## BUBONIC PLAGUE

### SOURCE OF THE ORIENT

TWO UNDOUBTED CASES ARE DISCOVERED.

Board of Health Meets in Special Session—Island Steamers Prohibited From Leaving—Clean the City.

Black plague has appeared in Honolulu.

Dr. Day and other physicians who have handled the cases now in hand declare that there is no doubt of the existence of the dread scourge.

There have been two deaths that the physicians are certain about. The first was a Chinese bookkeeper for a grocer on Maunakea near Hotel street. He died last night and the body was buried after an autopsy this morning.

The second case was in the Wing Wo Tai store on Nuuanu near King. This man was also a bookkeeper. A doctor was called last night and he died this morning.

In the four hours from 9 to 1 o'clock today four sudden deaths have been reported to the Board of Health. All are suspicious and most probably at least two will turn out to be plague.

The first was in Ah's furniture store near the corner of Nuuanu and Pauahi streets. This discovery was made by Dr. Herbert. An hour later L. L. Lapierre who was making a house to house canvass telephoned another case in the house next door to Ah's. Both places have been quarantined.

Another case is on Queen street. It is said that this is peritonitis. Shortly after noon Dr. Garvin reported the sudden death of a native in the row of houses near the corner of Queen and Richard streets. He was summoned but the fellow was dead when he arrived. This may not be plague.

When the first announcement of plague was made this morning extraordinary precautions were taken. Mounted police have been set to guard the infected district. A Board of Health meeting was called for 12 o'clock noon.

The Board of Health immediately closed up both places where deaths had occurred and a meeting to take action was called for noon today.

### BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health met at 12 o'clock noon on the important duty of determining what should be done. President Henry E. Cooper was in the chair. Dr. Carmichael, of the United States Marine Hospital service, was an important functionary present, as detailed reports of the situation must be submitted by him at once to the mainland. Nearly all the physicians of the city, including Chinese, non members of the board, were present. President Dole was an interested spectator and took a deep interest in the discussion.

When the meeting opened Dr. Day reported that Dr. Herbert had been called at 9 o'clock last night to see a man suffering with symptoms of

## BY AUTHORITY WANTED!

Dr. Herbert makes a startling statement. He says there was a case of black plague in Honolulu on November 10th, over a month ago. "A woman died on Smith street on November 10th," says the doctor, "under very suspicious circumstances. Since the deaths of last night and this morning I have made close personal investigation and I am fully satisfied that it was black plague or bubonic plague. This was over a month ago. How far the contagion has since gone, it is impossible to tell, but I feel that the strongest measures should at once be taken to check the disease."

### PRESIDENT DOLE'S VIEWS.

President Dole, while realizing the seriousness of the situation, does not believe there is much cause for alarm. Plague is a child of filth. The president thinks there is no danger to those whose houses, persons and food are clean. He has unbounded confidence in the ability of the Board of Health to quickly stamp out the visitation.

### HEALTH ITEMS.

One or more physicians will be kept on duty at the Board of Health office day and night.

The Board of Health is this afternoon looking for either a steamer or sailing vessel to be used as a quarantine ship.

The Board of Health adjourned this afternoon subject to call. Meetings will be held several times a day, if necessary.

All the houses around the Kakaako Battery have been taken as a hospital. Work and target shooting there have been stopped.

The Board of Health wants hundreds of volunteer inspectors at once. All who will serve may apply at the office this afternoon.

"Good, carefully cooked food, clean homes and outhouses and no dampness of any sort about the premises," is an important watchword.

The next act of the Board of Health will be to issue pamphlet warnings in all languages. If the disease keeps up longer than tomorrow health bulletins will be regularly issued every day.

Dr. Hoffman, the Government bacteriologist, is making the scientific analyses of all specimens taken from the stomachs of victims. Dr. Alverez has also been called into service and is hard at work.

### SHIP HOSPITAL

Dr. Day urged the importance of a ship hospital, to be anchored outside. The Maunakea street Chinaman was created on quarantine island this morning.

Mr. Smith reported another sudden death in Chinatown this morning and requested, for Dr. Herbert, that a certificate be not issued.

Mr. Cooper reported another death a few hours ago on King street and asked the doctors to investigate at once.

On motion of Dr. Day it was voted that no Chinese or Japanese freight or passengers be allowed to leave Honolulu until further notice.

