, constitutionally, in virility, in simplicity. (Applause.)

"My friends, the Democracy will not falter when it comes to reducing the duties upon trust produced articles to the point of competition, whenever the trusts attempt to exploit the American consumer for the foreigner. The Democratic party will nominate a man for President about whom everybody will not be guessing all the time what he is going to say or what he is going to do next.

"The Democratic party will denounce the reckless and heedless utterances of the President of the United States in his letter to Secretary Root upon the second anniversary of Cuban independence.

"We will let the world know that we recognize no duty of any sort to intervene in the internal affairs of other countries, because, forsooth, they do not conduct themselves well, as the President says, or because they do not know how to act with industrial and political decency. Who is going to be the judge of the industrial-decency part of the thing, or, because they do not keep order, as the President says, and we will give the world notice that the army and navy of the United States, under a Democratic administration, will never be used as a constabulary for the collection of the debts of European Governments, or the object of European Governments.

"The President says that where there is brutal-foing or impotency which results in a general loosening of the ties of civilized society, that it will become our manifest duty to interfere. My friends, wherever that exists the American people will regret it, and they will do what they can by example and by moral suasion to bring the people who are living in darkness up out of the darkness into the light. But they decline to encumber their own governmental institutions with the internal administration of the affairs of such people as those, and they decline to burden the Treasury of the United States with the police duty of bringing them to order."