The question of whether the three sudden deaths among the crew of the Claudine had symptoms of the plague came up.

Dr. Emerson reported on the symptoms of each patient as well as the autopsy examinations. There were no indications of plague.

President Dole thought that there should be no traveling of natives and other nationalities, between Honolulu and the other islands without first, an examination and pass.

This was made a motion and carried unanimously.

The man died this morning. Dr. Hoffman's examination of contents of stomach and found the case to be plague. The man had been sick three days only. Dr. Day, Hoffman, Herbert and Carmichael examined the case.

Upon examination another case was found on Maunakea street. Dr. Burgess was called yesterday but before he arrived patient had died. Examination revealed plague symptoms.

Dr. Hoffman is making a further examination, but there can be no doubt, said Dr. Day, that the visitation is bubonic plague.

Both men had been in the country over a year, were bookkeepers in stores and had no connection with freight.

President Cooper thought the first thing to be done was a systematic house to house examination in search of other cases. Then there should be a thorough cleaning.

Dr. Day suggested that all refuse be destroyed at once by fire.

George W. Smith asked if there was a hospital available.

### ISLAND STEAMERS TABU

The Wilder steamship Kinau got away, on her regular run, shortly after noon, while the Board of Health was still in session. She had not taken all the freight aboard that was intended, but cut loose and started, thus avoiding a possible quarantine. The Helene has not yet got away and is likely to be held as a suspect.

The transport Warren will leave at 4 o'clock this afternoon, quarantine or no quarantine, says Colonel Beck. The colonel does not think that there is any reason for him to stay here, and the transport does not need the clearance papers that ordinary vessels require. Col. Beck stated at 1 o'clock today that it was his intention to leave at 4.

### HOW IT GOT HERE

How the plague made the journey from the Oriental countries where it is raging to Honolulu is a question that is much discussed along the waterfront, where are the men who handle the goods from all vessels, in which the scourge might have traveled. The last steamer to arrive here with immigrants from Kobe, at which port the plague is reported, was the Norwegian steamship Thyra. Vessels from Japan since her arrival have been from Yokohama, where there was no plague reported up to the time of the last telegraphic dispatches received here.

The Thyra reached here on November 28th, with 710 immigrants and 200 tons of general merchandise. Many of her immigrants were from the Kobe district. They were sent to the quarantine station and treated in the usual way.

The usual time for quarantine against the black plague in Eastern countries is twelve days. If this is sufficient the Thyra's passengers have been here long enough to make it sure that they do not bring the plague, unless there have been cases before those now reported. The rule here, however, is eighteen days in the case of the plague, so that it appears possible that the Thyra did bring the germs here.

When the Thyra arrived but few reports of the plague in Japan had been received here and it was not known that it was raging in Kobe. No more than the ordinary precautions were taken with her passengers and freight. The captain informed several people along the waterfront, just before he left that the plague was raging in Kobe.

### COUNCIL OF STATE

Mr. Dole said the Council of State had been called to appropriate money for expenses of fighting the plague. He asked how much would be required.

Mr. Cooper thought \$10,000 would be enough. It might be possible to put down the scourge very quickly.

Dr. Herbert was doubtful as to the origin of the disease. Whether food or rats was the agency could not now be determined. At any rate there had been two days of the disease and there had been no notable improvement.

Mr. L. La Pierre telephoned that he had found another case of black plague in Chinatown.

"What we want now is men," said Mr. Cooper.

Mr. Cooper reported that the Honolulu Iron Works was constructing a crematory and all bodies would be burned.

Money for same was authorized.

Mr. Cooper urged that all doctors of the city lend their services to the board.

Dr. Raymond thought the medical board should establish the existence of the disease before proceeding further.

### HERE A LONG TIME.

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The physicians are almost settled in the belief that the plague came here in Chinese food from Hongkong. There was a morning of gathering up all Oriental food, and continuing it until all danger has passed.

Briefly summarized, there have been six deaths; two are unquestionably black plague; two others are probably the same; the other two are most probably something else. All of the plague cases are either on Nuuanu or Maunakea streets.

Quite a number of housekeepers are arranging to keep their servants indoors, where they work, during the plague. The doctors say this is a wise precaution. Chinese and Japanese servants should not under any circumstances be allowed to go to Chinatown or to eat Oriental food.

Colonel James has offered the services of as many members of the National Guard as care to serve. The men are being assembled this afternoon. Sergeant Mills, of Company A, was the first to assemble a squad of willing workers. They will be in uniform and serve as guards over quarantined places.

stray scraps of paper from a patient's house and even the damp air round about it, are constantly carrying out the germs. For instance, in the present outbreak at Kobe, the first victim was an employee of a dealer in grain, and the second and third were handlers of imported cotton. From these circumstances, it may be presumed that the disease germs came to Kobe concealed in those articles recently imported from Newchwang, China.

### RATS A MEDIUM.

Besides the above, there is another object which everywhere makes itself a powerful medium for the propagation of the disease, namely the rat; and it is almost always the case that, in a pest-stricken house two or three dead rats, victims of the plague, are to be found. The pest is infectious not only in the case of human beings, but most especially so with rats. For example, if a piece of flesh from the thigh of a rat's tail, the animal will almost immediately drop dead, so violent being the power of attack which the bacilli possess in the case of the rodent. On the occasion of the outbreak of the disease in Hongkong some years ago, and before the general public had come to realize its dreadful character, carcasses of dead rats were to be found in large numbers on the streets and roadside of the place. On examination, these dead rats were discovered to be literally filled with the plague bacilli; and steps were at once taken to enforce preventive measures against rats in general. But being extremely shy animals, it was practically impossible to devise any effective means for putting them under control, and the propagation of the disease from this source became utterly irremediable. Furthermore, being carnivorous in their habits, rats eat up their dead comrades—the victims of the plague—thus spreading the infection throughout all ratdom. The consequence was that anything and everything bitten by rats or soiled by their excretions became the means of conveying the disease to the human body. The only efficient method of disinfection will thus be, as it was then, to burn down the plague stricken house with all its contents.

Again, however infinitesimally small the wounds or cuts on the hand and feet be, when attacked they will at once become the avenue of entrance into our body for the germs, and in consequence, the propagation is generally very rapid among the lower classes of the Chinese, Indians and Japanese who are wont to go about barefooted.

### WRECKED ON LAHAINA REEF

THE STEAMER KILOHANA A TOTAL LOSS.

Went Ashore Just After Midnight on Saturday and is Being Rapidly Broken to Pieces.

The island steamer Kilohana was wrecked early on Sunday morning at Lahaina. She ran on to the reef between Lahaina and Kaanapali and is a total loss. No lives were lost. The weather was not rough and it is supposed that the accident was due to an error of calculation. The statement of captain Nicholson of the Kilohana, as brought by captain Simerson of the Mauna Loa, throws the blame on the first mate.

The Kilohana left here last Saturday for a short trip to Lahaina and Kaanapali. She had two passengers on board and a full load of freight. She arrived off Lahaina at about midnight and made for the harbor, going on the reef at a point where the coast is quite well known. There was the usual ocean swell on at the time, but not enough to endanger the vessel under ordinary circumstances.

The Kilohana was in charge of captain Nicholson, formerly mate of the Mauna Loa, who was on his second trip as captain this time. To captain Simerson captain Nicholson gave an account of the disaster which makes the mate responsible. "I was on deck just before the accident," he is reported as saying, "and before going below gave the mate instructions as to how to keep the vessel going. I told him to keep her ahead as she was. Ten minutes after I got below I felt the shock of going ashore. I rushed on deck and found the mate asleep. It was too late to do anything to save the vessel."

Chief Engineer Tillander of the Kilohana came to this city this morning on the Mauna Loa. He reports that the wrecked vessel is very rapidly being pounded to pieces on the rocks and that there is no chance of saving her. "I was asleep below when the accident happened," said Mr. Tillander. "I understand that the captain and mate were on deck. After the vessel went on the rocks we worked hard to get her off, staying at it from Saturday midnight till 4 o'clock this morning. Then we had to give it up. The crew were sent ashore last night. The captain and mate and I stayed on the vessel, but we were thrown clear across the deck by an ocean swell and had to give it up."

At the offices of the Inter-Island Steamship Company, which owned the vessel, the disaster was attributed to a miscalculation on the part of the captain and to a mistake in placing lights.

The Kilohana had been in commission about a year. She was built at Port Blakeley, Washington and is valued by the company at over \$50,000. This sum will not cover the loss caused by destruction of the vessel at this time, it is stated. The lost steamer was of 247 tons net register and had provided herself a first class boat for Inter-Island service. Her cargo was 100 tons of coal, 100 barrels of cement and a number of packages of sundries. All that was saved from the wreck was some machinery belonging to the vessel, which the crew managed to get ashore before she went to pieces.

### NICARAGUA CANAL.

An Extension of Time Not to be Granted.

MANAGUA (Nicaragua), November 6.—The Government of Nicaragua has refused to grant a time extension to the Maritime Canal Company, but agrees to accept arbitration as to the concession granted to Eyre & Cragin. It is required that the arbitrators be citizens of the United States. The process is conducted under the laws of Nicaragua enacted subsequent to the granting of the concession. The agent of the canal company protests against these conditions and declares that the arbitration clause in the company's concession gives full liberty for the selection of arbitrators to the state and the company.

### INJUNCTION DENIED.

One Phase of the Clark-T. B. Murray Case Decided.

In the matter of Thomas G. Clark vs. T. B. Murray, specific performance, et al., Judge Stanley on Saturday denied a temporary injunction on condition that defendant file a bond in the sum of \$250 and bargain to deliver to plaintiff all painting he may have in his absolute control.  
Sometime ago plaintiff obtained a verbal lease of defendant for the upper floor of his shop on King street. One of the conditions was that Murray was to give him all of his painting. Plaintiff claims that Murray has not complied with this part of the agreement.

### HISSED IN PARIS.

NEW YORK, November 29.—A cable to the Sun from London says: Twelve First Tennessee Volunteers, including Lieutenant Stacker, arrived in London today. These men, who are all from Clarksville, Tenn., left Manila on October 6th on their way home. They came via Nagasaki and the Suez canal. They will sail for home on the American line steamship St. Louis on December 2d.  
The American volunteers had an exciting experience on the Boulevard Montmartre, Paris. The Parisians mistook the Americans in their khaki uniforms for Englishmen and a howling mob surrounded their hotel and threatened them with violence. Some one shouted: "Americans." The mob did not appear to regard Americans in much more favorable light than Englishmen, but sullenly disappeared.

### KHALIFA INVITES DEATH.

CAIRO, December 1.—Officers from the Soudan who have arrived here say that when General Wingate's force overtook the Khalifa the latter tried to outflank the Anglo-Egyptians, but failed. Seeing his position was hopeless, the Khalifa bade his emirs stay with him and die. He then spread a sheepskin on the ground and sat down on it with the emirs on each side of him.  
The Khalifa was found shot in the head, heart, arms and legs, and the emirs were lying dead beside him. The members of his bodyguard were all dead in front of them. General Wingate's force swept over them without recognizing the Khalifa and his Emirs, but they were identified later.

### NEW HACK RULE.

Minister Young's hack order practically restores the old situation regarding vehicles off their stands. Except when waiting for a customer a hack can not stop anywhere except on its appointed station.

### WILHELMINA TO WED.

BERLIN, November 30.—After the return of the Kaiser to Berlin today report, originating from the lobby of the Reichstag, was spread that Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands is to be married to none other than the Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany.

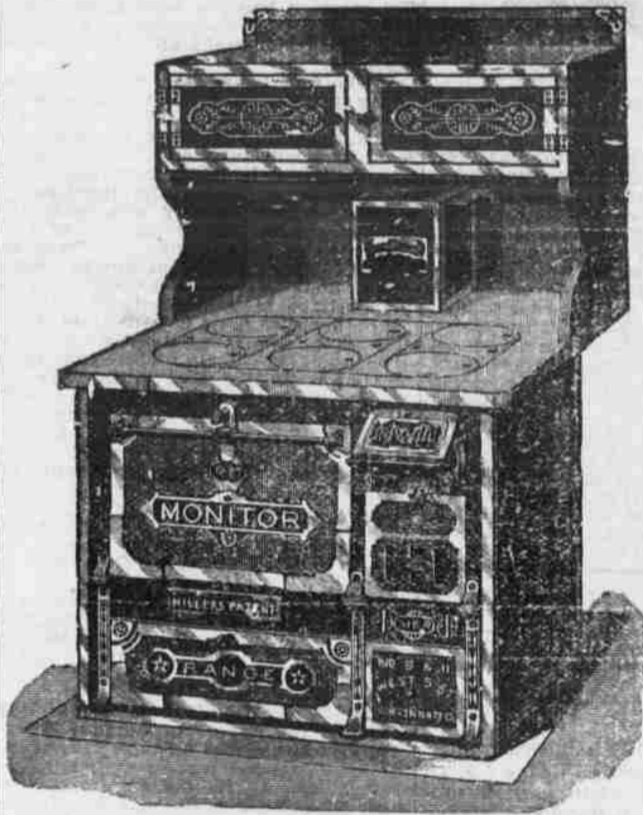

OPEN DAY AND NIGHT

WARREN'S CRAP SHOOTERS
THREE BIG GAMES IN FULL
BLAST.

One Game in Which \$400 Changed

and would not allow them in the game.
The hoale understood the game well
and it is said gathered in most of the
money during the afternoon.
No "crap" shooting is allowed on the
Warren. The soldiers were paid off
just before leaving San Francisco and
their misery without craps on the long
voyage may well be imagined. The
games ashore here offered their only
chance until they got to Manila, and
that the darkeys are availing them-
selves of the opportunity goes without
saying. And of course the money of
the regiment is swiftly slipping from
the hands of the many into the pockets
of the few.

placed in an easily discovered position
with a view to satisfying the customs
officers that they had got the ship-

posed to belong to William Fong, the
cook, who acknowledged ownership of
the ten tins. He was arrested, convicted
and fined \$250 and, as he had not the
money, he is still in jail, with a year's
sentence before him. Captain Roos of
the Eric says that he had no knowl-
edge of the presence of the dope on his
vessel and he declines to come to the
assistance of his cook. The latter would
have made between two and three hun-
dred dollars if he had succeeded in get-
ting the forty tins ashore. The captured
opium was put on board in Victoria.

MEET IT BRAVELY.

It is with great regret that the announcement is made that two cases of black or bubonic plague have been discovered in the city, one in Wing We Tai's store in Nuuanu street, which has proved fatal and another not yet fatal, in Maunakea street, while another yet is suspected.

Before making any inquiry into how the dread disease has managed to gain a foothold, the first step to be taken, and it has been taken, is to quarantine the places where it has been discovered, the next step, and this has already been initiated, though it will be more strenuously carried out as the day goes on, will be a thorough cleansing of the city. The Board of Health may be relied upon for taking stringent measures and in a case of this kind there will be plenty of volunteers ready to give every assistance in their power.

Though there will assuredly be great alarm in many homes, the Europeans and Americans and all those who have homes and good wholesome food need have no fear. In Bombay presidency where the deaths among the native population amounted to 400 a week, not a single case occurred among the European population. The papers sometimes stated that a European had been attacked, but investigation in all such cases proved that the person attacked was a Eurasian, that is a mixed breed, who like to count themselves as Europeans.

The main thing for everyone to do is to cultivate cleanliness. Not only cleanliness in their own houses, but cleanliness in those of their neighbors. The Board of Health has ample authority in such matters, and the Board of Health should be loyally supported. We stamped out cholera in 1895, and we should be able to do as well now with the plague. We have cleansed the city once, we must thoroughly cleanse it again. Bubonic plague is a fifth disease free air and sunshine, and the destruction of festering rubbish by fire will wage a successful battle against it. District the town—call for volunteers—establish a strict quarantine and the snake may be throttled in its infancy. Action should be quick and rapid. A moment now may be worth weeks later on. Above all let the authorities be firm no matter whose ox is gored.

The condition of the roads is very bad. The streets of the city have been so out up by sewer work and track laying that the slightest shower turns them into a series of mud puddles interspersed with a pasty mess that clings to one's boot soles and is hugely unpleasant.

The pure food battle in Hawaii seems to be dragging along slowly. Professor Chittenden of Yale, in his evidence before the Senate committee which is investigating the adulteration of food, insists that oleomargarine and similar products should be labelled and sold for what they are. This is what should be done here, if the law were efficiently carried out. But another suggestion is also made, and that is that the real article should be labelled also. Under such a requirement if a dealer sold spurious goods he would not only be proceeded against for selling an imitation contrary to law, but also for obtaining the money of his customers by false pretences. If all dealers in food products were made to label them all, whether pure or imitation there could be no doubt as to methods of procedure in a case of cheating.

IT ANSWERS WELL.

The effect of the gold standard upon Japanese trade is brought forth in replies addressed by one of the Japanese Chambers of Commerce to the Japanese Consul in New York. The Chamber inquired:

1.—"Has there been any feeling on the New York market against our country on account of its adoption of the gold standard?"

Answer.—"The export trade from New York to Japan is showing signs of development year after year; and these signs were especially marked last year. Though such advance of trade is not wholly attributable to the adoption of the gold system at home, yet it is noticeable that the export merchants at New York are greatly benefited in the transaction of business, for there has been no serious change on one side or the other since Japan adopted the gold system."

2.—"Did the adoption of the gold standard in Japan tell disadvantageously upon export business from Japan to New York?"

Answer.—"No; not at all. Owing to the stoppage of fluctuation in exchange, all the principal articles of merchandise, such as raw silk, tea, etc., entering New York from Japan are maintaining a most advantageous position in the field of competition against the products coming from China."

There is a practical illustration in this as to the value of a gold standard. With gold there was a stop put to the fluctuations in exchange. With a silver basis no one can predicate what exchange in China might be. The United States is fortunate that it escaped the silver standard which would surely have caused a financial crash long ere this. The present prosperity would have been a dream to wish for, and not a reality which has brought plenty into hundreds of thousands of homes.

THE HOODLUM QUESTION.

The question of how to deal with the wharf rats and other hoodlums of the city is a serious one, though few people seem to give the matter much thought. The Star pointed out yesterday the location of three gangs, other than the wharf rat gang, and it would be well if they could be broken up. It is not lack of education that is to be complained of in these boys. Of the eleven arrested on the wharf a week ago, all could read and write and all could talk English. Each boy had been to school. It was found that the boys were able to keep accounts, for they had a banker, who took charge of the funds and issued and charged up money for their meals and other expenses.

Education, though excellent in itself, is not the panacea for all social ills. Forty or fifty years ago it used to be thought so, but experience has proved that education is by no means necessarily a safeguard from criminality. In point of fact education has frequently made only the smoother rogue and the more accomplished villain. But this does not prove that education is faulty, it only proves that bad material may be polished, but it remains bad material. A paste diamond, however much it may glitter, remains a paste diamond it can never pass for a real stone.

We do, however, require some safeguard against these youths and boys sinking into lower depths. At present it is idleness, gambling, and may be some pilfering. Later it will develop into crime of deeper dye, into burglary, highway robbery and mayhap into homicide. There is doubt about the easy grade downward of such boys, and with the development of the male hoodlum will come the development of the female hoodlum and the eventual perpetuation of criminal families costing the State untold amounts.

It was not so long ago that a gang of hoodlums used to regularly collect in Palama, a perfect nuisance to the neighborhood, and their rough horse play resulted one night in a stabling affray which brought one lad to death's door and landed another in jail. It is easy, however, to point out the evils, it is very much more difficult to point out the remedy. Good work in the direction is done by the Salvation Army, the members of which understand how to work in the slums, and do not attempt conversion from the point of view of the broad cloth coat, the plug hat and the morning Sunday school. The latter are excellent in their place, but they do not attract the hoodlum or the wharf rat. Some others have worked in this direction also, and have a measure of success.

But what is needed is to try and remove the young hoodlum from his surroundings, and for this an Industrial School is urgently needed. There should be one for boys and one for girls and the work in them should be reformatory and not punitive. It is to raise and not to degrade that we must strive after. There will be a certain percentage saved and made good and useful members of the community, and there will be another percentage, it is to be hoped a very small one, which will prove hopeless and graduate from the Industrial School into the jail. But if we set the bulk of this class on the road to industry and independence, we shall have accomplished a good work for the future of the Territory. Meantime it is a fact that the eleven little wharf rats, after five days punishment breaking stones have returned to their old companions, and are starting out on their gambling, idling and pilfering career once more.

## FREIGHT BLOCKADED AGAIN

NO ROOM FOR CHRISTMAS SHIPMENTS.

The Water Front Blockaded All This Morning By Island Freight—Large Quantity Rejected.

The freight blockade at the Kinau wharf was worse than ever this morning. At seven o'clock there were about twenty-five trucks all full waiting at the wharf. They blocked the whole of the wide street from Kinau wharf to the Inter Island wharf and the teamsters sat and smoked while they waited their turns to get to the steamer.

The Kinau was full soon after ten o'clock and the line of trucks was still there. The teamsters began to leave before eleven, giving up all hope of getting their stuff on board. The Kinau was full to her utmost capacity. The leaving of the Helene, which was set for last night, was postponed till noon today. She was not able to get away, owing to the very heavy shipments.

The unusually large shipments are Christmas goods to a considerable extent. It begins to appear that many people on other islands than Oahu are going to fail to receive their presents. There will only be one or two more steamers going out before too late for Christmas gifts and it is estimated that already enough has been offered to fill them.

### NEW STEAM LAUNCH.

The Fort George brought from San Francisco a new steam launch for the firm of Gear, Lansing & Company. The launch is intended to run between Lahaina and Maunaloa, for Maunaloa plantation. It is 55 feet long. The Fort George went to the Pacific Mail stock and the launch was lowered into the water. The engine was put in later.

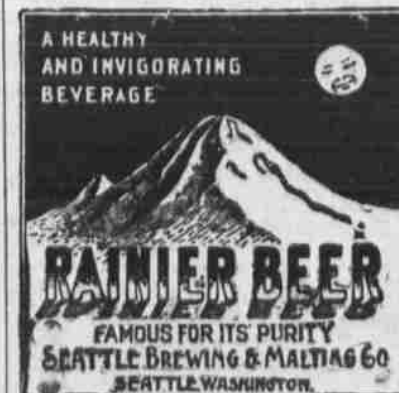

DESKY WANTS A NAME FOR HIS NEW HOTEL.

Site of the Hostelry is in the Upper Altitudes of Pacific Heights With a Wonderful Scenic Prospect.

There is a chance for some one with a poetically vivid imagination and a good pair of legs to make a hundred dollars in gold.

Bruce Waring & Company want a name for the new hotel they are going to build on Pacific Heights. Its site is near the top of the Pacific Heights tract on a beautifully leveled site space terraced many feet above the building sites immediately below it, and commanding one of the most remarkable views to be found anywhere in the islands. The site extends Ewa way to where the heights descend in a sheer precipice of many hundred feet to Nuuanu valley. Toward the sea the view comprehends the whole city of Honolulu, the harbor, and the ocean as far as the eye can see. On a clear day the coast of Molokai can be discerned beyond Diamond Head, and that commanding prominence itself is seen so clearly that one almost feels as if he could stretch forth his hand and touch it. In the other direction, Pearl Harbor the sea is outlined in the distance, a wonderful panoramic view, with the Waianae mountains beyond, while toward the ocean on the other side of the island, Nuuanu valley rises, clearly seen to the very gates of the pass over the Fall.

There is enough in the view to stimulate imagination to devise a name that would suggest all this. The good pair of legs is needed to get up and see it. They will not be needed very long because rapid transit to it will be provided very soon.

The site for the hotel is already prepared. Building operations will begin as soon as the rainy season is over. The plans are being prepared, and the stock has all been taken. The hundred dollar prize will be given to the one who suggests the most appropriate name for the hotel.

A Mr. Williamson from the States is having a fine residence built on the Heights not far from the reservoir. It is now nearly completed. Another one has been started at about the same elevation. ### URDANETA FIGHT.

Gallant Defense of Gunboat to the Very Last.

WASHINGTON, November 30.—A dispatch to the Navy Department from Admiral Watson at Manila received today, gives additional details of the fate of the crew of the gunboat Urdaneta, which was attacked and destroyed by insurgents some time ago. The dispatch follows:

"MANILA, November 30.—Oregon's force turned over Vigan to portion of the Navy Department on 28th. Returned with 106 recaptured Spanish prisoners. Taking of Vigan creditable to naval force. Coxswain Green and Apprentice Power of Urdaneta's crew escaped insurgents; reported on flagship. Report Cadet Woods mortally wounded. Died within fifteen minutes. Mitchell, Drummond, Stone and Grey killed outright. Burial place unknown; will endeavor to locate. Farley, Herbert and Burk alive and well October 30. Present whereabouts unknown. Chinese killed by insurgent spears. Urdaneta fought till guns failed; made gallant fight, date September 17th."

LONDON, November 29.—General Lord Kitchener, Sirle of the Egyptian army, having decided to open the Soudan railway extension to Khartoum on January 1th, Cook's tourist agency advertises a time table which provides for a train leaving Wady Halfa at 8 p. m. on Thursday, January 7th. Passengers will dine on the train. Abu Hamad will be reached at 1:30 a. m. on Friday; Abaha at 1:30 p. m.; Atbara at 4:30 and Shendi at 9 o'clock. The train is due to arrive at Khartoum at 3 a. m. on Saturday.
